Region is about to change whether we like it or not

Armidale Regional Council mayor Sam Coupland believes that the release of documents by EnergyCo related to the first phase of the New England Renewable Energy Zone (NE REZ) signals the start of significant change for this region.

He says that these changes will have both positive and negative effects for this community as the 20-year build gets underway.

"The scope of this project is unlike anything we have seen in living memory, however, it is a State Significant Development which means decisions around planning are solely the domain of the State Government," Mayor Sam Coupland said.

"As a community we can't hide from the fact that a REZ brings with it some significant challenges for our regions that we will need to manage."

As Founding Chair of the Coalition of Renewable Energy Mayors (CoREM), Mayor Coupland has been working with other Councils to ensure that local needs are recognised and to help begin to shape each REZ to minimise downsides and leverage potential upsides.

"Whilst the majority of re-

newable projects will be located outside the Armidale LGA, as the largest city in the REZ, Armidale has the greatest capacity to host the thousands of construction workers and will effectively be the epicentre," he said

"On the surface that is great news, but it comes with challenges.



Women in leadership program recognised

Armidale Regional Council (ARC) has been recognised with a NSW Local Government Excellence Award nomination for its Women in Leadership Program.

Council's general manager James Roncon established the program after he commenced in 2021 and soon realised that there was a lack of female representation in leadership positions across all levels of the organisation.

"Developing opportunities for women to grow personally and professionally was a key objective of the change journey and culture development that the organisation had to undertake in 2021," said Mr Roncon.

"Over the last couple of years we have put a lot of effort into providing a culture that fosters the growth of women and values their unique insights into leadership and management. Often women already possess many of the skills and attributes of a humanistic and encouraging values based leadership style so it makes good business sense that they should hold positions of influence."

PUT NEW TRANSMISSION LINES ON PUBLIC LAND AND

CONSIDER UNDERGROUNDING THEM With the State Government's announcement to push back the energisation of the New England Renewable Energy Zone (REZ) to 2029, Adam Marshall took to the floor of State Parliament to suggest that any new electricity transmission lines constructed in the region should be placed across public land and putting them underground should be considered as well.

Given that this infrastructure is intergenerational – it will be there not just for 10 or 20 years, but likely for 60 to 100 years – and there is the ability to amortise the cost of the infrastructure over multiple generations, we must seriously look at undergrounding some of the large transmission lines where possible to avoid land use conflict and to avoid the inevitable argy-bargy that happens.

FAULTY LEGISLATION HAS LEFT Our Country Water Utilities Out to Dry

With State Parliament back, Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall has condemned the State Government's late-night rushing of a bill to protect Sydney and Hunter Water consumers, while refusing to offer the same protection for rural and regional water utilities and communities.

Mr Marshall spoke in the debate on the floor of Parliament and said the government refused to amend the Constitution Amendment (Sydney Water and Hunter Water) Bill 2023, which seeks to provide constitutional protection to Sydney and Hunter Water, with the bill not providing any protection for 89 regional water utilities owned by councils across the State.





Draft Operational Plan and Budget 2023-2024, Fees and Charges 2023-2024, Revenue Policy 2023-2024

At the 23 November 2022 council meeting, Council resolved to apply for a permanent Special Rate Variation (SRV). As at 16 May 2023, the outcome of the SRV application is not yet known. Therefore, the preparation of the 2023-24 budget has required the preparation of two scenarios.

Scenario One (SRV): includes the rate peg and a 58.8% (Cumulative) Special Variation. A rate peg of 2.5% is assumed for the 2024-2025 and 2025-2026 financial years.

Scenario Two (Managed Decline): This scenario excludes the proposed 58.8% (Cumulative) Special Variation. A rate peg of 3.7% has been applied for the 2023-2024 year and assumes a 2.5% increase for 2024-2025 and 2025-2026 financial years.



"At a local level during the early stages there is likely to be social friction around the location of projects and the permanent changes to our landscape they bring. As projects are approved by the State Government and move to the construction phase we will need to manage accommodation and skills shortages and the additional pressure on community infrastructure.

"The construction phase will likely last many years and provide a significant boost to the local economy. Armidale Regional Council will be exploring post construction opportunities to build on the renewables projects – for example green hydrogen production, recycling, circular economies and so on.

"Opportunities exist to partner with renewables companies to solve mutual problems such as housing supply and road infrastructure as well as utilise our recent acquisition of Oaky Dam as a renewable energy generator.

"Council is working on options to ensure the wave of renewable developments will deliver real multi-generational benefits to the community, not just during the construction phase.

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

June 7th. Guyra numbers declined by 645 head to pen 4965 lambs and 3890 grown sheep. Processor lamb qulality was very good and there were large numbers of light store lambs suitable for feeders and restockers. Grown sheep were mixed but in strong demand particularly with a forward start in the skin. The regular buyers attended with an additional store lamb buyer as well as a return of a southern store operator. Light crossbred lambs to restockers were dearer and sold to \$115/head. Light trade lambs sold to cheaper trends as did the trade lambs \$123 to \$143/head. Heavy trades resulted in similar trends and the extra heavy drafts selling \$182 to \$192/head. Grown sheep sold to strong trends throughout with light crossbreds averaging \$89/head. There were several pens of very heavy crossbred ewes selling \$170 to \$200/head. Both medium and heavy Merinos with a very good start to skins resulted in strong competion with the heavy grades selling to \$126/head. Cross bred wethers made \$104/head and medium weight Merinos sold to \$112/head. Market Operator Stephen Adams

Armidale Cattle Sale

June 8th. Armidale penned 1251 mixed quality cattle which was 396 more than two weeks ago. It was a market where yearling cattle provided the bulk of the offering with pens of weaner steers and heifers suitable for backgrounders. There were several pens of very heavy yearling steers and heifers to go onto a short feed regime. Not all exporters attended but the regular feeder and background operators attended to a considerably dearer market. Weaner steers to restockers were significantly dearer to top at 416c/kg with similar trends resulting in the heifer sales 180 to

294c/kg. Medium weight feeder steers sold to dearer trends of up to 23c/kg with their heavier brothers marginally dearer. Medium weight heifers sold to a similar vein with a rise of 26c/kg and light feeder heifers selling to 310c/kg. Heavy grown steers in excess of 750kgs lwt made to 281c/kg and grown heifers to process 220c/kg. Medium weight cows made to 172c/kg with a solid rise of 16c/kg for the heavy drafts 160 to 218c/kg. A reduction in weight and quality for the bull offering saw that category sell to cheaper trends. Market Operator Stephen Adams

Weekly Wool Sales

June 9th - With no sale allocated in the Western region the national offering reduced to 33,500 bales. The stronger closing sentiment to last week's sales flowed over to Tuesday's opening. Prices improved as the day progressed with the Northern region indicator gaining 6 cents. Wednesday's sale opened against the backdrop of a sharply higher Aussie dollar against the US with Tuesdays gains being barely maintained and no change reported in the overall indicator.

Prices in the Southern region finished the week cheaper and came into alignment with the Northern region. The fall in the Southern region led to a 1 cent decline in the headline Eastern market indicator. When looked at in US dollars the EMI jumped 22 cents as the Aussie dollar strengthened 1.85 cents.

29,039 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 13.1%. Just over 14% of this week's offering was re-offered wool (previously passed in). Major buyers included Techwool, Endeavour Wool and Fox & Lillie. Next week's expected national offering jumps to over 45,000 bales with the Western region sales returning.

In Super Saturday, the Dragons produced the upset of the round, going try for try with the Rabbits, to run away with the win 36–30.

The Broncos then took on the in-form Knights at home, where

the Knights all but had the points in the bag when the Broncos produced a great try to snatch the game in the dying stages, winning by 24–20.

The Panthers asserted their dominance once again, cementing their spot on top of the table with a strong 30–6 win over the Roosters.

Sunday saw the Storm thrash the Sharks 54–10 and on the King's Birthday, King Gutho turned it on with a first half hattrick, where the Eels thrashed the Bulldogs 34–12.

Good luck tipsters, as Round 16 looks terribly difficult for tipping, with countless injuries and State of Origin selection proving too hard to get our heads around.

The Voice would be a permanent body that gives independent advice to the Australian Parliament and Government on matters that affect First Nations people.


The Voice aims to help the Parliament and Government to make better decisions and deliver better outcomes for First Nations people.
