Council endorses 50% permanent SRV application

Armidale Regional Council will proceed with an application for a permanent Special Rate Variation (SRV) of 50% to be phased in over three

A comprehensive report was presented at the council meeting held last week that included a Capacity to Pay Report, feedback, submissions and a Summary of Community Consultation Report and a Special Rate Survey Analysis. Approval was also sought to apply to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) for an SRV of 50% (Including the rate peg) of the general rate component only (58.8% cumulative) phased in over a three year period commencing in the 2023-2024 financial year.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Sam Coupland said the decision was a bold move that could set the Armidale region up to grow its way out of decline and into economic prosperity.

"Over the last couple of decades rates have not been set at a level where they needed to be which has significantly contributed to the underinvestment in the real cost of maintaining council's assets and providing services. Even a modest increase in rates during that time would have negated the need for such bold action to be taken now," said Mayor Coup-

"We are now at a crossroads, we either do nothing and manage the inevitable decline or we turn it around and make the tough decisions that need to be made. We chose the latter and the future prosperity and financial security for our families and generations to come."

Council officers will update the Integrated Planning and Reporting (IP&R) documents including the Delivery Program and Long-Term Financial Plan to meet the SRV application requirements. This will also include an addendum to the Delivery Program demonstrating the impact of a 50% SRV.

These documents will be presented to the December 2022 council meeting to be endorsed for public exhibition. An extra-ordinary meeting will be convened in January 2023 to present and review submissions on the revised IP&R documents. Council must submit its application to IPART by February 2023.

Helicopter called in following Baldersleigh car accident

A Guyra man has been flown to hospital suffering serious injuries after his car slammed into a tree. The man, aged in his 50s, was seriously injured in the crash on Baldersleigh Road, just before dawn on Thursday November 24th.

Ambulance paramedics were told he was in the car that left the roadway and rolled over a steep embankment before it hit a tree, at about 5.30am.

The man suffered a head injury, as well as leg and chest injuries. Paramedics treated the man at the scene and called for the Westpac Rescue Helicopter from Tamworth.

The chopper's critical care medical team assessed the patient and stabilised him at the scene. He was then flown to Newcastle's John Hunter Hospital and was listed in a stable condition. The cause of the crash is being investigated.

ARRA members tour glasshouses

Members of the Armidale Regional Residents' Association (ARRA) had a tour of the Costa Tomato glasshouse operation last week.

Tal Kanety, Head Grower Technical/R&D, showed the group through one of the glasshouses, explaining the growing process and sustainability initiatives at the New England Highway site. The group then toured the packing shed.

Costa State Manager NSW Vertical Farming, Scot MacDonald, said it was a great opportunity to showcase the facility and answer questions about the glasshouses, which total 40-hectares across two sites.

Requests from ARRA for additional tours in 2023 is a great indication that they found it interesting and enjoyable and Costa is looking forward to welcoming them again in the new year.

Homes North to manage community housing in Guyra

The management of two community housing facilities in Guyra will be transferred to Homes North.

Armidale Regional Council currently operate two separate community housing assets (five flats total) as part of arrangements between NSW Land and Housing and the previous Guyra Shire Council.

These assets were constructed under deeds in the 1980's for use as community housing assets - one focussed on age group under 40, the other focussed on older community members.

Council currently operates these assets on a 'first come, first served' basis, more recently using an external real estate agency to administer tenancy contracts. These community assets are not registered as part of the wider community housing list or crisis accommodation for the region.

A report to council described the assets as having 'challenging tenancy circumstances' and revealed that the last occupation of the Nincoola street flats resulted in criminal damage and an insurance claim of over \$60,000.

Council staff identified that Homes North would be better equipped to manage these assets and offer additional support to the tenancies as required and have approached Homes North for a management arrangement.

Homes North is a local business that operates as NSW Land and Housing representative. Council also approved an increase in rent percentage, consistent with the wider community housing levels currently under management of Homes North and NSW Land and Housing which both currently levy 25% income arrangements.



Community information sessions well attended

Costa Tomato Exchange and Jobs Australia hosted community "drop-in" sessions in Guyra last week, which were well attended by local residents and business owners.

Costa and Jobs Australia are Approved Employers under the Federal Government's Pacific Labour Mobility Scheme which brings in seasonal workers on fixed term visas. Workers are currently living in a variety of accommodation including townhouses, units, caravan parks, university colleges and houses spread across Armidale and Guyra.

The drop-in sessions were designed to gauge community views on the housing situation in Guyra and the potential for other types of accommodation, including the development of purpose-built accommodation for groups of workers.

Costa State Manager NSW Vertical Farming, Scot MacDonald,

said it was important to hear from the local community.

"A range of views were expressed about future worker accommodation, and we were also able to provide some facts and figures about the current worker housing in our region. While the demand for housing from Costa workers was one part of the accommodation pressures in Armidale and Guyra, we heard there are many other factors including lack of social housing and new people moving into the area," Scot said.

"While we were speaking to residents and local businesses, we were also able to provide an update on our production from the new glasshouses and hear some ideas for our ongoing community support.

"The Guyra and Armidale communities are integral to Costa's future planning and we'll continue to keep up the information flow."

Additional funding to urgently fix potholes

The regions councils will receive an immediate \$3.72 million to keep on top of the growing number of potholes and damage on local roads.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said the funding, from the government's one-off Fixing Local Roads Pothole Repair Round, would be used to cover the extra cost and ease workload pressures for urgent repairs to the most damaged sections of the local road network across the region.

Mr Marshall said that the extra cash alone isn't the panacea, but it is a welcome boost for our councils and their road crews, who are trying to take advantage of the current dry period to complete as much repair work as they can.

Under the funding round,

councils were allocated funding based on the size of their local road network: Armidale Regional will receive \$265,448.66, Glen Innes Severn, \$395,357.10, Gwydir Shire \$709,204.63, Inverell Shire, \$794,261.52, Moree Plains Shire \$927,639.40, Uralla Shire \$316,306.28, Walcha \$314,554.94.

"Councils are responsible for maintenance on the local road network so this extra cash will help ease some of the pressure they are facing and boost the resources they can draw upon to fix the most damaged roads," Mr Marshall said.

"It will also help reduce the number popped tyres, bent rims and other vehicle damage being sustained by motorists as they try to navigate some challenging road conditions."

Free mulch for the community

A free load of mulch for residents will be available from either the Armidale or Guyra waste management facilities, starting on Saturday 26 November through until 18 December 2022 (weekends only).

The mulch is shredded green waste, which will benefit the soil

and can save water, time and effort with pulling out weeds.

Community groups will also be able to take advantage of the free mulch to prep up their gardens for the summer. The maximum amount for a community group is two loads or 16 cubic metres

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

November 23rd - There was a small reduction in lamb numbers to 2450 head with sheep increasing to 2150 head. It was a very mixed quality penning of lambs featuring some high quality new seasons, and a line of well finished heavy Merino lambs. The usual processors were in attendance.

Market trends through the lambs were generally cheaper with the trade weight young lambs to 24kg down \$4 to \$5 per head. The heavy weight young lambs also showed a slightly cheaper trend. Plain condition lightweight lambs sold to cheaper trends under limited processor and restocker competition.

Trade weight lambs to 24 kg saw a firm to slightly cheaper trend while heavier weights followed a similar trend. The limited supply of heavy lambs remained firm. There were very few well finished heavy weight

sheep in the penning with the bulk of the offering light and medium weights.

Processor demand was somewhat subdued. This resulted in cheaper trends throughout. Falls of as much as \$14 per head on the lightweight sheep. Medium weight sheep sold to cheaper trends of \$12 to\$20 per head with the bigger falls on the lessor quality lines. The well finished heavyweights remained firm.

Armidale Cattle Sale

November 24th - Numbers fell by more than half for a yarding of 450 head. Young cattle made up the bulk of the offering along with a fair supply of grown cattle. The quality of the offering was fair to good with condition showing a great variation.

The usual processors were in attendance however demand was subdued. Restocker activity was high. Feed driven confidence was evident in the marketplace for better quality lightweight steers with both the vealers and yearlings to restock-

ers selling to dearer trends with strong gains posted on the vealer portion. Secondary quality lightweight yearling steers sold to cheaper trends. The vealer heifers to restockers also sold to a dearer trend.

Medium weight yearling steers sold to a cheaper trend of as much as 20c/ kg.Quality and breed played a large part in cheaper trends for yearling heifers to restockers with prices well down on the previous sale. There was little processor activity on grown steers with most going to restockers. Well finished grown heifers to process were considerably cheaper. This trend followed into the cows and bulls where prices fell significantly.

Weekly Wool Market

November 25th - The market was able to record a positive after a disappointing four weeks of losses. Gains were recorded immediately upon Tuesdays opening with the Northern region indicator rising 6 cents for the day. The momentum carried

over into Wednesday's sales and by the close of the week the individual Merino micron indicators were 25 to 45 cents dearer.

The Aussie dollar fell against the US leaving the market unchanged for the week when looked at in US dollars. The small national offering led to just 29,242 bales being sold. The clearance rate improved as the market climbed with 8.5% passed in.

Major buyers included Endeavour Wool, Techwool & Meliwa. This is the second time that the market has bounced off a similar low point in the past two months. Further consolidation next week could indicate that somewhat of a floor has been established.

The designated Superfine sale scheduled for Sydney next week should assist the finer micron indicators, however the national roster is expecting an additional 8,000 bales to be offered compared to this week's sale with a similar figure also expected for the following week.
