

\$23,013 to turn Tenterden Hall's white ants into dead ants



THE army of white ants which has laid siege to the almost century-old Tenterden Hall will soon be eliminated and the damage caused repaired thanks to a State Government grant of \$23,013 for essential upgrades and building works.

The grant, provided under the NSW Crown Reserves Improvement Fund, will go towards repairing the building after white ants damaged the floor and walls, as well as upgrades to the hall entrance, doors and ramps.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that Tenterden Hall has been the focal point for everyone in the district for almost 100 years, where locals have celebrated the good times and come together in the bad.

"In recent years the hall has literally been eaten away by white ants and now the local land managers are fighting back with some big plans to remove the ants, the damage they have caused and upgrade the hall," Mr Marshall said.

"This grant will allow them to do the work and continue their program of upgrades, started last year with a previous grant for a new toilet block and rainwater tank for the hall.

"Congratulations to the land managers on securing the funds to improve this important community facility."

Tenterden Recreation Reserve Land Manager Robert Martin warmly welcomed the funding, which he said would be mostly used to repair white ant damage to the building.

"Any remaining money will be used towards upgrading the side access doors and ramps to ensure we are compliant with work health and safety requirements," Mr Martin said.

"We had a pest inspection due to suspected white ant damage. The report showed considerable damage to the floor joists and other wall structures.

"The grant will mean a more structurally sound building and therefore will be safe for all users. The side access door will allow for better disability access."





Council Meeting Wrap-Up for February

Café Tenant for Armidale Airport

Frequent travellers and visitors flying via the Armidale Regional Airport will be pleased to hear that Council is a step closer to awarding a tenant to operate the café.

Getting the café operational again after the impact of Covid-19 on travel numbers was one of the objectives of the elected Council's Growing Region Key Pillar Working Group.

The preferred candidate has been identified as Tattersalls Hotel and Council have authorised the commencement of commercial lease negotiations.

Council conducted an Expression of Interest (EOI) and independent evaluation through a local estate agent which ran from 15 November and closed 4 December 2022. Council wanted to ensure a sustainable tenant was secured, one with local connections to suppliers, a business model and experience in the hospitality sector. The combination of these factors would indicate a position for a sustainable long-term tenant.

Reconciliation Action Plan and NAIDOC events being planned for 2023

The Aboriginal Advisory Committee this year is focusing on the preparation of the draft Reconciliation Action Plan and how this aligns with Closing the Gap. At the September meeting, there was discussion of the draft Reconciliation Plan, as well as the possibility of dual naming of the Newling Oval to recognise the contribution of the Narwan Football Club and a bus-stop at the Narwan Reserve.

There was also discussion about the plans for the upcoming 2023 NAIDOC events around this year's theme which is 'For Our Elders'. Aboriginal community involvement in the Armidale Creeklands Project was discussed at the November meeting, along with an invitation for the ARC Library staff to provide an update on the Aboriginal Elders Tech Savvy Program.

Child Safe Organisational Standards and Action Plan

Council endorsed the draft Child Safe Action Plan for review by the Children's Guardian. The Child Safe Action Plan is central to Council's commitment to child

safety. The draft Plan was developed as part of Council's commitment to implementing the 10 Child Safe Standards which were a recommendation of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse.

The Plan helps embed child safe culture across all of Council's operations and give effect to all Royal Commission recommendations.

The next step is for the draft Plan to be submitted to the Office of the Children's Guardian for review. The Office of the Children's Guardian may provide feedback on the Child Safe Action Plan for Council to incorporate prior to final approval and implementation. A copy of the draft Plan is published on Council's website.

Financial information in the Second quarterly review

The 2022-2023 Quarterly Budget Review was endorsed by Council after noting the figures in the review, which is a summary of Council's financial position at the end of the second quarter for the financial year ending 30 June 2023.

The overall aim of the budget review process is two-fold: To identify where expenditure and revenue are not tracking against budget and to adjust where necessary; and to maintain the Council's forecast financial position for the remainder of the financial year in respect of the operating result and the unrestricted cash position. A schedule of proposed changes is then created and presented to Councillors for their approval.

Overall the forecast general fund has moved from an original deficit position of (\$3.193M) to an estimated deficit of (\$4.899M) as at 31 December 2023, a total negative movement of (\$1.705M). The largest impact on the budget position has been the requirement to include an additional \$2.356 M in depreciation expenses. Council has been able to mitigate the impact of the additional deprecation expenses through adjusting proposed expenditure and sourcing additional revenue. It should be noted that without the inclusion of legislatively required depreciation expenses the estimated change in the financial position would have been a positive increase of \$651K.

Rural Market Report*s*

Weekly Wool Market

February 23rd - This week's national offering fell around 4,000 bales short of what was expected with just over 53,000 bales offered. The Northern region indicator recorded no movement this week over both selling days with individual micron indicator movements ranging from minus 27 cents to plus 7 cents.

The Southern region dragged the headline Eastern market indicator down however it was more a case of price's realigning to those of the Northern region. 43,120 bales were sold for the week with a passed in rate 12.8%. Major buyers included Tianyu, Techwool & Endeavour Wool.

Total bales offered for the season to date has edged ahead of the corresponding period last season by around 20,000 or 1.9% and will go ahead further next week with the third consecutive 50,000 bale plus weekly offering.

The Northern region will revert to a Wednesday/Thursday selling format for next week's sale. Forward market prices traded at a slight premium early this week for 19 and 21 microns for delivery in March and at an even larger premium for 28 micron for delivery in September.
