We also received wonderful donations during the year from the Regional Australia Bank Community Partnerships Program, the Tradie's Breakfast hosted by Darren and Tania Lennon and Guyra Soccer Club Family Fun Day.



Tenterden Hall to celebrate 100 Years

A beloved local landmark is turning 100, and the Tenterden community is pulling out all the stops to mark the occasion.

The Tenterden Hall Centenary Celebrations will be held on Saturday, September 27th, from 2:00pm to 8:00pm, at the Tenterden Recreation Reserve. Everyone is invited to join in a funfilled afternoon with a live band, food stall, jumping castle, face painting, a lolly bar, and historic displays.

More than just a birthday bash, the celebration is a chance to reconnect with neighbours, reflect on the legacy of this small but strong rural community, and honour the generations who have contributed to its success.

The hall, originally known as the Rifle Club Hall, was officially opened on October 2, 1925, coinciding with the first full moon after the spring equinox. An excerpt from the Guyra Argus dated October 8, 1925, described the event as a great triumph:

"The opening of the new Rifle Club Hall proved a huge success, nearly 300 persons being present. Guyra Orchestra provided excellent music. A sum of about £30 was cleared, so the efforts of a hard working committee and others were amply rewarded. Visitors from Guyra,



Uralla, Wandsworth, Tingha, and other centres were present, but particularly from Guyra, and much thanks is extended to the general public for liberal patronage"

A century on, the same community spirit remains.

One family with deep ties to the hall is the Nielsen family. Herb Nielsen was the original builder of the hall, winning the tender as announced in the Guyra Argus on July 16, 1925.

Since then, many local families and volunteers have remained actively involved on the hall's board, preserving its legacy and helping to shape its future.

What began as a rifle club has evolved into a treasured community hub. The centenary event will also feature a display from NSW Health's Rural Adversity Mental Health Program, and the Mayor is expected to attend in support of the milestone.

Organisers say they are proud of what the hall has stood for over the past 100 years and are excited about the road ahead.

"We feel that it is important to keep the hall alive, and the history behind it and we hope that we and the new board members can continue providing a space for the community to come together. We have some big ideas for the future, so watch this space."

So mark your calendars, bring your family and friends, and come along to celebrate a century of memories, milestones, and community at Tenterden Hall. Here's to the next 100 years!

About the Role

School Learning Support Officers provide support for students with identified diverse learning needs, including disability in classrooms and other learning environments across the school, K-12, under the direction and supervision of a teacher. Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

The unusual trend of the market continuing to rise after the mid-year recess continued this week. The Fastern market indicator climbed 30 cents and closed at levels not seen since May 2023. This also equated to a 24 cent increase when looked at in US dollars. In the Northen region the market opened strongly on Tuesday ending the day 18 cents dearer. This was followed up with further rises on Wednesday with another 8 cents added to the indicator. All categories enjoyed buyer support throughout the week including the Crossbred and Merino Carding types. Supply concerns appear to have finally crept into

the market with weekly national offering's consistently around the 30,000 bale figure. The fall in production started to gather a head of steam in August with AWTA testing figures showing a 24.8% decline in the weight of wool tested nationally bringing the combined total July/August decline in at 18.2%. This fall in production does not marry up with AWEX auction figures only showing a 6.8% decline. This can only mean that the seven week rise in the market has flushed wool held in stores across the country onto the market, and the market has absorbed this without blinking an eye. 27,538 bales were sold nationally this week with the passed in rate miserly at just 2.9%.
