The excitement didn't stop there. To add to the fun, the teachers surprised the students with a special race featuring inflatable costumes.


Students and parents alike

St Mary of the Angels students explore Canberra




Stage 3 students at the Australian War Memorial

Team Guyra Chopper ride tops \$21,000

The Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service's 23rd annual Ride for the Chopper rolled back into Tamworth last Friday, September 19, after eight days on the road and another successful fundraising effort.

The charity ride, which stretched over seven nights, began in Mudgee and travelled through Merriwa, Scone, Murrurundi and Quirindi before returning to Tamworth. Along the way, riders enjoyed spectacular views of the region's vineyards, sweeping hill country and the iconic Liverpool Plains, while also making time to visit schools and connect with local communities.

Among the standout contributors was the Guyra team, who raised an impressive \$21,397 through a combination of fundraising activities and community support. The team expressed their gratitude to both the local and wider communities for backing their efforts.

Special mention was given to the graziers who donated sheep, lambs and wool to the Wool and Sheep Drive, with buyers paying well above market rates to support the cause. Additional donations came in through cash, online contributions, and sponsorship of individual riders.

"Every dollar raised goes di-

rectly to the Chopper service so that it can remain free for all who need it," the team said.

"We are so grateful for the generosity shown by our community and beyond."

This year's ride has already raised \$77,000, with funds still coming in. Organisers say the final total is expected to climb

even higher as the last of the donations are tallied.

The annual Ride for the Chopper not only raises vital funds for the Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service but also strengthens the ties between riders, sponsors, and the rural communities they pass through. For the Guyra riders, the support received at home has

been a driving force in their continued involvement.

The Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service provides a critical lifeline across regional NSW, ensuring patients receive urgent medical care when they need it most. Events such as this ride help guarantee the service remains free to those who rely on it.

Letter to the editor...

Disappointing AGM

I would like to make comments re the Annual General Meeting of the Guyra Bowling and Recreation Club held on the 7th September 2025.

A little background on me first. Over the last 25 years I have been involved with many community groups. Childcare, preschool, school and sporting associations, Woolexpo, Rotary and Troutfest.

I have sat on the Board of most holding the role of Treasurer or President and therefore been part of the Executive as well. I feel qualified to comment on the process of an AGM.

Firstly, on opening the meeting the President basically laid down the law that no motions could be made, merely suggestions that would be discussed by the Board at a later meeting. Unusual?

Secondly, Presidents report, a neat statement of four lines stating profit, opening of the cabins, thanks to the Board and Secretary Manager, with an extra thank you to the Secretary Manager for doing her job. No mention of the staff, without whom the Club would grind to a halt. No mention of either the Bowlers or Golfers

and their achievements over the year. No mention of the Golfers who at times assist with maintenance of the course. No mention of Sammie and the bistro staff who bring people into the club to eat and drink. No mention of the Members, without whom the Club would cease to exist. I remember spending hours on a Presidents report so that everyone was acknowledged and achievements recognised, while at the same time keeping it as short as possible so as not to bore members, but this was ridiculous.

Thirdly, item 6 to approve Honorariums. Well that was interesting, the date was wrong, 30 June 2020, and the amount was wrong. Evidently neither the Secretary nor any of the board bothered to proofread the agenda. Cut and paste is all very well but you still have to check the essential points. I also wonder if this has been the same since 2020 and the first time picked up. If this is the case then have they approved honorariums five times for 2020 and not the following years? The President stated that this was a typo and continued with the approval. My understanding is that the typo should have been fixed and correct copies distributed to those present in order for voting to continue. This was not the case and I had thought to mention this as an opposed vote at that time. This also was not to be, as when the President called for approved he looked at one table that had hands raised, even though many others had not, and then pronounced Carried! No option of opposed, just in favour, carried. I find this deplorable.

During Other Business many members had questions to ask and it was interesting that the President had to constantly tell the Secretary "you better write that down". I would have thought that would have been realised by the Secretary since these questions were supposed to be addressed later by the Board. After quite a few questions it appeared the President was uncomfortable/unsure so declared that they had legal advice to not answer certain questions and closed the meeting. What could the Board be so worried about that they would take legal advice prior to an AGM, the only time Members can question the Board?

Sustainable Agriculture in Focus at Ben Lomond

Ben Lomond is fast becoming a hub for conversations around sustainable farming and food systems, with a recent workshop drawing more than 25 people eager to learn, share experiences, and take home practical tools to use on their own properties.

The event, hosted by the Ben Lomond Landcare Group on Saturday September 13th, featured a strong line-up of speakers who each brought unique perspectives to the table. Attendees said the day was not only educational but also a welcome chance to connect with like-minded people and strengthen the local Landcare community.

Local holistic management educator and Ben Lomond resident Brian Marshall opened the session. With decades of experience in land and livestock management, Brian spoke about how land function and ecosystem processes underpin successful farming. He unpacked common challenges such as overgrazing and the importance of allowing adequate recovery times for pastures, while also highlighting how careful planning can lead to both ecological health and a cash surplus.

"I wanted the group to get back to the business of Landcare, and that was the purpose of the day," Brian said.

Adding another dimension,

guest speaker Heidi McElnea, a qualified permaculturist and owner of Highland Permaculture, encouraged participants to consider their farms and backyards as living systems. She explained how waste can be cycled back into useful resources, how permaculture design can support long-term food security, and how small actions can foster biodiversity even at the household level.

"It was a lovely group of people, and I really enjoyed hearing from everyone about their experiences and areas of interest. People can learn a lot from each other in these settings," she said.

The third presenter, Campbell Wolfenden from Guyra Rural Services, focused on the practical. He demonstrated tools such as a refractometer and soil sampler, explaining how these simple instruments can give valuable insights into soil and pasture health. His hands-on approach resonated with participants who appreciated seeing tools in action that could be readily applied on their own farms.

Feedback from the day was overwhelmingly positive. Attendees described the workshop as an inspiring afternoon filled with practical ideas and plenty of robust discussion. The Ben Lomond Landcare Group has taken this encouragement on board and is already planning to run further sessions.

Several opportunities are already locked in. In November, Heidi McElnea will lead a series of practical permaculture workshops with the Guyra Neighbourhood Centre, offering everyday skills for building more resilient home gardens and communities.

The highlight, however, is the return of internationally recognised soil health educator Graeme Sait, who will deliver a half-day workshop in Ben Lomond on Saturday October 4th.

Co-founder of Nutri-Tech Solutions, Sait has presented more than 500 seminars in 20 countries and is renowned for his ability to link soil, plant, animal, and human health. His session, Soil Health and Your Wealth – Profit Building with Minerals, Microbes and Humus, promises to be a condensed yet powerful introduction to regenerative farming principles that boost both productivity and resilience.

Safety upgrades for highway south of Guyra

An extra \$23 million of funding announced by the NSW Government last week will go towards improving on major roads within the Northern Tablelands.

The funding through the Towards Zero Safer Roads Program is aimed at reducing crashes and saving lives in high-risk areas.

A total of \$8 million has been allocated to upgrade two stretches of the New England Highway between Guyra and Armidale. It includes \$3,127,289 for the installation of wide centre line, roadside barrier and shoulder widening at Tilbuster Ponds South, and \$4,851,058 for the installation of roadside barrier,

wide centre line and shoulder widening at Newman Park.

Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan has welcomed the announcement saying he receives numerous requests every week to improve road conditions, and he is pleased the NSW Government has listened.

"The Northern Tablelands is home to some of country NSW's most important routes which connect us to services and economic centres," Mr Moylan said.

"We know two-thirds of road fatalities occur on country roads with hazards such as trees and wildlife increasing the risks associated with driving on these roads so having these roads in a safe and working order is incredibly important.

"I have been fighting hard to improve travel conditions for residents and road users within our region, so I am glad to see the NSW Government has responded with \$23 million for those upgrades.

"Those safety improvements will include shoulder widening and the installation of roadside barriers which go a long way to bettering conditions on major regional routes."

Other works included in the announcement include:

• Waterfall Way at Old Hill-

grove Road, Metz - \$2.6m for installation of roadside barrier, shoulder widening and safety improvement to corners,

- Waterfall Way at Bullock Creek No. 2, Ebor - \$2.4m for installation of roadside barrier, shoulder widening and safety improvements to corners,
- Oxley Highway at Honeysuckle Creek, Yarrowitch - \$1.5m for installation of shoulder widening and safety improvement to corners
- Newell Highway at South Croppa, Tulloona - \$8.6m for installation of wide centre line and shoulder widening with pavement rehabilitation

The Scout Hall (Cnr Nincoola and White Streets, Guyra)

On 18th March 1965 the 1st Guyra Scout Group Committee, under the Presidency of Don Bowden, purchased the Everett School building for 412 Pounds and moved the school to the present site in Nincoola Street for a cost of 175 Pounds.

The Everett School is the northern part of the Scout Hall and was built in 1940. Everett School started in August 1886 and closed in February 1964.

The southern part of the Scout Hall, which was the Mogg's Swamp School building, was added to the Hall in May 1971. It was built around 1943.

The Mogg's Swamp School was given to the 1st Guyra Scout Group free of charge but the removal cost was \$1,000. Mogg's Swamp School opened in August 1911 and closed in April 1969.

Scouting began in Guyra in

1920 and held meetings in various halls and building in the town, including the Guyra Jockey Club building and under the old pavilion at the Guyra Showground. (The Scout Hall is located on part of what once was the Guyra Racecourse.)

It was in August 1947 that the Guyra Shire Council decided to set aside a triangular block of land bounded by White Street, Nincoola Street and the TSR, as a site for a Boy Scout's Hall.

Later that year, in an address to the members of the Guyra Rotary Club, Mr. F.B. Howard, Field Commissioner, New South Wales Boy Scout Association spoke on 'the necessity of providing a Scout's Club Hall'.

Opening his address, Mr. Howard said that Scouting, with its principal aim to promote the supplanting of self with service, was probably the nearest approach to Junior Rotary in existence.

Rotary was an old friend of Scouting. After giving valuable assistance Rotary invariably faded out of the picture, giving an example of real community services.

The Scouts continued to meet in various buildings in Guyra until 1965 when the Everett School became their "Home".



Major renovations of the Scout Hall by the Rotary Club of Guyra are now substantially complete.

This entailed plumbing and electrical works, painting inside and out, new guttering, replacement of some timbers, restumping, repair/replace windows and security screens.

Funding for this work was provided by the Crown Lands Improvement Fund,

The Hall now needs a new kitchen, a disability access ramp, blinds, tables, chairs, projector & screen.

NSW SES urges you to create a plan this storm season

With the 2025–26 storm season now officially underway, the NSW State Emergency Service (NSW SES) is urging communities across the state to take proactive steps to prepare for severe weather.

NSW typically experiences increased storm activity between the beginning of September and the end of April, with risks including heavy rainfall, damaging winds, and flash flooding.

Rural Market Reports

Weekly Wool Market

September 19th - The market has shown no signs of slowing down recording it 9th consecutive weekly rise.

AWEX report that the sixteen selling day rise is the longest unbroken upward movement since they began reporting the market back in 1997. In the Northern region similar gains were made on both selling days with a 12 cent rise on Tuesday and a further 13 cents added on Wednesday.

The headline Eastern market indicator closed at its highest level since March 2023. It was the finer Merino and broader Crossbred

types that attracted buyer attention this week with the 28 micron indicator recording an impressive 11% increase.

With the 20 micron and broader Merino types now sitting at 5 year highs it was becoming important that attention was also needed to be given to the finer micron categories. This started to occur last week and showed positive signs of continuing this week.

27,171 bales were sold nationally with a passed in rate of 3.8%. Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris and Meliwa with strong support given across the board. Upcoming national offerings remain around 30,000 bales per week.
