
Free cuppas sparked conversations on mental health in Guyra café Juneils and Ebor's Fusspots on Thursday, September 14.

Local non-profit HealthWISE donated more than \$6500 to 29 cafes throughout the New England North West and southern Queensland to shout the morning rush for R U OK? Day.

A national initiative which reminds Australians to check in on friends and family, customers were also offered R U OK? Day resources on starting conversations about mental health.

HealthWISE also supported emergency workers with coffee vouchers and targeted mental health resources, as part of 'Are They Triple OK?. The companion campaign was developed by R U OK? in response to research by Beyond Blue which found that police and emergency service workers report suicidal thoughts more than twice as often as the general population.

HealthWISE Mental Health team leader Tanya Hague recognised that it can be daunting to ask a loved one if they're ok, especially if the answer is no. She said you don't need to be a health professional to help someone who's struggling, and it can be as simple as lending an ear.

"You can absolutely save someone's life just by listening. Just being there with them, showing them that you care, maybe offering to sit down and have a cup of tea with them," she said.

"It is really important to genuinely listen to the person and give them your full attention. Be prepared, because it may be a long conversation," she said. Tanya recommended visiting the R U OK? Day website to learn more about how to respond when someone tells you they are not ok. HealthWISE also runs free Touchpoints workshops, which educate community members on recognising and responding to people at risk of suicide.

HealthWISE is licenced to run Touchpoints workshops through Roses in the Ocean.



It only takes one spark to start a fire

Local RFS volunteers were called out to attend a grass fire at Wandsworth which burnt out 16ha on Tuesday afternoon. The fire began when sparks from fencing hot works (welding) ignited nearby grass.

The fire was quickly brought under control thanks to a great response from nearby brigades and with the help of plant supplied by neighbours.

Superintendent from the New England RFS Paul Metcalfe said that is was just one of a number of similar fires that have been reported across the New England in recent weeks. He is calling on the community to be extremely careful when operating pumps, grinders and other hot work equipment.

"Local brigades are concerned about how dry the grass is at the moment and it only needs one spark and a puff of wind for a fire to take hold," he said.

"There have been a number of similar fires recently and accidental ignitions have seen over 600 hectares burnt out in the last fortnight.

"Our dedicated volunteers are giving up their personal family time and in some case paid work time to respond to these incidents.

"It is critical during these dry conditions to take some extra precautions if you are working outdoors or using equipment that can spark. PLEASE take a look around and PLAN AHEAD for the task. PLAN-NING for fire or ignition at this early stage can go a long way to saving yourself and many others in these dry conditions. "

There are few simple steps to prepare for a task to assist in the prevention of fires:

1. Check condition of equipment to be used. Is it clean and free from debris?

2. Clear around the work area: a good rule of thumb is 3 metres of clear area.


3. What is the weather doing or going to do in the next few hours or in the days ahead?

4. Remove material that is likely to burn in the event a spark should occur.

5. Ensure you have a phone or communication system so someone can call for help as early as possible should a fire start.

6. Have readily available water on hand to commence an initial attack after calling 000 for assistance.

STATE PARLIAMENT IS BACK

It is great to be back in State Parliament for the start of a two-week sitting period, including the handing down of the new Government's first Budget on Tuesday, 19th September.

Over the coming weeks in Parliament, I will be having a series of meetings and taking up a number of issues on behalf of our community, including:

• Protecting regional NSW airline slots and access at Sydney Airport;

• Progressing my Bill to split the Hunter New England Health District and return control and decision-making to our region;

• Pressuring the Government to maintain the \$250 Regional Seniors Travel Card;

• Resolving the Rural Fire Service 'Red Fleet' issue for our local councils; and

• Meeting with various Ministers to ensure funding for local projects will be included in the Budget.

I will keep the community informed of progress on these matters as well as a raft of other issues in the coming weeks.

RFS 'RED FLEET' BILL TO EASE RATEPAYER BURDEN

The 'red fleet dispute' has been an ongoing debacle over the last 18 months between the State Government and local councils over who owns and pays for RFS assets.

This Bill remedies the situation, by making it clear that RFS assets belong to, and will be accounted for by, the State Government.

The Bill will vest all firefighting equipment, including apparatus, buildings, water storage towers and lookout towers with the State Government.

As it currently stands, local councils are legally and financially responsible for firefighting equipment even though they don't have any control over the procurement of those assets, how they are operated, stored, maintained or disposed of.

This legislative amendment will bring the treatment of all these items in line with how the vehicle and building assets of all other emergency services in NSW are accounted for and remove an enormous and ridiculous cost burden from our local councils and their ratepayers.



Communities call on all MPs to support binding plebiscites on deamalgamation

Representatives of the Demerge NSW Alliance (DNA), made up of community advocacy groups from local government areas across the state, are calling on all NSW MPs to support amendments for binding plebiscites on council deamalgamations in the Local Government Act.

DNA spokesperson Grantley Ingram, from Save Bombala Group, said DNA is suggesting amendments which have the support of cross-bench members.

The proposed changes would bind the Local Government Minister to proceed with deamalgamations in former council areas which have returned majority vote in a plebiscite. Dr Amanda Cohn, Greens spokesperson for Local Government, gave notice of the bill to amend the Local Government Act to enable communities to have their say through binding plebiscites.

"Councils provide essential local services like libraries, sports facilities, and community centres, and make decisions that shape the future of our built and natural environments. To function effectively, communities must be empowered to participate in the decisions that impact them through local democracy," Dr Cohn said.

"Communities from right across the state have made their

voices heard loud and clear that some forced council amalgamations have been a real disservice. Those communities must have their views respected by the government."

Ingram is calling on Labor to support these amendments, which are in line with its policy presented to the election in March.

"Communities in Bombala, Canterbury Bankstown, Central Coast, Guyra, Inner West, Pittwater, Hilltops and Tumbarumba are campaigning for the return of their former councils and to 'Put the Local back into Council'.

"It is urgent to start the process now, so that local government elections in September 2024 can include polls for councillors for the newly deamalgamated councils, should their communities vote for deamalgamations in plebiscites," Mr Ingram said.

Grow Save and Guyra spokesperson Rob Lenahan said that the Guyra region has made a well-informed and considered decision to pursue separation reflecting the substantial discontent and disillusionment that has arisen as a result of the current amalgamation. Having made a proposal, they are now looking to understand the response from the Minister by having a meaningful dialogue and move forward.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep & Lamb Sale

September 13th - Total Yarding: 6335 (+1950). In the face of a falling market and heading into the new lambing season numbers increased with 3845 lambs penned. The sheep also increased to 2490.

The quality of the lambs was mixed with both restockers and processors well catered for. Heavy weight lambs were well represented. The usual processors were in attendance and there was some restocker activity. Processor demand was weak with market trends cheaper throughout.

There were only a couple of pens of new season lambs penned suitable to the trade. These lambs sold comparatively well in comparison to the old lambs. The restocker competition came mainly from Southern areas with little in the way of local competition.

The cheaper trends through the well finished lines to process were considerable in places given the fortnight between sales. The majority of the sheep were shorn Merino ewes and wethers.

With the weakened processor demand continuing market trends were also significantly cheaper. The lower price levels attracted restockers with several local orders operating on large lines of wethers.

Armidale Cattle Sale

September 14th - Total Yarding: 1060 (+160)There was a small increase in supply with lightweight yearlings in large numbers. There was a fair supply of cows and bulls however not many other grown cattle.

The quality of the offering was fair to good with some large lines of lightweight yearling heifers. Apart from cows the majority of the young cattle were on the plainer end of the condition scores. There was reduced buyer attendance both restockers and processors.

Demand for young cattle was down resulting in cheaper trends throughout. Restockers were active through the lightweight young cattle attracted by the lower prices while there was not a great selection of yearlings suitable to feed.

The fortnight between sales contributed to some significant price change on a falling market. A large run of lightweight yearling heifers in store condition sold well in comparison to the heavier weights. There were insufficient heavy grown steers to quote. Well finished grown heifers to process sold to cheaper trends.

Plain condition cows were least affected in a cheaper cow market that saw the well finished cows lose all of the last sales improvement with trends cheaper by 10c/kg. Heavy bulls also sold to cheaper trends with limited processor competition.

Weekly Wool Sale

September 15th - After last week's solid market further welcome relief from a prolonged downtrend was given this week. The signals given from the Western regions strong close to last week flowed over to this week's Eastern seaboard opening.

The Northern region indicator climbed 16 cents on Tuesday's sale with the 17 micron indicator being the only reported negative. The positives continued on Wednesday to a lesser extent with a further 5 cent lift in the indicator to conclude a 21 cent rise for the week. All categories closed in positive territory even the seemingly unloved crossbred types with the 28 micron indicator posting the largest percentage increase for the week.

37,546 bales were sold nationally with a low passed in rate of just 4.5%. Major buyers included Endeavour Wool, PJ Morris & Techwool with widespread support evident. This week's 21 cent rise in the Eastern market indicator has left the market sitting at roughly its average level for the 2023/24 season to date. The market continues to trade in a very tight band but importantly this week's bounce was the second time its managed to recover from the same low point.


Guyra held strong together
