particularly Jane Moffatt, Chair of the committee for her tireless work in organising this event."



New permanent off-leash dog park for Guyra

Armidale Regional Council (ARC) is now in the early design stages of a leash-free dog area in South Guyra Park, approved by Council at the May meeting, with some works scheduled to commence before the end of June.

Mayor of ARC Sam Coupland said Council listened to the community about the need for a permanent leash-free area in Guyra, as over 60 per cent of households have at least one dog and it will enhance liveability for the community.

"A permanent leash-free area provides a safe place for dog owners to exercise their pets," Cr Coupland said.

"We hope that once it is established, the Guyra community will find it a place they can relax and enjoy time socialising with other pet owners."

Mr Ian Chetcuti, Coordinator Regulation at ARC, explained that a permanent leash-free area will also help with keeping dogs happy during the day and therefore less likely to want to get out of their yards. "With dogs having a place to exercise and get that mental stimulation, they will also be less likely to want to try and escape their yard," Mr Chetcuti said.

"The site will have secure fencing around the area to ensure that dogs are kept within the approved leash-free area. Park benches and tables will also be installed to allow for dog owners to interact with other owners whilst exercising and socialising their dogs.

"Dog waste stations and water stations will also be installed and serviced regularly by Council Staff. Some dog play or stimulus equipment will also be incorporated within the area."

Whilst there has been no formal leash-free area in Guyra, a temporary unfenced site on land owned by the Guyra Aboriginal Land Council in Mackenzie Street Guyra had been utilised for this purpose. This land is no longer accessible, and engagement with the community over two preferred sites led to the decision of a permanent area in South Guyra Park.







"Wildlife SOME TIME SPENT Tails" WITH THE WIGGLES....



In autumn of 2022, some people arrived with a chook cage measuring 700 x 500 x 300 mm high and crammed inside was a young Wedgetailed Eagle with its wings at an odd angle and feathers caught in the steel mesh. Numerous primary wing feathers were missing or broken. In addition, he was starving to death as is sadly common with raptors after their parents cease to provide food and push them away to fend for themselves. Worldwide, 70 to 80 percent of raptors (of all kinds) die in their first year of life.

I provided him with nourishing food and a warm spot to recuperate and in a month, he managed to make it up to a low perch. In a further year, he had grown all his broken feathers back and was flapping awkwardly up to a perch 2.4 mts off the ground.

In January of this year, a new baby Wedgie arrived, his beak still showing the waxy flesh either side of his beak which denotes that he was not long out of the nest. He too was starving and was so quiet in nature that I feared that he had a more serious issue. This proved to be incorrect and he too, was soon perching at some height.

The two boys were finally placed together in the large flight aviary and despite a little aggressive interaction, they were soon perched together. They both began to fly end to end of their flight and fed well on a steady diet of fresh chicken, rabbit and some meat, they grew strong.

I released both of them onto a farm near Walcha. The primary requirement of a good release



site is plentiful numbers of their favourite prey species, the rabbit. The next most vital requirement is a farm where they are welcomed, safe and valued.

Release back to the wild is the primary goal of any wildlife carer but it is also a bittersweet moment for most of us. Raptors need to catch sufficient prey to sustain their lives and Wedgetails have about 3 to 4 weeks before they are once again at starvation point.

I am not of the "Pollyanna" persuasion so a sight of them flying off into a tree, gives me only small comfort. The next few weeks will be the important period for their survival and only nature can provide them with their needs though I will be monitoring them and providing fresh food if I can. I do hope that next year, should they survive, they will each find a mate and hopefully bring more of their kind into the world.

By the way, WIGGLES is the pet name I have for Wedgetailed Eagles.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

May 10th - There was a sharp increase in supply as producers offload into Winter. There were 6200 lambs and 4900 grown sheep penned. In a very mixed quality penning there was a good supply of lambs to suit restockers while in contrast there was a large supply of well finished trade and heavy weights. The usual processors were in attendance along with increased restocker activity.

Market trends varied with the restocker lambs selling on a firm to slightly cheaper trend. A lift in quality helping. Well finished trade weights 18 to 22kg saw a slightly cheaper trend. Heavier weights up to 24kg also sold to a slightly cheaper trend with odd sales firm. Weaker demand resulted in the heavy and extra heavy weights selling to a much cheaper trend as supply bogged down the processing system.

There were large numbers of plainer condition Merino ewes,

Spring shorn as well as a good supply of bare shorn ewes and wethers. Demand from processors was weaker with large numbers in the system. Market trends were generally cheaper with some large falls recorded in the plain light weights and the well finished heavy weights.

Armidale Cattle Sale

May 11th - The numbers lifted to 1365 head with another large offering of cows. There were some very good heavy weight grown steers and a mixed quality penning of young cattle. There was reduced restocker and feedlot competition. The regular processors were in attendance.

Demand was weaker through the young cattle with restockers showing some restraint heading into Winter. Vealer steers to restockers sold to a considerably cheaper trend while the heifer portion even more affected. A very mixed quality penning of heavy yearling steers were significantly cheaper with the secondary grades most affected.

Medium weight yearling heifers held up well to show little change while the heavy weights were cheaper. Well finished grown steers and bullocks sold to a substantially cheaper trend with those carrying an excess of condition most affected. There were also weight issues with some very heavy steers penned. The well finished grown heifers followed similar trends.

The best of the cows saw a cheaper trend of as much as 40c/kg on a fortnight ago with processors over supplied. There was weaker demand for bulls with trends much cheaper.

Weekly Wool Market

May 12th - Tuesdays opening market was reported as relatively unchanged but as the day progressed the market started to lose ground and the Northern region indicator closed 6 cents cheaper. This trend continued on Wednesday with the indicator retreating a further 18 cents.

All categories were impacted with only the lower vegetable matter fleece types offering any sort of resistance to the falls. The Merino Carding indicator was the hardest hit dropping 5% for the week. 24.8% of the national offering was passed in including a huge 41.9% of the Fremantle offering. These passed in rates are double that of the season average. The end result was 32,694 bales sold nationally for the week.

Major buyers included Tianyu, Techwool & Endeavour Wool. Foreign exchange rates appear to being playing a part in weekly market movements. When looked at in US dollars the Eastern market indicator only fell 6 cents this week. The EMI in US dollars is currently 868 cents. The average weekly closing level for the season to date is 884 cents. The past 3 months has averaged 876 cents. So, when looked at in US dollars the market largely has a degree of stability.
