The inaugural 'Poets on the Mountain' festival held over the weekend proved to be a resounding success, reawakening the spirit of bush poetry and showcasing the talents of both established and emerging poets.

The highlight of the festival was the crowning of Paddy O'Brien as the overall winner of the NSW Bush Poetry Performance Championship, with Debby Berryman taking second place.

In the written championship, David Judge emerged victorious with his poem "The Dream Team," followed by Catherine Lee with "Convict" and Glenny Palmer with "Billy Backtin." Kevin Pye impressed in the novice section with his winning entry, "Henry's Words."

The festival also marked the debut of the Australian Bush Poetry Film Festival, an innovative addition to the Australian poetry landscape.

New yarn in stock at Our Little Gallery

The owners of Our Little Gallery Sarah Hunt and Louise Pearson are passionate about yarn and are always looking for local options. Recently they have begun sourcing a new yarn base from the Fibre Arts Shed, which is milled on the NSW central coast from local fleeces.

Fifty percent of the fibre in this new yarn is reclaimed during the milling process and added to 50% new wool. This is a great way for the mill to reduce waste and the fibre has beautiful tiny flecks of colour incorporated into its light grey natural colour. They have two of these bases, one is a 4ply English Leicester and the other is an 8ply Corriedale.

Sarah and Louise have also been busy dying some of each of the bases and so have a lovely range of colours with the depth which comes from dying on a grey base.

They have also been busy putting together new Christmas gift boxes and bags. There are fibre gift boxes which have lots of luscious fibers for spinning or felting and fiber boxes with hand dyed fibre. There are also yarn gift boxes and bags.




An array of coloourful yarns and Christmas specials are now available at Our LIttle Gallery

Festival organiser James Warren expressed his delight with the festival's outcome.


"This first 'Poets on the Mountain' festival has been a great success," James said.

Demerger hopes rest with Greens MLC

With less than a year to go before the next NSW Local Government Election, communities across the state, including Guyra, are continuing to push for a reversal of council mergers that took place in 2016.

There were high hopes with the change of State government in March, however so far it hasn't delivered any of the promised solutions.

Groups such as Save and Grow Guyra (SAGG), with support from the Demerge NSW Alliance (DNA), are now pinning their hopes on a Bill which is being introduced by Greens MLC, Dr Amanda Cohn.

The proposed Deamalgamation Plebiscites Bill would amend the NSW Local Government Act to enable residents wishing to demerge their councils to hold a plebiscite. The bill, which will be presented in parliament at the end of November, allows for communities to move forward with a de-

merger if the majority vote that "sounding

way. Dr Cohn was the keynote speaker at a state-wide Webinar

which was held last week. Her Bill is intended to hold the Minister accountable when residents support demergers.

According to Cohn, communities across NSW have been "sounding alarm bells" about the catastrophic outcomes of the 2016 mergers but to no avail.

Save and Grow Guyra (SAGG) spokesperson Rob Lenehan said the group fully supports this Bill.

"We have been in contact with Amanda Cohn during the

preparation of this Bill," Mr Lenehan said.

"SAGG is still persevering with its advocacy in convincing the State Government, via the Local Government Minister, that the majority of the Guyra communities within ARC are in favour of a demerger."





Country Women's Association backs CMA call for inquiry

The Country Mayors Association of NSW (CMA) is extremely disappointed in moves by the NSW Premier and Police Minister to rule out an inquiry into crime, law and order in regional New South Wales.

CMA Chairman, Mayor Jamie Chaffey, said the NSW Government was refusing to listen to the united front of the CMA (representing more than three million residents across the state), the Police Association of NSW (PANSW), NSW Farmers, and most recently the Country Women's Association (CWA) of NSW in their call for action.

"Statistics show that residents of rural, regional and remote New South Wales are facing higher crime rates than metropolitan residents, with fewer policing resources to deal with the problems," Mayor Chaffey said.

"The situation has escalated, and our communities are worried about their safety.

"It is insulting for our NSW leaders to try to shutdown this call that has come on behalf of millions of NSW residents for a

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

November 17th - The strong close to last week's Fremantle market flowed onto this week's opening of the Eastern seaboard. Tuesday's opening in the Northern region saw immediate upward pressure placed on prices with the indicator recording a 21 cent lift for the day.

Most of the gains were held onto during the course of Wednesday's sales with a further 2 cents added to the indicator. 5,000 fewer bales were offered for the week than what were originally rostered.

The rise also came at a time when the Aussie dollar continued to strengthen against the US. The market remains in the narrow trading channel where it has been all season however this week's rise places it closer to the top of that channel and at its highest weekly closing level since mid-August.

36,267 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 6%. Major buyers included Techwool, Meliwa and PJ Morris with the top 4 buyers dominating the Merino fleece offering. In a hopeful sign that this week's gains can be held onto the Fremantle market once again closed out the week on a relatively strong note.

The stronger market has lifted next weeks expected national offering to almost 46,000 bales. Parliamentary Inquiry into crime, law and order in regional NSW. You cannot really 'know' the depth of the issues unless you live in regional NSW.

NSW today voted unanimously to support the call for an inquiry.

Mayor Chaffey welcomed the support of the CWA NSW, the largest women's organisation in the state and the country.

"The fact that four major organisations that represent so many of our regional residents have publicly joined this call shows just how critical it is," he said. "We thank the CWA of NSW and their members for standing up for their communities in their time of need."

NSW Farmers welcomes \$250 million Drought Fund

The NSW Farmers Association has welcomed the NSW Government's new \$250 million Drought Ready and Resilient Fund, designed to assist farmers prepare and respond to drought conditions.

NSW Farmers' President, Xavier Martin, said the clarity the government has provided early in the drying cycle will help farmers with making their business decisions.

"These loans, announced before drought hits hard, help farmers to make proactive decisions.

"Farmers are always subject to climate variability, and having faced significant drought and disaster impacts in recent years, know that having a plan and some certainty as to how best to prepare for adverse conditions is critical," Mr Martin said.

The new Drought Ready and Resilient fund will provide low interest, fixed term loans of up to \$250,000 to establish critical infrastructure, while also aiding in cash flow management for critical on-farm drought management tasks, particularly for livestock producers.

"For the first time, farmers will be able to access the loans for operational activities, including purchasing fodder and stock transportation costs."

NSW Farmers is also pleased to see an invigorated focus on the Farm Innovation Fund with the \$120 million balance being reallocated as the Drought Infrastructure Fund.

"This will aid the grain sector to increase on farm storage, and also potentially support the horticulture sector to expand their critical water infrastructure and storage needs.

"NSW Farmers congratulates the Minns Government for its proactive and forward-thinking approach to drought management.

"There are communities in NSW who fortunately are not as yet drought-affected, but the DRRF is incentivising farmers in these communities to participate in planning and preparedness measures to improve response and recovery times," Mr Martin said.

However, for those that have seen drying conditions for some months and have already expended considerable funds for fodder and transport, this loan opportunity may be beyond them. We encourage the Government to recognise that drought has a slow creep and request the Minns Government to be vigilant and open to additional support if conditions deteriorate further.

"We encourage the Government to also keep a strong focus on the support and extension services provided through LLS and DPI as these are equally critical to the resilience of farmers, farming families, and their communities," Mr Martin concluded


