Refurbished Men's Shed officially open

GUYRA'S refurbished Men's Shed is officially open for business, following two State Government grants.

The Guyra's Men's Shed were successful in two grant applications over the past few years which helped immensely with the refurbishment.

\$17,765 was secured under the Community Building Partnership program for solar panels on the roof and they also received \$234,500 for a refurbishment and expansion under the COVID-19 stimulus program.

With this support, they have been able to construct an additional shed for tools and machinery, accessible amenities and pathways and a rooftop solar system on their new shed.


Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall attended the opening on the weekend with President John Jackson and other dedicated members.

Mr Marshall said that the Men's Shed plays a vital role in the mental health and general wellbeing of the Guyra community.



The Guyra and Community Progress Association's (G&CPA) latest project has been completed, with all four of the town's entrances now proudly welcoming visitors with enhanced signage.

New stone entrance signs have been constructed on the eastern and western entrances to Guyra, while existing signs north and south of Guyra now have a new stone base.

Donna Davidson from the G&CPA said that they are proud of the new gateways to our town, especially those to the east and west.

"The entrances have been constructed using natural resources, with work carried out by Guyra craftsmen Paul and Ben Kirk Stonemasonary," she said.

"Over the coming weeks new solar lighting will be installed on all four signs by locals Hoffman Electrical."

"These beautiful entrances have now been brought to fruition and we look forward to more projects over the next few weeks and months."

The work, and further projects in the planning, are being funded by a \$157,765 from the NSW Governments Stronger Community Fund. With the goal of "Building a Vibrant Guyra" the grant was secured by the G&CPA with support from Ladybug Projects.

Men's Health Van returns to Guyra



The Men's Health Education Rural Van (mherv) will make a return visit to Guyra on August 8th and local men are being encouraged to call for a free health check.

'mherv' is a custom built caravan which travels the state offering free health screenings to regional and rural men, who are notorious for being completely in the dark about the state of their health.

Registered nurse Leanne Garvey is happy to take your blood pressure, cholesterol levels, and blood sugar levels; and have a general quick chat about your health.

"Don't hesitate to give 10 minutes of your busy day to get free basic health screening undertaken today," Leanne said. "It literally could save your life".

The 'mherv' project is organized by Rotary and over the past five years it is estimated that over 450 lives have been saved because of these free basic health checks.

'mherv' sees around 3,500 patients each year and it is no surprise how many males have undetected symptoms. Around 40% require following up with a GP.

Project leader Graeme Hooper said that while men are the key target, ladies are also welcome. A visit to the van is free and it will be in Guyra on Tuesday August 8th between 10am and 3.30pm. in the NAB carpark.

Rotary kindly acknowledges the support of the Royal Freemasons Benevolent Institution (RFBI) and Electrodry in making this free service possible.





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Sale O! - Bulls season arrives for local studs

Attending a local bull sale is one of the best events in the livestock calendar and buyers will have plenty of opportunities over the next few weeks to purchase some of the best as bull sale season kicks off.

Bald Blair, Eastern Plains, Bridgewater and Glenavon genetics will go under the hammer in early August with Glenmorgan and Figtree Park sales still a few weeks away.

Sam White from Bald Blair Angus said that the atmosphere of attending an on property bull sale is unique, with cars, utes and trucks parked in all directions.

"Local cattlemen and women, school and university students, bull buyers from far and wide, bankers and livestock agents all attending with their felt hats and boots, plus a beanie in the pocket and extra coats if needed," he said.

This year will be the 51st on property bull sale at Bald Blair and there will be 115 Bulls in the line-up.

"We will have on offer bulls rising 2 years of age, bulls rising 18 months of age and a great lineup of yearling bulls rising 12 months of age at sale time," Sam said.

"We will have numerous bloodlines on offer,



including some new international bloodlines."

Catering will be provided by the Bald Blair Public School P & C and Peter and Sharon Dundon from the MLA and Emily Brett from Quadrant Australia. They will be serving up steak sandwiches with meat from Bald Blair Angus steers – a real paddock to plate experience for those attending in person at the bull sale.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

July 19th – There was a total yarding 7009 with a top price of \$160 and average per head \$91.56. The numbers returned to a normal level in the knowledge that all the regular processors would be attending.

There were 5070 mostly good quality lambs and 2690 sheep drawn for. It was a very good quality penning of lambs for the most part with a good supply of heavy and extra heavy weights. Restockers were also well catered for. Restocker activity was high with some orders operating on well finished medium and heavy weights.

Following last sales low numbers and a vast improvement in quality most categories showed price improvements. The exception being the medium weight trade lambs that saw a slightly cheaper trend. Light and medium weight sheep made up the bulk of the offering with the majority being Spring shorn Merino ewes. No market comparisons with just 150 head penned at the last sale.

Processors purchased the majority outbidding the restockers on most pens. The quality and length of the Merino skins a contributing factor for those processors harvesting the wool.

Armidale Cattle Sale

July 20th - A total of 755 head yarded, averaging \$1040.18 per head and 234.7 c/kg. There was an increase in numbers with the offering consisting mainly of yearlings and cows. There were some very well finished heavy grown steers also. The quality of the penning was very mixed while condition showed great variation. The same group of buyers from the previous sale were in attendance.

Market trends varied through the young cattle with a noticeable preference from feedlotters for those carrying a bit of extra weight. A small number of vealer steers to restockers sold to a dearer trend while the heifer portion were cheaper. Light and medium weight yearling steers sold on a firm to 10c/kg cheaper trend with quality also contributing. Heavy weight feeder steers over 400kg sold to dearer trends with increases of as much as 30c/kg for breed and quality. Light weight yearling heifers sold to cheaper trends while the medium and heavy weights saw trends dearer.

The increased supply of heavy grown steers to processors sold on a firm to slightly cheaper market trend. The well finished grown heifers went the other way and sold to a much dearer trend. The cow market also sold on a firm to dearer trend with most improvement in the medium weights. The bull market was also a shade dearer.

Weekly Wool Sales

July 21st - The improved buyer sentiment over the last two sales continued this week as exporters pushed to secure quantity prior to the upcoming 3 week recess. Competition in the saleroom was widespread with all segments in the market active. Gains were seen across all micron categories on Tuesday with Merino lots carrying more beneficial test results improving by up to 50 cents clean. Lower spec lots showed gains of up to 10-20 cents. Crossbred types strengthened by 10-15 cents on more even well prepared types. A stronger A\$ on Wednesday impacted prices slightly with levels easing back, albeit not enough to lose all of their earlier gains.

As mentioned in last week's report, the number of bales offered for sale in these first two July sales has been far less than anticipated. This week's offering of 44,697 bales meant that 23% less bales have been offered in the last fortnight compared to the same two sales last season. This has definitely helped stabilize the market.

The mid-year sale recess is traditionally a time where exporters travel to see their clients around the world. We hope the more optimistic feeling in the market over the last few weeks will provide a platform for them to fill their order books. Quantities in the first few sales are expected to be large so the success of these meetings will go a long way to a positive market on its return.

Originally from Kempsey, Katie completed a Bachelor of Agriculture and Bachelor of Business with an Agribusiness major at the University of New England (UNE) before embarking on a role as an Assistant Manager on a superfine merino and agroforestry operation in the New England region.

Katie's profound enthusiasm for rural life shines through as she actively engages in various learning opportunities. These include attending and organizing working dog schools and Low-Stress Stock Handling courses, all aimed at enriching her farm and livestock management expertise and deepening her connection with the broader agriculture community.



GLENRAC Chief Executive Officer Kylie Falconer welcomed Katie's appointment as Project Officer and says her enthusiasm and willingness to get involved in her local community will be an asset to the organisation and the district.

"Katie will be working closely with landholders throughout the region and the University of New England to improve farmers' capability to manage productive pastures."

"The project focuses on supporting farmers to be better equipped for when the next dry hits".

"Katie's role is supported by funding from the Future Drought Fund, a project that involves partnerships with the University of New England and the Southern Queensland & Northern NSW Drought Resilience Adoption & Innovation Hub (SQNNSW)".

As a UNE graduate, Katie will be working with many of the same university lecturers she met as a student and will also lead GLEN-RAC's projects such as drought-resilient pasture landscapes, stock water management, and utilising drones for weed monitoring and control.

"I've previously attended GLENRAC events and heard about their good work in the region, so I'm excited to be joining the team".
