Petition to restore trains north of Armidale

A crowd gathered at Armidale Railway Station last week to celebrate the successful completion of a petition to the NSW legislative Assembly seeking the restoration of passenger train services from Armidale to Queensland on the Main North railway line.

Representatives of local councils and the Trains North groups in Guyra, Glen Innes and Tenterfield were present.

The petition, commenced by the group Passenger Trains North of Armidale, was subsequently taken up by Trains North and has reached a total of 10,746 signatures. In the afternoon it was delivered to Mr. Adam Marshall, MP for Northern Tablelands, to be presented in parliament, where it is expected to be debated in due course.

President of Trains North, Matthew Tierney, that he thinks this petition will prove to be a key milestone in establishing that public opinion in this region is in favour of protecting the railway line, restoring it north of Armidale, and getting the trains running through to Queensland once more."

"The social and economic future of this region depends to a large degree upon getting freight moving on the Main North Line,

but also upon the restoration of proper public transport — and that means trains," Mr Tierney said.

"By co-incidence the minister for Transport, Jo Haylen, has announced discounted fares on Fridays in the Newcastle-Sydney-Wollongong metropolitan area to encourage use of passenger trains. But the need for good public transport in the regions is important too, and it deserves greater attention. And passenger trains on existing railway lines are the backbone of good public transport."

Mr Tierney said that the Main North railway line, north of Armidale, has been neglected for over three decades by successive governments, despite the growing popularity of the restored service north of Tamworth to Armidale.

Next month will be the thirtieth

anniversary of the very welcome partial return of passenger trains to the Northern Tablelands when the Xplorer train commenced operating to Armidale on November 22nd, 1993.

"Sadly, Guyra, Glen Innes and Tenterfield did not share in that wonderful achievement. Now is the time to deal with unfinished business and work towards getting the line operating again all the way," Mr Tierney said.

Siri Gamage, vice-president of Trains North said that many residents in New England have close family or work connections with Queensland and students come from there to the schools and university at Armidale.

"Over the border, in South-East Queensland, the population is expected to grow to 4.3 million by 2030," Mr Gamage said. "

"It's time for our regions to be connected by effective public transport and to reduce carbon emissions by moving goods by rail."

Trains North Guyra vice President Rob Lenehan has encouraged all Guyra residents supporting the reinstatement of passenger train services for Guyra to contact their State MP Adam Marshall and ask that their voice be heard on the floor of parliament.

The Off-Grid Alternative to Towers and Turbines

If what comes through the letterbox at the moment is anything to go by, there seems to be growing community concern about the impacts of renewable energy developments in New England. We have the Nationals calling for a moratorium on these developments, and "lily livered dreamboats" getting the blame.

The nub of the problem is the fundamental principle of electricity distribution: the greater the mismatch between where electricity is generated and where it is consumed, the greater the need for transmission infrastructure. And the greater the mismatch, the greater the inequality in where the costs and benefits of the electricity grid fall.

For much of the 20th century, the people of the Hunter and other coalfields have borne the air pollution, respiratory deaths and coal mine fatalities associated with coal-fired electricity generation, while the rest of us enjoy the convenience of elecHave your say Emaíl: news@gala.org.au Maíl: PO Box 170 Fax: 67792069.

tricity at the flick of a switch.

Now, with renewables replacing coal, the shoe is on the other foot. Those living in the Renewable Energy Zones, like New England, will have to bear the impacts of wind and solar farms and associated transmission infrastructure, while those elsewhere enjoy the benefits of electricity supplied from afar.

If we want to reduce these inequalities, then we have to better match where electricity is generated and where it is consumed. The residential electricity sector has great potential for this. Think of an off-grid house with roof-top solar. Electricity is generated on the roof, stored in a battery in the shed, and consumed in the house a few

metres away. No substations, no transmission towers, no poles and wires, no meter box and no power bills. This is not lily livered dreamboat fantasy. I bought my first solar panels, a small wind generator and battery in 1980. For 37 of the last 43 years we have lived off-grid, easily and conveniently powering all the requirements of a modern household. It has been cheaper than the grid in the long run and, with good quality German and Australian made components, has a 100 per cent reliability that Essential Energy would die for.

The more off-grid households, the less the need for the generation and transmission infrastructure that is causing so much concern. Simple as that. And don't be fooled into thinking that grid connected roof-top solar is the solution. On the contrary, it overloads the grid in the middle of the day, creating the need for more transmission infrastructure, the cost of which is passed through to power bills.



Call for Parliamentary Inquiry to address crime in regional NSW

The Country Mayors Association (CMA) of NSW has joined forces with the Police Association of NSW (PANSW)and NSW Farmers to call for a Parliamentary Inquiry into crime, law and order in rural and regional New South Wales.

CMA Chairman, Mayor Jamie Chaffey said statistics showed residents of rural, regional and remote New South Wales were more likely to be sexually assaulted, more likely to have their cars stolen, more likely to have their homes broken into and more likely to be impacted by domestic violence. And when these crimes did occur, the police response was delayed due to the resources available.

"It is estimated one-third of New South Wales' population outside metropolitan live areas," Mayor Chaffey said. "But we are still second-class citizens when it comes to the safety of our communities.

"For the first time, our CMA annual survey has revealed that

crime, law and order is now in the top five emerging issues for New South Wales local governments

"We knew crime was increasing, but we looked to the NSW Bureau of Crime Statistics and Research (BOCSAR) data to clarify the situation. We were shocked to learn that as well as the alarming incident counts in regional New South Wales, the rate of incidents per 100,000 people was, in some cases, horrifying when compared to metropolitan figures. Up to 90% of crimes including vehicle theft, breaking and entering, sexual assault and domestic assault are happening here, in our regional communities.

"We also have significantly fewer police than our city cousins, and as a whole, New South Wales has less police per head of population than Queensland, Victoria and South Australia. Our police officers are already facing an incredible workload, with only one police officer per 467 NSW residents.

"We have not been heard by our state leaders, and our people - particularly the elderly and the vulnerable - are scared. They need to feel safe. They deserve to feel safe.

PANSW President Kevin Morton said the report showed that additional police resources were needed to manage crime rates and ensure that communities could be effectively serviced.

"Our regional police officers are expected to be the 24/7problem solvers. Police in these regional and remote locations are required to attend emergency situations that cover huge geographical areas with limited staff and resources with little to no back up. When they do call for assistance, it can be an hour away or more."

Mr. Morton said that staffing levels and resources needed to be re-evaluated to reflect contemporary requirements for policing in regional and remote areas.

NSW Farmers CEO Annabel

Johnson said while their primary concern was crimes against farming businesses, this report revealed an opportunity to do more to protect everyone in the rural landscape.

"This report is concerning and we would absolutely support a proper review of where police resources are allocated to protect every community and business regardless of where they are in the state," Ms Johnson said.

"A 2020 survey of farmers found that 81 per cent reported being a victim of farm crime theft of livestock and equipment, trespass, break and enter, and illegal hunting, and this is a significant risk to safety.

"More concerning is that 64 per cent were worried about crime in general due to repeated victimisation - and while the establishment of the Rural Crime Prevention Team by NSW Police is positive, there needs to be more resources available."

Regional seniors travel card petition tabled in State parliament

Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall has tabled a 10,000-plus signature petition in State Parliament, calling for the government reverse its recent decision and reinstate the popular \$250 NSW Regional Seniors Travel Card.

The petition will now trigger a debate on the floor of the Legislative Assembly next month when Parliament resumes.

Mr Marshall thanked the community for putting pen to paper to call on the government, which effectively axed the program in its first Budget last month, to continue the vital card.

"In last month's State Budget the government took the axe to the seniors travel card – a heartless decision which will negatively impact more than 12,000 seniors in the Northern Tablelands and more than \$1 million across country NSW," Mr Marshall said.

"We cannot afford to sit idle and allow this card to be taken so coldly off some of our community's most vulnerable people, especially in the midst of a cost-of-living crisis.

"We must take the fight up to the government and with the tabling of this petition, we'll get the chance to do this on the floor of parliament next month."

Mr Marshall said since 2020, the Regional Seniors Travel Card had helped more than one million eligible seniors living in rural and regional NSW with cost-of-living expenses by providing \$250 to spend on petrol, taxis or public transport to help get them to appointments, do the weekly grocery shop or take that special trip to visit family and friends.

"Cardholders have written to me about how the card has become an essential part of their budgets, allowing them to see grandchildren and family and paying for necessary travel to appointments when not many options for public transport are available," Mr Marshall said.

"The positive response to the petition, not just in our region but right across our state has been overwhelming.

"People of all ages have taken the time to show their support for our seniors and this program.

"This petition, backed with the signatures of more than 10,000 locals, send a powerful message to the government and I hope they listen and act next month."

Draft policy incentivises sustainable development

A policy that financially incentivises the construction of energy efficient and sustainable buildings is now on public exhibition for community review.

Armidale Regional Council in partnership with the community is committed to achieving its Zero30 carbon neutral standards and reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 2030. To do this council must develop policies that encourages and increases the uptake of sustainable development across the local government area.

The Draft Ecological Sustainable Development (ESD) Policy seeks to provide incentives to people who

build energy efficient and sustainable buildings.

Armidale mayor Sam Coupland said council was leading the way in the region for affordable green housing and at the same time contributing to reducing the cost-ofliving pressures long term.

"If we want to realise a more sustainable neighbourhood, one that makes our buildings more comfortable for our climate and reduces our carbon footprint, as a council we need to provide policies that help to achieve this," said mayor Coupland

"Sustainable building design and the long-term financial benefits of reducing household energy consumption is not a new concept, but there is a perceived or real higher cost to achieving these standards. If we can reduce some of these costs in the short term and there is an increase in sustainable design, hopefully in the long term this will normalise sustainable building."

To meet the objectives of the policy the development must clearly demonstrate that it meets a number of sustainable building practices including:

• Improvements to liveability through climate orientation and compact living

• Thoughtful site selection and avoidance of excavation and vegetation removal

• Low embodied energy building materials and small building foot-print

• Ensuring the development meets international energy efficiency and thermal comfort standards

• Water conservation through exceeding mandatory Government efficiency scheme requirements

• Careful consideration of prevailing climate considerations

• Retention of native and exotic trees, protection of ecological communities

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

October 20th - It was a better week for the wool market with prices bouncing back up off what appears to be a firm resistance level.

On multiple occasions over the past three months the market has moved higher after falling to levels near last weeks close.

A 12 cent rise in the Northern region indicator on the first day of sales was followed up by a further 8 cent increase on the final day.

The increases were confined to the Merino sector with the Crossbred and Carding sectors struggling. They prevented a higher increase being reported in the headline market indicators.

37,328 bales were sold nationally for the week with a good clearance rate resulting in just 4.7% passed in. This passed in wool was dominated by the Crossbred and Carding types.

Major buyers included Endeavour Wool, PJ Morris and Techwool. The past 9 selling weeks has produced just 20 cents difference in the Eastern market indicator between the high and low points.

Since returning from the July recess this figure is just 52 cents. It has been a period of unusually high stability for the wool market with supply and demand playing a delicate balancing act.
