Over the past two weeks, locals may have noticed big changes to the shopfront of the butcher shop that previously traded as Vidler's Butchery. The shop has undergone a facelift and has now been rebranded as Top of the Range Meat Company. Owners of the company are locals, Jason Siddell and Laura Penrose who also own and operate Fig Tree Park Angus Stud at their Wandsworth property, 25km North West of Guyra towards Tingha.

The decision to open Top of the Range Meat Company stems from a shared passion and dream to see the end result of breeding decisions quantified in terms of yield and eating quality and provide consumers the paddock to plate experience.

Jason graduated from UNE Armidale with a Bachelor Rural Science specialising in Meat Science. He began his career in Research at the Meat Science Department, UNE within Beef and Sheep CRC projects conducted across commercial abattoirs in Old and NSW. Further roles within beef extension and

research with Northern Tablelands LLS and NSW DPI has furthered Jason's passion for the Australian beef Industry.

Laura graduated with a Bache-

The 'bikes' are back

After disappearing for a couple of months, Guyra's 'standing bikes' were returned on the weekend, after getting a makeover. Each of the bikes now have their own individual colour scheme making the streetscape just a little bit brighter.

The bikes were first installed in May 2017 as part of the town's Bike Plan and were funded as part of a larger grant received from the State Government in April of 2016 by the then Guyra Shire Council.

The design for the bike rests came after consultation between the Guyra Cycling Community Inc and Armidale Regional Council.

They were designed to give cyclists somewhere to rest the bikes, rather than laying them on the footpath or resting against buildings.

In the last three years they have grown the Fig Tree Park Angus yearling bull breeding program and have entered into the world of Wagyu, starting a small Fullblood Wagyu herd and F1 Wagyu operation using Door Key Wagyu genetics from recent Wagyu Hall of Fame Inductee, Lock Rogers over the Siddell family's commercial Angus cattle.

Top of the Range Meat Company will operate as a retail butcher with the aim of expanding to online sales and deliveries. They will specialise in locally sourced beef, lamb and pork from the New England and Northern

Tablelands Regions. Beef bred from Fig Tree Park Angus genetics will be a feature of the store, partnering with clients who have purchased Fig Tree Park genetics. The store will also stock Angus, Shorthorn and Wagyu products from recognised beef brands like JBS, Jack's Creek and Teys Australia.

The core focus of Top of the Range Meat Co is quality, consistency, and affordability, taking their customers on a true paddock to plate journey with high-quality, ethically raised meat sourced right from their doorstep.

Top of the Range Meat Co will commence trading the week of August 21st.

Glenrac's Farmer update is back

GLENRAC's hugely popular Farmer Update information evening is back for another year, with an interesting range of industry gatherings to discuss the future of carbon emissions and what net zero will mean for Australian farmers, farm safety, rural fire management and farm insurance.

Lorraine Gordon is the Director of Strategic Projects, Farming Together and the Regenerative Agriculture Alliance, at Southern Cross University. She is also an active part of a grazing and agritourism business at Ebor, Moffatt Falls. Lorraine will discuss what the term 'net zero' means for farmers and what you need to know now and for the future.

Marco Rindo from Safe Work NSW will discuss the common cause of injuries on-farm and tips for managing risk. Attendees with an ABN (any business, not just farmers) may also

be eligible for the Safe Work NSW rebates of up to \$1,000 on workplace safety items including remote work safety devices, access ramps, guard rails and sunshades.

A representative from Meat and Livestock Australia will give a red meat market update for beef and sheep and Jane Munro from NSW DPI Rural Recovery Support will cover on-farm insurance, is your insurance adequate for your future risks including natural disasters.

They will be joined by Angus MacDowall from Rural Fire Service to discuss updates on farm fire units and how local farmers can work with RFS to respond to fire emergencies in the future. He will also cover how to apply for fire permits and required notifications.

Displays will be available from 5pm from a range of service providers including the Rural Financial Counselling Services, Safe Work NSW and GLENRAC.



Call for highway rest stops in the New England

Member for New England, the Hon Barnaby Joyce MP, is calling all truck drivers that use highways in the New England to provide direct feedback to the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communications, and the Arts in regard to any section of highway requiring a new rest area or any existing rest area that needs improvements.

The Heavy Vehicle Safety and Productivity Program (HVSPP) is an ongoing Australian Government initiative, with up to \$65 million per year provided to fund infrastructure projects that improve the productivity and safety outcomes of heavy vehicle operations across Australia. Under the HVSPP, there is an

opportunity to improve Heavy Vehicle Rest Areas over the next 10 years.

"I encourage all heavy vehicle users to provide feedback through a survey to support our local Councils applications to improve our rest areas, Mr Joyce said. "I also encourage Councils across the New England to be aware of new guidelines for the HVSPP by visiting the website of the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communications, and the Arts.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

August 2nd - Total yarding 5,604 Top price \$168 Average per head \$70.17. There was a reduced penning of 3200 lambs while sheep supplies increased to 2900 head.

The quality of the lambs which were mainly crossbreeds was fair to good. All weight classes were represented with the majority in forward to well finished condition. The usual processors were in attendance and there were a couple of good restocker orders.

There were varying trends in the market with the plainer condition light weight restocker lambs selling to a cheaper trend. Well finished trade weights 18 to 22kg also sold to a cheaper trend of \$4 to \$5 per head. Heavy weight lambs to 26kg dressed experienced little change while the heavy and extra heavy weights sold to a slightly dearer trend.

There were quite a few very plain condition sheep that attracted little competition and failed to reach \$10 per head. There were also a number of well finished lines. The better quality and condition sheep saw little change in market trends.

Armidale Cattle Sale

August 3rd - There was a small reduction in numbers to 690 head. Yearlings were well supplied while there were a small number of heavy grown steers and well finished grown heifers. Cows were well supplied and there were quite a few bulls.

The quality of the offering was fair to good while condition was very mixed. The usual buyers were in attendance along with an extra cow order. With a month before Spring and numbers waning the demand for yearling steers increased.

The light and medium weights sold to dearer trends of as much as 12c/kg. The heavy and extra heavy weight feeder steers also sold to dearer trends up slightly while there was some breed and quality related price change. Steers weighing in excess of 480 kg selling from 240c to 340c/kg depending on breed and quality. Light weight yearling heifers to restock saw a firm to slightly dearer trend while medium weights to restock and feed saw trends firm to a shade cheaper.

Well finished heavy grown steers in limited numbers sold to cheaper trends to processors. A fair supply of lightly muscled grown heifers in plain condition attracted strong competition from feeders. The extra order had a positive impact on the cow market with trends generally as much as 10c/kg dearer. The heavy bull market also saw a dearer trend.


Entry is \$15 for adults, \$10 for pensioners and kids get in free. These prices are set by Group 19, not the Guyra club.
