Security upgrade for Tingha Club

Tingha Sports & Recreation Club is set to have its security and lighting systems beefed up after receiving \$10,062 in State Government funding.

The money was secured under the NSW Crown Reserves Improvement Fund and would help with the cost of installing new security cameras around the club as well as upgrading lighting on the adjacent rugby league ground.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that the Tingha Sports & Recreation Club is an important community hub, enjoyed by locals for sporting or other social and community events.

"The club is well supported and run by a small group of local volunteers who want to protect it from any anti-social and criminal behaviour," Mr Marshall said.

"The new lights at thew footy ground will also help make this area much safer at night and discourage people congregating there when the ground is not in use.

"The lights will also aide the

Westpac Rescue Helicopters, which often land at the ground in emergency situations."

Tingha Recreation Reserve Land Manager Colleen Graham said she was grateful to receive the State Government funding and the money would be used to improve the safety and facilities for everyone.

"This is an important project for the club and one we've been wanting to undertake for some time," Mrs Graham said.

"Now we have the money to proceed and make the club a much safer place for the entire community."

Old school building on the move

A part of Guyra's history was loaded on to the back of a truck on Tuesday, ready to make a road trip to its new resting place.

The old Guyra Central School building, located at the back of the Guyra Council Chambers. was sold as part of a resolution of Council in February 2021.

The removal of the building was part of plans to build a new preschool and long day care centre for Guyra. The building has served many roles in its lifetime and was built in the 1950s to house students of Guyra Central School.

Since the school relocated to Marne St the building has been used by the community for a variety of purposes including aerobics and gymnastic classes, a gym, meeting and conference rooms, records storage area and a UNE Study Centre.



The building is set to become a family home on the new owner's land in Armidale.

A second timber school building, which housed the Guyra Men's Shed, will also have a new life, reportedly as Bed & Breakfast accommodation at Black Mountain.

The main u-shaped brick building of the school was demolished in the 1970s by Guyra Shire Council and replaced with the current Council Administration building.

The journey to Armidale was expected to take place in the early hours of Wednesday April 19th.

Bush fire management survey open now

Fire agencies and land managers are developing a Bush Fire Risk Management Plan for the New England Bush Fire Management Committee (BFMC) area, which includes the Armidale, Uralla and Walcha council areas. The community is invited to participate in this process by having a say on how bush fire risk is managed in a https://www.rfs.nsw.gov.au/pl an-and-prepare/managingbush-fire-risk/bush-fire-management-committees/new-engla nd.

The plan will map and describe the level of bush fire risk across an area and sets out treatment strategies to reduce the risk of bush fires and better protect the community over five years.

The survey is the way the New England BFMC gathers feedback from the community to assist with the risk planning.

"Bush fires can affect our homes, livelihoods and communities with devastating consequences," said New England Bush Fire Risk Management Committee Executive Officer, Superintendent Paul Metcalfe.

"Your input will provide valuable insights that enable the Bush Fire Management Committee to prioritise the communities, places, spaces, resources and assets that the community hold of most value."

All residents and landholders residing in the region are encouraged to participate in the short, five minute survey on how bush fire risk is managed over the next five years.

Communities can access the confidential survey at rfs.nsw.gov.au. The survey closes on May 5th, 2023.

White Rock Wind Farm Community Grant Fund Applications open

White Rock Wind Farm (WRWF) is seeking written applications from local community groups and organisations within 50 km of the wind farm that would like to apply for grants from the Community Fund.

A total of \$197,996 is available for projects across a range of community activities and interests, such as environmental, social, cultural and educational.

Applications are invited for projects in one of two categories:

* Minor Projects under \$5,000; and

* Major Projects over \$5,000.

Glen Innes Severn Council is managing the application process on behalf of White Rock Wind Farm. The closing date for applications is 4:30pm on Friday, 28 April 2023. Late applications will not be accepted.

The WRWF Community Fund Committee, consisting of the project owners, local Council's and community representatives, will review all submissions received by the closing date and allocate the funds to those projects which meet the application criteria.

Successful applicants will be notified in writing after Friday, 16 June 2023.

Applications will be consid-


ered for projects located within a 50 km radius of WRWF. Distance weighting will be applied to all projects according to the zone in which the project is located e.g. zero to 10km from the windfarm (Zone A), 10km to 20km (Zone B) etc. Ben Lomond is in Zone B and Guyra is in Zone D.

The applicant must list what zone the project will fall within. Preference will be given to those projects closest to WRWF. This weighting will be considered together with other selection criteria such as direct benefit to the community, demonstrated sound financial management, etc.





My March Report

I really don't think the months are getting any quieter. March brought three birthday parties. March 5th was Karin's dad's birthday, they celebrated with a big party at the Fotomecanica in Toluca. The second birthday was for the Danish exchange girl, Mia. She turned 17 so we had a party of about 20 exchange students, a few of Alina's host brothers' friends and one of Mia's school friends. The third birthday was to celebrate Karin's great niece Camilla turning 1. The party was held at the holiday house of Roberto's girlfriend's family in Cuernavaca. They had a big catered brunch of bagels, chilaquiles and fruit etc. The little kids had a jumping castle and there was a big balloon arch.

The next day I was peer pressured into trying offal soup and accidentally swam with a scorpion. I would not recommend either but would take the scorpion situation over the soup a million times over.

At the beginning of March, we attended the book release of Karin and Roberto's friend. I am unsure as to why the book's subject is so specific but it is about female photographers from the 1920's. Four of their friends also attended so afterwards we walked around downtown Mexico City trying to find somewhere to eat but it was very busy so we ended up going to the same park that I attended the San Valentine's Rotary event in. We ate churros at El Morro then walked around the park. All the city's lights were so gorgeous in the dark.

We had breakfast with a photographer Karin had been speaking to on Instagram. We met at a mall in Santa Fe called Centro Santa Fe, it has to be the biggest shopping centre I have ever been to, having three stories and housing over 400 retailers.


Just to give better size reference the MCG is 20,000 metres squared, Centro Santa Fe measures in at 210,400 metres squared. That makes it over 10 times bigger!

School has become pretty standard. I survived my first ever exam week by drawing and watching Netflix and helped in my first group project, about eagles for biology.

I also participated in the school's spring parade. Everyone decorated teachers' cars, four of my classmates and I all decorated a teacher's ute with giant Hawaiian necklaces then got on the back and drove through Metepec talking and waving to everyone in the street.

Also on this month's list of firsts, I attended a Mexican cinema for the first time. We watched Shazam in a special cinema where they actually serve you your dinner and every seat is a reclinable lounge chair.

This month's absolute highlight was the trip to Acapulco. Our accommodation was called 'The Mayan Palace' and did slightly resemble an ancient Mayan civilization from the TV, filled with

Mexicans and with lots of straw roofs, big stone pillars and jungle-esque surroundings, however no human sacrifice was performed during our stay so they didn't have it spot on.

When the staff dropped our bags off we all changed into swimmers and headed straight for the beach and pools. Jaoa, Juliet and I got big inflatable donuts and floated around the donut river for a while then headed to the beach. Jaoa taught me a traditional Brazilian prayer/mini ritual to thank the Brazilian God of the Sea which he performs before he ever enters the ocean and for the first time in my life I did not get sunburnt.

We started our second day with a buffet breakfast at the resort then all split up. Jaoa and I went to explore more of the resort. I changed into my new swimmers (bought after my strap broke), then we stopped at the plaza for an impulse purchase of macarons which were hands down the best macarons I've ever had.

We had dinner at a seafood restaurant. My favourite part was that I could just order a whole coconut, I got to drink all the water straight from the coconut and then eat all the flesh from inside.

Jaoa, Karin and I got dropped back to the resort. We went night swimming, which was fun because the stars were gorgeous and there was no one else at the pool so it was super peaceful and relaxing.

Day three was less busy because it was 32°C

from 9:30AM until 5PM and I had very little intention of dying from heat exhaustion or sunburn. We made breakfast and ate it all together in the room then lounged around chatting and using our phones. By 2PM I was sick of sitting inside so I threw on my swimmers and gassed myself with aerosol sunscreen and headed out. Eventually I headed back to the family who had all been doing their own things and we went for a drive to a famous spot in Acapulco where the cliff scenes in a movie called 'No Instructions Included' were filmed and got to see the sunset over the water.

They also had a cliff diving demonstration and we watched 8 people jump from all different heights into the water below. The top of the cliffs are 24 metres above sea level so there was no way I was joining in, allowed or not.

The next day we woke up fairly late, but didn't have to check out until 1PM. It was absolutely bucketing when we reached Karin's parents' house so we all changed cars very quickly and had a quiet trip home with a lovely lightning show.

I believe I will move soon so hopefully I will be able to write about that in my next report. Most of the photos are from Acapulco but it was gorgeous, so enjoy.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

April 12th - There was an increase in supply with 2455 lambs (+1100) and 2800 sheep (+1655) penned.

The quality of the lamb offering was mixed with condition also showing great variation. Restockers were well catered for while there was a good supply to suit processors. All regular buyers were in attendance. Restocker lambs sold to a dearer trend with an improvement in quality. There was some restocker activity on medium weights.

Well finished lambs to process attracted stronger competition with all weight and fat classes showing improvement. The heavy and extra heavyweights showed strong improvement.

There was only a small number of Wethers penned with both Crossbred and Merino ewes well represented. Skin length varied greatly and therefore put quite a range in skin values particularly in the merino's.

Processor demand increased and competition was strong with this resulting in dearer trends throughout. Restockers were active on some of the wooly Merino ewes as well as the younger lines of Crossbreds.

Armidale Cattle Sale

April 13th - There was a small increase in numbers with 595 head on offer. A good supply of well finished heavy weight cows along with a very mixed quality offering through most categories. The regular processors were in attendance along with strong support from restockers and feedlotters.

An increased penning of vealers suitable to restockers sold to dearer trends with light and medium weight steers showing significant improvements. Breed was a contributing factor in cheaper prices for the heavier weights. The heifer portion also attracted strong competition. There was little but quality related price change in the medium and heavy yearling steers to restock and feed.

Limited supplies of yearling heifers sold to cheaper trends. Heavy grown steers to process in limited supply sold to a dearer trend. Well finished heavy weight grown heifers to process also sold to a dearer trend with some strong gains recorded.

Well finished heavy weight cows sold on a firm to slightly dearer trend. Those carrying an excess of condition were a little cheaper.
