Ride for the Chopper passes through

The 2023 Ride for the Chopper has wrapped up, raising close to \$90,000 for the Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service (WRHS).

The eight day mountain bike ride started in Woolgoolga on September 15 and stopped in Guyra, Armidale and Walcha before finishing up in Tamworth on Friday, September 22.

Forty riders, their support crew and two NSW Ambulance paramedics took part in the adventure.

Among the riders were Guyra cyclists Leanne Mayled (team captain) David Mills, Michael Kirk, Stuart Hutton, John Newsome, and Wayne Jenkyn. Team member Bill Perrottet was unable to take part due to an injury which he sustained just days before the ride.

It was a fantastic effort from the Guyra riders who have so far raised \$23,000, with money still coming in.

For many of the team it was a very personal experience with family members having made use of the services provided by the WRHS in the past.

They are grateful for the support of the local community who assisted with their fundraising efforts. Major contributions came from local woolgrowers who donated fleeces for the cause, raising \$9400 and a wood raffle which raised what is believed to be a record amount of \$2300.

The team would like to thank the woolgrowers for their support of the wool drive and Elders who auctioned the wool without commission or fees and the Guyra Lions Club for the wood raffle. Also thank you to the many locals who made cash contributions and businesses that provided sponsorship and donations towards the ride.

It wasn't all hard work with themed ride days, games and activities. They made a stop at Bald Blair Public school on 'TuTu Tuesday', where they talked to the students about bike safety and accepted a donation from the school.

The riders also called in at Black Mountain Railway Station and would like to thank Dennis Wright for allowing them access to the platform. One of the highlights for the team was the dress up night, with Team Guyra getting a win for their very convincing portrayal of the Adam's family.

This year marked the 21st anniversary of the ride. Funds raise help to ensure the helicopter is available 24/7, 365 days a year for those in need and that no one has to pay for the service. The WRHS is 70% government funded, with the other 30% of funding coming from community fundraising such as the Ride for the Chopper, as well as sponsorship.

Costa group agrees to \$1.5 billion takeover

The board of the Costa group, owners of the Guyra tomato farm, has agreed to a \$1.5 billion takeover offer from a consortium headed by private equity firm Paine Schwartz Partners.

Paine, which floated Costa in 2015, acquired a 13.8 per cent stake in Costa last October at \$2.60 a share, and began discussions in April about a takeover offer in the range of \$3.20 to \$3.30 a share. It followed with a non-binding proposal at \$3.50 a share in May that valued Costa at \$1.6 billion.

The Costa board said the certainty of a cash offer in an uncertain operating environment meant the reduced offer of \$3.20 a share was the best outcome for shareholders in the absence of any higher offer.

Paine Schwartz specialises in agribusiness and food chain buy-

outs. The consortium also includes Californian berry group Driscoll's Inc and the British Columbian Investment Management Corp.

Costa chairman Neil Chatfield said on Friday that the board still believed the company had solid fundamentals, but the cash offer had outweighed those longerterm considerations.

"While the Costa board has confidence in the long-term fundamentals of the company, the scheme provides certainty for shareholders in an uncertain operating environment by delivering cash proceeds to shareholders at an attractive premium," he said.

Scot MacDonald, State Manager NSW for the Costa Group, said that they foresee no immediate changes to the Guyra operations of Costas.

"This acquisition has been

coming for some months," Mr MacDonald said.

"The Paine Schwartz team visited our glasshouses late last year and had the opportunity to see the highly productive and technologically advanced growing and packing systems.

"The new owners have been in the agricultural investment business for a long time and understand the opportunities and challenges.

"Costas in Guyra employ up to 800 staff in its peak summer period and are an important economic driver for the region.

"Our leadership team is focussed on the business continuing to be commercially successful."

What's HOT Understanding Farm Fire Units



An information evening will be held at the Ben Lomond Fire Station on October 6th to helper farmers understand the new role for Farm Fire Units alongside the NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) The RFS recognises that in many parts of the state RFS resources are supported by the use of private equipment, in-Farm Fire Units cluding (FFUs), to fight and contain fires.

The Farm Fire Unit Guidelines, officially launched at AgQuip in August 2023, are a commitment to consult; to understand what's important to farmers; and let farmers understand what the fire fighter needs

to do in the event of a fire.

A background check shows that rural and farming communities were instrumental to the foundation of the NSW Rural Fire Service. NSW RFS together with NSW Farmers intend to restore trust for a long, enduring relationship and build more relevant, meaningful relationships:- because a strength and trust are critical to ensure safer communities.

The guidelines for FFU's working on fire grounds aim to ensure all parties can communicate, work together and keep each other safe, in partnerships, to protect our diverse places.

The intent here is to raise

awareness, introduce the guidelines; clarify the way forward; establish strong lines of communication; share ideas and examples; promote understandings; collaborate; respect and recognise the important work that farmers do in the management of fire, whether they are RFS members or not.

The evening at Ben Lomond on October 6th, will secure an opportunity to familiarise ourselves with a broad brush look at the scope of applications and limitations within this new context.

Can you help rediscover the Yellow Spotted Bell Frog?

A dedicated team of frog researchers from the Australian Museum, led by Dr. Jodi Rowley, have embarked on a mission to rediscover the Yellow-Spotted Bell Frog (Litoria castanea). This unique frog is a relatively large species that can grow up to an impressive 9 cm in length. Its name is derived from the small, bright yellow patches on its groin and the back of its thighs.

Once common around Guyra, the Yellow-Spotted Bell Frog is now listed as critically endangered and has not been seen on the New England Tablelands since the 1970s. The species decline is likely a result of infection by the amphibian chytrid fungus (Batrachochytrium dendrobatidis).

Researchers aim to survey favoured habitats of these frogs, including ponds, swamps, lagoons, farm dams and the backwaters of slow flowing streams in the Guyra region.

They believe the greatest chance of rediscovery will be on private property and are asking local residents if they are interested in frog surveys on their properties.

One fascinating aspect of the Yellow-Spotted Bell Frog is its distinctive call. The males of this species produce a unique chorus of short grunts, which occasionally elongate into short growls, creating a sound akin to a revving motorbike.

To aid in the search, the frog team encourage the use of the FrogID app, a free and user-friendly tool that enables you to record frog calls on your property. Your participation in this citizen science initiative may not only contribute to the rediscovery of the Yellow-Spotted Bell Frog but also offer you the exciting opportunity to encounter this extraordinary amphibian once again!


