## Strong support for ANZAC tradition

Anzac Day commemorations in Guyra attracted large crowds as residents and veterans joined together in remembrance of generations who served their country.

Support was strong for the dawn service and the strong support continued during the main march and ceremony which saw a capacity crowd line Bradley Street.

A large contingent of service men and women, family members of those who served and school students all marched to honour the Anzac tradition.

Councillor Eli Imad, representing Armidale Regional Council, welcomed those who gathered for the service.

"It was wonderful to see such a large crowd gathered in Guyra to mark this year's Anzac Day service. Particularly heartening was the strong presence of younger generations, who will be the ones to carry forward the legacy of the ANZACs.

"Anzac Day is a powerful reminder of what unites us as Australians, transcending political and religious differences. It is a day to honour our veterans, to thank those who have served and continue to serve, and to remember with deep respect those who made the ultimate sacrifice for our country."

The commemorative address was delivered by Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan. He shared the story of the Cameron boys



from Wandsworth and their mother Rachel. John, Harold and Hugh Cameron were among the first to enlist, all paying the ultimate sacrifice.

John and Harold served at Gallipoli, John's body was never found and is still somewhere in the hills of the Gallipoli Peninsula. Harold and Hugh were among the first Australian casualties on the Western Front and they both to this day lie in graves in France among the thousands of other young Australian soldiers who made the ultimate sacrifice. Rachel Cameron died eight years later in Glen Innes, having never got over the loss of her three boys.

"Today we remember the Cameron boys of Wandsworth and we remember their mother, Rachel," Mr Moylan said. "We remember all Australian men and women who have made the ultimate sacrifice, and we remember all of those who have served and their families."

"We honour the values of the original young Anzacs – loyalty, selflessness, courage, and mateship – and the ways in which later generations have measured their own achievements against those of the soldiers who fought on Gallipoli."

Local schoolchildren were active participants in the ceremony. Tallara Patterson and Una Ale from Black Mountain Primary School read the Prayer of Remembrance, Hugo Sisson from St Mary of the Angels read the Prayer of Freedom, Guyra Central School Captains Annabelle Colllins and Treigh Bonser-Karhu read the Prayer for the Australian Defence force and Sydnee Everett from Bald Blair Primary School read the Prayer of Peace.



## Guyra team smashes Tour de Rocks 2025

The annual Tour de Rocks fundraising bike ride took place over the weekend with close to 500 cyclists and support crew making their way to the coast, all for a good cause.

The ride aims to inspire communities to help find a cure for cancer, while raising much needed funds along the way.

Over the three days of riding they covered 265kms, climbed 4700km in altitude and spent a total of 15 hours on the bike seat.

Guyra cyclists have been among those who have shown support for the event over many years, and in 2025 14 riders once again took part.

Now in its 11th year the event raises funds for cancer research. Last year's event raised \$372,050 and more than \$2.6million dollars raised for cancer research since it began.

## **Coalition promises CCTV for Guyra CBD if elected**

An elected Coalition Government will provide \$435,000 from a revitalised Safer Communities Fund (SCF) to help ensure people in the Uralla, Inverell, Guyra and Armidale communities feel safe as they go about their daily lives.

Member for New England Barnaby Joyce said the funding would deliver an upgraded and expanded CCTV network across the crime-hit CBDs of Uralla, Armidale, Guyra and Inverell, helping businesses and families feel safe again.

"Crime is continually brought up

with me, from stolen vehicles to break-ins and smashed shopfronts. This \$435,000 will get Uralla, Armidale, Guyra and Inverell back on track by giving police the tools to catch crooks and let local businesses breathe easier," Mr Joyce said.

Mr Joyce announced the investment to help tackle soaring breakand-enter rates, including:

• Uralla Shire Council \$155,000: An upgraded CCTV network for the main street, parks, and council depots, responding to a spate of vehicle thefts and commercial break-ins. • Inverell Shire Council \$180,000: Mobile CCTV camera trailers to target crime hotspots and the CBD, one of NSW's worst for break-and-enters.

• Armidale Regional Council \$100,000: CCTV in Bradley Street, Guyra and the investigation of CCTV along the Armidale cycleway linking the CBD and the University of New England.

Mr Joyce said the funding will support councils' calls for modern surveillance to deter antisocial behaviour and assist police in holding offenders accountable.

The revitalised SCF will build on the programme established by the previous Coalition Government, delivering grant funding to councils, schools, and local organisations to reduce crime and anti-social behaviour, enhance security around community spaces, and promote social cohesion.

This commitment is part of the Coalition's plan to strengthen our local communities and get our country Back on Track.

## ANZAC Day 2025

I write this wearing two hats, one as a granddaughter and the other as an educator.

The Guyra 2025 ANZAC Day Ceremony was the first year I marched in honour of my grandfather. I was honoured to wear his medals and march with fellow community members who honoured their loved ones. For me it was an emotional experience, but I understand an extremely important one to help teach future generations what has been sacrificed in the past, for our lives and country today.

The scheduled elements of the program were wonderful, and testament to the RSL ensuring a meaningful service. Having our local state government member attend, and share the heartbreaking story of Rachel Cameron and her three-sons highlighted the impact of war. The representatives from Amberley's Air Force Squadron, demonstrates the Australian Defence Force's commitment to see a significant and meaningful ceremony in our beautiful little town. The number of local schools and their students & staff in attendance, demonstrated a commitment to respecting our ANZACs. It was a great effort made by many which I am grateful to have experienced.

As an educator and advocate of young people, I was appalled at the negative sentiments expressed by the Master of Ceremonies (MC) towards our youth and a perception of their lack of understanding surrounding the importance of ANZAC day. It is insulting to the exceptional local educators who make every effort to keep the ANZAC spirit alive by teaching our youth why we are to be eternally grateful for those who fought to defend the Australian way of life.

The figures used by the MC to support his criticism were from a Daily Telegraph article which reported the lack of interest in young people possibly volunteering to serve, in the event of an Australian fought civil or international conflict. The figure quoted - an uptake of 1 in 6 willing to volunteer, I believe demonstrates the complexity of war and how our young people understand the gravity of war. This figure most significantly indicates the thoughts of Metropolitan youth, not Guyra and not the Northern Tablelands. The Daily Telegraph does not seek out the opinions of regional and rural people. Our little town showed our support ANZAC by having a massive number in attendance remembering our current, returned and fallen service people. The comments made by the MC were not relevant to our town, and as a result tone deaf. ANZAC day is about commemorating, mateship and a focus on how our efforts today can determine what the future will bring. It is not about war.

If the MC is so concerned about the youth being interested in the defence of our nation, and their understanding ANZAC day I challenge the MC to consider handing over the role of Master of Ceremonies to our students. Our Northern Tablelands schools run ANZAC day assemblies at schools and do an absolutely wonderful job. I understand the time constraints of my fellow educators and do not wish to increase their already massive workloads. I therefore gladly and willing volunteer to assist the RSL to help facilitate and act as a conduit between schools to enable such opportunity for our youth.

I am certain if our ANZAC day service was voiced by our future the spirit of the day would be preserved, instead of being lost by the tone deaf commentary of one. *Gemma Mulligan*



## ARC calls for funding to support NEREZ growth

Armidale Regional Council (ARC) is calling for election funding commitments from candidates in the upcoming Federal Election to help fund critical projects like water security, airport upgrades, housing, workforce training and education.

Further investment in the Armidale Region is needed to address the impacts of the NSW Government's New England Renewable Energy Zone (NEREZ), according to ARC Mayor Sam Coupland.

The NEREZ - which is proposed to generate 8 gigawatts of renewable energy (the largest planned REZ in NSW by capacity) - is poised to transform Armidale Region into a 'boomtown' by driving rapid economic growth, increased population, and heightened demand for local services and infrastructure.

"While this may sound enticing, the perils of boomtown dynamics have long been recognised and challenges boomtowns frequently encounter include degraded quality of life and social disruption arising when demand for services exceeds supply, followed by inadequate investment and shortfalls in the necessary workforce to service new community and business needs," said Mayor Coupland.

"We are not asking for handouts - we are asking for smart, strategic investment that will support the economic engine of the New England region.

"We need to build resilience and capacity across the whole New England area. Strategic investment now will pay dividends for decades to come."

Key areas requiring funding include:

• Remediation works to the Oaky River Dam wall to make it operational. This is required to support the NEREZ construction and shore up future water security for the region.

• Upgrade of the Armidale Region Airport runway needed to service the additional FIFO flights and emergency response aircraft required to protect the nationally significant energy generation, storage, and transmission infrastructure throughout the NEREZ from bush-fire.

• Fast-tracked housing development, including the 130-lot Duval-Grandview site for mixed-tenure, mixed-density housing, including social and affordable dwellings, to ease affordability pressures.

• Construction of a new, larger, purpose-built childcare facility to service the Guyra community and surrounding region.

"The renewable energy transition is coming fast and we're ready to rise to the occasion," said Mayor Coupland.

"But without targeted investment in our infrastructure, training, and housing, we risk being left behind.

"We have done the groundwork. We have the vision.

"What we need now is for election candidates to match our ambition with funding commitments that support sustainable, long-term growth for our region."

## Costa supports local schools to access kitchen garden program

Guyra Central School is one of ten regional schools in communities across Australia will be joining the Stephanie Alexander Kitchen

Garden Program in 2025 for the first time, as a result of Costa's new partnership with the Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Foundation.

These schools are amongst the first to receive support through our three-year partnership, which will see a total of 30 schools or early childhood services welcomed into the kitchen garden community across Australia.

Costa Group CEO Marc Werner said one of the most important things Costa can do is contribute to improved health and wellbeing which reduces the incidence of chronic disease and morbidity.

"We know that an effective way to do this is through educating children about the benefits of eating a balanced and nutritional diet, which includes regular serves of fresh fruit and vegetables, and we are delighted to be teaming up with the Foundation to support schools in our local communities," he said.

Each of the schools and services will be based in a community where Costa have farms to foster connections between education, agriculture, our workforce and the community.

The first schools to receive support are:Atherton State Primary School and Mareeba State School, QLD, East Devonport Primary

School and Our Lady of Lourdes, TAS, Guyra Central School, and Kelly's Plains Public School, NSW, Nairne Primary School, Nangiloc Colignan and District Primary School, Unity College, and Loxton District Childcare Centre, SA

"Providing hands on gardening and cooking experiences will not only help develop an understanding of plants and nutrition but also provide a safe calming space to nurture student wellbeing." Guyra Central School, NSW.

Each sponsored site will receive a two-year membership to the Kitchen Garden Program, providing the knowledge, support and inspiration to these educators so they can empower children and young people to develop lifelong skills in growing, harvesting, preparing and sharing fresh, seasonal food.

An infrastructure grant has also been provided to support their kitchen garden activities. This budget might go towards repairing or building garden beds, purchasing new cooking equipment or adding a compost system or irrigation.

The Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Foundation and Costa Group have partnered in a values aligned multi-year agreement that ensures more children and young people from around Australia experience practical, hands on, pleasurable food education.

## Labor candidate supports farm safety and health initiatives

In a bid to enhance safety and healthcare in rural regions, Labor's candidate for New England, Laura Hughes, has thrown her support behind two major policy announcements from the Albanese Government aimed at addressing critical challenges in farming and health services across the electorate.

The first initiative is a \$2.5 million commitment over three years to Farmsafe Australia, reinforcing the National Farm Safety Education Fund. This program seeks to reduce rising fatality and injury rates in agriculture, a sector where one in five workplace deaths in NSW occur. In 2024 alone, 72 lives were lost and 133 serious in-

juries recorded on farms, with risks like quad bike accidents, animal handling, and electrical work being top hazards.

Hughes stressed the significance of safeguarding New England's farmers and mining workers, calling them "the lifeblood" of the region. The additional funding builds on an existing \$125,000 annual contribution toward Farmsafe's educational campaigns, extending their reach to even remote farming communities.

In a separate policy push, Labor announced the creation of 1800MEDICARE, a \$204.5 million national telehealth and urgent care advice line, ensuring 24/7 access to free medical support, in-

cluding GP telehealth consultations

Set to launch on 1 January 2026 if Labor is re-elected, the service will provide every resident in New England with access to health care at any hour, reducing pressure on emergency departments and improving health equity in rural communities. This new service will complement Labor's existing plan to roll out 50 additional Medicare Urgent Care Clinics, placing most Australians within a 20-minute drive of urgent medical help.

Laura Hughes highlighted the local importance of both initiatives, stating that only a Labor Government would strengthen

Medicare and ensure consistent healthcare access in rural areas like New England. By targeting workplace safety on farms and improving healthcare delivery outside the traditional 9-to-5 model, these policies are designed to directly support regional communities that have often been underserved.

Together, these announcements underscore Labor's commitment to supporting the health and wellbeing of workers and families across New England, addressing both acute safety risks in agriculture and long-standing healthcare access issues in remote and rural communities.

Kim at Kimmy's Kitchen is still in the lead on 80 points, having a reasonably lead over Robert who is in 2nd place on 74 points.


Next in 3rd spot on 72 points are Sue and our lovely lads at Four Ways.
