Reboot Your Grazing with Soil Land Food

Resilient, healthy and productive grazing landscapes will be the focus of a free workshop series for farmers in the Guyra and Walcha districts over the coming months.

The first Reboot Your Grazing workshops are designed to increase farmers understanding of soil types and soil health.

David Hardwick, Agroecologist from Soil Land Food said the workshops are devised to give farmers a holistic overview to landscape management.

"We use a systems approach through managing farm ecology, regenerating landscapes and helping farmers with good decision making on a whole property scale," David said.

"The first two workshops on soil extension are to help landholders build practical confidence by understanding soils and soil constraints."

The first workshop will be held in July, at Guyra on July 24th with Kristy Youman, a Farming Systems Extension Specialist from Soil Land Food. A second workshop will be held in Walcha on July 25th.

The initial workshop will cover all your essential knowledge on soils from understanding your topsoil, soil types, soil health and soil fertility and the 4 steps to soil success.

Project Officer – Sustainable Agriculture, with Southern New England Landcare Elizabeth Rosser said the workshops are suitable for those who would like to develop their practical knowledge and skills to make good management decisions and increase drought resilience.

"I encourage local farmers to take advantage of this opportunity," Elizabeth said. 'I am really excited to facilitate this opportunity to learn from David and the team at Soil Land Food on how to build soil health and optimise a planned grazing approach."


If you want to learn to turn your moments of "..um" into "momen-

Takeover bid for Costa Group

The Costa Group, Australia's largest fresh fruit and vegetable grower and owner of the Guyra Tomato farm, could be in American hands within months following a takeover bid by Paine Schwartz Partners (PSP).

The Costa Group last week confirmed it has received a takeover bid from the US private equity firm.

PSP's indicative proposal gave shareholders \$3.50 per share plus any interim dividend declared in relation to the six-month period ending 2 July of up to four cents a share. The New York firm reconfirmed its offer after four weeks of due diligence.

Meanwhile, following PSP's proposal, Costa said its board, financial and legal advisors decided it was in the best interest of shareholders to grant PSP an eight-week timeframe for non-exclusive due diligence, which began on 6 June.

Costa said that after PSP acquired 13.78 per cent of the company at \$2.60 per share in October last year, the two spoke regarding a potential approach in the range of \$3.20-3.30 per share.

It said that the proposal's cash consideration, excluding any dividend, is a 34.6 per cent premium to the price PSP paid in October 2022.

PSP said it already has approval from the Foreign Investment Review Board to acquire 100 per cent of Costa, which may need to be refreshed depending on any co-investors.

"We often don't think about when we flush the toilet and turn on the tap or put our bins out on the kerbside. Many people are not aware that there is a reuse farm attached to the wastewater management facility that produces Lucerne and fattens cattle, or that we produce some of the best compost and have high levels of waste diversion from our landfill."

Ingrid in Mexico - June

June has certainly been an emotional rollercoaster. My first two nights were spent at Rotary events, first was a formal dinner/annual report evening and a Rotary pizza party with all the Toluca students and families. Both nights contained music, karaoke and a lot of having photos taken.

The night between the two events I went out with Mia, Alina, Johanna and João. We saw La Sirenita (The Little Mermaid) which I honestly didn't expect to enjoy but it was amazing.

On the 10th, I celebrated father's day with Rogelio. Axel, Maritza and I wore matching shirts and attended the Fathers Day Rally at Colegio Forger together. Everyone did a giant group Zumba class then split up to do what each family wanted.

I spent my last weekend with all the other Rotary students camping in Texcoco. We ate chilaquiles, hot dogs and lots of tunas (the fruit not fish). During the day we set up our tents, had a water slide and a soccer tournament in which my team won two of three matches. Everyone spent the afternoon talking and resting before the awards ceremony and bonfire that night. Some people went to bed immediately after but most of us stayed up until 2AM dancing, singing, talking, crying and just enjoying our last hours together. The following morning everyone packed up, signed each others flags and took SO many photos together.

The month has ended on a much sadder note as I said goodbye to all my friends at Colegio Forger, said goodbye to all my friends and watched them all leave and attended my first, and hopefully only, Mexican funeral. On Thursday afternoon Maritza, Axel and I headed to El Oro to attend the funeral of Maritzas great aunty Pompe. She was 94 and died peacefully in her sleep but the proceedings came as a bit of a culture shock.

Friday I was allowed to go for a walk through El Oro by myself which gave me a huge feeling of freedom which I haven't really had since arrival. I walked through the town visiting the government

hall where I was taken my first ever visit. I bought fruit from the market, a new art diary and visited many little stores.

Friday afternoon we returned to Toluca as Axel had a volleyball event early the next morning. Once he set off with his team Maritza, Pedro, Karina and I packed up the car and set off for El Oro again.

Sunday I had breakfast with the family then attended Sunday mass with Maritza, her mum, Karina, another one of Maritzas great aunts and her cousin in law. It was outdoors in the sun which was nice and I actually understood what the priest was saying.

We hung out at home most of the day then returned to the Casa de las Tias to eat and attend the 4th day of mourning before returning home.

João arrived at the house on Monday afternoon so we had dinner together, then he packed his suitcase while I painted in my room and did the washing. Today Maritza, João and I went out to dinner where she made us try sopes topped with chapulines. João tried a bite but didn't eat any-

more and I actually ate the whole thing, they were delicious but the idea was still very strange.

Wednesday morning we were up early and headed to Mexico City. We arrived at the airport, got Starbucks then went with João through customs and to his gate. We saw him off with a lot of tears from him and Maritza then left the airport.

Maritza, Rogelio, Axel and I spent the rest of the day walking around the downtown area of Mexico City. We visited the Metropolitan Cathedral, Mexico's largest church. Built during the Spanish conquest as a symbol of the consolidation of Spanish power the church is located directly on top of where the Aztec temple, Templo Mayor once stood before being ripped down to construct the cathedral.

When we returned to Toluca it had rained heavily and the streets were flowing with water causing traffic issues but we got home fine. The whole bottom floor of the house was flooded so we had to clean that up but luckily nothing was damaged.

Public garbage bins removed

I would like to know when Council plans to replace the three bins removed last week from the southern end of Bradley Street.

With many of our local seniors already feeling the cost-of-living pinch, axing this travel card would represent a major blow at a time when our seniors need this assistance the most.

BILL TO FORCE SPLIT OF HEALTH DISTRICT INTRODUCED

Off the back of his 16,000-strong signature petition, tabled late last year, Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall has introduced a Private Members' Bill into State Parliament,

which will force the split of the inefficient and Newcastle-centric Hunter New England Health District.

Mr Marshall said his Health Services Amendment (Splitting of the Hunter New England Health District) Bill 2023 would divide the current health district and re-create the former New England Area Health Service, headquartered in Tamworth, servicing the entire New England North West area.

Mr Marshall said it may not be the panacea to solving all the ills of health care in our region, but the groundswell of support for the petition and the momentum it created, dictates this is the next inevitable step in bringing about the change so many people want to see.



Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale


July 5th - Total Yarding: 1375 (-10025) | Sheep Yarding: 150 (-4650) | Lamb Yarding: 1225 (-5375). There was a complete turnaround in numbers from the previous sale with just 1225 lambs and just 150 sheep penned. Several factors contributed not the least being known buyer absence.

There were no heavy weight lambs penned however the lambs presented well despite the wet weather.

The majority of the lambs were purchased by restockers with restricted processor competition. The low numbers had an effect on price change however despite the restricted competition trends through all classes were only slightly cheaper. There were insufficient sheep to quote.

Armidale Cattle Sale

July 6th - There was a reduced penning of 655 head following a rain event. The majority of the offering were of good quality and presented in fair to good condition. Cows were well supplied. The usual buyers were in attendance along with the return of a major processor after a very long absence. Restockers



were active throughout.

A very mixed quality penning of vealers suitable to restockers saw the steer portion remain firm while the heifers sold to cheaper trends. Medium and heavy weight yearling steers attracted good competition from both restockers and feedlots to sell to dearer trends also.

Quality variations accounted for a large range in price for medium weight yearling heifers with the better quality lots firm to slightly dearer. Heavy grown steers to processors sold to a dearer trend with increased competition with the well finished grown heifers following a similar trend.

Competition and demand increased in the cow market

where a line of PTIC cows reached 274c/kg to a restocker. The cows to process sold to a dearer trend with well finished heavy weights improving by 5c/kg. Improved quality and increased competition resulted in the heavy weight bulls selling to a significantly dearer market trend.

Weekly Wool Market

The opening to the 2023/24 selling season bucked the trend set over the preceding 8 weeks of negative results by closing in positive territory across all micron categories and types.

Traditionally the first two July sales carry large quantities in excess of 50,000 bales and it seems as though most mills and exporters expected this season would be no different.

This week's offering of just over 36,000 bales fell a long way short of these expectations and this seems to have been the catalyst to turn the heat up on mills wanting to secure quantity prior to the upcoming 3 week recess.

Competition in the sale room was certainly more widespread with support coming from all parts of the processing world including Europe, India and China. With this being said, mills and exporters didn't totally abandon their recent cautious approach as they targeted specific lots fitting their specifications rather than trying to just secure quantities of stock.

In an encouraging note to next week the market did maintain its positive approach from the first lot to the last and market levels improved as the week progressed.

The National offering for next week's final sale before the recess has not jumped significantly and as a result we expect the market will maintain the gains of this week. Exporters will also want to see next week close in a positive manner as this will provide a better platform for them to negotiate business with their overseas clients throughout the sale recess.
