Share the Dignity this March

Share the Dignity is worried about meeting the demand of period products for their bi-annual Dignity Drive as the cost of living sees an increase in "The Working Poor".

The rising cost of living has seen an influx of people reaching out to specialist homelessness services. It comes as the latest Australian Homelessness Monitor report suggests homeless services are providing more support to low-middle income earners who are struggling to make ends meet.

Share the Dignity's Dignity Drives allow people to pay it forward and support women, girls and anyone with a period who is experiencing, or at risk of, homelessness, domestic violence or poverty. But as the cost-of-living increases, Share the Dignity has seen donations decrease.

Throughout March, Woolworths will donate 5 cents from the sale of every period product purchased to help fund Share the Dignity's Dignity Vending Machines. Collection boxes have also been placed in all Woolworths supermarkets nationwide, where customers are able to place donated period products. Anne Lane is a volunteer with Share the Dignity and will be helping to collect and distribute the donations in Guyra, Armidale and surrounding areas.

"Our Dignity Drives are so important to support those experiencing period poverty," Anne said. "We rely on these donations to give those in need access to period products, so they don't go without. "We accept all products in original packaging, including pads, tampons, menstrual cups, period underwear, reusable pads and incontinence pads."

Supporters can drop-off donations at all Woolworths stores as well as CT Electric and Brisk Trading in the main street throughout March, or donate via the Share the Dignity website.

Share the Dignity strongly believes those experiencing period poverty should be able to choose which period product they use, and is encouraging customers to collect all period products in their original packaging including pads, tampons, menstrual cups, period undies, reusable pads, as well as incontinence aids.



Tour the Ag

Ten candidates for Northern Tablelands

Ten candidates will contest the NSW State election in Northern Tablelands on March 25th, including two local Guyra residents. Margaret (Margot) Hammond will stand as a candidate for the Liberal Democrats while Darshan (Billy) Wood is standing as an independent.

The ballot draw was held last

week with Alan Crowe from the Sustainable Australia Party drawing the number one spot, followed by the Legalise Cannabis Party candidate Peter O'Loughlin.

Independent Billy Wood is in third spot, followed by incumbent MP Adam Marshall at number four. Gary Hampton representing the Public Education Party is at five, with Labor's Yvonne Langenberg at six, Independent Natasha Ledger at seven, and Greens candidate Elizabeth O'Hara at eight.

The final two spots are taken by Liberal Democrat candidate Margaret Hammond, and Michael Hay from the Shooters, Fishers and Farmers Party.

It will be the largest number of candidates to ever contest an election in the Northern Tablelands. Incumbent Adam Marshall has held the seat since May 2013, winning at a byelection which followed the resignation of Richard Torbay.

Falls prevention workshop

Guyra residents are being invited to attend a Pilates workshop aimed at helping in the prevention of falls. In the workshop you will be educated on how to safely move and be taught exercise for strength, balance and stability.

Workshop organiser Jess Ahern said that many falls are multifactorial in nature and linked to both patient specific and environmental risk factors.

"The key intrinsic risk factors are age, sensory decline, reduced lower limb strength and comorbidity," Jess said. "Cognitive impairment, even subtle



deficits, also increases the risk. "The strongest predictors of risk are previous falls, with injurious falls and a walking or balance difficulty increasing risk even further." The workshops are limited to twelve participants and will run over 6 weeks commencing on March 20th. Classes are free and will run twice a week each Monday and Thursday from 12:30pm until 1:30pm. Participants will need to dress in loose and comfortable clothing which is easy to move in.

The workshops will be held at Karan Wildman's Physiotherapy (opposite Guyra post office).

Early access to universal preschool promised

The NSW Liberals and Nationals have pledged to bring forward their planned \$5.8 billion pre-Kindergarten program, including the construction of over 31 new preschools in the Northern Tablelands electorate.

Member for Northern Tableland Adam Marshall has described the pledge as a 'once-in-a-generation reform' for the region. It is part of a broader \$1 billion statewide commitment to fast-track the construction 500 new preschools co-located with local public schools.

Mr Marshall said by 2030, every single child in NSW would have access to a full year of free, five days per week, play-based learning in the year before school.

"This is one of the biggest education reforms for our region in a generation and its impact cannot be overstated," Mr Marshall said. "It is all about investing in the next generation and ensuring our kids get the best start in life."

Mr Marshall said the 31 new preschools would be constructed in every corner of the region, with Bald Blair Public School, Ebor Public School, Guyra Central School and Tingha Public School among the sites nominated.

"No matter where you grow up in our region, it should not determine your access to a good education, even before you begin school," he said.

having a mobile signal to be able to contact them. The worry these distance carers have for their relations just becomes worse when they loose their landlines etc.

The only real option for many is SkyMuster, with all the hassle and poor connection spends, or Star-Link, which is far better but prohibitively expensive for a lot of people.

This needs to stop. Over the years various local members, Federal members and governments of all types have promised to "fix the problem soon", which then turns into a blame game between corporations that have little if any interest in small communities and Government.

What will it take for this digital discrimination against small communities to end. How many times will there be near misses, or tragic outcomes because there isn't a mobile signal. Where are Adam Marshall or Barnaby Joyce advocating for the community?

Have your say..... Why is Guyra stuck in a mobile phone Stone Age?

In 1994 when analogue mobile phones were coming into their own, you could get a decent signal in most of Guyra, and had a choice of the three major networks. Things have only gone down hill from there

How is it possible, in 2023, Guyra creeps along on a barely existent signal from Telstra, Vodafone and Optus, and only Telstra seems to have any agent close by? This is more than just an inconvenience for mobile phone users. Many modern EFTPOS terminals, square terminals etc rely on a 4G SIM card to work. So many Government agencies have moved online. How are people supposed to access essential services like ServiceNSW and Centrelink when their mobile phone have snail speed internet and often no signal at all?

Various governments of all persuasions have touted the advent of digital agribusiness. It's a bit hard to compete in this space when you don't have any signal for your modern equipment. Animal management systems need mobile signal. Many livestock transport companies use modern mobile technology to track vehicle movements and cargo loads I'm not sure, but the last time I checked you couldn't plug into a cow to boost your signal!

Throw in a blackout and total chaos ensues. As none of the phone companies will pay for a backup generator on their towers, what little service that is available is gone for hours. And once power is restored, mobile signal can be affected for weeks or even months afterwards. I'm sure everyone has noticed how bad the Telstra signal has become following since the blackout on show weekend.

Many people in Guyra and surrounds now rely on mobiles since the NBN is so poor, and that includes many children and grandchildren who live "away" but rely on their parents and grandparents

Guyra War Memorial Hall Land Manager

The Guyra Soldiers' Memorial Hall is managed by a group of Guyra people appointed by the NSW Government to oversee and protect this significant Crown Land War Memorial. Guyra War Memorial Hall Land Manager was previously called a Crown Trust and consists of seven Guyra community members who give voluntarily of their time and skills to manage and care for the Hall.

In May, all positions of all NSW Crown Land Managers will be rescinded and made available to applicants from local communities. The Guyra War Memorial Hall Land Manager will need many willing local people to apply and from those applicants seven people will be selected by NSW Crown Lands and appointed for five years. Previous applicants may apply.

For many years Mrs Sue Rice, Mr Ron Vickress and Mr Jim Souter have served on the Land Manager but they have decided that they will not reapply. The current Land Manager thanks them sincerely for their decades of dedicated service. We also thank Mrs Anne Woods who, until last year, served for over 30 years. Ron did say he felt he was abandoning his responsibility however we believe that at almost 98 he is entitled to a well-earned rest.

Skills required are a willingness to work cooperatively with the other appointees, access to email, a working knowledge of the internet, a

desire to secure grants and other funding, and a capacity to support projects which will need to be undertaken to ensure the upkeep of both the hall, the grounds and the memorabilia contained therein. You do not need to be able to undertake any upkeep work, however any skills you have will be gladly snapped up. In the end it is the government who will appoint the group, but we'd be grateful for your consideration of how you would be able and willing to contribute, and your application. The next meeting of the Guyra War Memorial Hall Land Manager will be at the Soldiers' Memorial Hall at 3pm on Sunday 26 March 2023. Meetings generally take around one hour and are held four times per year. Everyone is welcome at the meeting where we will distribute information on applying. 

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

March 10th - The current trend of large weekly national offerings continued and whilst the trade has managed to absorb most of this over the past month it is resulting in fluctuating prices.

The Northern region indicator fell 13 cents on the first day of sales and recovered 3 cents on the final day. Gains and losses in individual micron categories were more dramatic ranging from plus 20 cents to minus 46 cents.

A decrease in the volume of wool carrying less than 1% VM is maintaining keen demand for these types whilst at the same time creating irregular results on the lower style, higher vegetable matter types.

A 1.5 cent drop in the Aussie dollar against the US this week may have prevented the market falling further in local currency, with the Eastern market indicator losing 28 cents when looked at in US dollars. 41,683 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed rate of 13%.

Major buyers included Techwool, Tianyu and Endeavour Wool. Sales will again be held on Wednesday/Thursday next week due a public holiday in Victoria. Just over 49,000 bales are expected to be on offer.


