Festival back after two years

The 2023 Lamb and Potato Festival has been blessed with nice weather, with no showers to dampen anyone's enthusiasm. After a two year hiatus due to the Covid pandemic, organisers were unsure how the festival would unfold. Any doubts were quickly dispelled on opening day with visitors calling in as if nothing had really changed according to Committee President Steve Mepham.

"We have had a lot of visitors

by the numbers going through gazebo and I can confidentally say we are ahead of pre Covid numbers," Steve said.

"To be honest we were surprised that it has bounced back so well. The stall holders are doing nicely to this point and if weather holds they will be more than happy."

"There are fewer stalls this year due to the impact of Covid which caused the closure of some business while others have retired.

"We have been able to replace some with weekenders, who can't do the full twelve days but will fill up the empty spaces on the weekends."

"It is also great to see that it is abuzz not just on the highway but also down Bradley Street with businesses reporting that they have been very busy as well.

"There are some wonderful things happening in main street with businesses such as Burgess Garage Car Museum being open, the Australian Poetry Hall of Fame with some special events and the CWA Art Show. Other businesses are reporting they are being kept busy which is really good to see.

"This weekend will be even bigger with the model trains, car show and shine and antique machinery all happening so there will be plenty to see and do."

Life membership for Julie Gittoes

Julie Gittoes was presented with life membership of the Guyra Lamb and Potato Festival committee on the opening night of the 2023 Festival. Julie's involvement with the festival goes back 34 years, 32 of which has been as the main organiser of the food gazebo.

The presentation was made by three people who she has worked closely with for much of that time – Bertha and Geoff Reeves and Gwyneth Pearson.

Each year Julie coordinates more than 30 different volunteer groups, with up to 20 different people per shift. Thanking the committee for the honour Julie said that every day that she has turned up is because she wanted to be there.

"To be honoured is special, because I get to work with wonderful people like Bertha, Geoff and Gwyneth and the wonderful groups of volunteers who turn up to help," Julie said.

"I also get to catch up with the extended Lamb & Potato Family including all the wonderful stall holders who come back every year."

Built with a \$130,000 State Government Community Building Partnership grant, the new dining and performance space has been welcomed by organisers and visitors to the festival.

President of the Lamb and Potato committee Steve Mepham thanked ARC for their involvement in getting the building up and running.

"We had to jump through a few hurdles to get it built, but how great is this building?" Steve said. "The festival has a rich history and now we have somewhere to document how it has unfolded over the last 37 years.

"The photos on the walls bring that history to life and this has been made possible thanks to a grant from Australia Post and the Guyra Historical Society."

Respect, reflect and celebrate Australia Day

The 2023 ambassador for Armidale Regional Council is Jarrod Wheatley.

The Australia Day Ambassador Program, encourages links between communities across the country. Each local government area is assigned its own ambassador, a prominent person from the sporting field or the science lab, government or the stage or screen. Their primary job is to deliver a speech about the meaning of Australia at events across the state.

The key message for Australia Day is Reflect, Respect and Celebrate and we're all part of the story. In Guyra, there will be the annual awards dinner held on Wednesday January 25th at the Bowling Club and on Thursday January 26th there will be a flag-raising ceremony at the Guyra Council Administration Building at 9am with a morning tea afterwards at the Guyra Historical Museum.

Jarrod was awarded NSW Young Australian of the Year in 2019, and has worked in the social sector since the age of 17. During this time he has run a Youth Centre, set up programs for refugees and founded two innovative, not-for-profit organisations including, Street Art Murals Australia (SAMA) and Professional Individualised Care (PIC).

not-for-profit organisations, Mr Wheatley is creating positive change in the community. Professional Individualised Care works to improve the well-being of children in care. Meanwhile, Street Art Murals Australia helps solve the graffiti problem, by connecting street artists with paying clients, to create commissioned murals.

Tickets for the awards dinner are \$25 per person and will need to be pre-purchased from the New England Community College in Guyra (GALA).

NO potato shortage for festival

While there has been a potato shortage this year, with growers impacted by wet weather, organisers of the Lamb and Potato Festival say they were able to secure their supply and they don't anticipate running out.

That is good news for festival goers with hot chips and potato bake among the most popular items on the menu.

Bertha Reeves has been busy peeling, slicing and making potato bakes and said that so far demand is on par with the last festival, which was held in 2020.

Between 2009 (when it was first introduced to the menu) and 2020, Bertha cooked 921 dishes each using 3kg of potatoes – that is a total of 2763 kg of spuds. The biggest

year was 2015 with a record 162 potato bakes coming out of the oven.

2015 was also a big year for lamb with 234 legs of lamb used to feed the hungry hordes.

Anne Thrift cooks all of the roasts in her own kitchen with help from family and friends. Anne said that this year the legs of lamb are a lot bigger and are taking longer to cook, which means numbers may be down although the quantity of meat is greater per leg.

The ovens at the Guyra Hot Bread Shop are also working overtime to supply lamb pies, sausage rolls and buns for the lamb and gravy rolls.

Rest assured that whether it is lunch or dinner you will be able to get your fill of lamb and potatoes.

Guyra Rainfall, 2022

With all the record-breaking rainfall and floods around Australia in 2022, readers may be wondering whether any records were broken in Guyra. BOM's website has daily rainfall records for Guyra Post Office from 1886 and for Guyra Hospital from 1981. There are some gaps in the record and these can be filled using accepted methods that estimate daily rainfalls using other rain gauges in the region. The end result is 50,038 daily rainfall records from 1/1/1886 31/12/2022. The year to date rainfall (cumulative rainfall) for each year can be plotted against the

time of year, as the accompanying graph shows. Wet periods are marked by the steeper parts of the cumulative rainfall line. The line for the average rainfall is steeper in January, February, November and December, which reflects Guyra's summer dominant seasonal rainfall pattern.


In terms of total year's rainfall, wettest day, runs of wet days and runs of dry days, 2022 did not break any records. With 1,087mm for the year, it was wetter than average, but nowhere near as wet as 1890 and 1921, for example. The year got off to a good start in January to March, but a relatively dry November and December pulled

the year's total down. The drought year of 2019 may still be fresh in many readers' minds, and it can be seen from the graph what an exceptionally dry year it was driest year on record and way below the next driest year, 1919.

Detectives appeal for information

Detectives are appealing for information as investigations continue into an armed robbery in Guyra in early January.

Police have been told two unknown men allegedly threatened a woman with a firearm before stealing her vehicle, on the corner of Clarke St and Sandon St, Guyra, about 4am last Tuesday (3 January 2023). The woman was

not physically injured.

Officers from New England Police District attended, established a crime scene and commenced an investigation into the incident.

At about 7.30am the same morning, the vehicle was located on Dodds Lane, Elsmore and seized for forensic examination. The woman's mobile phone was also recovered.

As part of their inquiries, investigators have released CCTV of a vehicle, which is being described as a white 4WD utility.

Anyone with information about those involved, or anyone with dashcam who was driving along Ollera St about the time of the incident, is urged to contact New England Police District or Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

Guyra's rainfall total for 2022 was 1,086.6 mm, 210 mm or 24 per cent higher than the average. Rainfall was above average in eight months of the year with 2022 being the third consecutive year with well above average rainfall. (2020: 978 mm, 2021: 1200 mm)

Although it was a wet year, December was significantly drier than average with just 40.2mm of rain recorded. It was also cooler than av-

The average maximum temperature of 21.0C was the lowest for the month of December since 2011 (19.1C). The average minimum temperature of 7.0C was the lowest on record for the month of December. Previous lowest was 7.3C in 1924.



As founder of two innovative, not-for-profit organisations, Jarrod Wheatley is creating positive change and is the Armidale region's Australia Day Ambassador for 2023.

Jarrod Wheatley has worked in the social sector since he was 17. He has run a Youth Centre, set up programs for refugees and founded two innovative, not-for-profit organisations, Street Art Murals Australia (SAMA) and Professional Individualised Care (PIC). Jarrod Wheatley is working tirelessly to improve opportunities for those on the margins of our community.

Five years in the making, PIC is an accredited new model of Out-of-Home Care. Before, children who were too traumatised or highneeds for a foster home would generally be placed in an institutionalised group home. Here they would be cared for by shift workers.

Instead PIC places one child in the home of a Professional Therapeutic Carer, who can provide a therapeutic intervention and real relationships. This is both improving the lives of young people and changing how traumainformed our sector is.

Through SAMA Jarrod used street art as vehicle for social inclusion and urban beatification, breaking the negative cycle of



criminalisation and alienation by commissioning murals and workshops. Street artists have now painted more than 360 murals all over the country, for clients such as Pfizer and Lend

Increased grass fire danger for New England District

The NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) is warning residents of an increased risk of grass fires across the New England District over the coming months as the weather warms up.

NSW RFS Superintendent Paul Metcalfe said that two years of wet weather has led to prolific vegetation growth across NSW, with the State now facing its most significant grass fire threat in more than a decade.

"It can take just a few days of hot, dry and windy weather for grasslands to cure and for fires to take hold, even in areas which have experienced recent heavy rains and flooding.

"Grass fires can start easily and spread rapidly, threatening homes, crops and livelihoods.

"I urge New England District landholders to be aware of this increased threat and to prepare.

"Every landholder should have firefighting equipment on hand and ensure that it is in good working order."

"All New England residents should also update and discuss their Bush Fire Survival Plan and know what they and their family will do if a fire threatens," Superintendent Metcalfe said.

The top five actions landholders can take to make their property safer are:

- > Clear and maintain firebreaks they can help prevent a fire spreading to or from your property.
- Clear around assets and buildings to help protect sheds and valuable equipment.
- > Rotate stock to help reduce the risk and ensure paddocks are well-grazed.
- Check for restrictions before using fire – permits are required during the Bush Fire Danger Period. Always check the conditions before using fire. On total fire ban days, all permits are suspended.
- > Check and maintain equipment
 a build up of debris can cause a
 fire, destroying equipment and
 crops.
- > Have firefighting equipment handy -maintain hoses and water pumps, and check your water supply.

Residents should download the Fires Near Me NSW app and set a Watch Zone to monitor fires in their area.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

January 4th - There was a yarding of 2670 lambs and 1560 sheep. The offering consisted mostly good quality young lambs showing varying degrees of finish. There were some very good Merinos and a few heavy weight old lambs. The usual processors were operating along with limited restocker activity on the plainer condition lines.

Comparing the market to pre christmas levels the better quality young lambs to restockers showed little change. The plainer lines sold to a cheaper trend. Lightweight young lambs to the trade sold on a firm to cheaper trend. Well finished young lambs to the trade sold to cheaper trends with the exception being the heaviest lots they saw little change.

The best of the Merino lambs carried more weight than was evident prior to Christmas and sold accordingly. Light and medium weight sheep made up the bulk of the offering with a few heavyweights. The very plain condition lightweight sheep sold to cheaper trends. The better conditioned 2 and 3 scores sold to a slightly dearer trend with some of the improvement attributable to skin values.

Weekly Wool Sales

January 13th - Wool sales commenced this week after the annual three week Christmas recess. For the seventh season in a row the first sale in the New Year proved to be a positive one even with a large national offering of over 50,000 bales rostered for sale.

A sale of this magnitude coming off a recess could have been cause for concern pre-sale, however this concern was unfounded as Chinese interests continued their strong push with fresh orders and their willingness to re-build their stock levels after the relaxation of the Zero Covid Policy in late November.

Strong gains were seen across most types, particularly those with better specs. Competition in the sale room was widespread with no individual buyer able to dominate.

All major players were pushing to fill orders and enquiry coming from overseas continued throughout the week. The few weak spots in the market were in the poorer prepared, lower spec types which continue to suffer. This again highlighted buyers focus on selecting wools that provide them with the most confidence in processing. A similar quantity is up for sale next week and the strong opening to the year should continue.

Gwyn is the Head Steward for the School Arts & Crafts section of the Show and has held this position for a number of years. With the high volume of entries from the schools, it is a big job for her




