Global Delegates visit Bald Blair Angus

The eyes of the international beef industry turned to Guyra on Monday, May 5th, when Bald Blair Angus welcomed over 250 delegates from around the world as part of the 2025 World Angus Forum.

The World Angus Forum is a global event that brings together Angus cattle breeders, enthusiasts, and industry professionals from around the world.

World Angus Forum travellers visited the White family's Bald Blair Angus stud on their way from Tamworth to Brisbane. Bald Blair has been in the White family for 127 years and has been breeding registered Angus Cattle since 1908. The herd currently stands at 800 Breeding Cows, a 50/50 split between Seedstock and Commercial production.

The visit shone a light on the importance of agriculture to the local economy, with international guests gaining first-hand insight into how Guyra leads in sustainable and innovative cattle breeding

Bald Blair principal Sam White, with his wife Kirsty and children Abbott and Arthur, welcomed the visitors, and related to them the successful succession planning that the family has managed to achieve - both in terms of their nuclear family and of the progressive Angus herd.

The extended White family have been living and working in the Guyra district for seven generations, with Sam's cousins Frank, Andrew and their families also still actively involved in Angus production.

Involvement in the Angus Society has long been a family affair, with great uncle JC White its first president, followed by grandfather HF White while Sam's father Richard, as president, came up with the brilliant idea of hosting a first-ever world forum. Sam took

his turn at the role, three years ago.

The visit was not just a showcase of quality Angus genetics – it was also a celebration of Guyra's rich agricultural heritage, community spirit, and local talent.

Strong connections with the local community were evident, with volunteers providing morning tea, highlighting the role of local schools in regional events.

"We are proud to be part of our local district, with strong ties with the Bald Blair School and the

wider community," Sam said.

"Thank you to the P & C and their team of volunteers for their efforts."

"Thank you also to the Bald Blair team and to my wife Kirsty for all you encouragement and support in preparing for this day.

"Many connections are made in this business, many connections and life time friendships are formed at these World Forums we remain forever grateful for these breed of cattle."

Guyra woolgrowers successful at Sydney

For the second consecutive year, Moray Pastoral Company of Guyra has claimed top honours as the Most Successful Merino Exhibitor at the 2025 Sydney Royal Easter Show Fleece Competition.

Moray Merinos, owned and operated by James Stewart, earned victories and placings across multiple classes, taking home three major awards.

There were 203 fleeces entered in this year's competition and judge Mark Beazley (Riverina Wools) said there was a range in quality.

Celebrating Mothers at Bald Blair









Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lambs

May 6th - A smaller yarding was penned for this week's Guyra sheep and lambs sale.

Lambs

- Top price reached: \$270
- Heavy domestic lambs: Sold from \$248 to \$270
- Trade lambs: Made between \$160 and \$180
- Restocker lambs:sold from \$70 to \$120

Mutton

- The market trended softer than last week.
- Best mutton lines: Achieved between \$148 and \$170
- Medium crossbred ewes: Sold from \$110 to \$140
- Merino ewes (notable for skin presence): Realised \$70 to \$110, varying with weight & freshness
- Merino rams: Topped the category at \$60

Armidale Cattle Sale

May 8th - Armidale penned 1152 mixed quality cattle 223 less from last sale. The regular buyers attended to a market influenced by quality operating to subdued trends.

Weaner steers were in a limited capacity and sold to restockers 450c to 462c/kg on a dearer trend.

Steers under 280kgs to background slipped 26c/kg 354c to 454c/kg with similar feeders gaining 16c/kg reaching 378c/kg.

Medium feeders lost 21c/kg 269c to 426c/kg corresponding backgrounders slipping 4c/kg selling 266c to 432c/kg.

Feeders over 480kgs declined 18c/kg and sold to 396c/kg.

Light background heifers back 35c/kg 268c to 328c/kg.

Medium feeders lost 13c/kg 274c to 376c/kg similar backgrounders considerably cheaper 244c to 280c/kg a lapse in quality coming into play. Heavy feeders back 14c/kg.

Grown steers to process gained 5c/kg 318c to 342c/kg. Similar heifers down 32c/kg selling 271c to 290c/kg.

Four score cows to 4c/kg better 260c to 286c/kg. The balance of the heavy cows 7c/kg in the negative 245c to 279c/kg.

The bulk of the heavy bulls cheaper 255c to 290c/kg.

Weekly Wool report

May 9th - The small national offering was not enough to break the current cycle of the market largely being dictated to by exchange rates.

Tuesday's market resulted in a four cent decline of the Northern region indicator with a further eleven cent fall recorded on Wednesday. This equated to just a two cent fall in the indicator when looked at in US dollars.

An abundance of less stylish wool on offer nationally, particularly in the Southern and Western regions, is not helping the cause along with the continued uncertainty around trade tariffs and lack lustre consumer discretionary spending.

24,467 bales were sold nationally for the week with a passed in rate of 14.2%. The top four buyers purchased more than 50% of the Merino fleece offering, sharing this almost identically between them.

Up-coming national offerings for the next three weeks are struggling to reach 30,000 bales. This period does historically represent the low point in seasonal offerings.

Total bales offered for the season to date are now 217,000 or 13.8% behind the previous season.
