## **Barnaby speaks to Guyra**

Federal member for New England and Shadow Minister for Veterans' Affairs, Barnaby Joyce was in Guyra last week to speak to members of the local Nationals branch and other interested people.

In his address to the gathering he spoke of the need for residents to understand the implications of the proposed Voice referendum which will be held later this year.

He said that one needed to get past the so called "vibe" and to focus on what this permanent change means for Australia and in this community.

In his opinion it means 'that one section of the community will have a greater say on issues affecting us all, thereby splitting communities' and that 'these permanent changes would not necessarily lead to a change for the better in outback Indigenous communities'.

Mr Joyce also commented on the impact of the renewables industry with the New England becoming 'a dumping ground for a



virtuous zeal to achieve unsustainable emission targets'. He believes that this push for net zero has 'destroyed the affordability of power to the cost of us all and replaced it with a dependence on the weather'.

He asked the question: 'As more coal fired generators close over the coming years what will replace

them? Why hasn't the Government considered Nuclear Energy as a reliable base load power 24/7?'

Mr Joyce said that the proposed New England REZ is a prime example of residents not being initially asked what they thought of the unclear proposals at the time, and then finding that 60 wind towers, 300 metres high are proposed for the Booroolong area between Armidale and Guyra on the Western side with massive transmission lines.

He called up those people who are concerned by this development to demonstrate in Canberra outside the parliament when it next sits.



## Students tour Costa glasshouse



## Marshall moves to force split of health district

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall has introduced a Private Members' Bill into State Parliament, which will force the split of the Newcastlecentric Hunter New England Health (HNEH) District.

The bill comes on the back of his 16,000-strong signature petition calling for the split which Mr Marshall tabled late last year. He says his Health Services Amendment (Splitting of the Hunter New England Health District) Bill 2023 would divide the current health district and re-create the former New England Area Health Service, headquartered in Tamworth, servicing the entire New England North West area.

Mr Marshall said that despite many promises since the tabling of the petition last year, nothing had changed and many issues stemmed directly from the size of the health district – the largest in regional NSW.

"The current HNEH District services 25 local government areas, a population of more than 950,000 people and is the only health district in the State that tries to deliver rural and remote services from a metropolitan base," Mr Marshall said.

"This may not be the panacea to solving all the ills of health care in our region, but the groundswell of support for the petition and the momentum it created, dictates this is the next inevitable step in bringing about the change so many people want to see.

"We are sick and tired of decisions being made centrally in a metropolitan location without respect for the individual needs of rural and remote communities that are very different to Newcastle.

"This Bill will force the changes we have been asking for and bring the decision makers inside our tent and working for the community they serve in deed and action.

"I look forward to working hard over the next few months to attract support for this Bill from the government, opposition and cross-benches."

# Alternative departure gate for smaller aircraft at Armidale airport

An alternative departure gate (Gate 3) is now in operation at the Armidale Regional Airport to cater for airlines that fall beneath the Federal Government's 40 seat passenger threshold and do not require security screening.

From the end of June, the Federal Government will no longer be subsidising a national security screening process in regional areas. The alternative departure gate will service all REX and LINK Airways aircraft that fall under the federal government threshold. All Qantas passengers will continue to be security screened through the current departure gate.

Armidale Regional Council Mayor Sam Coupland said that the cost for national security screening should not be borne by local ratepayers.

"We are fortunate with our new terminal to be able to modify an existing area, and we have partnered with REX and Link Airways to operationalise the new departure gate," said Mayor Coupland.

"Other regional airports affected by the federal funding withdrawal have not been able to juggle the operational logistics as easily.

"REX and LINK Airways were offered the opportunity for their passengers to be screened, albeit this came at a cost. The fact that we have terminal space and maintain good working relationships means we were able to accommodate their needs, arriving at an outcome that secures a competitive market for air travel in our region and in turn, minimises any reduction in services or increase in costs to passengers.

"Because the Federal Government is no longer subsidising the security program, airports like ours, servicing smaller travelling populations are at a disadvantage.

"This approach becomes difficult as the cost of operating screening services is borne by a relative few compared to metropolitan ports. If costs are ultimately passed onto the traveling community, it means proportionately higher airfares for regional travellers and these proportions are way out of whack. It's a cost that could ultimately affect demand for regional air travel and lead to a reduction in air services for many regional communities."

Council will continue to advocate for a workable, longterm solution to the impact the current federal funding model has on maintaining security screening services at smaller regional Tier 2 airports generally.

## **Steam trains rides returning** to New England in August

Transport Heritage NSW, operators of the state's rail heritage fleet, is returning steam to the New England region from 11th to 20th August 2023.

Over 5,500 people are expected to take part in the event, which sees historic locomotives 3265 and 3526 embark on a series of steam train rides departing from both Tamworth (12 and 13 August) and Armidale (19 and 20 August).

Transport Heritage NSW CEO Andrew Moritz said this is the first time they have operated a steam train to the New England region since 2015.

"Both the 32 and 35 class steam locomotives were once the backbone of the NSW railways and operated regularly in the New England region for many years," said Mr Moritz.

Built in 1917, 3526's original number was 1314. Reclassified as the 35 class during the 1924 renumbering program, these locomotives were originally known as the NN class, giving rise to the nickname 'Nanny'.

The 35 class 4-6-0 locomotives were built by the NSW Government Railways (NSWGR) at their workshops at Eveleigh. Coincidentally, there were 35 engines in the 35 class. They were intended to reduce the amount of 'doubleheading' required for main line express trains following the introduction of heavy, twelve-wheeled corridor compartment cars. With the advent of the 36 and later the 38 classes, the 35s spent the greater part of their lives on northern services.

Locomotive 3265 entered service as 4-6-0 express passenger engine P 584 in 1902. It was renumbered 3265 in 1924 and was equipped with superheating in 1933. The 32 class became known as the "English express locomotives" due to their origin, although some were built in the USA by Baldwin and others in Australia. 3265 was among those built by Beyer, Peacock and Co.

in Manchester, UK.

The 32 class hauled a range of passenger services on almost every line in NSW. With 191 members the class were among the NSW Railways' most successful steam locomotive designs.

"While we had the pleasure of operating to Tamworth in 2015, this will be the first time a steam train has operated as far as Armidale in over 25 years," Mr Moritz said.

"We can't wait to offer locals the opportunity to ride behind these two icons of our state's rich transport history."

"Not only will people get to experience the sights and sounds of a genuine steam train, but they will also get to enjoy the comfort of our beautifully restored carriages which date back to the late 1930s."

• In the left column, click Privacy. · Look for the setting Who can

see your friends list? and click Edit to the far right.

• Select the audience of people (such as Only Me) you'd like to have access to your friends list. Only Me is the safest option.

## Rural Market Reports

## Weekly Wool Sales

June 30th - This weeks' market represented the final week of the 2022/23 selling season. 43,344 bales were offered for sale with all three selling centres operating.

Whilst market indicators continued to ease back there were pockets that showed some signs of improvement particularly later in the selling week. Buying strength generally came from the larger Chinese players whilst Italian interests were also strong on a selection of better superfine types on offer this week.

With the world's current economic situation continuing to remain negative, the wool pipeline has adopted a similar cautious approach to that of most consumers.

Exporters with larger buying power and access to finance continue to buy every week whilst the smaller players with less spending capacity come in and out of the market as they get further access to funds or have specific orders to fill.

Periods of lower demand pressure like we are currently experiencing see aspects like currency fluctuations play a greater role in market movements compared to periods when demand is strong.

As our currency has slipped back over the last week it is hoped that this will create some new orders into the market with only two more sales remaining before the mid-year three week recess.

## **Junior Soccer**
