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What Living in Guyra has done for us

Ronald, Keskie and Benoni are three of 120 Seasonal Workers currently living in Guyra who are employed by Jobs Australia. These boys come from Vanuatu and are here on a six-month rotation working at Costa Tomato Farm.

In recent discussions with Jobs Australia staff, the boys talked about what living in Guyra has done for them, the opportunities it has afforded them and their families back home and how truly grateful the are to be here.

It is such a small insight into the life

and background of our seasonal workers who travel here from Tonga Vanuatu and the Solomon Islands who fondly call Guyra their home. So, we wanted to share their stories with the wider community.

Ronald's story

Everyone has a story, everyone has a background, a spiritual and cultural belief says Ronald who is on his third rotation, this time in Guyra.


Previously Ronald has worked for Jobs Australia in Victoria and Queensland. He has at home a wife and two children ages 10 and 3. Although being away from his family for long periods of time is hard, being here working has allowed Ronald to buy land in one of Port Villa's biggest villages Mele Maat. He has built his house in stages from money earned each rotation.

Ronald is the team leader of his group who arrived in June 2023, and they conducted a fundraiser over the weekend. The workers in his group feel they are more fortunate financially than others, so each worker contributed part of their

weekly earnings to go to chosen charities back in Vanuatu.

Ronald and his team of workers raised over \$1400 and have chosen to help the maternity ward in Port Vila where expectant mothers are forced to wait in the street when attending appointments. Ronald and his team hope to build a shelter to allow them to sit and wait to be seen in the hospital, as well they would like to give some money to children with disabilities in the islands where medical help and supplies are scarce.

Benoni's Story

Benoni also on his third rotation and leaves at home his wife and small daughter Keryana. Like Ronald, Benoni has in stages built his home and on this rotation is able to finish it so it enables him to have a fully functional kitchen. Benoni, when in Vanuatu, also runs a side business of his own, a small Nakamal which is a kaya bar in the village of Mele.

"It has taken time, but it has been so worth it getting my home to a comfortable living standard, and somewhere to return after work in Australia. It gives me comfort to know my wife and daughter are safe there while I'm away."

"Being away from family has its challenges and when we are far from our children, we miss them terribly. We miss birthdays and milestones which we can only see in photos and by video chat.

"I made a promise to my sweet little girl when I was leaving Vanuatu,

I promised her that I would speak to her every single day. So no matter where I am or what I'm doing, Keryana calls every night so I can sing her a song so she can sleep. I cherish this but I can't wait to go home and hug her too.



Keskie's story

Keskie has a bit of a different story and is here in Australia for his first time. He has recently faced adversity where he has lost his entire home last week during cyclone Lola. Keskie comes from the island of Malekula and has been trying to join the seasonal workers program for over 8 years. With so many people wishing to travel for seasonal work it has been really hard to enter the program.

Keskie has paid for a passport every year in hope he would get a chance to travel and was fortunate to be recruited by David Daniel at Paradise Workers in 2023 who sent him to Guyra.

Keskie has a wife and two children, and being here has afforded Keskie's children a secure education. Like all our workers from the islands, coming to Australia pays for school fees, it's the only thing that allows our children a high school education, where many

kids leave school at an early stage as it is unaffordable. Some children are forced to work to earn an income for the family which means they aren't properly educated.

"Following last week's cyclone and losing my family home I will face many challenges returning home. Being here will allow me to earn money to start rebuilding but living on the Island, will have its challenges.


"Unlike Australia where materials are readily available, Port Vila is the only place where building materials can be sourced. To rebuild our home, I will need to purchase materials on the main land, have them couriered to the port, then shipped to the wharf on my island.

"I will then have to transport them to my land before being able to repair my home. Often in the islands, as building materials and equipment is so unobtainable, we often use bamboo, thatched roofing in place of modern material."

Changes to drought management plan

Armidale Regional Council (ARC) last week approved the early introduction of Level 1 water restrictions ensuring residents won't be left high and dry in the forecast long, hot summer ahead.

Councillors agreed at their general meeting on Wednesday October 25 that it would move residents to Level 1 water restrictions when total dam storage was at 90 per cent and move to Level 2 water restrictions when total dam storage was at 80 per cent. Previously Council had implemented Level 1 restrictions when dam storage was at 80 per cent.

Mayor Sam Coupland said Council's Drought Management Plan 2020 (DMP), which was adopted in February 2021, was a considerable improvement in Council's response in times of (and preceding) drought and drew heavily on its learnings from the drought in 2019.

"The DMP provides for permanent conservation measures and implements water restrictions well before water levels at our dams reduce to the point that seriously impact our ability to supply water to our community," Mayor Coupland said.

"The DMP was subject to widespread industry and community consultation and, as Mayor, I am reticent to develop 'policy on the run'. However, I have thought deeply about this matter, spoken to community members on the land and consulted with Council staff.

"The water levels at our dams remain healthy, as of Monday, September 23 total water storage is at 94.9 per cent. Nevertheless, I would rather be accused of going too early on water restrictions than too late."

Council also plans to investigate a subsidised rainwater tank program.

The Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) recently predicted warmer and drier conditions would be likely over spring and summer for parts of eastern Australia, due to an El Niño and positive Indian Ocean Dipole (IOD) that tended to draw rain away from Australia. El Niño events also increased the risk of extreme

temperature shifts, like heatwaves and hotter days.

Level 1 water restrictions involve households using no more than 180 litres per person per day and include restrictions including not watering gardens and washing cars with hoses during the heat of the day and using sprinklers for two hours only.

Avoiding an energy blunder downunder

Nuclear for Climate Australia founder Robert Parker will make his case for nuclear power and a clean energy future at the Armidale Bowling Club next week.

After a career in civil engineering, where he worked on international hydroelectricity projects, Mr Parker became interested in climate science but said he soon became disenchanted with the push for renewables.

His concern about carbon reductions led to the completion of a Masters in Nuclear Science at ANU and continued study into the nuclear fuel cycle especially for its use in Australia.

As the founder and former President of the Australian Nuclear Association (ANA) he investigated advances in nuclear fuel cycle for power generation and developed public information programs into nuclear energy, radiation and reactor safety, and uranium resource development.

Robert has attended numerous conferences and study tours of nuclear power plants, fuel and waste facilities, and reactor manufacturing plants worldwide.


In his talk Mr Parker will outline



the need for emissions reductions, why we are going through an energy transition and why he thinks nuclear is the most sustainable and environmentally beneficial energy source.

He will also cover the economics and operation of electricity energy systems based on 100% renewables, compared with ones that include nuclear energy.

Mr Parker will advocate for a concept which includes teaming up with Canada to power Australia with nuclear energy, concluding with an outline of the benefits to rural and regional Australia from a programme of nuclear energy based on both some small and some larger plants.

Remembrance Day services in Guyra

Remembrance Day is Saturday, 11th November. The Guyra RSL sub-Branch will hold a brief Remembrance Day service at the Soldiers Memorial Hall in Bradley Street, commencing at 10.45am on Saturday, November 11th.

Members of the community are invited to attend as a show of respect for all our servicemen and women who served in all conflicts. Each year on this day, Australians observe one minute's silence at 11.00am in memory of those who died or suffered in all wars and armed conflicts.

At 11.00am on 11th November 1918 the guns on the Western Front of World War I fell silent after more than four years of continuous warfare. Germany called for an armistice (suspension of fighting) in order to secure a peace settlement. They accepted the Allied terms that amounted to unconditional surrender.

The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month attained a special significance in the post-war years. The moment when hostilities ceased on the Western Front became universally associated with the remembrance of those who had died in the war.

During the period of the First World War, Australia's population was 4 million which is now the population of Sydney. More than 600,000 of our young men signed up to fight for their country and homeland in the First World War.

Following the Remembrance Day service, members of the community are invited to proceed South along Bradley Street to celebrate the completion of the Guyra Garden Club's Memorial Park project.

Memorial Park opening on Remembrance Day

On Saturday November 11th, Guyra Garden Club, community organisations and members of the public will mark the completion of the three-year Guyra Memorial Park project with a morning tea, participation in the Remembrance Day service and a Park Walk.

The Park has been enhanced by planting an Avenue of Trees, by placement of Memorial Stones identifying service people lost overseas during World Wars 1 and 2, and by a Mandala Garden with a Rotunda in its centre.

The Rotunda has been funded by Guyra Country Women's Association and a new BBQ has been constructed by the Rotary Club of Guyra and Armidale Regional Council.

'It is a fitting day to declare open, for public use, reflection and enjoyment, the Club's Memorial Park project," President Guyra Garden Club Dr Sandra Welsman said.

"All citizens of Guyra and the region are invited to join the Remembrance Service and then join us for the Park Walk from 11.30am to 1pm.

"The Park Walk will include opening of the Rotary BBQ, and a stroll through the Memorial Avenue of Trees, to the ceremonial opening of the Memorial Stones and the Mandala Garden."

Renewable energy projects must provide benefits

A Renewable Energy Community Benefit Framework – that promotes benefit sharing strategies associated with the development of renewable energy projects in the Armidale region –was adopted at last week's Ordinary Council Meeting.

"The creation of the Renewable Energy Zone (REZ), where Armidale is the epicentre, is our one-off mining boom," said Armidale Regional Council Mayor Sam Coupianu.

"As a responsible council we need to ensure that any benefits that can be derived from the creation of the REZ are not only shared throughout the community but more importantly provide an intergenerational benefit.

"As one of the host locations for the New England REZ, we want to work with renewable developers who are interested in being good corporate citizens and integrate with the community. The framework draws a clear position from Council that the minimum community benefit threshold is 1.5 percent of the capital value of the development. Projects that do not deliver community benefits above this threshold are likely to be considered not in the public interest and by extension Council could object to these developments on public interest grounds."

Council has previously agreed

general terms for planning agreements associated with Tilbuster Solar Farm in October 2021 and Oxley Solar Farm in August 2022.

With the establishment of the Renewable Energy Community Benefit Framework Council will now turn its mind to establishing a "Future Fund" that will see the proceeds of planning agreements for renewable energy projects invested for future generations.



Off-grid living a 'privilege'

There is certainty in the use of high end Australian or German manufactured technology to support independent living off the grid. It is a privilege that rests with those who have or have had technical understanding, know how, confidence, a site, the discipline and the financial resource to successfully embark in and mitigate living off grid, over past years and for those new to the experience.

There is nothing about living independent of the electricity grid that will protect a householder or property owner from the impact of a renewable energy project precinct, the associated battery storage and the transmission on their doorstep, except wisdom, consideration, community cohesion and political pressure. That wisdom may come from copious research and asking the right questions. Understanding the "lived experience" is quite helpful. With knowledge and experience we can apply pressure to the "lily livid dreamboats" to reset the vision, the practice and the political will.

Please note that the Guyra Branch of NSW Farmers offers "Fifteen First Questions Before Signing." The session applies to any Renewable Electricity Generation Works contract" at the Guyra Bowling Club on Wednesday 22nd November.

While there is a shift in pressure points regarding the definite mismatch between the siting of electricity generation capacity and point of consumption, there is nothing about living independently off the grid that limits the Australian coal mine or gas field production that supports manufacture the product components offshore to supply the necessary equipment for single site or broad scale electricity generation and transmission. Nor is there yet satisfactory 'planning for decommissioning' the redundant components, despite the fact that there is a limit to the rare earth resource, going forward.

The extra competition and improvement in quality saw dearer trends through the lamb market for the most part. There were a couple of negative price changes however this was weight and quality related.

A little restocker competition saw the light weight slightly dearer. The well finished medium and heavy trade lambs saw s slightly dearer trend with odd sales showing strong gains. This trend continued into the heavy and extra heavy export weights.

A fair to good quality penning of sheep with a number of pens lacking condition. The majority were freshly shorn merinos. Increased competition also saw market trends slightly dearer throughout.

Armidale Cattle Sale

October 26th - A total of 1,166 head yarded, averaging \$645.83 per head and 165.27 c/kg.

There was a small increase in supply as producers continue to offload in the face of poor seasonal conditions. The quality of the offering was very mixed with young cattle making up a large percentage.

The condition of the offering varied greatly with large numbers on the plainer side. Conversely there were some very well finished grown cattle. The usual processors were in attendance along with some feedlot participation. A rain forecast saw restocker activity high. The forecast increased demand for the young cattle and resulted in

dearer trends through most classes. The majority posted strong gains.

The lightly muscled yearling heifers in the light weight classes saw a breed related price change in the negative. The quality and condition of the grown steers was generally plain with several pens of plain condition full mouth manufacturing steers penned. The majority were purchased by restockers and opportunity feedlotters.

The few well finished lots purchased by processors were a little dearer as were the well finished grown heifers. Quality contributed also. There were cheaper trends for the most part through the cow market with most showing slight falls. The best of the heavy weight cows were slightly dearer with some improved quality. A larger supply of bulls sold to cheaper trends.

Weekly Wool Sales

October 27th - The market managed to hold onto last week's gains in what was a relatively stable but uneventful week.

An almost unchanged Aussie

dollar and consistent weekly national offerings around the mid to low 40,000 bale mark appears to be the key in keeping buying ticking over at current price levels. The range bound price level of the market is about to extend into its fifth month.

The 1 cent gain in the Northern region indictor was largely driven by the 17.5 micron and finer types that closed 20 cents dearer. Offsetting gains was a 20 cent decline in the 18 micron indicator. 34,324 bales were sold nationally for the week. Clearance rates remain high with just 6.1% of the offering passed in and this was predominantly Crossbreds and Oddments once again.

Major buyers included Techwool, ΡJ Morris Endeavour Wool. Next weeks expected national offering has risen to over 47,000 bales and if this quantity materialises it will be the largest weekly offering since the end of August. 22,000 additional bales have been offered for the season to date compared to last season and 40,000 additional bales have been sold.

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
