## Renewable Energy Zone

The NSW Government has designated New England as a Renewable Energy Zone. Some 1500 to 2000 Wind Towers and tens of millions of Solar Panels plus new 500kv transmission Lines are planned for New England

Some 900 Towers are proposed for our Southern New England area. Uralla is central to this development and is the site for several planned substations linking new and existing north south and east west lines and a new twin 500kv transmission line, see attached map.

This year at St Mary of the Angels we have taken on a project with MEG, a global program that encouraged us to make a change in our school for the better. We are known as Global Citizenship Ambassadors, this includes students Tom, Camilla, Noah and Mackenzie, alongside our teachers, Miss Casey Lennon and Miss Tiffany Martin who have been there to assist us with our project and in helping us succeed.

The problem that we identified in our school was rubbish and the amount of rubbish we had in our school. If we were to be successful in our school with our project we would need to begin by improving our recycling and rubbish collection. To address our problem we needed to work with the leaders in our school to make a change so rubbish was reduced and no longer a problem.

As the year progressed, so did our project which saw the implementation of an education program about recycling created by ourselves. The buying of colour coded bins for correct rubbish sorting and writing a letter to the local council about collection services and signage. As the year has continued we have looked into introducing nude food lunch boxes in our school to further reduce our amount of waste at school.

Throughout this year we have engaged in a range of research, and conversations with school leaders, teachers, students, and families. We have also had conversations with our local council and have been involved in zoom meetings with other schools around Australia who have also been a part of the global citizenship ambassadors program.



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## "Wildlife Tails"



### Christmas is coming.... bringing gifts, friends, families and MAGPIES

So beware. Magpies are one of Australia's most loved and feared birds. They are friendly, their song is synonymous with Aussies and most of us have a pair nearby where we live.

For some reason known only to them the majority of fledglings leave or are kicked out of the nest before they can fly. The parents usually secrete them under a bush and continue to feed them. Magpie parents are extremely protective of their young and in late spring and summer will defend their family in the only way they can - by swooping any perceived threat. According to Professor Darryl Jones who has spent his life observing birds (and is now a Pro-



fessor of Ecology at Griffith University), magpies know the recognise the faces of those people that live in their area. If at some time when you were young you threw marbles, sticks or stones at them they remember so will always see you as a threat, also speed disturbs them, hence they attack if you're on a bike of

some sort

Northern Tablelands Wildlife Carers receive lots of calls re magpie young on the ground. What to do?

Keep your animals and children in the house.

Watch and see if the parents are feeding the chick.

If not ring us.

If the chick is being fed and you are able bring the bird in at night, a cardboard box with paper or a towel in the bottom is fine and return the chick outside in the morning.

If it's not perching then an ice cream container with holes punched in the bottom and a couple in the top sides can be used then hung in a tree and yes the parents will continue to feed it. You still need to bring it in at night.

### Rural Market Reports

## Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

December 7th - There was a small increase in lamb numbers to 2640 with sheep supplies falling to 1490 head. The quality of the lambs was very mixed with a few lines of new season lambs along with a large supply of Merino lambs. The condition of the above varied considerably. The older lambs also varied greatly for quality and condition. The usual processors were in attendance.

The lightweight young lambs suitable to restockers met with restricted competition and sold to cheaper trends than recent sales. There were none to compare to from the previous week. Young trade lambs to 20kg dressed remained firm. The few heavier weights sold to cheaper trends with an odd sale firm. Restocker Merino lambs met weakened demand to sell to a much cheaper trend.

The Merino lambs carrying better condition and suitable to processors sold on a firm to

cheaper trend. Well finished Crossbred lambs to 22kg sold to cheaper trends under weaker demand. The heavier weights to 26kg saw trends firm to slightly cheaper while the heavyweights saw a slightly dearer trend.

There was a good supply of well finished sheep penned. Processor demand was again weaker and there was little in the way of restocker competition. Market trends were cheaper throughout and considerably so.

### **Armidale Cattle Sale**

December 8th - There was a small increase in numbers with 545 head penned. The quality and condition of the offering was mixed with some well bred young cattle and some very good cows a standout. The usual buyers were in attendance with some represented by different personnel.

Local restocker demand was high on the light and medium weight young cattle. Trends however were cheaper throughout. The vealer steers were as much as 22c/kg cheaper with the heifer portion showing greater falls.

There were significantly cheaper trends on the lightweight yearling steers to restock with some of that quality and breed related. The medium weights suffered only slightly. Heavyweight yearling steers saw a cheaper trend of 10c to 40c/kg on the back of limited buyer competition.

Yearling heifers in all classes met weaker competition to show significant losses. Heavy grown steers and heifers attracted limited processor competition to sell to cheaper trends. The cow market was strong with trends firm to slightly dearer. That was also the case in the heavyweight bulls.

### **Weekly Wool Sales**

**December 9th** - For the third time in the past three months the Eastern market indicator was able to bounce off the bottom of its trading range with this week's rally stronger than the previous two. It does appear that the

market in the current environment has a strong resistance to falling lower than last week's closing levels.

Gains were made across both selling days in the Northern region and in a hopeful sign for the last sale of the year next week the Melbourne market continued to make further gains on Thursday. The rise in the market combined with the upcoming three week recess has resulted in almost 50,000 bales expected to be on offer next week. This is 10,000 bales greater than the corresponding sale last season and will test the depth of this week's rally.

36,212, bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 7.5%. Major buyers included Techwool, Endeavour & Tianyu with the top four accounting for over 50% of the national Merino fleece offering. AWEX figures are showing a 1.2% decline in the number of bales offered for the season to date whilst AWTA data is showing a 1.8% decrease in the number of bales tested.


