Restoration plans for Wandsworth memorial

WANDSWORTH'S District Soldiers and Nurses War Memorial has been given a \$6,732 boost to help cover costs for consultation and restoration works.

The funding was secured under the NSW Government's Community War Memorials Fund and will initially be used to run a Condition Assessment Report on the Memorial.

Built by prominent stonemason Michael William Hardy of Narrabri, the Memorial was residents erected by of Wandsworth in honour of those who sacrificed their lives in World War One.

Wandsworth Community Reserve Board Director Phil Henry said he was excited to receive the funding for this important restoration project.

"It is great to see State Government funding for the future preservation of these War Memorials," Mr Henry said.

"We owe respect to all who have served past and present, and persons who have been impacted by war including their families and communities.'

Mr Henry said the restoration and preservation of the War Memorial will enhance education and awareness for future generations.

"It will allow for the continuation of honour and respect for the sacrifices that were made by the men and women, who fought for our freedom, from the Wandsworth community and surrounding districts," he said.

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall inspected the memorial last week and said he knows how important this monument is to the Wandsworth community.

"It is fantastic news that the first step towards restorations works is underway," Mr Marshall said.

"Phil Henry has been a fierce and tireless advocate for the Memorial and I'm so pleased work is now underway to bring this magnificent structure back to life."

Demerger submission in the hands of Local Government Minister

The Save & Grow Guyra Inc. (SaGG) committee have put their hand up on behalf of Guyra to have their council returned. Spokesperson for the group Rob Lenehan said that they have now completed and sent their demerger submission to the Minister for Local Government Hon. Ron Hoenig MP, the Premier Chris Minns and Local Member Adam Marshall.

Mr Lenehan said that the committee has worked extremely hard over a long period to achieve this.

"As President of SaGG Inc., I thank them for their dedication and countless hours sacrificed in accomplishing our goal," he said. "There are some 9 or 10 councils across NSW wanting a demerger and we feel there is as

good a chance now as there ever was."

Along with other councils seeking demerger, Guyra is part of an alliance known as Demerge NSW Alliance. They have renewed hope, with 'recent parliamentary mutterings' concerning the forced amalgamations by the former coalition State Government in 2016.

They also believe there is a possibility of a plebiscite based on the pre 2016 council areas to determine whether the residents and rate payers want a demerger or separation of ARC to form new Local Government areas in Guyra and Armidale independently.

"There is a real opportunity for the Guyra and Armidale communities to exercise their democratic right and have their Councils returned," Mr Lenehan said. "There are a small but determined number of opposition MPs sympathetic to our cause, so let us hope democracy can come to the fore and the Parliamentary balance of power can force a change and correct the dreadful debacle the Local Government amalgamations have caused."

Now that the group have formed a committee and been granted Incorporation, they are asking the Guyra community to join Save & Grow Guyra Inc. Membership Forms and support letters are available for signing at Four Ways Service Centre in Guyra or by email saveandgrowguyra@gmail.com.

Information supplied by Jeff Martin, Observer for Bureau of Meteorology Recently it has been reported in the media that climate scientists believe the world will experience its hottest year on record in 2023. Halfway through the year now, and with an El Nino in the offing, readers may be wondering if Guyra is going to break any temperature records this year.

The BoM has nearly 43 years of daily maximum and minimum temperatures from the Guyra Hospital weather station, so we could look at daily averages, obtained by taking the average of the minimum and the maximum temperatures on the day. However, studies using continuously recording temperature gauges show that the average of the maximum and minimum is an inaccurate estimate of the true average. So here we will look just at Guyra's daily maximum temperatures - after all it is the maximum temperature that affects the discomfort we feel on hot days.

First, we look at the average of the daily maxima from 1 January to 21 June. Figure 1 shows this for each year from 1981 to 2023, with El Nino years marked by black dots. There are seven years (2019, 2018, 2016, 2014, 2005, 2002 and 1998) that are hotter than 2023 in the first half of the year. So, as far as maximum temperatures go, Guyra is nowhere near the hottest on record for the first half of the year.





Figure 2 - Guyra daily maximum temperature Full year 1981-2023

But what about the second half of the year, for which the BoM thinks there is a high likelihood of an El Nino weather pattern? Figure 2 tries to answer this by looking at the whole year.

Each of the grey dots is a daily maximum temperature recorded sometime in the period 1981 to 2022. The black wobbly line joins the dots just for 1 January to 21 June 2023. There are also two dashed lines that are the smoothed averages of all the grey dots. The upper line is for El Nino years and the lower for other years. The two lines show that daily maximum temperatures are generally higher during an El Nino, particularly so in the second half of the year, when daily maximums can be about a degree

Figure 1 - Guyra daily maximum temperature Average 1st January - 21st June

higher than average. The wobbly line for 2023 daily maximums so far this year shows that they have been average or below average for much of the time. For much of April and May, daily maximums were well below average. With daily maximums for the first half of the year averaging almost 1.5degC below the record in 2019 (top part of Figure 1), the El Nino effect of an extra degree on maximums in the second half of 2023 won't be enough to cancel out the cooler than average first half of 2023. So, at this stage, looking just at daily maximums, it doesn't seem likely that Guyra will break any temperature records this year. Of course, the past is never an infallible guide to the future, but unfortunately it's all we've got.

Drought Resilient Pasture Landscapes update

Farmers who are members of the nine coaching groups of the Drought Resilient Pasture Landscapes project, have spent some time during their third round of coaching sessions looking at their predicted pasture availability for the coming spring.

Aside from calibrating their eye for estimating pasture availability (also called herbage mass) and the green (quality) content of the pasture, these members have customised their Ag360 accounts with paddock and animal details for their property.

The time spent doing this using the online tool Ag360 (www.ag360.com.au) has paid off for these farmers, allowing them to access 6-month forecasts of rainfall, soil moisture, and pasture availability.

Jaimi-lee Edwards, a pasture coach with the project at UNE said that it's one thing to know your current livestock feed position, but it's another to see the

forecasts that go hand in hand with farmer experience, to help make decisions about stock numbers and grazing management.

"We are also pleased to have UNE complete the establishment of seven water quality monitoring sites on various waterways in the Northern Tablelands, and look forward to seeing how our decisions with pasture management improve water quality in our waterways," Jaimi-Lee said.

"The fourth round of coach-

ing sessions start next month, during which we'll keep an eye on likely spring pasture availability."





Nine deserving community organisations have received financial support through Council's latest round of its Community Small Grants Program.

The funding round closed on 21 May 2023 and 21 applications were received from a diverse group of organisations from across the Local Government Area.

Armidale Mayor Sam Coupland said the grants of up-to \$3000 were given to community groups to deliver one-off initiatives across a broad range of programs to enhance the lives of residents.

"This year's grants program was well subscribed with many deserving initiatives but unfortunately we could not award funds to everyone, but rest assured there will be further opportunities later in the year," said Mayor Coupland

"The small grants program aims to encourage, support and promote community groups and volunteers in their invaluable contributions to our community."

\$110k boost for Arts North West

Arts North West will use a \$110,000 State Government grant to renew and activate precincts across the Northern Tablelands to help re-engage audiences during post-covid recovery.

Announcing the grant, Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall MP said the funding was provided from the NSW Regional Arts Development Organisation Fund.

"It was wonderful to meet with Arts North West Executive Director Lauren Mackley and hear firsthand about the exciting art initiatives that are underway across the Northern Tablelands as a result of this funding," Mr Marshall said.

"Arts North West will experiment with local venues, both indoor and outdoor, and consider how to re-engage audiences

"The funding will be used for a series of CBD and venue activations, venue and public space mapping, as well as numerous professional and creative development programs across various towns. Executive Director of Arts North West Lauren Mackley said the organisation was thrilled to receive the funding.

"This funding is a great opportunity to build creative capacity, celebrate and showcase our creative and cultural identity and understand how regional audiences respond in this new era," Ms Mackley said.

"Post-covid audiences' return to venues has not been stable or easy to anticipate."

Busy Start to Term 3 at Black Mountain

Weekly Wool Sales

July 14th - The improved buyer sentiment over the last two sales continued this week as exporters pushed to secure quantity prior to the upcoming three week recess. Competition in the saleroom was widespread with all segments in the market active.

Market Reports

Gains were seen across all micron categories on Tuesday with Merino lots carrying more beneficial test results improving by up to 50 cents clean. Lower spec lots showed gains of up to 10-20 cents. Crossbred types strengthened by 10-15 cents on more even well prepared types. A stronger A\$ on Wednesday impacted prices slightly with levels easing back, albeit not enough to lose all of their earlier gains.

As mentioned in last week's report, the number of bales offered for sale in these first two July sales has been far less than anticipated. This week's offering of 44,697 bales meant that 23% less bales have been offered in the last fortnight compared to the same two sales last season. This has definitely helped stabilize the market. The mid-year sale recess is traditionally a time where exporters travel to see their clients around the world. We hope the more optimistic feeling in the market over the last few weeks will provide a platform for them to fill their order books. Quantities in the first few sales are expected to be large so the success of these meetings will go a long way to a positive market on its return.

Welcome back everyone to a busy term. Seth Patterson will be competing at the PSSA Athletics Carnival in Week 2. We wish him well in his events.


