Who is the thief?

Vandalism and theft on our railway line has left members of the Heritage Train Group no option but to cancel operations due to safety concerns during the Lamb & Potato Festival.

This is very regrettable and the decision leaves the train drivers and members of the Guyra Heritage Train Group very sad, disappointed and, indeed, angry at the senseless nature of the vandalism to the rail infrastructure.

More than 180 dog spikes which hold the rail double shoulder sleeper plate to the sleepers have been removed and stolen. The removal of these spikes can cause the rail line to move while the train is traversing the track and this can cause a derailment.

This selfish action by thoughtless people could result in misalignment of the heritage train whilst on the track causing injury to parents, their children and rail staff.

The rectification of this damage will cost the organisation quite a lot of money and time to find replacement spikes and repair the damage.

Members of the Heritage Train Group apologise for not being able to provide the very popular train trips during this year's festival.

Come and visit the Guyra Museum

The building in which the museum is housed has a story to tell on its own. The building was the original Guyra Shire Council Chambers built in 1909 and was used until 1981.

The Guyra Historical Society opened the building as a Museum in 1988, maintaining the first room just as the Council had it set up for their meetings. Pictures line the walls of this room of the town's Founding Fathers as well as Honour Rolls of past Presidents 1907-1981.

The museum collection houses over 4,000 items, some of which are the following:

* When the Fire Brigade was formed in 1929, the appliances used were more manpower than horsepower. The old hose reel was set up on a wagon-type contraption and was pulled by men towards the source of the fire.

* A room that could be described as "Grandma's Kitchen" which is a far cry from today's modern "kitchenalla", with barely a cord in sight .

The museum also houses a number of rare items and collections some are:

* A rare barbed wire collection dating back to the 1875

* A rare collection of Shearing handpieces that includes an American Cooper dated 1900, a Wolsley No. 3 dated 1904 through to the controversial wide comb in 1983

* An early projector machine from the Arcadia Theatre and a number of glass advertising slides which are extremely rare.

* The rarest in the collection is a washing machine used in the 1880s. The only other known one is at the Sydney Powerhouse Museum.

The museum will be open this coming Friday 26th, Saturday 27th and Sunday 28th from 10am 3pm. On Friday 26th Australia Day morning tea will be served at the Museum from 9.30am.



Armidale Cattle Sale

January 18th – Yarding 1090 (-610) Following good rain over the 6 week layoff between sales the numbers were well down. The first of the weaners were penned along with a good supply of yearlings and cows. Quite a few at the heavier end of the weight classes.

The quality of the offering was generally good with the majority of the cattle presenting in good condition. There was a full field of buyers in attendance including some extra orders. Demand for young cattle was very strong through all classes and categories.

Restockers and feedlots competed strongly on the medium and heavy weight young cattle while restockers showed a confidence in the market going forward by bidding strongly on the lighter weights. All young cattle sold to dearer trends with most showings significant improvement. The yearling heifers posted some of the greater increases. Processors also competed strongly for the well finished grown cattle with both the steers and heifers showing strong improvement.

There was increased competition from feedlotters on suitable lines. It was a very good quality penning of well finished cows with the market much dearer and in line with what's been happening elsewhere. There was increased competition from processors on bulls with substantially dearer prices achieved.

Weekly Wool Market January 19th -

A large offering of close to 50,000 bales were offered this week.

The quality of the offering was again varied and whist prices retracted on all types, the greater falls were certainly on the poorer types.

With the lower Australian dollar retreating by close to two cents since last week, it could be expected that this would be a benefit to the market. Exporters and traders look as much for stability in currency markets as much as they do for a lower currency.

Sometimes as currency is falling, it can encourage them to wait until the currency stabilises at the new level before they cover their currency. This can impact their buying patterns and you may not necessarily see the benefit of a falling currency in the market straight away.

Buyers are reporting enquiry still coming in at reasonable levels and competition in the sale room remained solid throughout the week. The larger players were more active, particularly on low VM sounder types.

With close to 100,000 bales being offered since Christmas it is not unexpected to see the market under some pressure. A smaller offering next week should hopefully add some stability back into the market.

An open to letter to our community

Alex Manners, Chief Officer Assets and Services at Armidale Regional Council gives an important update about Guyra's water supply

Dear Guyra community,

I understand that you may be experiencing changed water quality and am writing to share some information and plans that I hope will provide reassurance.

As the weather warmed over summer, and with low rainfall in the catchment serving the Guyra dams, water quality in Guyra suffered. This was especially noticeable in late December.

Water treatment is guided by the Australian Drinking Water Guidelines (ADWG), and in New South Wales (NSW) it is regulated by the New South Wales Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water (DCCEEW), as well as New South Wales Public Health (NSWPH).

Council works closely with those agencies to ensure water meets standards and that risks to the public from consumption of water are within acceptable limits.

Algal blooms in dams are a common phenomenon that is experienced by water supplies across New South Wales and Australia.

As temperatures started to rise at the end of 2023, Guyra water treatment operators prepared for the water quality changes caused by algal blooms, which can affect both taste and odour. All preparations were in line with the guidelines and support from both DCCEEW and NSWPH.

One of the challenges facing local operators is the age, design and condition of the Water Treatment Plant (WTP) in Guyra which was constructed in the 1980s. The WTP requires operators to manually adjust the treatment process based on water quality being received from the Guyra dams. (There is no automated response as at updated facilities in other areas).

Unfortunately, the existing treatment process allowed for water with higher than usual taste and odour to enter the water reticulation system.

While the water quality was within NSWPU and ADWG limits and safe to drink, we understand that Guyra residents were impacted.

To address this impact, local staff worked (within the limitations of the WTP) to reduce the taste and odour of the water received from the dam. Staff also worked to remove the taste and odour from the network through an ongoing flushing program to expel any residual water with taste and odour as quickly as possible.

What next?

Armidale Regional Council has a program to design and complete Treatment Automation works which will improve the ease for treatment operators, reduce the workload and eliminate the historical manual design and components of water treatment at the Guyra plant.

While the former Guyra Shire Council did not have the opportunity or resources to update the plant, we are pleased that this work will soon be done.

The planning and preparation for these works has been an ongoing project for approximately 18 months and is expected to run for at least two years before fully complete.

Please be aware that whilst these works are being undertaken, the challenges in treating water at the Guyra WTP will remain.

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
