New rescue gear a game changer for VRA

Guyra's Volunteer Rescue Squad has taken a major step forward in its ability to respond to emergencies in rough terrain, thanks to the acquisition of a new traverse mule — a piece of rescue equipment purchased with assistance from a recent Community Support Grant from Armidale Regional Council.

The traverse mule, a lightweight, all-terrain wheel system, is designed to transport stretchers over rugged, narrow trails. It's a vital tool for bushland rescues, where access is limited and patient transport can be treacherous without specialised gear.

"This piece of equipment is a game changer for our team," a spokesperson from Guyra VRA Rescue Squad said. "It allows us to safely and efficiently carry out rescues in areas that would otherwise require significant manpower and risk."

The \$4,000 grant was part of

the latest round of the Armidale Regional Council's (ARC) Community Grants Program, announced in May 2025. This round saw \$52,000 distributed across 20 local organisations, including six from Guyra.

Other Guyra based organisations to receive grants under the program were the Rotary Club of Guyra Inc. \$4,300; Guyra & District Pony Club \$2,500; Guyra Show Society \$2,500; Masonic Lodge Guyra 325 \$2,500; and the Black Mountain Baptist Church \$1,200

ARC Mayor Sam Coupland highlighted the purpose of the program:

"Even small grants can have a big impact — from helping volunteers buy new equipment to supporting events that bring people together," he said.

"This program is about investing in our community's future."

A century of service, stories, and stage

Around 90 close family members and friends gathered at the Armidale Ex-Services Club on June 28th to celebrate an extraordinary milestone: the 100th birthday of Ron Vickress, a man whose life has been defined by service, creativity, and community.

Ron, who spent many years living in Guyra, remains a proud member of the Guyra RSL sub-branch. He also served as a long-time trustee of the Guyra War Memorial Hall and was an active member of the Guyra Probus Club. His ties to the region run deep, and his contributions have left a lasting impact.

The celebration was rich with tributes, including a special video message from actress Rhonda Burchmore and official letters of congratulations from King Charles III, Prime Minister Anthony Albanese, Armidale Mayor Sam Coupland, RSL NSW, and University of New England Vice-Chancellor Professor Chris Moran.

Ron's life story is remarkable. From his early days as a 16year-old air raid warden during World War II to his service aboard HMAS Pirie as a signalman in the Royal Australian Navy, his journey has been one of courage and conviction. He was present at a pivotal moment in history — the signing of the Japanese surrender in Tokyo Harbour in 1945.

Yet it was in the years that followed, in classrooms, theatres, and community halls, that Ron truly left his mark. A former teacher and lifelong lover of the arts, he performed in dozens of plays and wrote novels, stage works, and even a musical. After completing a Bachelor of Letters at the University of New England in 1963, he went on to earn a Master of Education with Honours. From 1972 to 1985, he served as a respected lecturer in English and Drama at UNE.

Ron's community involvement has been wide-reaching. He helped establish swimming clubs, ran amateur theatre productions, and championed causes of social justice and Indigenous support. He was awarded the UNE Alumni Community Award and named Armidale Regional Council's Senior Citizen of the Year.

Among his many roles, one stands out for its longevity and symbolism: Ron was the oldest trustee of any Crown Land entity in New South Wales, through his service with the Guyra Soldiers' Memorial Hall.

Local Land Services' annual farm census underway

NSW landholders are being asked to report their livestock numbers and land use information as part of Local Land Services' annual farm census.

The Annual Land and Stock Return collects important information that helps shape the delivery of essential animal health and biosecurity services and prepare for emergencies such as bushfires and biosecurity outbreaks.

Landholders must lodge their return by 31 August 2025 via the online portal or by completing the paper form received in the mail.

Local Land Services' Execu-

tive Director Delivery, Rob Kelly, said the Annual Land and Stock Return helped paint a picture of agricultural land use and livestock across NSW at the time of the 30 June census date.

"An accurate snapshot helps the NSW Government respond quickly and accurately to emergencies such as bushfires and floods, monitor flock and herd health and carry out emergency animal disease surveillance," Mr Kelly said.

"This helps protect NSW from the threat of pests, diseases and emergencies while supporting primary producers and keeping supply chains strong.

"We recognise many farmers have faced significant challenges recently that have impacted their stock levels, including floods in the Hunter and North Coast regions and drought conditions in southern parts of the state.

"Despite these challenges, it is still important for everyone to lodge their Annual Land and Stock Return as this information allows us to better respond in emergency situations and deliver timely animal health and biosecurity advice.

There are more than 170,000 landholders across NSW.

Those without stock still need to complete their returns to avoid unnecessary fees.

The Animal Health and Meat Industry Levy is automatically applied to a landholder's next Local Land Services rates notice if they fail to complete their return.

Landholders can visit the Annual Land and Stock Return or scan the QR code on their Annual Land and Stock Return notice to submit their return online.

Information supplied by Jeff Martin, Observer for Bureau of Meteorology This September, Team Guyra will once again hit the road as part of the annual Ride for the Chopper, raising much-needed funds for the Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service—a vital lifeline for communities across Northern NSW.

The Ride for the Chopper is a major fundraising initiative for the Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service. Each year, cyclists take on a challenging multi-day ride to raise funds and awareness. Riders cover hundreds of kilometres through regional NSW, with every dollar raised going directly to support the community's own rescue helicopter service.

This year's team includes dedicated local riders: Leanne Mayled, Donna Mayled, Dave Mills, Michael Kirk, Bill Perrottet, Wayne Jenkyn, and John Newsome. Over the course of eight days, the group will cycle approximately 600km, starting in Mudgee and making their way back to Tamworth, with overnight stops in Merriwa, Scone, Murrurundi, and Ouirindi.

Team Guyra Saddles Up

"This is a service any one of us could need at any time," said team organiser Leanne Mayled.

"Fundraisers like this are what help keep the helicopters flying and the service free for everyone."

The Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service operates 24/7 from bases in Tamworth, Belmont, and Lismore, providing rapidresponse aeromedical care, emergency transport, and lifesaving rescue missions.

Each helicopter is crewed by a highly trained team including a pilot, aircrew officer, NSW Ambulance Critical Care Paramedic, and a NSW Health doctor. In many missions, a specialist nurse is also on board.

Operating as a flying intensive care unit, the service performs over 1,500 missions every year, including accident response, inter-hospital transfers, neonatal emergencies, and search and rescue operations. Each hour of flight can cost up to \$4,000, with an estimated \$40 million annually required to keep the helicopters and crews operational.

"We would love the support of our community," said Leanne. "Every donation—big or small—makes a real difference."

Big Chill, Big Impact: How festivals enhance regional economies

The Big Chill Festival has once again proven that regional events are more than just a good time, they're a powerful force for economic growth and long-term resilience in communities like the Armidale Region.

Figures released by Armidale Regional Council (ARC) have revealed that this year's sold-out festival delivered a staggering \$3.6 million in total economic benefit, including \$2.3 million in direct visitor expenditure. With a 47 percent increase in ticket sales from the previous year and a sold-out weekend that drew more than 5,000 attendees, the numbers speak volumes — but they only tell part of the story.

At the heart of this success is ARC's annual investment into the festival of \$350,000, which acted as a catalyst for growth. That contribution generated a tenfold rethe into community, turn

amplifying the festival's impact far beyond the event itself.

Across Armidale, local businesses felt the buzz. Hospitality and retail operators reported trading levels that rivalled the Christmas rush. Cafés were bustling and local boutique stores thrived as the city came alive.

"It's not just about the sales," said Renata Davis, Manager of Regional Activation. "It's about visibility, connection, and showing off what Armidale can do. The festival creates a ripple effect that lasts well beyond the weekend."

Weekend activities like the Chilly Dip at Dumaresq Dam and local markets gave residents and visitors a uniquely Armidale experience and extended experiences beyond the festival walls.

The event's reach also extended far beyond the city limits. Some 45% of ticket holders travelled from outside the region, and more than 1 million people were reached across social media platforms, putting the region firmly on the map for future tourism and investment.

Mayor Sam Coupland said this year's The Big Chill Festival wasn't just a celebration of music, food, and community - it was a major economic boost for the Armidale Region.

"I can't overstate the importance of these events," said Mayor Sam Coupland. "They showcase our region and bring people together while giving a huge boost to our local retailers and business community."

LP Dutton Trout Hatchery re-opened to the public

It was great to get the news last week that the LP Dutton Trout Hatchery at Ebor had finally been re-opened to the public. For nearly 18 months the facility was closed

to visitors. I made numerous requests to Minister for Agriculture Tara Moriarty to have it re-opened, so it is excellent to finally see the closed sign removed.

The trout hatchery has a long history of tourist and community visits for education and fish feeding. The town of Ebor relies on this steady stream of visitors to boost their economy. While the trout farm was closed, the community felt the impact with the pub, accommodation and other facilities all suffering.

It is a fantastic facility where visitors can learn about aquaculture and the vital role it plays in fish restocking, conservation research, and recreational fishing across NSW.

The LP Dutton Trout Hatchery is located at 336 Point Lookout Road, Ebor, and is open seven days a week for visitors from 9am to 3pm.

Coalition Bill to crackdown on illegal vapes and tobacco

The NSW Coalition will introduce a Bill in Parliament to make NSW the hardest place in Australia to sell illegal vapes and tobacco.

Illegal vapes are readily accessible for our region's youth and are having an enormous impact on health and safety. The nicotine in one vape can be up to the equivalent of 50 cigarettes.

Nicotine is incredibly harmful to the development of a young person's brain, and we don't want our kids smoking or vaping at 12 and 13-years-old.

The Bill aims to further increase the penalties for the sale of illegal vapes and tobacco, give NSW Health the power to close businesses selling tobacco and vapes for up to one month, provide magistrates with the power to close those businesses for up to 12 months, give lessors the statutory right to terminate leases where a closure order has been issued, and create a new offence for lessors who knowingly permit their tenant to use the store for the sale of illegal tobacco or vapes.

National Desexing Month - call to prevent unwanted litters

Australia's animal shelters continue to face overwhelming pressure from unplanned litters, surrendered and abandoned pets — but one simple act can make all the difference. This July, the National Desexing Network (NDN) invites veterinary clinics and local communities to join National Desexing Month (NDM) 2025 and help turn the tide on pet overpopulation. NDM is an initiative of Animal Welfare League Queensland (AWLQ), and this nationwide program is now in its 21st year. It calls on veterinary clinics nationally to offer discounted desexing services throughout July, and on pet owners to act responsibly by ensuring their pets are desexed.

In support of this initiative, for the month of July, Guyra Veterinary Clinic are having 20% off routine desexing.

"Every year, more pet owners are stepping up to desex their pets and break the cycle of unwanted litters — and that's real progress," said Jemal Mako, NDN spokesperson.

"But we still see too many animals coming into shelters because this vital step wasn't taken. We need the whole community to keep pushing forward." "Desexing is a simple act with a huge impact," Ms Mako, continued. "By taking part in National Desexing Month, veterinary clinics, councils, animal organisations and pet owners all become part of a solution that reduces the number of animals surrendered — and those that tragically never leave the shelter system."

Country Mayors renew concerns over cost shifting

The Country Mayors Association of NSW (CMA) has renewed its call for action on cost shifting, following a new report by Local Government NSW titled "Cost Shifting 2025: How State Costs Eat Council Rates."

The report, prepared by Morrison Low, found that NSW councils now absorb \$1.5 billion annually in shifted costs from State and Federal governments—up 10% in three years, totalling \$11.3 billion over the past decade.

CMA Chairman and Temora Shire Mayor Rick Firman OAM said the impacts are especially severe in rural and regional communities.

"These figures are disturbing. Financial sustainability is becoming impossible for many councils," he said.

Firman cited the ongoing issue of councils being forced to carry Rural Fire Service assets on their balance sheets, despite not owning them. He welcomed efforts by the NSW Government to address this, noting positive discussions with key ministers.

Deputy CMA Chair and Bega Valley Mayor Russell Fitzpatrick said declining Federal Financial Assistance Grants have compounded the issue, forcing some councils to seek Special Rate Variations, which burden ratepayers already facing cost-of-living pressures.

The CMA continues to advocate for fairer funding and structural reforms to support rural, regional and remote councils.

Digital Water Meters rolling out in Guyra

Armidale Regional Council is set to begin the rollout of Digital Water Meters (DWMs) across the local government area, with Guyra the first to receive the upgrade. The new meters promise smarter water use, improved leak detection, and more accurate billing—all at no additional cost to residents.

Digital Water Meters are part of Council's push toward smarter, more efficient infrastructure. Unlike traditional meters, DWMs collect hourly water usage data, allowing both residents and Council to monitor consumption in near real-time.

The system will provide each household with access to a Customer Portal. From there, residents can view their usage, set alerts for high consumption or suspected leaks, and receive monthly reports—helping them make informed decisions and avoid unexpected water bills.

One of the most significant benefits is the early detection of leaks. The data collected will allow both residents and Council to quickly identify and respond to abnormal usage patterns, potentially preventing water damage and reducing financial burdens.

The upgrade comes at no cost to residents, as the project is fully funded by the Water Fund Reserve. Council is replacing meters that have reached the end of their service life, opting to install this new technology rather than replace outdated devices.

Installation will be conducted in stages over the next 18 months, starting in Guyra. While the schedule is subject to change due to weather and unforeseen events, residents will receive timely updates about their area's rollout and instructions on how to access the portal.

Beyond individual households, the new metering system is expected to streamline Council operations by eliminating manual meter reading, allowing staff to be reallocated to other critical services.

Residents are encouraged to check Council's website regularly for updates on the installation timeline in their area.

Trends improved for the most part with considerable improvements through the cow drafts. Limited weaner steers much dearer 370c to 430c/kg.

Light background steers gained 14c/kg 348c to 450c/kg. Feeder drafts marginally dearer 370c to 404c/kg.

Medium weight feeder steers gained 12c/kg 320c to 466c/kg. Feeder steers to 480kgs as much as 37c/kg dearer 320c to 464c/kg.

Weekly Wool Market

July 11th - The low weekly volumes on offer continue to place somewhat a floor price in the market with demand and supply seemingly well balanced at this point in time.

Prices did edge slightly higher this week with the Aussie dollar assisting by falling against the US. A 3 cent rise in the Northern region on Tuesday was followed by a further 1 cent increase on Wednesday. Individual micron indicator results were mixed, ranging from plus 25 cents to minus 5 cents.

Once again, the national offering failed to reach 30,000 bales. 26,943 bales were sold for the week with a passed in rate of 8%. Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris and Tianyu with an even spread of purchasing on the Merino fleece types.

Just two sales into the new season and already 12.8% fewer bales have been offered compared to the corresponding sales last season. This is being reflected in market prices just not to the full extent, with an 8.5% average rise.

With Fremantle not participating next week just 23,990 bales are expected to be on offer nationally before nudging back up closer to 30,000 bales in the final sale before the annual three week recess.
