Costa Tomatoes celebrates end of successful year

Costa Tomatoes is celebrating the end of a successful year with Christmas celebrations for employees. Costa State Manager NSW Vertical Farming, Scot MacDonald, said it had been a successful year and he welcomed the support from the entire team, local businesses and the community.

"We started the year with our expanded glasshouses coming into full production. This means we now have the capacity to produce up to 20 million kilograms of tomatoes per annum," Mr MacDonald said.

"Our new facilities also include a 2.5 hectare nursery, where we are trialling new varieties to meet the demands of our customers.

"It's been really exciting seeing this project come to fruition, which has flow-on benefits for the whole region including expenditure on goods and services within the New England region of approximately \$11 million a year."

Mr MacDonald said a key focus throughout the year was supporting the local community and organisations across the region. This has included support for the Armidale Regional Show, Guyra Show Society, Armidale based social enterprise Back Track, Duval Dam Buster Trail Run and UNE Agriculture Careers Expo. Costa also offered a \$5000 scholarship through UNE.

"We have also continued to provide our healthy tomatoes to numerous organisations and

schools and have had the opportunity to host a number of local groups for tours of our facility.

"At a broader level, Costa's tomato and mushroom operations have partnered with Coles to contribute \$200,000 over two years to the Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Foundation, which promotes healthy food habits from a young age."

Mr MacDonald thanked all employees including those from the Pacific Islands.

"It was great to see the excitement in our work-

force as they followed the Samoan team reach the final of the Rugby League World Cup. It was the first time a Pacific Island nation had reached this level.

"We are very grateful for the support of our local community, and in particular want to acknowledge the members of our Costa Tomato Exchange Community Reference Group – Dot Vickery, Rev Andrew Campbell, David Bearup – for their valuable contribution through the year."

Council agrees to purchase Oaky River Dam

Armidale Regional Council (ARC) last week resolved to secure the purchase of the Oaky River Dam, to address the region's underlying water security needs, which emerged as needing urgent attention during the long period of drought.

ARC Mayor Sam Coupland said that water security is the number one issue preventing our region from growing.

"We need to provide a longterm solution to allow the region to sustainably support growth over the next few years," he said.

"The timing is perfect, as Council had identified Oaky River Dam as the preferred water supply option in March this year. This will be wonderful for our whole region."

Armidale Regional Council General Manager, James Roncon, said Council has acted quickly when the option to purchase Oaky River Dam became available and it has been the preferred option to address water security.

"The Hydro-Electric Scheme built in 1956, suffered damage in 2013 and so is no longer active. Whilst it does require work to repair and develop into a water source, is critical infrastructure and will ensure our region is better prepared for any future drought," Mr Roncon said.

"Compared with creating a whole new dam, with Oaky it means the impact on the environment is already known. It's a logical choice to establish as an additional water source,"

Council agreed to the purchase of the dam for \$4.3M which will come out of the funds for the Water Reserve, which is currently \$29.6M. Council will now begin the process of lobbying the State Government and opposition for funding to reinstate the Oaky River Dam wall and construct a pipeline from the dam to the Armidale Water Treatment Plant (WTP), ahead of the program to raise Malpas Dam Spillway.

This aligns with a funding pro-

posal currently with Department of Planning and Environment (DPE) for pre-construction works, leading to a tender ready stage which is the next step for the water security project. The acquisition comes after Council set ambitious growth targets of 4,000 jobs over the next ten years as part of a Mayoral Growth and Jobs summit held

in February this year.

Securing the region's water supply, to support the level of growth required, now provides assurance to future developers that we are open for business and our region is an attractive option for those considering a tree change.



Solar grant for Guyra Men's Shed
