Leadership transition underway at GALA

Change is underway at the Guyra Adult Learning Association (GALA). Long standing Executive Officer Dorothy Lockyer is preparing to step back and Kelso Looker has joined the team. He will transition into the role over the coming months.

Dorothy has been the Executive Officer at GALA for 'Quite a number of years'. During that time the organisation has grown from conducting sewing lessons in people's homes and providing basic computer classes (with a \$2000 grant), to employing multiple trainers and office staff who conduct training courses across the New England.

As Executive officer Dorothy currently oversees the running of the Guyra office as well as offices in Armidale and Glen Innes. After many years at the helm she has now decided to step back and has welcomed Kelso Looker to the team. Plans are that by the end of July he will take on many of the Executive Officer duties.

Kelso is no stranger to the area and has a lot of family connections to the Guyra district. His Grandparents still live around

Ben Lomond where his father grew up and Kelso has lived between Glen Innes, Ben Lomond, Llangothlin and Armidale since he left school.

He is already familiar with the business through involvement with the management committee and has worked with the team in a voluntary capacity with the Armidale and Guyra Show Societies.

"So far it has been a really easy transition because I'm already familiar with the people and the programs," Kelso said.

"I've been very busy familiarising myself with the programs already in place and I've learnt a lot of stuff very quickly.

"From answering the phone to dealing with the customers I've been busy getting to know how everything works.

"I think GALA is a vital part of the community and helps to keep the town thriving.

"It is a quiet gem - not many know exactly what we do but if we didn't do it everyone would notice."

"I'm looking forward to working with the team and building on the great work that Dot has done during her time here."

End of Financial Year Reflections and Local Updates

As we approach the end of the financial year, I've taken the opportunity to reflect on what has been an incredibly valuable period of learning and contribution.

Over the past several months, I've gained a deeper understanding of the inner workings of Council—from the complexities of budgeting and the coordination of various funding streams, to the volume and diversity of community needs and project proposals. It has been both eye-opening and motivating.

I'm honoured to serve on a number of working groups focused on planning, infrastructure, and community development. These collaborations are already laying the foundations for tangible outcomes, and I'm optimistic about what lies ahead for Guyra and the surrounding villages.

I would also like to acknowledge the generous support of my fellow Councillors, as well as Council's executive team and staff. Their guidance and cooperation have been invaluable as I work to plan and deliver positive outcomes for our region.

In this edition of Councillor's Corner, I'm pleased to share several important updates that reflect our shared priorities and the progress being made:

Local Area Community Grants

As part of Armidale Regional Council's 2025–26 budget, dedicated grant funding will be allocated directly to small towns and villages, to be distributed via their local community organisations. These grants empower communities to deliver projects that matter at a grassroots level.

Guyra, the second major township in the region, will benefit from a minimum allocation of \$70,000 for local projects. A further \$40,000 will be shared across surrounding villages—including, but not limited to, Ben Lomond, Wollomombi, and Ebor.

Mother of Ducks Lagoon

I've continued to actively follow up with relevant authorities regarding the restoration of the Mother of Ducks Lagoon. I've recently received confirmation that funding is expected to be allocated in the upcoming financial year for the essential preliminary works, including a full hydrology report and survey. These foundational steps will inform future restoration and enhancement efforts.

Bradley Street and Town Centre Improvements

Bradley Street—Guyra's central thoroughfare—has long presented a series of planning and infrastructure challenges. I've been working behind the scenes to progress a comprehensive masterplan that addresses safety, accessibility, and streetscape improvements, with a view to revitalising the town centre in line with community expectations.

In recent months, I've held a number of discussions with Council executives to share my vision and advocate for a coordinated approach. I'm hopeful that, in the coming financial year, we will be in a position to present a draft plan to the community for feedback.

Abbey Green Church, Tubbumurra

I recently met with the gracious owners of the historic Abbey Green Church to explore the possibility of restoring this important local landmark. The meeting was productive, and we agreed to engage a heritage specialist to undertake a site inspection and condition report.

That assessment has now taken place, and I'm pleased to share that the report confirms the church is structurally sound and suitable for restoration. I look forward to working with all stakeholders to explore funding options and next steps for preserving this piece of our regional history.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve. I'm proud to be your representative on Council and remain committed to advocating for the needs, aspirations, and future of our vibrant and resilient community.

State Champions at Shakespeare Carnival

Three local students have performed well as part of PLC Armidale's entrants in the 2025 Shakespeare Carnival State Finals.

Guyra's Olive McFarlane, and Lucy Ward along with Molly Chard from Ben Lomond, were part of the teams who were crowned state champions over the weekend at Sydney's Seymour Centre.

The all-girls' college Dance and Physical Theatre teams dazzled judges with their powerful, creative interpretations of Shakespearean themes, securing the top titles in their categories at the prestigious state-wide event, presented by Sport For Jove.

The Dance duo, Molly Chard and Lucy Ward, captivated audiences with their hypnotic performance inspired by The Taming of the Shrew, while the Physical Theatre pairing Poppy-Grace Newton and Olive McFarlane, delivered a dynamic and emotionally resonant piece based on Hamlet.

It was the second time that Olive has been in the winners list. Last year she teamed up with Poppy Grace for the first time, becoming dance champions - they were the youngest ever to go to State level in 2024.

The Shakespeare Carnival, run by the Sport For Jove Theatre Company, is a state-wide initiative en-

Road crews on the way

Repairs to the New England Highway should be underway this week, after record-breaking coastal floods saw traffic rediverted to the New England Highway. The increased traffic saw the road deteriorate into a pothole-ridden danger zone for motorists.

Last week Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan met with Minister for Roads Jenny Aitchison in Parliament, to push for urgent assistance and much-needed repairs to the highway.

As a result of their meeting, road crews from the Pacific Highway were expected to be shifted to the New England HIghway this week.

"The Northern Tablelands electorate office has been inun-

dated with calls and emails from concerned drivers reporting near-misses, blown tyres, and vehicle damage," Mr Moylan said.

"I travelled to Glen Innes from Armidale last week and experienced first-hand how bad the road conditions are.

"I met Minister for Roads Jenny Aitchison and her team while in Parliament in Sydney this week to push for urgent repairs and I am pleased to say she has agreed for road crews to be relocated to the New England Highway.

"Until the road crews can repair the worst of the damage, I urge motorists to be careful while travelling.

"While the road is being worked on there will be delays. I ask motorists to be patient so the road crews can restore the highway."

Destination Management Plan

Armidale Regional Council is developing a Destination Management Plan (DMP) for the Armidale Region, including towns, villages and natural areas across the area. This plan will guide the future growth of the visitor economy, support targeted investment, and help identify opportunities that build on our strengths while addressing challenges to sustainable tourism development.

tourism industry, and stakeholders.

They are collecting insights, data, stories and experiences from locals, business owners, community groups, tourism operators and visitors to inform the DMP. These inputs will guide future decision-making, project development and how our region is positioned as a destination.

Joyce formally declared winner

The Australian Electoral Commission (AEC) has officially declared the Honourable Barnaby Joyce as the duly elected member to serve in the House of Representatives for the Division of New England once again.

In what was a resounding result in the seat of New England, Mr Joyce secured 52.22% of the vote, which was more than double the next nearest candidate, Laura Hughes with just 20.32%. The final two-party preferred vote tally was Joyce 65.21%, Hughes 32.94% a swing of 1.85% to Mr Joyce.

Mrs Rita Merienne, Returning Officer for the Division of New England, declared the poll results at the Armidale office of the AEC on Wednesday May 28th.

Calls Grow for Urgent Action on Feral Pig Crisis

The escalating crisis of feral pig populations across regional New South Wales has sparked renewed calls for urgent and coordinated government action, with Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan and NSW Farmers both pressing for increased funding and targeted control measures.

Speaking in Parliament last week, Mr Moylan delivered a Private Members' Statement highlighting the growing threat feral pigs pose to farmers, livestock, crops, and infrastructure throughout his electorate.

"Current estimates indicate there could be 100 million feral pigs in Australia," Mr Moylan said. "In my electorate, the population has exploded following a run of good seasons."

Describing the situation as "absolute carnage," Mr Moylan detailed the extensive damage caused by feral pigs, including attacks on lambs and calves, destruction of crops, and the

wrecking of rural roads. He warned that current control measures are falling short, and stressed that up to 80 per cent of the population must be culled annually to contain the crisis.

He called for a shift away from blanket policies and urged the NSW Government to support more localised, targeted pest control campaigns. "There is no point in NSW looking at a total approach across the board," he said. "We need targeted local campaigns... The pig populations breed back up faster than any of us can handle."

NSW Farmers President Xavier Martin echoed these concerns, welcoming recent comments from NSW Premier Chris Minns, who signalled openness to new measures, including bounties, to control feral animals.

"Feral pigs cause millions in damage each year. They attack people and animals, tear up paddocks, and destroy fences," Mr Martin said. "We welcome a shared responsibility, including additional funding, to control these nasty pests."

Martin emphasized that the problem extends beyond pigs, citing wild dogs, cats, and increasingly feral deer as persistent threats. He warned that damage from animal pests in NSW could exceed \$489 million annually by 2026 and advocated for a full suite of control strategies including aerial culling, trapping, baiting, and bounties.

"NSW has the highest number of feral mammal species in the nation," Martin said. "We need long-term, cross-tenure pest control programs and strong coordination between government and communities."

Record late first frost?

If you thought the frosts were late coming this year, you'd be right. If we take an overnight minimum temperature of 2.5degC or less as indicative of a frost, then the BoM records for the Guyra Hospital weather station suggest that the first frost this year was on 28th May.

The figure shows the date of the first frost for the years since 1981. There have only been four years in which the first frost came later than 15th May: 1989 (22nd May), 2002 (18th May), 2024 (20th May) and this year on the 28th May.

So this year the date of the first frost was the latest on record. Perhaps we will soon need to change the rule of thumb "first frost by Anzac Day" to "first frost by June long weekend".



Weekly Wool Market

May 30th - Just over 26,000 bales were offered nationally this week and with a stable

exchange rate the headline market indicators managed to gain ground for the second week in succession.

Individual micron indicator quotes varied from minus 23 cents for 17 micron to plus 19 cents for 18 micron. There was a notable improvement in the quality of this week's offering compared to last week.

23,824 bales were sold nationally with a passed in rate of 9.3%. Major buyers included Techwool, Tianyu and Endeavour Wool. AWEX offering data at minus 14% and

AWTA testing data at minus 12% has aligned with just four sales left for the season. This is also in line with the 11.8% reduction that was predicted by the Wool Production Forecasting Committee.

With only the Eastern seaboard selling next week the national offering shrinks even further to approximately 23,500 bales. So far this season the Eastern market indicators average weekly closing price has been 4.5% higher than the 23/24 season.


