Long-standing community leaders and volunteers have been recognised at this year's Australia Day ceremony with Beth White honoured as Guyra's Citizen of the Year for 2023. There was a strong field of candidates for this year's award with seven nominations.

Beth is a stand-out member of the local community through her extensive volunteer work and significant contribution to the Guyra and Ben Lomond communities. She has spent decades volunteering in leading roles, including Chairperson of Ben Lomond Landcare Group, Board member of Rural Lands Protection Board, Member of Ben Lomond War Memorial Trust, Editor of Altitude Living, P&C Member Ben Lomond Public School, Volunteer of ADRA Op Shop Guyra, Volunteer at Guyra History Museum, Secretary of R.E.D.D New England and an active community member of the Presbyterian Church.

Gwyneth Pearson was runner up in the Citizen of the Year category. Gwyn has been a key member of the Guyra Show Society and the Guyra community for many years through involvement at Bald Blair School, Guyra Central School and the school P&C association. Gwyn has helped with junior and senior cricket, rural fire services and the Lamb and Potato Festival for a number of years by assisting with fund raising, canteen, cooking and in many other areas. Other nominees in this category were Kim Shone, Donna Davidson, Peter King, Paul Kliendienst, and Dr Thampapillai Jeyakumar.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Sam Coupland was joined by this year's Australia Day Ambassador, Jarrod Wheatley, Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall, ARC General Manager James Roncon and ARC Deputy Mayor Todd Redwood to present the awards.

Making that online transaction safe

New England Police have warned that there has been an increase in good people falling victim to online scammers, especially with the sale and purchase of items on sites like Facebook and Gumtree.

Offenders have been using fake locations and the like and will often use recently sold properties as their "residence".

Here are some useful tips for people in the New England to follow, to help you not fall victim to these online predators.

* Know who you are dealing with by taking time to do a bit of research * Never send money to anyone you don't know

* Always make cash transactions in public, in person. Also it's a good idea to take a family member with you.

* Use payment methods with buyer protection, such as PayPal or Afterpay

* You should inspect the item carefully, in person, to ensure it is as described in the ad and any issue are known upfront before you exchange money

If its sounds too good to be true, it probably isn't true.



Funding puts watts on the roof for Guyra Sporting Shooters

The Guyra Sporting Shooters Association club house is about to be powered up thanks to a \$11,937 State Government grant to purchase and install solar panels on the roof.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said Guyra Sporting Shooters Association (SSAA) members applied for the Community Building Partnership funding after deciding it was time their club house had power to improve the facilities and phone and internet connections.

"For the first time, the club house will have its own source of power which will allow members to install computers and other technology that will make their events at the range a lot easier to operate and much safer," Mr Marshall said.

"At the moment, when the range is being used, club members rely on a generator to power scoring systems and other essentials.

"The grant will be used to put solar panels with backup battery on the club house roof and then they will put in lighting and install a water pressure pump.

"Most importantly, on the club's list of improvements is phone and internet connection.

"It became apparent recently, when a visitor to the range needed medical assistance, that their ability to communicate with emergency services was lacking.

"As can be the case with mobile coverage in the bush, anyone needing to make a call had to travel five minutes down the road to get a connection.

"It's certainly not an ideal situation and the members decided it was time to make those improvements and I'm delighted this funding has been secured to help the club out with this project."

Guyra SSAA member Michael Hay said the lack of mobile coverage at the range had become a health and safety issue and they'd decided they needed to provide their site with phone and internet connection.

"The history behind this project arises from the fact that a visitor to the club needed to be taken to town for medical assessment," Mr Hay said. "It was on that day the discussion began as to how help would be obtained in an emergency because as it stands now, decent phone service is five minutes down the road in either direction.

"The other reason is all attendance recording is being done online and all that information can be sent and received at the time it is needed.

"Thanks to Adam for his support in getting this funding so we can improve our club facilities."

Free menstrual hygiene products for students

Public school students across the region will return to the classroom this week with access to free menstrual hygiene products, thanks to a new initiative by the State Government. More than 4,600 dispensers had also been installed in public schools across the State to support young women overcome barriers in accessing menstrual hygiene products.

Member for Northern Tablelands said that getting your period should not be a barrier to education.

"I want young women in our region to feel comfortable in knowing they have access to free sanitary products when they need them, in their own school.

"Evidence shows that providing sanitary items has a very positive impact on educational

engagement and attainment, so I know this program is going to make a huge difference to the education of our local students." Mr Marshall acknowledge and praised Year 10 Glen Innes High School student Phoebe Vimpany – a current member of the Education Minister's Student Council – for lobbying to have sanitary products made available in all NSW public schools.

"When Phoebe was appointed to the council last year, she told me this was one of her goals," Mr Marshall said.

"Since then Phoebe has been a strong voice for rolling out free hygiene products at every school to support young women.

"I commend Phoebe for her advocacy and helping bring about this incredibly positive initiative – it just goes to show how big change can be made, no matter who you are and where you live.

"This statewide rollout of period products will ensure our young women have the support they need, with dignity and without barriers, as they continue their education journey.

Know your parking signs in school zones

NO STOPPING

What does it mean? You cannot stop in this area for any reason.

Why is it there?

To keep sight lines clear for drivers and children, so both have more time to avoid traffic and crashes.

NO PARKING

What does it mean?

You can stop in a No Parking zone for a maximum of two minutes to drop off or pick up passengers.

You must stay within three metres of your car at all times.

Why is it there?

To provide a safe place for older children to be set down and picked up without endangering other children.

BUS ZONES

What does it mean?

You must not stop or park in a bus zone unless you are driving a bus.

Why is it there?

To provide a safe place for large buses to set down and pick up passengers.

Cars parking in bus zones put lives at risk by forcing buses out of their safety zone.

Do you have a pet?

All companion animals must be:

Registered from six months of age

Microchipped and identified

Council Rangers are qualified identifiers and can microchip your animals by appointment. Call the Rangers on 1300 136 833.

You can register your pet at any Council office within NSW by simply taking your identification paperwork in. There are reduced fees for de-sexed animals, you will need to show the de-sexed certificate from your vet for the exemption.

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

January 27th - After a buoyant opening fortnight to the new calendar year this week's sale produced some mixed results. A five-cent decline in the Northern region indicator on the first day of sales was followed up with a one cent gain of the final day.

Very little change in prices occurred for most types throughout the week with lower style, higher vegetable matter types coming under the most downward pressure. The strengthening Aussie dollar against the US since sales resumed after the Christmas recess has led to a 41 cent rise in the Eastern market indicator when looked at in US dollars but this only translates to a 11-cent increase in local currency terms.

38,467 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate climbing higher to 12.5%. Major buyers included Techwool, Endeavour Wool and Tianyu with the top four buyers accounting for over 50% of the national Merino fleece offering.

Auction offerings for the season to date remain slightly above last season with expected weekly offerings over the next month to be around 40-45,000 bales. There was no guidance from the forward market this week as a degree of uncertainty seemingly prevails.

Revised strategic documents to be included in SRV application adopted by Council

At an Extraordinary Council Meeting on Monday 30 January, Armidale Regional Council (ARC) adopted the revised suite of documents which form part of the application to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal of NSW (IPART) for a Special Rate Variation (SRV) of around 50% over three years, which would take effect from 2023-24. The revised documents were on Public Exhibition from 16 December 2022 to 20 January 2023, with 29 formal submissions received.

Mayor of Armidale Regional Council, Sam Coupland thanked the community for their feedback on the revised documents and explained the next steps for Council's application for the SRV.

"We thank the community for their feedback following the public exhibition. Now that Council has adopted the amended documents at the Extraordinary meeting, our next step is to submit our application to IPART by 3 February," said Mayor Coupland.

"We are confident in the decision we have made and know this will make a big difference to our region in the future. This is part of our jobs and growth strategy, to change the fortunes of our region and get on top of the backlog in the maintenance of important community infrastructure," said Mayor Coupland.

The revised documents were the Amended Delivery Program 2022-2026, the Amended Resourcing Strategy 2022-2026, including the updated Long-Term Financial Plan. These documents were updated to include;

• Additional information gath-

ered through the SRV community engagement process

• The staged removal of some Council charges identified during the community consultation process as a method of financially assisting ratepayers through the rate increase should the SRV application be successful and;

• Additional financial modelling and information from the Capacity to Pay Report to facilitate Council's intention to apply to the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal of NSW (IPART) for a SRV.

The suite of Asset Management Plans, the Strategic Asset Management Plan and the Asset Management Maturity Report were also placed on Public Exhibition and changes made as considered appropriate.

Kayaks out exploring Malpas Dam

Pathfinders and Joeys Adventure Tours delivered free Kayaking Tours during the January school holidays at Lake Inverell and Malpas Dam. The tours were available to young people aged 12 – 18 years and were made possible through funding by the NSW Government's Holiday Break Program.

Heinrich is based at Inverell and conducts regular tours on waterways throughout the region and also regularly travels overseas on kayak adventures. He believes that getting out on the water can have a positive impact and allow young people to connect with nature.

"Getting out on the water is always a great opportunity to experience the environment in a different way to land based adventures," he said.

"At Malpas we ventured across the dam and into the river and for-

tunately I was able to show the tour participants a variety of wildlife and trees."

"Being on a kayak you get to appreciate the serenity which is a wonderful experience and even though most of the kids hadn't done it before they took to it like a fish to the water. It was a very different experience for them to get out and away from screens and I'm sure that it gave them something to think about."

He will be joined by ecologist, Alex Dudley and LLS staff Andrew Walsh and Ivan Lackay for a guided Kayak tour of Malpas Dam.
