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New Owner for Guyra Rural Services

Established 34 years ago, Guyra Rural Services has now been sold to the current manager, Campbell Wolfenden. The business will remain in its current premises at 173 Malpas Street.

Campbell has had a long agricultural association in the Guyra area from when his family moved to a grazing property at Black Mountain in 1973. This property was sold in 1979 and the family moved to a larger property in the Wandsworth area.

Campbell managed this property for a number of years until a decision was made to sell. Campbell, his wife Margaret and their three young children moved to Guyra to start a "new life after farming" which included jobs such as local newspaper editor and rural training facilitator.

In 2010 Campbell was offered and accepted the management position at Guyra Rural Services. Since then, focused training and research has been undertaken in soil chemistry, soil biology, multi species pastures, horticulture, apiculture, animal nutrition and grazing management.

Campbell sees a bright future in agriculture, especially in regeneratively managed enterprises that have a holistic approach to land management that keeps water in the landscape, improves soil health, stores carbon and increases biodiversity and natural capital.

Guyra Rural Services will continue to promote and support Regenerative Agriculture. It is not a one size fits all approach to farming or land management. It is principles and practices that enhance and restore strong, healthy ecosystems like soils and biodiverse pastures. Together, these have benefits for the farmer in terms of productivity and profitability, but also have long-term ecological benefits and support a healthy agricultural landscape.

Fascinating contrast

What a fascinating contrast there was between two articles in your August 16th, 2023 edition: "Protesters rally outside Tamworth Bush Summit" and "New England graziers preparing for the next drought".

In the first article, we saw signs saying 'No Wind No Solar, Keep Bendemeer Beautiful'. Graziers, however, are worried about ways of coping with drought. More frequent and severe droughts are accepted consequences of climate change by the vast majority of scientists with the exception mainly of those supported by the fossil fuel indus-

Some at the rally identified nuclear energy as an alternative to coal and oil, even though economists point out it is a much more expensive source of energy than renewables and requires many years to bring on line. Furthermore, I can't imagine many in Bendemeer would volunteer to have a nuclear reactor or waste dump anywhere near the town.

It is ironic that the Nationals seem so keen to hold back renewable developments. The adverse side-effects of solar and wind power are much less than for example, open cut mining.

In the Hunter Valley, we have endured decades of dust, noise and light pollution from coal mining and transport, and electricity production, vet the Nationals have shown minimal concern about this. Dust pollu-

tion, in particular, has increased childhood respiratory diseases and lung deaths in adults.

In addition, despite the myth of regeneration, aerial photos demonstrate how a vast area of the once, highly productive Hunter Valley floor is permanently ruined for any form of agriculture including grazing.

In the Liverpool Plains, the Nationals were forced to oppose mining developments because farmers, big and small, had seen the disastrous effects of open-cut mining on fertile land in the Hunter and they faced a mutiny from locals.

It is telling that the principal time the Nationals have opposed open-cut expansions in the Hunter is when proposed, new mines are anywhere near the multi-million dollar horse studs owned by the rich and famous. Horse health clearly trumps human health.

The core of the National Party has been captured by Big Business and huge, pastoral companies. Ordinary farmers and town dwellers can expect little support from the Nationals unless major companies' interests are served at the same time or they face the possibility of losing a parliamentary seat.





Rehydrating Workshop for Landowners

Landholders in the Armidale region who want to understand the water cycle and improve resilience of their rural landscape are encouraged to attend a three-day Rehydrating Your Farm Landscape bootcamp on October 17th to 19th.

Armidale Regional Council (ARC) is funding the bootcamp to assist the region to address water quality issues and retain more water in the landscape, an objective of Council's Catchment Water Quality Strategic Plan 2022-2032.

Facilitated by Southern New England Landcare and presented by the Mulloon Institute, the bootcamp will introduce landholders to a range of landscape hydration strategies through activities that blend scientific principles and practical skills.

Participants will learn the role of the water cycle and plants in the farming landscape, identify indicators of healthy and unhealthy water cycles and apply sound planning and design principles to give the landscape rehydration project the best chance of success.

Mayor Sam Coupland said water quality issues have a di-



rect impact on the Guyra and Malpas Dam catchment areas.

"The three-day bootcamp will educate landowners about ways of retaining water and re-hydrating their landscape through plantings, creating structure in the creeks and gullies to slow and spread water across the catchment and isolate stock from creeks and gullies to reduce pollutants entering our dams," said Mayor Coupland

"Council is committed to delivering water security to the Armidale region and has been working hard in partnership with the NSW Government to improve our resilience to future droughts."

ARC is in the process of purchasing Oaky River Dam and is also working through the initial design phase for the reconstruction of the dam and a pipeline from the Dam to the Armidale Water Treatment Plant.

Council is also installing Water Quality Monitors within the Armidale region catchments to get baseline data and monitor for improvements in water quality.

The three-day bootcamp is being held at Urandangie Pastoral, 238 Urandangie Road,

Guyra from Tuesday, October 17th to Thursday October 19th. Price is \$50 per person and includes catering.

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

September 8th - In what was a mixed week, the first day of sales saw the market opening on a softer tone, with the 17 to 17.5 micron indicators giving up in excess of 50 cents. Other categories were slightly softer resulting in a 16 cent loss to the Northern region indicator on Tuesday.

A different mood was apparent from the outset on Wednesday when sales resumed. Buyers jumped in and the market was higher from the opening lot. This continued as the sale progressed and the market closed 8 cents dearer for the day.

Passed in rates were lower

and competition was strong on the final day with the true result perhaps not fully reflected in the weekly market report.

This is backed up by what happened in the Fremantle market where their sales normally commence after the Eastern board has closed.

It's unusual to see all of the Western region micron indicators finish the week at a higher level than that of the Eastern seaboard. Hopefully it's a positive for next week's sales.

39,851 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 7.5%. Major buyers included PJ Morris, Tianyu and Endeavour Wool with more widespread support evident.
