First-of-its-kind rescue event held in Guyra

Over the weekend, VRA Rescue NSW Guyra hosted the region's first multiagency Road Crash Rescue and Electric Vehicle (EV) Symposium, bringing together skilled personnel from NSW SES, NSW RFS, Fire + Rescue NSW, and NSW Ambulance.

The event aimed to enhance interagency collaboration and hone rescue techniques in a safe training environment that encouraged learning through realistic challenges and "safe failure."

By simulating real-world conditions, the symposium helped responders strengthen critical skills and build confidence for high-pressure incidents.

Months of planning resulted in a highly immersive training arena. Thirteen vehicles were positioned in scenarios—overturned, crash trapped in rubble, or pinned against trees-each with trauma mannequins placed inside. A large excavator was used to simulate authentic crash damage, while fuel hazards, smoke, rubble piles, and blocked access points added complexity.

A major focus was on modern extrication techniques using advanced hydraulic and battery-powered tools. Participants trained with Holmatro's Pentheon series, batterypowered Lukas and Weber Rescue

tools, and other equipment used across NSW. A key takeaway was the use of cross-ramming techniques to safely create space for patient removal.

The EV component of the symposium was led by subject matter experts who shared evidence-based strategies for handling electric vehicle incidents. Attendees learned how to approach EV crashes safely and were reassured about the structural safety of modern EVs-dispelling common myths and misinformation.

The symposium was so successful that plans are underway to make it an annual event. Organisers thanked the many individuals and businesses who supported the initiative, including Trent Mendes (Excavator), Trevor Tarrant and Phil Saunders (Semi & Float), Jackson Family in Hardinge St., Armidale Automotive Group (EV), Dr. Jey, NSW Ambulance, and NSW RFS.

A special congratulations goes to five VRA Rescue NSW volunteers who achieved their Road Crash Rescue operator qualification, marking a significant milestone in their training toward General Land Rescue status.

Seven candidates standing in New England

Incumbent New England MP Barnaby Joyce has secured the coveted top spot on the ballot paper for the upcoming federal election, following a double-blind draw conducted by the Australian Electoral Commission (AEC) at its Armidale office on Friday, April 11th.

Mr Joyce was drawn first from a field of seven candidates contesting the seat of New England in the May 3rd federal election.

Following Joyce on the ballot is Greens candidate Wendy Wales in the second position, and independent Natasha Ledger in third.

The remaining candidates, in order, are Laura Hughes – Australian Labor Party, Holly Masters – Family First, Todd Juchau – Trumpet of Patriots and Brent Larkham – Pauline Hanson's One Nation.

The 2025 election comes amid significant electoral boundary changes across New South Wales, with the state's representation in the House of Representatives reduced from 47 to 46 seats. This adjustment led to changes to several electorates, including New England.

To maintain compliance with voter enrolment quotas — now set at 121,011 electors per division — New England has expanded its boundaries. The seat has absorbed

new areas from neighbouring electorates of Parkes and Hunter and now includes the remainder of Gwydir Shire and the entire Muswellbrook Shire Council area.

These additions increase the geographic size of New England to approximately 75,237 square kilometres, stretching roughly 600 kilometres from end to end, making it one of the largest regional electorates in the state.

Recognising Guyra in Parliament

During the March sittings of Parliament, it was great to be able to recognise people and groups from Guyra through Community Recognition Statements.

I brought up the work of the Guyra United Hospital Auxiliary, Guyra's Got Talent, Guyra Fleece and Fibre Frolic and Costa's grants program.

Anzac Day in Guyra

I will be in Guyra for the service on 25 April.

Anzac Day is a very important date on our calendar. It is a day where the community gathers to show their respect and pay tribute to our servicemen and women who made huge sacrifices for our country.

I look forward to joining the Guyra community this Anzac Day and being part of the service.

Community Forum

I attended a community forum at the beginning of April which was hosted by the Save and Grow Guyra Ratepayers Group.

It was great to catch-up with the Guyra community.

Maternity Services

I put forward a Notice of Motion in NSW Parliament in March requesting that the NSW Government consider bundled funding for maternity care, implement an advisory group on rural health and commission a parliamentary inquiry into maternity services in regional NSW.

Since the 1990s, more than 50 per cent of maternity and children's health services have closed across rural and regional NSW and only about 15 per cent of obstetricians nationwide are based in rural and remote areas.

There's also a huge shortage of midwives with some regions reporting deficits as high as 58 per cent.

This has led to rise in born before arrival (BBA) births where women give birth on the way to healthcare facilities, often without trained staff or necessary medical equipment.

It also forces women to relocate to urban centres for childbirth. This isn't good enough as it causes significant financial and emotional stress.

Urgent intervention is needed, including



to attend the Anzac Day Service

restoring maternity services, expanding midwifery care, and providing support for rural families.

Rural maternal health advocate Ien Laurie has started a Parliamentary ePetition to address the decline in maternity services in rural and regional NSW.

The ePetition needs 20,000 signatures to be debated in Parliament.

As Jesus hung on the cross, he didn't lash out. He asked a friend to take care of his mother, he comforted the man being crucified alongside him, and he prayed to God to forgive the people who put him on the cross. Often, the week of Easter flies by without many of us giving it much thought. That is, apart from perhaps happily enjoying all the chocolate that seems to magically appear! But do you know what Easter is actually about? Don't let this year slip you by without understanding!

In the Bible, we learn that Jesus, the Son of God, entered the world. He preached a message of salvation, for which He was arrested and ultimately killed. Archeologists have found a graffiti, a drawing scratched on the wall of the Domus Gelotiana, a building in Rome.

Unmistakably it's someone being crucified; but the person has an ass' head. The drawing is a bit child-like, but you can easily pick out the donkey's head.

Mocking Jesus? Oh yes. And an early Christian. For, there's also a rough drawing of a man, arms raised. And an inscription "Alexemenos worships God."

So archaeologists guess that the person with arms raised to the crucified ass is named Alexemenos, an unknown Christian of 1800 years ago.

From the very beginning, Christians believed the extraordinary truth that not only had God become a human being, but that God was humiliatingly crucified; but that even in that horrible death, He came alive and is worthy of worship as God.

That's the central message of Easter. Yes, foolish to many. But for followers of Jesus, everything. Jesus the God-man dying in our place, for us, so that we can be right with God, and His friends. And Jesus who came alive, Jesus who is alive, having defeated death for us so we are ready for heaven.

Sure, a message that has always seemed foolish, as ridiculous as worshipping a dead donkey. But a message of forgiveness, grace, and hope.

May you have a blessed Easter in the year of our Lord, A.D. 2025; and join with us in this truth that, okay, seems foolish, but is the most wonderful reality of history.

Mutton topped at \$230, Medium weight crossbreds made anywhere from \$120 to \$140. Merino sheep with not much skin made anywhere from \$90 to \$140. Lighter weight merinos making anywhere from \$70 to \$80

Armidale Cattle Sale

April 10th - Armidale penned 278 head less to offer 1462 mostly good

quality cattle with mixed pens of plainer quality through the offering.

Not all buyers attended with a marked absence of two major exporters that having a negative result on the cow market.

Better bred pens of yearlings were subject to strong feeder interest on medium and heavy feeders of both genders. That said trends varied firm to cheaper from last sale.

Backgrounders were strong with competition from local purchasers again with subdued trends.

Light yearling steers to background considerably cheaper 334c to 338c/kg. Medium feeders firm 318c to 414c/kg. Similar weight backgrounders cheaper 360c to 404c/kg. Steers to feed up over 400kgs to 348c/kg.

Light background heifers significantly cheaper 300c to 322c/kg. Medium feeders 305c to 359c/kg backgrounders to 349c/kg. Heavy feeders to 348c/kg.

Heavy grown steers to process 320c to 330c/kg similar heifers 320c to 346c/kg. Cows sold to cheaper trends throughout medium weights 242c to 295c/kg the heavy weights 270c to 316c/kg. Heavy bulls sold to a firm result 270c to 312c/kg.

Weekly Wool Market

April 11th - Tuesday's wool market opened under a cloud of global trade and tariff uncertainty. It was dearer from the outset being cushioned from an Aussie dollar trading sharply lower against the US.

The Northern region indicator gained 12 cents for the day with some solid increases in the mid micron Merino types. These gains were held onto throughout the final day of selling with the market quoted as unchanged.

However, the 13 cent gain in the broad based Eastern market indicator for the week masks a different story when viewing the market in US dollars.

The EMI in US dollars fell 34 cents for the week and is now down 5.4% from its high point of the season only four weeks ago. The EMI at 1262 in local currency has closed the week at its highest point in 23 months. This is due to the cushioning effect of the lower Aussie dollar.

Uncertainty will prevail whilst the US flip flops on policy and targeted countries retaliate. China's exports to the US remain in the firing line whilst somewhat of a reprieve has been given to the rest of the world. 34,168 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 5%. Next week's sale will be held at The Royale Easter Show in Sydney. The following week is scheduled for a recess.
