Council welcomes rate rise decision

The Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) has approved Armidale Regional Council's (ARC) application for a 58.8 percent special variation to general income residential, farmland, business or mining land rates over three years.

Armidale is one of 17 NSW councils to be approved in full or partly approved a special variation, with Walcha (57.74%) and Liverpool Plains (18.1%) also being approved. Tenterfield Shire Council's application for a 104% was only partially approved.

ARC Mayor Sam Coupland said the number of approvals is indicative of the difficult financial position of many councils across the state.

"This announcement marks a significant turning point for our region and will now allow council to address the systemic revenue problems that have plagued this council and the many iterations of it for decades in the past," said mayor Coupland

"It is completely understandable that the community will have concerns about the increases to their rates particularly while there are ongoing cost of living pressures, we are all feeling it. But it would have been remiss of this council not to address the long term decline in services for the Armidale region."

The special variation will be implemented from the 2023/24 Financial Year in the first rates instalment that will be distributed in July 2023. It will be staged over three years with 16.67 percent in 2023/24; 16.67 percent in 2024/25 and 16.66 percent in 2025/26.

"I want to remind ratepayers

that the increase will only be applied to general income residential, farmland, business or mining land rates, the top two lines identified on your instalment, not the total amount you pay," said Mayor Coupland

"The land rates are clearly identified on your instalment and it will also be phased over three years to ease the financial impact. Some ratepayers may also experience a change to their rates due to the impact of the ongoing rates harmonisation that commenced last year."

Local farmers 'gutted' by IPart decision

The Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal decision to approve a special rate variation of 58.8 per cent over three years for Armidale Regional Council (ARC) has been met with dismay by the Guyra Branch of the NSW Farmers Association.

Guyra Branch President Beth White said that they are very disappointed with the IPART decision and 'gutted' that their submission, along with those of both groups and individuals, has largely been disregarded.

The increase in rates comes on top of rate harmonisation adjustments that have already seen hefty increases, brought on by the amalgamation of Guyra with Armidale.

Some Guyra landholders will see a rate increase of 198% and

are now facing further increases, which could severely impact their businesses.

"As a branch we are feeling totally disenfranchised by IPART's decision to allow ARC to increase rates over the next three years," Beth said.

"Along with many others we put in a submission, but it appears that those concerns were just tossed aside.

"During the limited consultation period, council revealed no appetite to improve services to the rural community with most of the projects 'vanity projects' in Armidale.

"In their application, council did not consider appropriately, the capacity of the rural landholders to pay.

"The huge increase comes at a

time when many are still recovering from years of drought and adversity and are still trying to rebuild their herds.

"Members have been reporting

to us that the rate increase will directly impact their businesses and they will have to cut back expenditure which will have flow-on effects for the whole community."

"There has been a deterioration in commodity prices since the application, and the assertion that farmers can 'stump up' is offensive.

"Supporting a broken, inefficient organisation without greater accountability, but a guarantee of more money, is ridiculous."

"We are gutted that we have not been heard and that the work we put into making a submission seems to have been ignored.

"True consultation doesn't have meaning anymore. Councils have lost the perspective of the ratepayer.

"This submission has come after ongoing consultation and discussions with the community and key stakeholders," Mr Lenehan said.

"SGG has been working tirelessly to ensure that the unique needs and challenges of Guyra are taken into account by the local government.

"Through this submission, we

aim to achieve a more responsive, vibrant, and sustainable future for the community of Guyra.

"We believe that the demerger from the ARC will enable us to focus on the development of sustainable agriculture practices, protect our environment, and support local businesses and job growth.

"SGG would like to extend an invitation to all members of the

community to consider becoming a member of SGG. We look forward to a more sustainable and vibrant future for Guyra."

Black Mountain competing in Armidale Eisteddfod




On Wednesday, June 7th the students from Black Mountain Public School travelled to the New England Conservatorium of Music to participate in the Armidale Eisteddfod.

Julie celebrates 18 years with Costa

Julie Driscoll joined Costa when the first tomato glasshouses came into operation in 2005 and this week the team celebrated her 18 years of employment. Julie, who started out in pruning and has done a range of jobs, is now the Packing Supervisor for Glasshouse 1 and 2. She is one of a handful of employees who have been with the Costa since the start of the operations in Guyra.

Born in Armidale, Julie moved to Queensland before returning to Guyra with her two children, before starting work with Costa. Her children, now with families of their own, have also worked at the glasshouses at different times.

"When I started I didn't have any horticultural skills but I have learnt a lot over the years." she said. "There are good people here and its great getting to know people from different countries," she said.

Scot MacDonald, State Manager Vertical Farming, said Julie had worked in most parts of the business and was now a valuable and effective supervisor in the Elm Street packhouse.

"Julie has been part of the growth of our glasshouse operation at Elm Street from five hectares to 20 hectares. Originally there were about 150 staff when she began her career with Costa, now there are 800 people employed from all over the world," Scot said. "She is usually one of the first to arrive and last to leave. Julie supports her team and colleagues and is highly regarded. I hope Julie will be around for many years to come."



Garden makeover about to get underway

The gardens of the Guyra Civic Administration Building will soon receive a fresh makeover thanks to a project initiated by the Guyra and Community Progress Association (GCPA) to improve the beautification of Bradley Street.

Council's parks team is collaborating with the GCPA to extend the gardens and upgrade some of the landscaping to include the removal of some large shrubs, relocation of the roses and the introduction of perennial borders, spring bulbs and a new hydrangea garden along the southern wall of the civic administration building.

Member of the GCPA Barbara Ross has assisted the parks team on a landscaping theme that will thrive in the Guyra climate.

"This has been a wonderful collaboration with council who continue to demonstrate their commitment to working with community groups in Guyra to improve amenities and the beautification of the town," said Barbara.

"I am excited about this project that will extend the already lovely gardens in and around the precinct that also includes the Guyra Neighbourhood Centre.

"The removal of the large shrubs at the front of the building will make way for small trees that will provide spring flowers and good autumn colour.

"Sadly the old roses along the path will be removed and replaced with a perennial border and spring

bulbs as they have become quite woody and their thorns pose a threat to small children."

Guyra residents have fond memories of the roses leading into the building, but rest assured the roses will be dug up, and if suitable for transplanting offered to the community.

If anyone would like a rose please visit council's customer service team at the Guyra office and put your name down for collection when removed in July.

Armidale Mayor Sam Coupland said the GCPA is continuing to do great things for the Guyra community and our collaboration with members is strong.

"The GCPA is a great example of the community putting their hand up to make things happen and share their passion for the Guyra region," said mayor Coupland. "Council will continue to support the GCPA and any other Guyra community group that is committed to enhancing and beautifying the town and surrounding villages."

Visitors to the library and the council offices will also experience an improvement to the existing path to the building that can be slippery and will also undergo improvements for safety.







Memorial Park Mandala Garden underway

Construction work has started on the new memorial Mandala Garden opposite McKie Park on the on the corner of Sandon Street and Lagoon Road opposite the early childhood centre.

This is a key element of Guyra Garden Club's Memorial Park project which includes a Memorial Avenue of Trees, the Mandala Garden, and Engraved Stones in Memory of local service men and women who died overseas during the two World Wars.

In 2020, Guyra Garden Club was awarded funding by the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR) and the Department of Veterans' Affairs towards parts of the project.

The Club's proposals were backed by Armidale Regional Council, Rotary, the RSL Guyra sub-branch and other community organisations. In 2022, the Country Women's Association Guyra Branch also decided to support the project by funding a Rotunda to mark its 90 years of service to the Guyra community.

Many people have worked to progress the Guyra Memorial Park project with physical construction of the Mandala Garden starting in June 2023. A cement slab has been laid for the garden centre and will be the base for the Rotunda to be

assembled in October.

This week, shaping of the outer circle pathway and the north-south and east-west pathways began. This work is being done by local contractor Scott MacFarlane. Corten steel garden edging has been ordered through DTB Fabrications in Tenterfield for delivery soon.

Planting out of the four garden beds will commence in Spring. Guyra Garden Club is planning a remembrance morning tea in early November to open the garden and thank contributors.

The Guyra Memorial Park project aims to fulfil a 1951 resolution of the then Guyra Shire Council. They say patience is a virtue. It is the hope of the Guyra Garden Club that this new garden, rotunda and avenue of trees will be a welcome addition to the open spaces and gardens of Guyra and will help build a stronger, more engaged community.

Active and creative kids vouchers to be cut back

The NSW Government has confirmed that Active and Creative Kids vouchers will be halved to \$50 and means tested. First Lap swim vouchers will also be halved in value, but the program has been extended for a year and will be available for all children.

Premier Chris Minns and Sports Minister Steve Kamper announced the new details last week and said the government was "making the Active and Creative Kids voucher programs more sustainable by introducing a new and permanent means-tested scheme from Term 1 next year".

The new voucher will be for \$50 and will be issued twice a year, at the start of terms 1 and 3, beginning in 2024. It will cover activities currently available under both the Active Kids and Creative Kids voucher programs. The vouchers will only be given to families receiving the federal government's Family Tax Benefit Part A.

As an interim measure, the current Active Kids and Creative Kids vouchers will be extended from July 1, 2023 until

the new scheme is in place from February 1, 2024. The interim vouchers will be to the value of \$50 for school-aged children.

Guyra based MLC and Shadow Minister for Youth Justice, Aileen MacDonald, has condemned the decision saying it will massively restrict the eligibility of NSW families.

Mrs MacDonald said thousands of families in regional NSW rely on the annual vouchers to enrol their children in sporting and creative activities.

"All families in our community could receive \$300 per

child per year in Active Kids and Creative Kids vouchers under the Liberal and Nationals Government," Mrs MacDonald said.

"Under Labor's cuts, the number of eligible families will be cut in half, and those who are still eligible will receive just \$100 per child per year.

"I'm really disappointed Labor has cut these highly successful programs at a time when the cost of living is rising and households budgets are already under significant pressure."

Petition to save regional seniors travel card

MEMBER for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall last week officially launched a community petition to fight to save the NSW Regional Seniors Travel Card from being axed in the State Government's upcoming September Budget, with a large group of local residents and local seniors outside Armidale Train Station.

"Despite being asked multiple time since the election, the new government has refused to rule out giving the Regional Seniors Travel Card the chop at the end of this calendar year," Mr Marshall said.

"With many of our local seniors already feeling the cost-of-living pinch, axing this travel card would represent a major blow at a time when our seniors need this assistance the most.

"The \$250 prepaid card can be used for pre-booked rail travel, coaches, taxis and even fuel for a private vehicle."

Mr Marshall said 12,034 Northern Tablelands seniors currently had a travel card, representing savings for them in excess of \$3 million each year.

"Axing this card would impact aversely on local seniors who travel on public transport or drive themselves for cancer care treatment, various medical appointments, to

visit their families, children, grandchildren and other important needs.

"After lobbying the previous government, this card is now available to those on a disability support or carers pension (if you are of aged pension age), as well as those on an aged pension, service pension or a war widow pension."

Mr Marshall has formally asked the Minister for Regional Roads and Transport in Parliament to guarantee the continuation of the travel card beyond 2023.

"Disappointingly, the Minister gave no assurance, instead telling Parliament the entire program is 'under review'—this gives rural and regional seniors no comfort or certainty whatsoever.

"Axing this program would be a heartless and cruel blow for our local seniors and I'm hoping we can send a very strong message via this petition to the government and Macquarie Street and rural and regional people want to see this travel card continue."

Across NSW, more than 1 million seniors currently access the Regional Seniors Travel Card.

Paper copies of the petition is also available at Mr Marshall's Armidale and Moree Electorate Offices for signing and distribution.

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Sales

June 16th - After stabilising last week it was apparent upon opening that the market would continue along its current downtrend that has now stretched into its sixth week. By the end of Wednesday's sale the Northern region indicator had retreated 30 cents with the 18 micron and finer types the hardest hit.

This trend continued during Thursday's sale with the indicator falling a further 18 cents. The Aussie dollar gained 1.2 cents against the US during the selling week making the fortnightly gain over 3 cents. When looked at in US dollars the Eastern market indicator has only fallen 8

cents over the past fortnight. 30,544 bales were sold nationally for the week. A large 23.2% of the offering was passed in and 8.7% was withdrawn prior to sale.

Major buyers included Endeavour Wool, Tianyu and Techwool with the top 4 purchasing over 50% of the national Merino fleece offering. With the Western region not selling again next week the expected national offering reduces to 33,463 bales. Next week's sale is the second last for the season. The new season will commence with sales during the first two weeks of July before heading into the annual three week recess period.
