S&GG says all may not be lost

Save and Grow Guyra (S&GG) say they that positive comments and feedback from a meeting held last week has re-invigorated the committee.

Approximately 80 people "very strongly supported the long-term and current actions of the Guyra community under the Save and Grow Guyra movement in their desire to exercise their democratic right to re-instate a Guyra based Local Government area" according to group Chairman Rob Lenehan

"It was great to see a very attentive audience listen intently to our local speakers, all long-term members of S&GG and as Chairman I thank them immensely," Mr Lenehan said.

"A significant number of relatively new residents in the town and surrounds were in attendance showing full support of either a demerger or formation of a new council area, which was hugely encouraging."

He said that the recent 'butchering' of the Local Government Act by Minister Hoenig was a deliberate attempt to shut down any actions of a de-merger of failed amalgamated councils across NSW.

"The amendments of Section 218cc of the Act has now created an ANTI-DE-MERGER Bill," Mr Lenehan said.

"All may not be lost as our sub-



mission/proposal, which is currently in the hands of Minister Hoenig, was submitted under Section 215 of the Act which means our proposal is unaffected by Labor's hatchet job on the Bill."

A support letter from Northern Tablelands MP Adam Marshall arrived just in time for presentation at the meeting and Mr Lenehan said that is also encouraging.

"Adam, who was an official apology for the meeting, has recommended that the proposal be referred to the Boundaries Commission by the Minister for Local Government - the result of which is anyone's guess," he said.

"It was disappointing to see only three of 11 councillors who were invited to the meeting were in attendance. It really defends our case to return to our own representative rural council based in Guyra.

"On behalf of the S&GG executive we extend a huge thank you to the Guyra community and the three councillors, Margaret O'Connor, Paul Packham and Susan McMichael for your attendance."

Mr Lenehan said that there were strong comments and suggestions from the crowd that S&GG formally represent the rate payers of the Guyra region. With that in mind S&GG will call for another meeting at the Guyra Bowling & Recreation Club on Wednesday March 6th to discuss the possibility of incorporating the rate payer into their association which is now incorporated

The De-Merge NSW Association (DNA) of which Guyra is a member has been very active, closely studying the recent changes to the Local Government Act by Labor and have been extremely helpful in providing information directly from parliamentary sessions.

They have organised a public rally outside Parliament House in Macquarie Street, and would welcome and appreciate any regional representation.

Tahlia has also had experience creating florals for events such as parties and weddings. She is hoping to expand her flower growing next year as she settles into the area, but is also passionate about supporting other local spray-free growers when she needs to increase her supply.

"I love to purchase flowers from other growers when I need to, instead of shipping them from further afield," Tahlia said.

"I am also looking forward to meeting more of the community in the future."





116th Guyra Show - Wood Chop

Once again we were blessed with great weather to start our day off. Our President, Richard Post, was introduced to our axemen and women, and thanked them for supporting our community.

This year our travelling axemen came from Nundle, Grafton, Herons Creek, Kempsey, Glen Innes and Armidale.

Our local contingent was made up of Michael and Ann Shipman and Luke Newberry. Issac Moore, from Nundle, was our junior axeman. Issac is 8 years old and started to woodchop when he was 5. His father, Matt, coaches him and says Issac is mad about the sport and would some day like to compete in the Stihl series.

Our veteran axeman, John Crosby from Glen Innes, is 82 years of age. Our lady competitor, Ann Shipman, started double handed sawing and is now competing in the underhand events.

Each event can be run with either a 250, 275 or 300mm diameter block. The block getters determine this when they are sourcing the logs in the bush. Each heat and final has to be made up of wood from the same tree, so that there can be no advantage/disadvantage for the axemen competing in that heat.

This means that in a heat of six competitors the tree chosen must be able to accommodate the diameter from the butt to the head of the tree in its trimmed state. The finished blocks are 300mm long by the diameter chosen. Once trimmed, each block is wrapped and marked with its heat/final

number. Wrapping the blocks stops the wood from drying out and cracking, as they are usually trimmed 2 to 4 weeks out from the event.

Rural Market Reports



Weekly Wool Market

The Northern region indicator managed to register its first weekly gain since the opening of sales in January.

The first day of sales followed the strengthening position at the close of the Southern region market last week and progressively got dearer to close up 4 cents for the day.

The second day of sales was relatively

stable with some minor movements in the finer end leading to a 2 cent decline in the indicator.

The Southern region did continue selling on Thursday, but it was all New Zealand stored wool that does not impact on the Australian stored market indicators.

It is notable however that more than a quarter of this 4,500 bale offering was passed in. The national offering fell 4,200 bales short of what was rostered resulting in just 32,595 bales sold for the week.

Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris and Endeavour Wool with the top 4 buyers continuing to dominate the Merino Fleece sector. The recent decline in the national weekly offering compared to last season is continuing. Looking at February and if next week's expected offering is correct, 45,000 fewer bales would have been offered compared to February 2023.


