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Small town puts on a big Show

The official opening of the 116th Guyra Show was a chance to acknowledge people in the community who have made significant contributions to the running of the Show over many years.

David Cameron, Richard Gordon and Chris Sole were presented with Life Membership badges by Member for Northern Tablelands Adam Marshall, who went on to perform the official opening.

Mr Marshall congratulated the new life members on their many combined years of service which he said was 'mindblowing'.

"Part of the real success of what

makes this show such a brilliant show is the contribution that you have made as individuals but also as part of a team," Mr Marshall said.

"You are carrying on a legacy that goes back generations and that speaks volumes as to how important this show is to the community."

Show Society President Richard Post said that it is important to officially acknowledge the contribution of the many people who make the Show happen each year.

"There are around 200 to 300 people who have volunteered their time over the last few weeks to make the show what it is," he said.

"In particular I would like to acknowledge the wool section with a record number of 365 fleeces which has taken days to process and prepare.

"The display is a real credit to that group who have many who have been contributing for several generations.

"The show also wouldn't be possible without what the team at GALA who do an enormous amount of work behind the scenes and also the sponsors who donate generously to make sure the show is a success.

"We may be a small town but we put on a really big show and it is a great reflection on our community."

The official opening was also a chance to recognise Guyra's entrant in the Royal Ag Shows Young Women competition. Alice Stanley represented Guyra in the Zone 4 finals in Tamworth, and was in attendance at Guyra Show performing her official duties. She received her sash from sponsor Sue Ross and was presented with flowers by competition organiser Rita Williams.

New Ebor Falls upper deck viewing platform now open

Four years after viewing platforms, pathways and pedestrian barriers at Ebor Falls were destroyed in devastating bushfires, the facilities which make Guy Fawkes River National Park one of the region's most popular visitor destinations have returned from the ashes.

Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall was this week joined by Armidale Regional Council Deputy Mayor Todd Redwood to inspect the completed project, which is part of the \$3 million State Government redevelopment of the area.

"Considerable planning has gone into developing an accessible tourist experience which will act as the 'eastern welcome mat' to the region," Mr Marshall said.

"Visitors are already being drawn to the first of the three new viewing platforms over the spectacular Guy Fawkes River gorge.

"These incorporate raised viewing areas with upgraded carrying capacity, giving breathtaking views of the 120-metre drop

twin waterfalls.

"A dedicated seating area has been built, which brings visitors closer to the mist of the falls and builds capacity for cultural and nature tours in future.

"All pathways have been con-

structed to inclusive access standards, enticing visitors of all age and ability to experience the area.

"This universal access approach has been extended to a dedicated water supply for fire-fighting and flushing toilets – it is

good-bye to the old long drop." Mr Marshall said one of the more exciting aspects of the proj-

ect was the renewed pedestrian connection to Ebor village. "Ebor village has been connected to the falls by a pathway running alongside Guy Fawkes

River," he said. "Pathways, partnered with expanded parking infrastructure and promotional signage will encourage a greater portion of the 140,000 visitors to the falls each year to base their day trip out of Ebor.

"This will be of huge benefit to the local hotel, café and petrol station with the potential for hundreds of thousands of dollars in additional income each year.

"These new platforms are guaranteed to cement Ebor Falls as one of the State's seven best waterfalls."

NSW National Parks and Wildlife Services has planned the official opening of the entire redeveloped Ebor Falls visitor precinct on 4 May.

Rex Airlines has extended suspension of its flights from Armidale to Sydney until October 27.

The airline announced the extension on Friday, February 2, blaming "continuing dislocated supply chains post COVID that are heavily impacting the provision of aircraft spare parts, especially aircraft engine parts".

Flights to and from Armidale Regional Airport were initially suspended in October last year.

Then, the regional carrier blamed the suspension of services on other carriers pillaging its pilots, as well as a shortage of engines, forcing the carrier to park 340 aircraft.

Rex has now said it will need to prolong the regional network reductions implemented throughout last year.

"Rex prefers to reduce services if it does not have the resources to fly them rather than continue to sell tickets for phantom flights and then cancelling them at the last minute," Rex's general manager of network strategy, Warrick Lodge, said.

"Rex is committed to the rebuilding of its regional network and intends to return to the standard flight schedules from October 27, subject to the situation improving."



Inspired to run for cancer research

Guyra mother Kate Kane is in training to run a marathon in memory of her inspirational daughter Peta, forever 11, who loved to run and who she lost to brain cancer. She has already completed a half marathon as preparation for a full marathon which will take place in Newcastle on April 21st this year.

Kate is running not only in memory of her daughter, she is also running the marathon in memory of, and to honour, two other beautiful brave children who were being treated while Peta was in hospital.

Aahliyah Cutrupi and Sam Hope (also from Guyra) passed away the year after Peta. Kate will be running the marathon in a shirt with photos of Peta, Sam and Aahliyah on it, plus the Children's Cancer Institute (CCI) logo. She has been in training since August last year and remains focussed on her goal of raising funds for research into childhood cancer.

Kate has already published a book based on Peta's writings and has also launched a range of athletics shirt inspired by her daughter (Positive Energy Through Athletics) with proceeds going to children's cancer charities.

"I will be thinking of those inspirational little people all the way," Kate said. "I always had it in my head that I would do a marathon one day in memory of Peta, so when I started to promote inspirational athletics shirts, I decided that I should 'walk the walk' as well as 'talk the talk' and that now was the time to start training!

"Peta gives me inspiration and motivation in all my running and helps me push through - I remember her running bravely around Guyra oval between her rounds of chemo to regain her strength and maintain fitness so she could get back to her running as soon as possible, and when she was paraplegic after her relapse all she wanted to do was get back to her running training and to school.

"Peta can't run any more, so I'm running for her. And when I think of all she went through and endured as an 11yr old with such bravery and determination, always with a smile on her face, it gives me strength to keep going." Kate is currently running up to 32.64km on my weekly long run, and it is not always easy. Her joints, particularly her knees leave her feeling crippled straight after the long run. She has now added strength training into her weekly routine to hopefully prevent injury.

She has chosen to run in is Newcastle Marathon in April, the city where Peta travelled to regularly for treatment at John Hunter Hospital. It will be the first time she has been back to Newcastle since losing Peta in February 2019. I

"I feel ready now to return to Newcastle and run in memory of Peta, Sam and Aahliyah," Kate said. "It will all obviously be very emotional, but I hope that with Peta, Sam and Aahliyah and their bravery in my thoughts it will be enough to keep me running for 42km!

"As part of my training I ran in the Port Stephens half marathon at the beginning of December in 2hrs 1min 47 sec (despite a few minutes lost with confusion over course route) and was 2nd female in my age group. But a marathon is a different 'beast' and much more than twice the challenge!

"Supporting the Children's Cancer Institute is so important as it is the only independent medical research institute in Australia solely dedicated to curing childhood cancer.

"On average three Australian children every week die from cancer and the incidence rate of childhood cancer in Australia between 1983 and 2015 has increased by 34%.

"No child should have to go through what Peta, Aahliyah and Sam went through. Beautiful brave souls whose lives are cut short when they have only just begun, hopes and dreams snuffed out."

Armidale Cattle Sale

February 15th - There was a lot less competition in front of a slightly reduced penning. Both young cattle and grown cattle were evenly represented with a great variation in quality and condition.

Differing from the previous sale was the lack of good quality straight lines. The regular processors were in attendance with the reduced attendance coming from the large field of feedlot and restockers present at the previous sale.

Trends were cheaper through all classes of young cattle with a fortnight of falling

markets contributing to some large price changes. There was also quality related change. Crossbred yearling steers heading to Northern paddocks and feed yards held up reasonably well.

In a falling market the secondary quality yearling heifers attracted some of the larger price corrections. Despite all being in attendance processor demand was weaker through all classes of grown cattle with the well finished heavy steers down by 16c to 20c/kg. The well finished grown heifers were less affected.

Cows and bulls felt the brunt of the cheaper market with the well finished heavy weights as much as 35c/kg cheaper while the plainer conditioned cows experienced greater falls. Heavy bulls were also significantly cheaper with falls in excess of those of the cows.

Weekly Wool Market

February 16th - The market once again opened the week softer. The largest declines were confined to the finer Merino types with the Northern region indicator falling 14 cents on the first day of sales. The second day of sales witnessed a slight change in sentiment particular around the 20 micron types that closed 20 cents dearer for the day. This resulted in a 4 cent rise in the overall indicator, its first daily increase in a month.

In a positive sign for next week the Southern region sold in isolation on Thursday with the market continuing to show signs of improving. 36,617 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 9.5%.

Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris and Endeavour Wool with the top two dominating the national Merino fleece offering. The headline market indicators both closed the week spot on their average level for the 2023/24 season to date.

Next week's national offering increases to 44,000 bales but remains well below the 50,000 bale offerings that were occurring this time last season. 30,000 additional bales have been offered so far this season compared to last season, but that gap is narrowing and will continue to narrow over the coming few weeks.
