Parliamentary Inquiry into undergrounding of transmission lines 'welcome news'

A Parliamentary Inquiry into undergrounding powerlines has been welcomed by both the NSW Farmers Association and Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall.

Multiple renewable energy projects proposed or under construction in regional areas will require new power lines to connect them to the grid.

The Legislative Council inquiry will report on the feasibility of undergrounding transmission infrastructure for renewable energy projects by the end of August, with particular reference to:

- the costs and benefits of undergrounding;
- existing case studies and current projects regarding simi-

lar undergrounding of transmission lines in both domestic and international contexts;

- any impact on delivery timeframes of undergrounding, and
- any environmental impacts of undergrounding.

NSW Farmers Energy Transition Working Group chair Reg Kidd said that too often landholders were being ignored by the big developers.

"We support a robust inquiry, because it will find that there are places where undergrounding wires is a win-win for production and community amenity that has not been addressed to date," Mr Kidd said.

How Tafe Digital helped Heather's career

Whether it's helping artificially inseminating a heifer or tending to a pet cat, no two days are the same at Guyra District Veterinary Clinic – and Heather Moran wouldn't have it any other way.

The Guyra local and TAFE Digital graduate said she is living her dream career as a vet nurse, helping tend to sick and injured animals in a busy country vet clinic.

And TAFE Digital-trained vet nurses have never been more in-demand. According to Jobs and Skills Australia, there are currently about 10,700 vet nurses nationwide, a number that will need to almost double by 2026 to keep pace with industry demand.

Ms Moran said studying her Certificate IV in Veterinary Nursing through TAFE Digital gave her the practical skills and flexibility to make an immediate mark in her role.

"With my busy life, I wouldn't have been able to do the course if I had to drive to Tamworth for a face-to-face class," Ms Moran said. "A lot of my teachers were actual working vets and it was just such a great way of learning."

Ms Moran, 29, who grew up on a farm and has a lifelong love of animals, said working as a vet nurse was both rewarding and exhilarating.



"Vet nursing was always a natural choice for me and we have such a huge variety of animals in this clinic," she said.

"It's so satisfying knowing you're making a difference and helping animals get well again."

TAFE Digital vet nursing teacher Emma Joseph, a practicing vet nurse for more than a decade, said Ms Moran was a

powerful example of how TAFE Digital enabled students to realize their dreams in a flexible learning environment.

"Heather was so self-motivated and keen – she just kept persevering," Ms Joseph said.

"By the end of the course, most students are already in paid work or very close to that point.

"It's such an ever-changing

job and it's rewarding to be able to help pets and their owners when they need you most."

The Certificate IV in Veterinary Nursing with TAFE Digital is a self-paced, online course that includes 21 units of study. Applicants to the course must have completed the equivalent of a Certificate II in an animal studies-related area.

"Until now undergrounding has been ignored or dismissed as too expensive, not because of a cost/benefit analysis, but rather through the lack of will to fully investigate the impacts of huge infrastructure on rural communities.

"There has been a lot of just drawing lines on maps and justifying route selection in order to minimise cost and get onto the next project, and the real impacts of above ground infrastructure have not been as-

sessed, and this is what this inquiry will reveal."

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall said that people across the Northern Tablelands and New England regions had been raising their concerns about the impact large industrial-scale transmission lines would have on the landscape, environment and agricultural production and he's pleased the government has finally acknowledged them and taken some action.

He is urging the inquiry committee to visit the region to see

and hear for themselves the concerns locals have about the proposed transmission lines.

"As I said in the Parliament a fortnight ago, the government must look seriously at undergrounding sections of these new lines to avoid land use conflicts, loss of biodiversity and impacts on people's amenity and existing industries, such as agriculture," Mr Marshall said.

"People across the region are telling me loud and clear they want these new large-scale public infrastructure assets placed on public land.

"We have no shortage of parcels of public land in the broader New England region and that should be the first preference this inquiry looks at, with the use of private land only considered where there is no other option available.

"No one is suggesting we underground all of the hundreds of kilometres of new transmission lines required to be built, but where it impacts heavily on existing industries and the lives of local residents, we should put them underground as has been done in other parts of the state."

UNE calls on farmers to share information about farm crime

In an effort to combat rural crime, University of New England's (UNE) centre for rural criminology has initiated the first comprehensive study in over two decades.

The 2023 Australian farm crime survey aims to gather crucial insights from landholders regarding their encounters with criminal activity, and their perspectives on crime prevention effectiveness.

The survey seeks to gain a better understanding of the climbing rate of rural crime from the perspective of farmers and landholders.

This national survey follows UNE's 2020 NSW farm crime survey, which found that farmers are reluctant to report criminal activity, and many are dissatisfied with criminal justice responses to the crime.

The NSW survey also found most farmers see the rural crime prevention team as a positive development in the fight against rural crime, with nearly half of those surveyed saying they're more likely to

report crime since the creation of the specialised team.

The survey also highlighted farmers' frustration at their inability to monitor stock against theft. In response, UNE supported a smart tag trial that proved that following a theft, stock could be successfully tracked by police.

The centre's co-director, Dr. Kyle Mulrooney, said in order to combat farm crime, police and policymakers need better information from those involved in farming who have key insights into the important issues.

"This national survey comes off the back of several state surveys. The evidence suggests that farm crime is a serious problem. Increasing the capacity to fight farm crime is crucial," Dr Mulrooney said.

"This survey puts the farmers' voice front and centre, allowing us to gain a better understanding of the scope of the problem, as well as find out what measures might be taken by the Government, police, farmers and rural communities to

reduce farm crime across Australia."

Dr Mulrooney said it's well known that farm crime is quite rampant, but there's not a clear picture of how widespread it is, mostly because it is under-reported.

"This farm data from NSW was crucial in crime campaigns to target communities to help them address and prevent farm crime. We also drew on the experience of farmers around livestock theft," Dr Mulrooney said.

"So this is our attempt to collect that data from across Australia. It's information we need to be able to move the needle against the crooks, to properly address farm crime."

The national survey is calling for farmers across the nation to take part; it is now open until the end of the year.

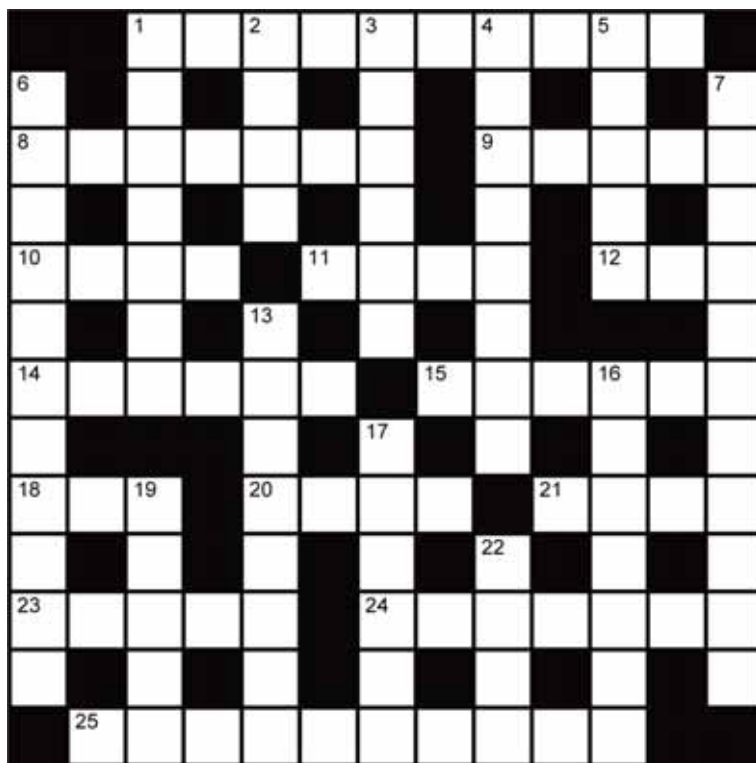

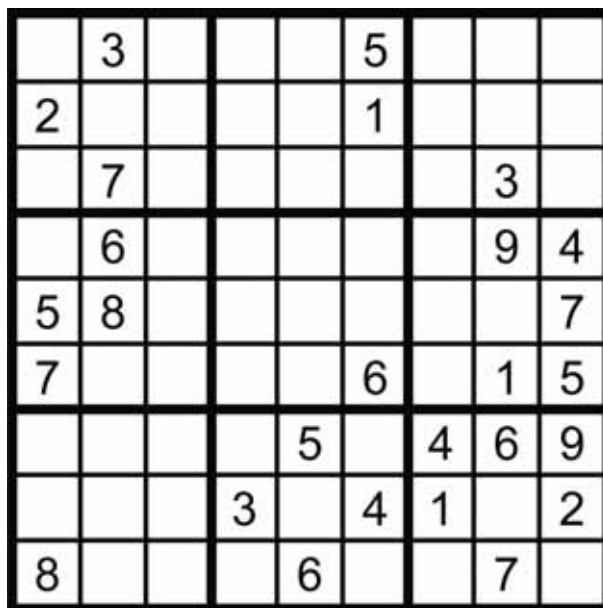

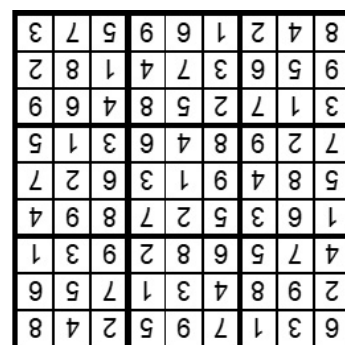

Wildlife Tails

Care needed for wildlife during winter



Winter is here and for wildlife carers it's time to relax a bit as the calls for injured and orphaned wildlife slow down. We do get calls for critters caught in chimneys, mainly possums and sometimes birds who are also looking for somewhere to keep warm.

Do be careful when lighting your wood burning fireplace for the first time each year and check for any unexpected inhabitants. We have one possum in care that was singed when a fire was lit but fortunately didn't have too many actual burns. He still needed medication and is still in care two months on.

I know it's winter but please keep any bird baths that you have clean and filled. Although birds don't consume as much



water in winter they still need to drink and bathe, and don't forget a shallow dish for our wonderful lizards that keep pesky snails at bay.

We are in need of more carers in all areas and we run quite a few training days and workshops

during the less busy months. If you haven't time or your home is unsuitable for raising wildlife we also need people with other skills. If you are competent with computers, or are able to transport animals or are interested in helping with our newsletter, we

have a place for you.

Most volunteers meet the costs of caring for themselves but if we have spare money then we try to help carers out with vet costs, fuel and food for their animals in care. Another way of helping if you are able is to donate a small amount each month. We are a registered charity and donations of \$2 or more are tax deductible for you.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb sale

June 21st - Lamb numbers increased to 6600 head with sheep supplies lifting to 4800. It was a good quality penning of lambs with few plain quality lots on offer. Weights and condition varied with a good supply of well finished heavy and extra heavy weights. The usual processors were in attendance and there was increased restocker activity.

Processor demand was weaker throughout resulting in cheaper trends throughout. Restockers took advantage of the weaker market and purchased large numbers of lambs at heavier weights. The fall in market trends was less on the lighter weights while the heavy and extra heavy weights were considerably cheaper.

There were large supplies of bare shoes 2 and 3 score merino sheep penned with limited supplies of Woolly sheep. Cross-

breeds and Dorpers were also limited in supply. Processor demand was again weaker with trends cheaper throughout. The lack of a skin value made price variations between the shorn sheep and those carrying a Spring skin vast.

Armidale Cattle sale

June 22nd - The final sale for this financial year saw numbers reduce to 745 head. Young cattle were well supplied along with some very good cows, grown steers and grown heifers. The quality and condition of the offering was fair to good. The usual buyers were in attendance.

There were varying trends through the young cattle where restocker weaners sold to cheaper trends with breed and quality accounting for significant price reductions. Light weight yearling steers to restockers experienced little change with the heavy feeder steers following a similar trend. Yearling heifers to

restock and feed saw a firm to slightly dearer trend for a very mixed quality offering. Heavy grown steers to process sold on a firm to slightly cheaper trend however did not carry the weight or finish of the previous sale.

The good quality well finished grown heifers to processors followed a similar trend. There was not as much restocker competition in the cow market however this had little effect with market trends remaining firm across all classes. There was some quality related price change.

Weekly Wool Sales

June 23rd - The Eastern market indicator continued to head backwards this week, making it the seventh consecutive week of falls. In the Northern region a 21 cent fall was recorded on the first day of sales followed by a further 12 cents decline on the final day.

Price premiums for the finer types continue to be eroded

with more substantial falls being recorded in this end of the market. With the Western region not selling this week the national offering of 28,500 bales was the smallest in nine months. 24,260 bales were sold for the week with a passed in rate of 16.4%.

The combined passed in and withdrawal rate exceeded 25% compared to the seasonal average of 18.8%. Major buyers included Tianyu, Techwool & Endeavour Wool, with the top four once again dominating purchases in the Merino fleece category. The headline market indicators finished at their lowest weekly closing level since October 2020.

A large offering of 47,000 bales is currently rostered for the final sale of the season as Fremantle returns to weekly selling in the lead up to the July recess. If they all materialise it will be the largest offering since returning from the one week Easter recess in April.
