Design work to begin for New England Rail Trail

The New England Rail Trail (NERT) is a step closer to reality following a decision taken at the March meeting of Glen Innes Severn Council (GISC).

Glen Innes councillors voted to progress the lease arrangements and commence the design process for the construction and ongoing operation of the northern section of the rail trail from Glen Innes to Ben Lomond.

Councillors were also given an option to withdraw support for the project. The majority of councillors supported the option to move forward to the next stage, with only one - Tim Alt - voting against the motion.

Director of Infrastructure Services Keith Appleby said that the project has been around for a number of years and it was timely to revisit the costing and review funding.

Council had requested the funding body to utilise the services of NSW Public Works Advisory to provide a desktop review of the project. The resulting report provides an overview of revised project costs, project risks, and timeframe for delivery.

Mr Appleby said that while there is still a lot of work to be done, this decision to commence the process of taking on the lease and design work is a natural progression.

Mayor Cr Rob Banham spoke positively about the move, saying he had read about very successful rail trails operating in regional communities. He said that he was 'all for it, it is a great idea for people to walk or ride and will be a great thing if we can get it going'.

Deputy Mayor Cr Arandale also threw his support behind the project saying that he was previously sceptical. He pointed to recent of launch of park run to the town and said that its success had 'opened his eyes to what will bring people to the community - it is going to be a great addition'.

While supporting the motion, Cr Andrew Parsons commented that a lot of people were passionate about restoring trains to the region and said he was concerned about the impact on ratepayers of council's deci-

The rail trail requires the removal of the train line, prompting passionate debate on both sides of the issue. Council voted 6-1 to proceed.

GISC has been offered \$8.72M in State Government funding construct 35.5km of the Rail Trail from Ben Lomond to Glen Innes. Armidale Regional Council is responsible for the southern stage of the project. \$5.8M has already been approved for the section between Ben Lomond and Black Mountain, with other funding applications in progress to connect with Armidale.

Mayor Sam Coupland and Council's General Manager James Roncon also attended the function.

During the evening a member of each organisation was invited to give a short talk about their organisation. This turned out to be very informative and quite humorous on occasions.

The Rotary Club took the opportunity to incorporate their Pride of Workmanship Awards into the event. These awards are usually to enable an employer to recognise significant contributions by an employee, however, this year community organisations were invited to recognise one of their own members for the work they do in our community.

The Garden Club recognised David Kanaley for his work in obtaining grants for, and the design and implementation of the new Memorial Park and Mandala Garden Project.

CWA Evening Branch recognised Kate Matthews for her substantial contribution to the CWA, taking on the role of Treasurer and including volunteering for two days at the Royal Easter Show and as a steward at the Guyra Show.

The baton was passed to CWA Evening Branch to host next year's function.

Anne Starr, President said: "It's wonderful that Rotary hosted this event and it was encouraging to see so many volunteers gathered together in one room. It's fantastic that Guyra is able to support so many service clubs and volunteer organisations. CWA Guyra Evening Branch are looking forward to hosting the event next year."

Guyra Central to host Hoof and Hook Competition in 2023

Each year Guyra Central School farm participates in several livestock shows to provide students with opportunities to learn livestock handling skills. This year, they are hosting the Regional Northern Schools Prime Lamb, Hoof and Hook Competition in May. Students have been preparing the lambs for this competition that includes a led lamb section and 'Pens of three' competition.

The school breeding ewes have been sourced locally over the past couple of years through purchase and kind donation by Mara and Anthony Grills. This year they have also received four outstanding prime lambs from Gina and Warren Lockyer to enter in the show. The students are enjoying getting to know their lambs better through regular weigh-in sessions and halter leading the lambs.

Last week, the school was thrilled to take possession of the first of our Poll Dorset Stud sheep. A ram (Dugald) and four young ewes sourced from Smithston Farm, Graham's valley, will form the foundation of their new stud. This is a very exciting time for the

school and its students.

Guyra Central School expresses its deepest gratitude to Mara and Anthony Grills for their coordination of sourcing, delivering and incredible generosity in donating the ram Dugald and for making the stud a reality for the school. They hope to take their stud animals to Sydney Royal Show in the near future

Students are also working on six merino wethers to once again attend the Merino wether challenge held in Dubbo each August. Students prepare the wethers for parading and monitoring their feed rations and overall health. This is a great learning opportunity and was a wonderful experience for the students.

Lastly, talented sheep/wool judge, Brooke Grills (year 11) has once again performed exceptionally well in the zone judging for sheep and wool and will be travelling to the Sydney Royal Show to compete at the state level once again. Guyra Central wishes her every success in Sydney.

"This will engage visual arts educators to deliver high quality 'minds on, hands on' art activities to students as well as classroom support and resources to teachers."





School captains Harris Dullaway and Nioka Levy were very proud to present the money plus a certificate of donation to the residents and Mrs Sonya Wallbridge in a short presentation last week.

Mrs Wallbridge was very pleased with the donation and said that it would be used for a number of activities involving the residents. The donation to Kolora was a student decision. Each year the SRC raises funding for a National Causethis year they are raising money for the anti-bullying campaign "Doing it for Dolly". They also raise money for a local community cause and a school project.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

March 29th - Total Yarding: 2500 (-6405) Rain reduced the penning to just 800 lambs and 1700 sheep. It was a much plainer quality and conditioned penning of lambs with few well finished lines suitable to processors. The usual orders were in place.

Demand was weaker throughout however there was some restocker activity on the plainer condition lightweights.. Market trends were cheaper throughout with some significant reductions with quality contributing. The one exception was a single pen of young lambs that were the first draft of a mob.

Demand for sheep was also weaker and particularly the plainer conditioned lightweights with no skin value. There were cheaper trends throughout the plainer condi-

tioned lightweights however skin values on Merino sheep lessened the impact. The well finished medium and heavy weights experienced little change. .

Armidale Cattle Sale

March 30 - A rain reduced penning of 565 head. Cows and heifers were well supplied while there were limited numbers of steers. The quality of the young cattle was very mixed while there was a very good quality penning of heavy weight cows. Most of the usual buyers were in attendance and restocker activity was high.

The limited number of vealers sold to restockers on a cheaper trend with quality a factor. Heavy yearling steers to restock and feed sold to cheaper trends. Medium weight yearling heifers to restock and feed sold to a slightly dearer trend under solid com-

petition. Heavy weights also sold to a slightly dearer trend.

The majority of the grown steers were purchased for further finishing, those to process remained firm. Well finished grown heifers to process sold firm to slightly cheaper. There were dearer trends through the cow market with the quality contributing to some strong average gains.

Weekly Wool Market

March 31 - The market managed some small gains in the Northern region over both selling days. A 5 cent rise on the first days of sales was followed up with a further 1 cent rise on the final day. Around 5,000 fewer bales were offered for the week nationally compared to what had been rostered.

The best gains were on the mid micron Merino types as the quality of the national weekly

offering gradually deteriorates. Higher vegetable matter, lower strength and a greater proportion of the clip breaking in the middle is all more prevalent than the corresponding period last season.

39,483 bales were sold for the week with a passed in rate of 10.6%. Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris & Tianyu. The Southern region market experienced some weakness on the final day of sales as buyers cast their eyes forward to next weeks national offering which is expected to be in excess of 52,500 bales.

This will be the last sale before a one week Easter recess with early estimates expecting yet another 50,000 bale plus offering when sales resume. AWEX figures are showing only a marginal 0.5% rise in the volume of wool offered nationally for the season to date compared to the corresponding period last season.
