Neighbourhood Centre introduces 'Breakfast Bar'

Have you ever run out of time or supplies for breakfast? Well a new service is hoping to fill the gap as well as fill the stomachs of those who sometimes go without.

The Guyra Neighbourhood Centre (GNC) has opened a 'breakfast bar' which will be available for the public to help themselves at any time during their opening hours.

The centre is now opening its door for breakfast from Monday to Thursday starting anytime from 8am. This service is for anyone who has missed breakfast or is in need of an early morning (or anytime) pick me up.

Basic breakfast foods will be on offer such as toast, weetbix and porridge. It is a self-serve arrangement and includes tea and coffee making facilities. An assortment of condiments, including homemade jams made by the Neighbourhood Centre tops off the selection.

Centre Manager, Sarah Hunt

said that they had identified a need for those who did not have stable living arrangements or those living 'rough'.

"Our staff saw that as the winter set in, there were some members of our community needing that little extra assistance," Sarah said "They also recognised that our current opening time of 9am is too late to wait for some sustenance if you are cold and hungry, so we are trialling opening at 8am for at least the winter months.

"We have set up our 'breakfast bar' so that those wanting to use it can make their own meals and help themselves to whatever they want. They can also sit in the warmth to enjoy their meal."

The Neighbourhood Centre will still be providing lunch on Tuesdays, so those coming in early for breakfast are able to stay for lunch also. This service has proved popular and is well supported by the community.

"Our Tuesday lunch is always a hot meal followed by sweets, made by our volunteers and staff," Sarah said.

"Any leftover food is packaged, labelled and dated and frozen so that we can distribute to community members needing a meal or meals to get them through those rough periods."

The 'breakfast bar' is available for anyone in the community - you can simply come in and help yourself at no cost. It's being funded thanks to generous donations, however a gold coin donation is optional and will help to support the work done by the Guyra Neighbourhood Centre.





New service station proposed for Llangothlin



A development application has been lodged for a new service station (incorporating the Post Oflice and general store) at Llangothlin

A development application has been lodged for a new stateof-the-art service station at Llangothlin.

The proposal, submitted to Armidale Regional Council, is being led by local developer and Councillor Eli Imad, who purchased the existing Llangothlin Fuel Stop and Post Office over two years ago.

Mr Imad said the location — the only fuel stop on the New England Highway between Guyra and Glen Innes — offers untapped potential to draw in passing traffic.

The development will include EV super chargers which he believes are lacking as part of current infrastructure.

Progress on the project had

initially been delayed due to concerns about highway access, with early assessments suggesting that extensive slip lanes would be required in both directions.

However, updated traffic engineering analysis found that based on current traffic movement the slip lanes are not required to the original extent.

The first stage of the project includes the demolition of the current facility and the construction of a modern petrol station, general store and Post Office.

Mr Imad hopes that demolition could begin by late 2025, with full construction underway in early 2026.

"I'll be prioritising local trades and businesses during construction. If they've got the time, the job will be theirs," he said.

"We're expecting to create four to six full-time jobs once the site is operational, and we're in talks with potential tenants which could lead to even more employment."

The development also includes a large commercial space that could be divided into multiple tenancies, with a car park planned for stage two.

A future stage could include a small motel, further enhancing services for highway travellers. Discussions are ongoing with retail and service chains interested in establishing a presence at the site.

Mr Imad said the local com-

munity is supportive of the proposal, with some already expressing interest in employment opportunities.

"I've developed large commercial warehouses in Sydney, but this project is personal. It's about improving services, supporting local jobs, and investing in this community" he said.

The development application has been lodged with Armidale Regional Council, however final approval will be outsourced to a third party due to the fact that Mr Imad is a sitting councillor.

If approved, the development is expected to transform the Llangothlin stop into a service hub for both locals and travellers alike.

Weeds management has new home after dissolution

Biosecurity and weeds management for the Armidale Regional Local Government area now has a new home after the official proclamation to dissolve the New England County Council known as the New England Weeds Authority (NEWA), occurred on the 4 June 2025.

Local Government Minister Ron Hoenig suspended the authority's board and appointed an administrator in May last year.

Mr Hoenig said he acted after being "alarmed by reports about the financial mismanagement and governance issues" of the authority. Interim administrator John Rayner, has spent the past 12 months managing the transfer of jobs, assets and services to the authority's four member councils in the lead-up to its dissolution.

The dissolution marks a significant restructuring of biosecurity and weeds management across the New England as individual councils take that responsibility on.

A division of NEWA's assets is underway amongst the former member councils (Armidale Regional, Walcha Shire, Uralla and Glen Innes Severn Shire councils) as is the transition of records and IT integration with council's processes.

Armidale mayor Sam Coupland said landowners won't see much change from the regular services they already know and use, that the former NEWA provided.

"Five of the existing staff have moved across to Team ARC and I have full confidence that the transition won't impact the quality of services we provide in managing weeds within our LGA," said mayor Coupland.

"In-fact - I am sure that the dissolution of NEWA will provide better value for money for council and a higher degree of governance and financial accountability."

From Monday 16 June contact for services will be through Armidale Regional Council's call centre on 1300 136 833 or you can call one of our biosecurity or weeds officers directly.

The Armidale team will still be located within the existing NEWA office in Rusden Street, Armidale and the old NEWA phone number and email contact points will still be active with prompts to your local council service.

Heating fail at Kolora

On Tuesday 10 June 2025, we were advised by local resident John Simpson—whose mother resides at Kolora Residential Care Home—that the facility's hydronic water system had failed, leaving residents without adequate heating during some of the coldest days of the year. Ten days on, there is still no resolution.

Upon receiving this advice, Phil Henry and I attended the site to witness firsthand the conditions our elderly residents were facing. I returned on 11 June 2025 with Councillor Eli Imad, who immediately engaged with Armidale Regional Council administration to ascertain who was accountable for resolving this critical issue.

Despite a direct commitment from Kolora's Acting Director of Residential Services on Friday 12 June that the problem would be fixed by Sunday 15 June, we are now past close of business on Monday 16 June 2025 —and the system remains non-operational.

We have since been advised that the boilers, which underpin the hydronic heating system, have not been serviced since their installation in 2017. This is not merely an oversight—it is a prolonged failure of duty of care.

Guyra's overnight temperatures routinely dip below zero. Our elderly residents deserve better than excuses and inaction. They deserve warmth, dignity, and protection.

I call on McLean Care or Armidale Regional Council irrespective of whichever organisation holds responsibility—to take swift and decisive action. Our most vulnerable should not be left to suffer due to bureaucratic inertia or blurred lines of accountability.

Enough is enough.

New England Highway repairs

I have been continually advocating for the Minns Labor Government to deliver more resources and funding to repair the New England Highway, which has become a pothole-ridden danger zone for motorists.

After record-breaking floods hit the coast of NSW in May, traffic was diverted to the New England Highway which resulted in serious damage to the road.

I met with Minister for Roads Jenny Aitchison in Parliament two weeks ago to push for urgent assistance to repair the highway.

She agreed to road crews being relocated to the New England Highway but it has been limited and there's still more work to be done.

I will continue to push for more repairs and upgrades to ensure motorists travelling through Northern Tablelands can do so safely.

More action needed on feral species

Feral pigs are a huge problem across Australia and have a huge impact on farmers, particularly in the Northern Tablelands after a run of good seasons in recent years.

Although that is great for our farming communities, it has meant the population of feral pigs has exploded.

Large numbers of feral pigs have been destroying farming land, harming livestock, and wreaking havoc on the region's roads. They are causing absolute carnage and destruction.

They are causing widespread devastation with attacks on livestock, such as lambs and calves. They also get into crops and cause huge amounts of damage.

Current control measures are failing to keep up with the growing number of

We are losing the battle. Unless we cull around 80 per cent of the population per year, we will not get on top of the problem.



I have urged the NSW Government to increase funding for control programs and adopt more localised and targeted approaches to combat the rise in feral pig numbers, because once the shooters come through and the baiting and trapping are done, the pig populations breed back up faster than any of us can handle.



Ben Lomond RFS welcomes new Fire Truck

A new era of firefighting capability has arrived in Ben Lomond, with the delivery of a new fire truck to the local Rural Fire Service (RFS) brigade.

The official handover of the new vehicle took place on May 24th at a ceremony held at the New England Fire Control Centre in Armidale. NSW Rural Fire Service Commissioner Rob Rogers formally presented the truck to Ben Lomond Fire Captain Andrew Willis.

On Sunday, June 15th, members of the Ben Lomond Rural Fire Service gathered at the local fire station for a detailed induction and familiarisation session. The new truck's advanced safety features were demonstrated, including sprayover and underspray protection systems, heat curtains, and enhanced hose recoil mechanisms. Improvements in pump switching and clearly visible tank level indicators were also highlighted.

The truck's design not only improves efficiency but also boosts comfort for firefighters. It is built for both performance and practicality—even featuring a small fridge.

The vehicle's increased capacity will significantly enhance the

brigade's operational capabilities, providing the Ben Lomond community with stronger frontline fire protection.

Calls for return of Discovery Train Pass

The Hon. Aileen MacDonald MLC, has renewed calls for the NSW Labor Government to immediately reinstate the 3 and 6 month NSW TrainLink Discovery Passes, describing the removal as a "quiet cut" that disproportionately hurts regional communities.

Speaking in the Legislative Council last week, Ms MacDonald moved a motion highlighting the significant impact of the change on regional students, seniors, and families, and condemned the lack of public consultation or explanation.

"These passes weren't a luxury," Ms MacDonald said "They were essential, used by students to get home from university, by older residents staying socially connected, and by working people accessing health care and services in regional hubs.

To remove them without warning and call it a 'pause' is a costof-living hike by stealth."

The six-month Discovery Pass, previously available for \$420, offered unlimited travel across NSW TrainLink's regional train and coach network. It has now been scrapped, leaving only more expensive 14-day and 30-day options, effectively doubling the monthly cost for many users.

While the Government claims the change only affects tourist users, Ms MacDonald challenged that characterisation.

"You can call it a tourist product, but real people, regional people used this pass to live their lives affordably and now they're left without answers.

Meanwhile, metro passengers can tap on and off with regular options, while regional travellers are told to 'just buy six 30-day passes in a row'. Regional people shouldn't have to beg for services that are taken for granted in the city."

In debate, Government members confirmed that no consultation or impact modelling was undertaken before removing the passes. Ms MacDonald called for transparency and fairness in future decisions.

"If the Government is serious about regional equity, it will reinstate the Discovery Pass, fix the broken booking system, and guarantee no further cuts to services."
