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Costa product innovation centre launched

The new Costa Innovation Centre was formally launched last week at Costa's glasshouse facility in Guyra.

There are close to 30 new types and varieties of produce already being tested in the Innovation Centre to assess their potential as commercial fruit and vegetable product lines. They include popular produce, such as cucumbers, as well as innovative new varieties of fruit and vegetables.

Marc Werner, Costa CEO, and Manpreet Sidhu, Vertical Farming General Manager, cut the ribbon for the Centre, which is housed in a 4000 sq metre glasshouse.

"Costa is well known for being an industry leader in the growing and supply of premium fresh produce, including our glasshouse grown tomatoes, and we are excited to be able to diversify and extend our product offering. We look forward to sharing more with our customers

as we progress through our testing," Mr Werner said.

Since 2005, Costa has invested more than \$200 million in the establishment and ongoing expansion of 40 hectares of glasshouses, spread across two locations in Guyra – Elm Street and New England Highway.

The glasshouses enable produce to be grown in a sustainable and fully protected cropping environment which helps to mitigate the impact of extreme weather volatility, requires less land than comparable field crops, enables the supply of consistent quality produce year-round, and more efficient yield per unit of water usage versus field crops.

"This Centre will ensure we can continue to innovate and develop new, premium quality differentiated produce varieties for our customers, both in Australia and through existing and emerging export opportunities," Mr Werner said.

Demerger protest held outside State Parliament

Community representatives from across the state gathered in front of New South Wales Parliament on March 12th to demand NSW Labor not proceed with its bill which, essentially, would make it harder for forcibly merged councils to deamalgamate.

The protest was organised by Demerge NSW Alliance.

Greens MLC Dr Amanda Cohn and independent MLA Dr Joe McGirr addressed the crowd, as did Hilltops councillor Brian Ingram, former Inner West mayor Rochelle Porteous, Northern Beaches councillor Miranda Korzy and Canterbury-Bankstown councillor Barbara Coorey.

Support came in a message from Charlie Sheehan, mayor of Cootamundra-Gundagai, which has been battling for years to deamalgamate, had been given approval by the Coalition, but has still not been given the go-ahead. Residents groups in in Guyra and the Central

Coast also sent messages of support.

Protesters had expected Labor's bill to be debated that day, but it was deferred, and they are continuing to organise to protect democracy at a local level.

The protest came in the same week that the NSW government announced that it has rejected a proposal to demerge Sydney's Inner West Council despite the majority of residents voting for a split

Residents voted in 2021 in a non-binding poll, with a majority 62 per cent voting to deamalgamate the council and return to three separate councils— Ashfield, Leichhardt and Marrickville.

NSW Local Government Minister Ron Hoenig rejected the request after receiving the findings of a NSW Local Government Boundaries Commission report which found the demerger would be financially unviable.

Momentum program coming to Guyra and Tingha

The highly acclaimed Momentum Program, an initiative funded by the NSW Government, is making its way to Guyra, Tingha and Armidale.

Collaboratively developed by Real Futures, Pathfinders, and ACE Community Colleges, this ground breaking program aims to empower Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander individuals by helping them overcome common barriers to long-term employment.

The Momentum Program signup events will take place in Guyra, Tingha and Armidale during May. With a vision to make a lasting impact, Momentum offers free support to successful applicants, including assistance with obtaining birth certificates, driver's license acquisition, and finding sustainable employment opportunities.

To be eligible for the program, applicants must identify as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander, be aged between 16-55 years, not possess a Birth Certificate or Driver's License, and currently be unemployed.

During the Momentum Program, approved participants will receive guidance in applying for their birth certificate on the same day of enrol-



ment. To facilitate the process, individuals are advised to bring any available identification documents, such as Medicare Card, Health Care Card, Certificate of Aboriginality, Student ID card, Health Care Card, or Pension Card.

Momentum represents a ground breaking collaboration among three local organisations. Pathfinders plays a crucial role in assisting individuals with obtaining their birth certificates, while Ace Community Colleges provides guidance and support in obtaining driver's licenses. Real Futures specialises in employment readiness, training services, and job placements, empowering Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander individuals in their journey towards sustainable employment.



Make your voice heard: Rural & Regional crime inquiry begins

NORTHERN Tablelands MP Adam Marshall is encouraging local residents to contribute to the newly-established regional crime inquiry to ensure communities across the region have their say on law and order issues.

The inquiry, spearheaded by NSW Country Mayors Association Chairman Jamie Chaffey, is the result of months of campaigning to convince the government of the need to examine the issues behind the incidence and severity of crime in the regions.

"Make no mistake, this inquiry is all thanks to the hard work of Jamie Chaffey and the Country Mayors Association who, along with the Police Association, NSW Farmers, the CWA, and members of the opposition, called on the government to once and for all, take action on combatting regional crime," Mr Marshall said.

"I backed the need for this inquiry from day one as I too believed it was the only way that we could properly assess the situation, identify whole of government solutions, and put in place long-term measures that will address the issue, and hopefully, provide residents in rural and regional areas with some peace of mind.

"Of course I remain incredibly grateful to

Premier Chris Minns for the support and assistance shown for Moree, but this in no way negated the need for a broader and more indepth examination of these issues across all rural and regional areas."

Mr Marshall discussed the inquiry and its terms of reference with Mr Chaffey, along with other mayors from the Northern Tablelands, who had gathered at Parliament House for a meeting of CMA members today, with regional crime at the top of the agenda.

"I certainly welcome the inquiry, but the hard work has only just begun; we've lost six valuable months while the government dragged its feet on this, so it's important that we mobilise now, and create real momentum towards achieving meaningful outcomes for the regions," Mr Marshall said.

"And that's where our local communities come in; I'm encouraging anyone who would like to tell their story and contribute to this important initiative, to make your voice count by lodging a submission to the inquiry.

"I've already written to the committee chair requesting that the committee conduct one of the various regional hearings in our region, to ensure they see firsthand our issues, concerns and hear some of the solutions.

"This parliamentary inquiry is a fantastic step, alongside bail reform legislation introduced this week, and will go a long way to examine the causes of youth crime in rural and regional NSW."

Mr Marshall said the Inquiry is accepting public submissions until 31 May 2024.

Rural Market Reports

Armidale Cattle Sale

March 21st - A total of 289 head yarded, Averaging \$1055.52 per head and 237.60 c/kg. This sale was scheduled in the off week to avoid clashing with Easter. There was a greatly reduced supply with quality and condition very mixed.

All categories were represented however there were not many straight lines. There was a reduced buying presence with the lack of numbers contributing to that. There were not many positive market trends through the young cattle where quality was a factor.

A small number of weaner

steers to restockers remained firm while the heifer portion were cheaper. Yearling steers to restock and feed were considerably cheaper with quality the lack of supply and restricted competition factors.

The market trend for yearling heifers took the greatest hit with prices for all those going to restock and feed significantly cheaper. Heavy grown steers sold to cheaper trends. A small number of well finished grown heifers sold to a slightly dearer trend. There was little change in the cow market when taking quality into account.

Weekly Wool Market

March 22nd - Prices were expected to weaken when the Northern region commenced selling due to the falls registered by the Southern market late last week. By the close of trade on the first day of sales the Northern region indicator had lost 25 cents with most of the individual Merino micron price guides 30 to 40 cents cheaper.

Buyers were enticed back into the market on Wednesday with prices gradually increasing throughout the course of the day with the Northern region indicator gaining 1 cent.

The positive tone flowed onto the Western region (selling after the East coast market had closed) with price levels also increasing. Closing price levels at the end of the week had roughly realigned the Northern and Southern markets.

40,207 bales were sold nationally with a passed in rate of 8.7%. Major buyers included Techwool, Meliwa & Tianyu. Next week's sale is the last before a brief 1 week Easter Recess.

A large jump in the expected national offering is predicted with just short of 50,000 bales rostered. In the Northern region the sale will be held on site at the Sydney Royal Easter show in the sheep and wool pavilion for the first time in a number of years.


