Guyra was transported back in time over the weekend as the Lotus Club Queensland (LCQ) Grand Tour rolled into town on Saturday, July 5th.

NEREZ and the Armidale Region: Opportunity meets urgency

The New England Renewable Energy Zone (NEREZ) is set to transform the Armidale Region into a renewable energy powerhouse, with 8 gigawatts of generation capacity and \$24 billion in private investment. But while the economic opportunity is immense, the most urgent challenge is clear: water. Armidale is expected to become a central hub within NEREZ, supporting

over 1,100 new jobs and welcoming around 2,300 new residents.1 This growth will place unprecedented pressure on local infrastructure — and water is already in short supply. The region faces a current water deficit, with an estimated additional demand of 700+ megalitres in dry years. Armidale's existing infrastructure — particularly Malpas Dam — can only meet about 60% of daily demand. To address this, Armidale Regional Council (ARC) is implementing a two-stage water security strategy! Find out more, scan the QR code below!





The first year of the full SRV increase enables significant improvement in asset renewal

The 2025-26 financial year will be the first year Armidale Regional Council levies the full Special rate Variation (SRV) increase. Additional revenue through the SRV totalling \$9,255,000 will be levied for 2025-2026 financial year.

The Budget, Operational Plan, and associated Integrated Planning and Reporting documents were all endorsed at the Council meeting held on Monday, June 30th.

A 58.8 percent SRV was approved by the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART) in

2023. Revenue through rates

has been incrementally increased over the past two years, with the 2025–26 financial year being the first full year of implementation. This has already significantly reduced Council's operating deficit and increased its capacity to improve and maintain infrastructure—particularly roads.

Armidale Mayor Sam Coupland said the reason that SRV was needed is that traditionally the rate peg did not kept pace with inflation.

"IPART has recently changed its method of calculating the rate peg to align more closely to changes in costs. Rates increases will now return to the incremental increases governed by the rate peg set by IPART", said Mayor Coupland.

Since the introduction of the SRV, Council has been scaling its resources to deliver the additional asset renewal and maintenance.

"It was a courageous move by the Council of the time—of which I was a part—to seek and apply for the SRV. We've been able to deliver additional asset renewal and preventative maintenance to key infrastructure such as roads and buildings," said Mayor Coupland

A detailed breakdown of the projects completed through the additional SRV expenditure during the first two years of implementation is now available on Council's website. The 2025–26 SRV expenditure plan is currently being finalised, but notable projects include the continued road widening and sealing of Rockvale Road and refurbishments to some of our local museums, to name a few

"The community can be assured that improvements to roads and building infrastructure will continue over time. Projects that were previously delayed due to limited Council funding—often reliant on grant criteria—are now on track for completion," concluded Mayor Coupland.





Spuds cling to fourth place with scrappy win

The Super Spuds took an important step towards a semi final berth with a scrappy win over the Moree Boomerangs at the New Red Hill on Sunday.

In their last home game of the year, the Spuds were never behind on the scoreboard, but had to stave off a dangerous Moree side late in the day.

Robert Sisson opened the scoring for Guyra with an intercept and an easy run to the line for a 6nil lead.

Corey Torrens then ran it himself and crashed over for Guyra's second and it was 10-nil.

The Rangs showed they were not going to lie down with their first try coming against the run of play.

When Dylan Sutton latched on to an offload from Rave Brazier and spun out of a tackle to score it was 14-4 to the home side, until the Rangs posted another try just before the break to go to the sheds at 14-8.

In the second half Brazier scored one of his own when he ran onto an inside pass from Cormack Hume to make it 20-8.

However, every time the Spuds kicked clear a mistake would let the Rangs back in it and this allowed the lead to narrow to 20-18.

Matt Sisson scored what looked like the try of the day for the Spuds but it was called back and it took a Riley Campbell fourpointer to extend the lead to 24-18.

Moree levelled the scores and threatened to go ahead, but with 10 minutes to play Torrens found

Tahmani Landsborough unmarked out wide and the winger put Guyra up 28-24.

A couple of key defensive stops allowed the Spuds to keep that lead and in the last five minutes they managed to seal the win with a second great try to Rave Brazier and an unusual one on the stroke of fulltime to Angus Brazier after a missed field goal attempt.

The final score was 38-24 and flattered the Spuds, but ensures they stay in fourth spot.

Club points went to Robert Sisson (3), Archie Dowden (2) and Angus Brazier (1), while Rave Brazier was voted players' player.

The Spudettes didn't get the result in the earlier game, going down 28-4.

The only try-scorer for Guyra

Moree line right on halftime to keep Guyra in it at 12-4.

Moree was too good in the second half with three more tries, but the Spudettes also remain in fourth place.

Kiarna Landsborough was play-
