World Cup success for Fletch

Guyra shooting talent Fletcher Richardson delivered a great performance at the 2025 World Universal Trench Championships held in Rome, Italy from July 31st to August 3rd.

Competing as part of the Junior Australian Team alongside teammates Cam Ford and Lucas Furlan, Richardson contributed to the squad's silver medal win. The team competed over four days in fairly warm weather and sometimes overcast conditions against a strong international field that included 17 nations and over 300 competitors.

Individually, Richardson placed 4th overall in the junior division with a score of 186/200, narrowly missing the podium. His performance also saw him finish 45th overall in the Open category.

Notably, Richardson achieved a new personal best during the championship — a milestone in his shooting career that signals continued improvement and dedication.

Students Decode the Universe

As part of National Science Week 2025, students at Bald Blair Public School embraced the theme "Decoding the Universe: Exploring the Unknown with Nature's Hidden Language" through a week filled with hands-on learning, creativity, and exploration.

The week kicked off with a whole-school Science Day, where students worked in teams on fun and challenging activities. They researched famous scientists and inventors, communicated using light and Morse code, built sun dials to tell time using the sun's movement, and competed in a marshmallowand-toothpick tower challenge that tested their engineering and teamwork skills.

On Wednesday, students joined a live webinar with author and illustrator Matt Cosgrove and the Museum of Australian Democracy. Highlights included a reading of Alpacas in Space, a live alpaca drawing tutorial, and a Q&A session where students asked Matt about his stories and creative

Thursday saw students head off on an excursion to Thalgarrah, rounding out an exciting week of science and discovery.

Permanent memorial for long forgotten graves

Two long-forgotten graves on a property near Falconer have now been permanently marked, thanks to the dedication of Doug and Rhonda Ferris, with assistance from Dave Richardson.

The graves, located on East Tara — a property owned by Kerry and Bernard Makings — were known to only a few locals until recent efforts brought them into the light. The site was once part of a much larger holding known as Tara.

Doug Ferris, who now lives on West Tara — the site of the former village of Falconer — first learned of the graves when he moved to the area. Long-time residents Harry and Rita Williams pointed out the location and shared its history.

"When I first stood at the site with Harry Williams, we both agreed — if we didn't do something to mark these graves, they would be lost forever," said Doug. "They deserved to be remembered, the spot marked, and not forgotten."

The graves date back to the 1860s and belong to two children of Thomas and Anna Morson Rae: Anna Morson Rae, who died on January 4, 1863, aged just four days, and Emma Marie Rae, who passed away in May 1866 at six weeks old, reportedly from whooping cough.

Information about the children and their family was sourced from the Guyra and District Historical Society Journal 'A Monumental Achievement'. Further information about the family can be found in the Armidale and District Historical Society Newsletter (October 2022).

Thomas Rae was a Scotsman and he married Anna Morson Buckland in Armidale in 1861. He was the owner/licensee of the Falconer Hotel, 7.8kms north-east of Guyra in the Sandon Goldfields.

In 1874 the Armidale Express, describing the



goldfields settlements stated 'Mr Thomas Rae remains the sole resident of all he surveys from his own windows at Falconer'. Thomas died in February 1882 aged 67.

Guyra and Falconer were proclaimed as villages in 1885, but as the 1884 extension of the railway went through Guyra, the settlement at Falconer lost significance and Guyra grew. At the end of 1882 Mrs Anna Rae sold her household goods and the de-licenced hotel was auctioned as a 14 roomed house.

All that they left behind were two tiny graves

which may well have been lost to history. The only reminder of where the children lay were two small indentations, marked only by sticks.

Now, a granite headstone has been installed at the site as a lasting tribute. A marble plaque, engraved with the children's names and dates has been inset into the stone.

This heartfelt act of remembrance ensures the Rae children are no longer forgotten — their resting place now marked with care and dignity, and their story woven back into the history of Falconer



Weed alert | Sticky florestina

Armidale Regional Council has been notified by the Local Lands Services (LLS) and Biosecurity Queensland that Sticky florestina may be entering parts of the Armidale region via livestock transport All parts of the plant are considered toxic and unpalatable to grazing animals. Sticky florestina produces hundreds of sticky seeds which are easily spread by stock, native animals, vehicles, machinery and people. Its seeds are also believed to be dispersed down waterways. Prevention: Identify and treat any new infestations promptly before seed can be set. Prevent seed spread by minimising contact with seeding plants. Be sure to brush down clothing, empty boots, clean down vehicles, machinery and equipment before leaving infested


Vision to restore Little Boy Lost landmark

Standing for more than a century, the Abbey Green Church is one of Tubbamurra's most significant historic landmarks and forever linked to the famous Little Boy Lost story. The church has fallen into disrepair, but a new push is underway to save it and bring it back to life.

Councillor Eli Imad has met with the building's owners, the Wyatt family, and secured agreement on a framework to begin the restoration journey. A senior strategic planner from Armidale Regional Council has inspected the site and confirmed the church can be restored, opening the door for a community-led revival.

"I'm grateful to the Wyatt family for their cooperation and willingness to see this vision take shape," Cr Imad said.

"Abbey Green is the last remaining public building in Tubbamurra. Preserving historic structures like this is vital. We need passionate locals to step forward so we can begin the journey



of restoring it for future generations — it would be an asset for the whole region."

The proposed plan includes restoring the building in line with heritage values, revitalising the grounds, and adding interpretive signage to share its rich history — including its Little Boy Lost connection.

Cr Imad hopes the restored church will serve as a tourist drawcard, a unique wedding venue, and even host special prayer services.

Funding will be sought through community events, grants, donations, and in-kind support from local tradespeople.

Residents interested in being part of the restoration committee — to help steer planning and fundraising — are encouraged to contact Councillor Imad as soon as possible.

mherv is operated by the Rotary Club of Warners Bay in collaboration with local NSW Rotary clubs and other local community organisations.

The mhery Project has been operating for over 6 years travelling regional and rural NSW offering free health checkups to people who haven't seen the inside of a doctor's room since they don't remember when! In that time, blood pressure, blood sugar and cholesterol levels may have reached seriously high levels and there are no symptoms... until it's too late and a heart attack or stroke strikes!

The program is focussed on men because unlike the womenfolk, they are not good at caring for their own health!... But nobody is turned away.

The service is offered in a relaxed, confidential and informal

setting. The mhery Registered nurse conducts the tests and discusses any health concerns seated in the privacy of the van.

mhery screenings have saved many lives and improved health outcomes for many men and women throughout NSW.

Snowstorm

The recent storms across the Northern Tablelands saw thousands of residents across the electorate without power for days. This meant people were without water, lost perishables and businesses couldn't trade.

I have written to Minister for Recovery Janelle Saffin requesting the Northern Tablelands be declared a disaster zone. Armidale Regional Council have now submitted the required paperwork for the council area to be declared a natural disaster and the declaration should come through this week.

With the snowstorms, I would also like to commend the community spirit. There were plenty of stories of people checking on their neighbours, offering up their homes, delivering goods and clearing roads.

Well done to the whole community.

NSW Farmers' Annual Conference

I attended the NSW Farmers' Annual Conference in Sydney last month which saw farmers, industry leaders and politicians come together to discuss issues facing the industry.

These included the future of farming, artificial intelligence, a first farm buyer's scheme, renewable energy concerns, animal activism, privacy, waste transfers, mobile coverage, funding for feral pig control, pest and weed control, insurance costs, and the next generation of agriculture.

REZ inquiry

Renewable Energy Zones (REZ) were in focus when the Upper House brought their Parliamentary Inquiry to Armidale two weeks ago. Local mayors, local planning officers, landholders, academics, and community members had the chance to raise their concerns about the New England Renewable Energy Zone.

Our community has clearly and methodically identified shortcomings with the roll out of the REZ and witnesses raised those during the inquiry. No one said they were against renewables, but it is clear the NSW Government has so far failed to properly address fundamental issues such as water security, housing availability, roads and infrastructure, waste and recycling management, current infrastructure, and workforce availability.

Since becoming the local member 12 months ago, I have constantly said that the current planning laws in NSW are outdated and do not achieve fairness for regional communities dealing with large scale renewable projects.

Witnesses also identified the flawed planning process and the failure of the NSW Government to take their feedback into consideration.

The NSW Government now needs to stop overlooking them and start addressing them.

Crackdown on illegal vapes & tobacco Our regional communities have been calling

for change on the sale of illegal vapes and tobacco for months and now the Government is finally acting. They have decided to introduce tougher laws.

This comes after the NSW Opposition announced they would introduce a Bill in Parliament to make NSW the hardest place in Australia to sell the dangerous products. These illegal shops run by criminals have moved into empty shops in our towns and have made these addictive, destructive and harmful products readily available, particularly for young people.

New England District Exercise descends on Bundarra this weekend

This planned exercise will allow RFS members to practice core skills designed to test the readiness and response capabilities of multiple crews from within the New England Zone.

The focus will be on enhancing team coordination and communication in a relaxed community setting, with some fun activities included to encourage participation and camaraderie.

Also present will be the New England First Aid instructors and Community Engagement specialists to demonstrate First Aid techniques and provide information to the community around fire preparedness and information on how to join the RFS.

Inspector Matthew McKean, Acting New England District Manager, said,

"Bundarra has been selected to host the exercise with the aim of boosting membership for the local Brigade. Like most brigades across the District, they need additional members to support immediate response to incidents. Exercises like this are vital for improving preparedness, teamwork, honing skills and ensuring that crews can operate seamlessly together when a real emergency occurs."

Residents can expect to see an increased emergency service presence in the area throughout the day, including multiple RFS appliances and members. Organisers stress that these activities are controlled training simulations and are designed to enhance the capability and community profile of the RFS.

The community is encouraged to observe and even participate where invited, with information stalls, first aid demonstrations, and preparedness resources available opposite the Bundarra Caravan Park in Court Street, Bundarra from 10:00am on Saturday.

"This is not just a test for responders — it's an opportunity for residents to understand their level of risk and look at ways this could be reduced. We want to make the Bundarra community as prepared as it can be, not only for fire but for all types of emergencies," added Inspector McKean.

The exercise is scheduled to conclude by 1:00 PM, with a debrief involving all participating agencies and community stakeholders.

Now based in Armidale and applying for permanent residency, Thaw Ni is eager to support local landholders and communities in protecting koalas.




