Crowds turn out for Anzac Day



It was a chilly start, but the rain stayed away for the duration of the Anzac Day dawn service in Guyra with around 200 people gathering at the Soldiers Memorial Hall. Commemorations also included a 9am service at the Guyra MPS and the mid-morning march and service at the Soldiers Memorial Hall, with a large crowd in attendance.

At the main service RSL sub-branch President Hans Hietbrink acknowledged the contribution of 150 young men from the Guyra District who left to join the 33rd Battalion AIF, 1st Light Horse Brigade and other Battalions 107 years ago.

He said that Anzac Day has become more than a commemoration of those who served in World War One.

"It now represents a day when we remember and pay tribute to all the men and women of all of the armed forces and the civilian forces who paid the supreme sacrifice in all conflicts throughout the world," he said.

"At the same time on Anzac Day we salute the men and women currently serving in our armed forces both at home and abroad and we honour our peacekeeping forces who are currently serving."

"Our remembering will not bring back those who died or were injured, we know that our remembering will not alleviate the hurt of the families, but we still remember."

The commemorative address was delivered by Member for New England and Shadow Minister for Veteran Affairs Barnaby Joyce.

"To all those who served our nation and to all those who had family members who served our nation, I thank you," Mr Joyce said.

"Why did they do it? They were just ordinary people, they grew up around places such as Guyra. They would have had families just like you, they lived the same life that you live now but they made the sacrifice to go off and serve our nation."

"They did it because they believed in our nation, they believed in our democracy, they wanted to make sure they kept the children of this nation and the people of this nation safe. That's why they did it."

"Today is about remembrance. We always say 'Lest we Forget', but why do we say that? We say that because if we do forget, if we do take them for granted then what on earth did they do it for? All I ask is that you remember them and you respect them."

Participation by local schoolchildren was once again a special part of the day. They filled out the ranks of marchers and were active participants in the ceremony. Latai' Ale from Black Mountain Primary School read the Prayer of Remembrance, Baxter Clark from St Mary of the Angels read the Prayer of Freedom, Guyra Central School Captains Harris Dullaway and Nioka Levy read the Prayer for the Australian Defence force and Henry Evans from Bald Blair Primary School read the Prayer of Peace.

A contingent from RAAF 1 Squadron at Amberley were present at all three services. The squadron has a special connection with Guyra as the final resting place for two of their flight crew who died in an F-111 crash in 1993.

The 10th anniversary of the Tour de Rocks saw 345 bike riders head out of Armidale last Thursday. In previous years, the ride has taken the riders from the tablelands to the coast ending in South West Rocks. With the closure of the Kempsey Rd, the Tour de Rocks was actually a tour of the tablelands over three days from Armidale to Wollomombi, Wollomombi to Guyra and then Guyra back to Armidale.

In a huge community effort, 110 support people were also on hand to help the riders and prepare the 4600 meals that were consumed over the three-day ride.

A team of twelve riders and two support people represented the Guyra Cycling Community in this year's event. The Guyra riders put in many hours of altitude training and completed the threeday ride in fine form.

Day 1 was a ride from Armidale to Wollomombi then to Jeogola Station for lunch and back to Wollomombi to camp the

Day 2 was a big 90km from Wollomombi to Guyra via Rockvale Rd (and many mountains), Aberfoyle Rd, Glasser Rd and Wards Mistake Rd into Guyra, to camp at the beautiful show ground.

Day 3 was a little easier as it was a short 55kms from Guyra to Armidale via the Boorolong Rd.

Friday night was a highlight with all Tour de Rocks participants converging on the Guyra Showground. Many thanks go to the Guyra CWA Evening Branch for helping with the evening meal and cooking amazing sweet treats for the night.

Dr Mark Henschke was a longtime participant of this ride and had registered to ride in 2023, before being tragically killed in a cycling road accident. Mark is sadly missed by the Tour de Rocks Community and amazingly a jersey with his name on it was auctioned for \$1500.

Many thanks must go to all the sponsors who contribute, to help us raise in excess of \$200,000 for cancer sufferers and research and development.

The Guyra Cycling Team were also very proud to accept a cheque for \$5000 on behalf of Guyra Can Assist. 'This is why we ride and raise money'.

Guyra's grand fleece the supreme of show

GUYRA'S Moray Pastoral Co has been awarded the David Merriman Hodgkinson Memorial Annual Trophy for grand champion Merino fleece at the Sydney Royal Easter Show.

The 16.8-micron fleece was from the housed or rugged Merino ram fleece class, where it scored 92 overall, including a full 40 points for its 5.6 kilogram fleece, full points for hauteur, 9.5 points for trueness to type and 99.6 per cent comfort factor.

Moray Pastoral also won champion Merino ram fleece in the topmaking type wool open classes and the NSW Wool Selling Brokers Association Award for the best collection of three

In 2022 he picked up a swag of awards including the Cliff

Friend Perpetual Award for the Most Successful Exhibitor in the Unhoused and Unrugged Merino Fleece Classes.

He said that this year's accolade is one that he never expected to pick up.

"I have been entering fleeces at Sydney over recent years and have picked up a few ribbons, but to win the award for supreme fleece is something I never expected would happen. It is a great honour."

Another Guyra woolgrower was also among this year's winners. In the districts, the champion NSW and Qld class skirted Merino fleece went to Guyra's Thor Burey, representing Northern district.

Establishment of Leash-Free Areas in Guyra

Armidale Regional Council is expected to endorse a proposal at its April meeting that will see a leash free area established in Guyra for use by dog owners.

A report to the meeting, which is scheduled for Wednesday April 26th, recommends council go ahead with the proposed leash free area at the South Guyra Park in Sandon St.

However, a second area which was to be set aside in Balblair St has been put on hold following objections by nearby residents.

A further report on the need for a second leash-free area in Guyra, will be prepared once the established area has been accessible to the public for a minimum of 12

months

It follows an extended period of public exhibition during which fourteen (14) submissions, including one petition, were received. The petition contained 97 signatures (22 of which were not Guyra residents) who were opposed to the Balblair Street site only.

The submissions raised a number of objections, including that money should be spent on other more urgent projects, that the Balblair Street site was unsuitable, and concerns about maintenance and car parking.

Submissions also outlined concerns that areas should be available to all local residents not just dog owners and that leash free areas would not be utilised by local residents. Council received one submission in favour of both proposed sites

The establishment of leash-free areas in Guyra was contemplated as far back as the 2020/2021 Operational Plan but was not pursued.

The Companion Animals Act 1998 requires Council to provide at least one off-leash area within the Armidale Regional Council LGA.

Whilst Armidale Regional Council has fulfilled its obligations under this Section by having five (5) leash free areas in Armidale, there is a demonstrable need for permanent leash-free areas in Guyra.







Be wary of bitumen bandits scam

New England Police District are urging local residents to remain wary of the bitumen (asphalt) scam. The fraudsters, known as Bitumen Bandits, offer to lay bitumen at what appears to be a great deal however, if a deposit is made, they often don't commence the job.

If they do perform the job, the service provided is of a substandard quality with watered down bitumen laid on poorly graded ground or bitumen dumped on the driveway.

The fraudsters then demand substantially more money than initially quoted resulting in residents paying a third party to remove the bitumen and even the substandard bitumen that was

The way the fraudsters engage with residents is intimidating and aggressive, often resulting in residents paying over fears for their safety.

While these 'Bitumen Bandits' can be very convincing and their sales pitch tactics may vary there are some characteristics to help identify them:

- They proactively approach residents going door to door.
- They may speak with a strong Irish accent.
- The quoted amount will literally be 'too good to be true.'
- They may claim the reason they can perform the job

cheaply is because they have leftover bitumen from a previous job.

- They may pressure residents to accept the deal, and even become aggressive or say the deal is only valid for that day.
- They may quote a reasonable price however, upon completion demand a higher payment.
- They may demand payment that day.
- If a deposit is made, they often vanish before commencement of the job.

Acting Commander, Kylie Phillips, said anyone who believes they have been approached by these comman are urged to collect whatever details possible – such a vehicle registrations – and pass them onto police as soon as possible."

Residents who may be concerned about the legitimacy of their contractors can request to see a White Card, which all contractors and labourers in NSW are required to hold. If a quote exceeds \$5000 the tradesperson will also be required to show a contractor's licence.

The Sustainable House Tour 2023

Are you looking for ideas to save energy at home, create beautiful spaces to live in, adapt or extend your present house or just to meet other locals and see how they've incorporated sustainable ideas into their house or renovation?

Sustainable Living Armidale (SLA) is holding its sixth Sustainable House Tour, an opportunity to look at a range of local houses, showcasing a variety of sustainable features, and have conversations with their owners and with each other.

There are eight houses this year, grouped by location, so on Saturday 6th May you can visit two houses in Uralla, one in In-

vergowrie, and one in Kentucky. On Sunday 7th May there are four houses to visit in Armidale.

Four of the houses are relatively new, each with unique features; two more could be described as recycled – the basic structure and footprint of each house retained, but major rebuilding incorporating recycled elements. There's a modern extension to an historic cottage, and a second storey on a small granny flat.

To get on the self-guided tour you need to buy the Sustainable House Tour Booklet in advance, from Boobooks in the Armidale Mall; Armidale Outdoors, Rusden Street, or Little Birdy, 38 Hill Street, Uralla. Booklets are \$20, for a car full of people.

Opening times are set out in the booklet, together with details of each house, mud maps to locate the eight houses, plus short articles on aspects of sustainability.

A spokesperson for SLA said: "We're so lucky, yet again, to have generous people willing to open up their houses so that we can all learn from each other. We're sure people will be delighted with the variety of houses in this year's Tour."



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
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Ladies Open attracts 64 competitors

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

After the one week recess there was an expectation of a 60,000 plus bale national offering. This didn't eventuate with 6.3% withdrawn prior to sale and the balance not materialising resulting in 52,951 bales being offered.

The Northern region indicator fell by 8 cents on both selling days with only the 17 micron and finer types bucking the trend. Signs of a recovery appeared in the Fremantle market late on Wednesday and this flowed onto the Southern region market on Thursday. This is hopefully a solid pointer towards a higher

opening when sales commence on Wednesday next week in the Northern region. 46,417 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 12.3%.

Major buyers included PJ Morris, Techwool & Tianyu. Whilst the broad based Eastern market indicator sits around 6.5% lower than the corresponding period last season it's a different picture when looking at the individual micron categories.

The 19.5 micron and broader Merino types are dearer with the 21 micron range up to 10% stronger. The finer Merino types, Crossbreds and Merino carding sector are all cheaper.

Mixed results for Super Spuds against Walcha/Uralla
