New laws to remove roadblock to demergers

Save & Grow Guyra have issued a friendly reminder that a public meeting is set down for February 22nd to discuss developments around council demergers.

They have welcomed news this week that the NSW government will introduce new laws to remove a major legal roadblock delaying the breakup of forcibly merged councils.

The Sydney Morning Herald (SMH) is reporting that in its first major piece of legislation for the year, the government will repeal what it says is a "legally flawed section" of the Local Government Act and replace it with a "democratic process" to allow voters to

What is the reasoning for such short sighted ideas. This is only one more reason that all residents should attend the SAGG Meeting at the Bowling Club on the 22/02 at 6pm to support the the demerger of the disastrous ARC. This is a decision that follows on from the Rural Rubbish collection levy where all Rural Ratepayers will have an annual fee in the vicinity of \$320-\$350 p.a. for NO,(repeat NO) service. Maybe this money could be used for a rubbish collection in Bradley St at a more suitable time. What will tourists think at our Local Festivals, eg. Street Christmas Party, Trout Festival, Lamb & Potato Festival and many other celebrations held in the main street. This decision, as I see it, is only a backhander for Guyra and is designed to tell us what we are thought of.

decide on the demerger of their local council.

Under Labor's changes, councils wanting to demerge must develop a robust business case which considers the financial impacts the and council's ability to fund deamalgamation, long-term strategic plans and the service delivery capacity of the new demerged councils.

Councils will also be required to undertake community consultation on the business case, and the minister for local government must then forward that business case to the NSW Local Government Boundaries Commission for an independent review.

After the review, the minister may then approve a constitutional referendum with a compulsory vote, which would require majority support from locals to proceed with a de-amalgamation.

One major sticking point for councils will be their ability to pay for the demerger.

The SMH article quotes the

Local Government Minister Ron Hoenig:

"While the NSW government strongly supports a clear process for councils and communities to exercise their democratic right to pursue deamalgamation, we also have to be realistic about challenges this brings".

The forum to discuss the latest deveolpments will be held at the Guyra Bowling Club on February 22nd commencing at 6pm.



Armidale Cattle Sale

February 1st – Total yarding 1980 (+980). There was a sharp increase in numbers as producers took advantage of the high demand for cattle of all descriptions and offloaded. This being the largest offering for several years. There was a large gallery of buyers in attendance including several not seen for some time.

The quality of the offering was generally good while condition varied to suit all buyers from restockers through to export processors. Buoyed by a good season and the current state of the market restockers were active throughout the young cattle. Weaners returning to the paddock sold to a significantly dearer trend with both the steers and the heifer portions keenly sought.

Light and medium weight yearling steers saw some of the greatest improvement with both restockers and feedlots competing fiercely. Strong gains were also experienced in the heavy weight feeders with the majority destined for Northern feedlots. Yearling heifers in all weight classes posted strong gains however the increases were not as great as those of the steers. With higher weights in demand the grown steers with 2 or more teeth were keenly sought to produce some of the larger price improvements.

Well finished heavy weight steers to the processors sold to dearer trends with strong gains in place. Grown heifers also sold to much dearer trends with some good quality lines suitable to the feedlots and some very well finished lots purchased by processors. The cow market saw some variation with a few to restockers selling to a slightly cheaper trend however quality was a factor. The well finished cows were slightly dearer while those in the 5 score category were substantially dearer. A large offering of bulls were keenly sought by processors to show a firm to dearer trend.

Weekly Wool Market

February 2nd - Once again, a relatively small national offering was unable to halt the downward drift in prices. Most of the falls were registered on the first day of sales with the Northern region indicator closing 13 cents cheaper.

The final day of sales showed signs of a recovery in some micron categories particularly the 18 micron indicator which finished the week 16 cents dearer. 29,630 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 8.7%.

Major buyers included PJ Morris, Tianyu and Endeavour Wool with the top 4 buyers dominating the Merino Fleece offering. AWTA testing data released yesterday is showing a 2.8% increase in the weight of wool tested for the season to date.

A year on year fall in the volume of wool tested nationally in December and January has narrowed the gap of the production increase for the season to date. Surprisingly AWEX data is showing a 5.8% increase in the number of bales offered through auction up until the end of January. The expected national offering is set to rise considerably next week with more than 44,000 bales rostered.
