# Posthumous award for Guyra aviator

Eighty years after his service in the skies of occupied Europe during the Second World War, a Guyra born Air Force aviator has been posthumously awarded the Commendation for Gallantry.

Pilot Officer Justin 'Joe' Mulligan flew Mosquito fighter bombers on 60 missions with 464 Squadron RAAF, sharing the plane with Warrant Officer William 'Billy' Kinloch who also received the same award.

Tragically, Joe Mulligan and Billy Kinloch would not survive the war to see their loved ones and tell their story. Early on January 13, 1945, their Mosquito crashed near the German border with Belgium. Both men were 22 years old. Three years later, their bodies were found and interred in a war cemetery at Rheinberg in Germany.

A lifetime after the war's end, relatives of Justin recently accepted a posthumous Commendation for Gallantry on his behalf at Government House in Sydney. The commendation recognised acts of gallantry in action over two tours of operational service with 464 Squadron.

Justin Newberry accepted his namesake uncle's award at a ceremony in September. He is the son of Sheila (nee Mulligan) and Jack Newberry and was born in April 1945 whilst his uncle was listed as missing presumed killed.

Mr Newberry said his uncle

worked as a woolclasser and grazier before enlisting in June 1942 and enjoyed embarkation leave and Christmas with his family in Guyra in December 1942. It was the last time they saw him.

Growing up Mr Newberry only knew of his uncle as having been killed in action, and that it caused immense sadness within the Mulligan family. On the death of his Aunt Kathleen a book came into his possession that sparked a voyage of discovery that has lasted more than 20 years.

The book was 'The Gestapo Hunters', a history of No. 464 Squadron during World War 2. It led him to research the exploits of his uncle with the help of his wife Kaye.

# Work progressing on old Scout hall

Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan has inspected progress of works on the former Guyra Scout Hall with members of the Rotary Club, who have taken over the management of the facility.

The hall is getting a new look thanks to a \$145,079 grant from the NSW Government's Crown Reserve Improvement Fund.

"It is important to improve and maintain facilities such as the old Guyra Scout Hall for clubs like the Rotary Club of Guyra and the wider community to use," Mr Moylan said.

"Communities in the region need facilities to use as hubs for community groups and projects which keep the community spirit alive.

"The current state of the hall is in no shape for these groups to use. Repairs are needed across the board, including electrical, a disability access ramp, plumbing, painting, and bathroom facilities.

"I commend the Rotary Club for their efforts into bringing the Hall back to life."

The Guyra Scout Hall is made using two 1940s buildings from the

former Everett School and Moggs Swamp Schools, which were joined in the 1970s.

The Rotary Club of Guyra's president Hans Hietbrink said once the hall is renovated, it will be fantastic for community use.

"The funding will be spent on refurbishing and renovating the hall to bring it up to a standard that is fit for purpose," Mr Hietbrink said.

"Rotary plans to use the hall for its meetings and for storing and sorting books for Book Fairs. In addition, it would be available for use by community groups or organisations for meetings.

"It is hoped the project can be

completed by June 2025, however this will be dependent on availability of relevant trades people to carry out the works."

Over time he met with surviving members of the squadron, and their families. Among the stories they shared was a daring raid undertaken on the Gestapo Headquarters in Aarhus. The mission led to the airmen being gifted gold cufflinks by the King of Denmark in gratitude. The cufflinks are now a treasured possession of Mr Newberry.

Several 464 Squadron aviators received Imperial Awards like the Distinguished Flying Cross (DFC) for their service. Mr Newberry believes the squadron's relocation to France in February 1945, followed by the war's end, led to Mulligan and Kinloch's service not being likewise awarded.

The Directorate of Honours and Awards researched the pair's service, and recommended the Commendation for Gallantry be awarded.

"Justin went from putting around the farm on a tractor to flying dangerous missions at low level in one of the fastest planes in the world,"

Mr Newberry said. "Not bad for a bloke from Guyra."

"I started to ask questions in 2017 of the Honours and Awards about the possibility of having Justin Mulligan and Bill Kinloch awarded the DFC, which their families were told they had earned," Mr Newberry said. "I was elated that after all those years, they were to be recog-

nised.

"I know that Justin Mulligan would have appreciated being recognised, I am proud to have achieved this outcome for him."

# Glen Innes takes step forward on Rail Trail

Glen Innes Severn Council (GISC) last week announced a significant step forward in delivering the New England Rail Trail by executing a licence agreement with the Transport Holding Entity of NSW through its contractor UGL to facilitate access to the rail corridor.

After almost 12 months of negotiations with UGL, the agreement authorises GISC to enter the corridor to undertake the survey and investigation works necessary to complete the onsite investigation works required under the NSW Rail Trails Framework, including environmental assessment.

GISC is still awaiting a response to its request in April to amend the project scope, to end the initial stage in Glencoe instead of Ben Lomond. In considering this request, the Department

of Primary Industries and Development has advised it is undertaking a project viability review as it is with a number of other projects funded under the same program.

GISC Mayor Cr Margot Davis said that council has worked hard to meet all the requirements necessary to progress the project.

"In addition to the economic impact of the construction phase on the community, the initial studies for the project outlined the long-term benefits of the project to the community which will be felt for decades to come," Cr Davis said.

"In fact, the viability of the project has only improved significantly since the original economic analysis was undertaken given the significant growth in rail trail users across Australia and the increasing role rail trails are playing in driving overnight visitors

"This project is vital to diversifying our economy and building visitation to the region, Council is ensuring it does everything possible on behalf to the community to keep it on track," Cr Davis concluded.

This \$8.7M project will be the largest economic/community project undertaken by GISC.

Recent activities have included,

- Receiving a letter of support from the local state member
- Allocating Council funds in order to progress initial works.
- Undertaking a further community survey earlier this year as requested.
- Noting the formation of a local support group for the Rail Trail.
- Liaising with Local Land Services and adequately addressing any biosecurity concerns.


"Perfect examples of these heritage protected sites include



# Rural Market Reports

# **Weekly Wool Sales**

**November 8th** - Wool sales were conducted over three days this week due to the public holiday in Melbourne on Tuesday.

A 3 cent rise in the Northern region indicator on Tuesday was followed by a further 4 cent increase on Wednesday. Melbourne was the only centre selling on Thursday and in a positive sign for next week the market continued to make small gains.

Results were not uniform across the individual micron categories with 17.5 micron and finer types going slightly backwards and 18.5 micron and broader types gaining ground.

33,695 bales were sold nationally for the week with the improved market lowering the passed in rate to just 4.8%.

Major buyers included PJ Morris, Techwool and Endeavour Wool who between them purchased almost 50% of the national Merino fleece offering. AWTA test data for the first 4 months of the season is showing an 8.1% reduction in the volume of bales tested nationally.

AWEX auction data differs quite largely with a 19.3% reduction in the number of bales offered for sale. Weekly auction offerings are remaining around the mid 30,000 bale figure well below the corresponding period last season

# **Armidale Cattle Sale**

November 11th – A total of 920 head yarded, Averaging \$1171.39 per head and 281.68 c/kg. There was an increase in numbers in what was a very mixed quality penning.

Light weight young cattle well supplied with limited supplies of medium and heavy weights. There were quite a few older cattle penned, mostly heifers while there was a very mixed quality penning of cows.

The usual processors were in attendance well supported by local restockers. Comparing to the sale of a fortnight ago the lightest of the yearling steers to restock sold on a firm to slightly cheaper trend. The heavier weight classes however sold to

dearer trends. Restocker demand saw all classes of yearling heifers sell to dearer trends.

Strong competition from processors through the grown cattle with well finished heavy grown steers selling to dearer trend while the well finished heifers followed similar trends. There were quite a few secondary quality heifers penned that also sold to dearer trends to both feedlot orders and processors.

The very mixed quality penning of cows attracted strong processor competition with all classes selling to dearer trends. The well finished heavy weights improved by as much as 10c/kg. Well finished heavy bulls sold to a slightly dearer trend.

# Shooting and showjumping success

On November 8th, Guyra Central School student Charlie Ward participated in the Northern NSW Schools DTL shoot held in Tamworth. These events provide an opportunity for students to engage in a day of DTL clay target shooting, alongside peers from various schools.

Charlie had an exceptional day, achieving 2nd place in the AA double barrel championship, 1st place in the AA single barrel championship, and being the overall winner in both the point score and double rise championships.

Additionally, Charlie excelled in the team events, where three participants from the same school or those who are the only representatives from their school can join forces for an overall point score. She also secured the titles of Overall High Gun at the Northern NSW School Carnival and the Cherie Hunter Memorial Ladies High Gun.

"It was a great honour to win these awards, and I am very thankful to receive the Memorial Ladies High Gun as it holds significant meaning for the Tamworth Gun Club," Charlie said.


Charlie also recently represented Australia in Show Jumping and Dressage during a competition in China. She was one of four athletes selected for the Australian Team, competing against teams from Ireland, South Africa, New Zealand, and China.

Over her 19-day stay in China.

Charlie rode numerous horses, including one that competed in the World Cup in Europe, jumping heights of 1.60 meters. She returned home with immense pride, having won a gold medal as an individual competitor.

Her individual results also included a bronze medal, along with placements of 7th and 11th. As part of the team, her contributions resulted in 2 bronze medals, 3 silver medals, and placements of 4th and 5th.

"It was the most amazing time, and a great opportunity for a rider who is passionate about this sport," Charlie said.


