Bowling Club Cabins ready for first guests

The Guyra Bowling Club's newest venture is set to welcome its first guests this weekend, with the opening of ten cabins on site.

Club President David Wilcox said that the \$1.9 million project was funded from the club's reserves.

"We recognised there was shortage of local accommodation, and saw an opportunity to fill the gap while also supporting local events and visitors," David said.

"The cabins also provide us with an additional income stream which will reduce reliance on poker machines.

"Construction work was carried out by local tradespeople wherever possible, ensuring the investment flowed back into the Guyra community and supported local businesses."

Nine of the cabins feature three to four beds. Each cabin includes a king bed, reconfigurable into two singles, along with single or bunk options. There is one wheel-chair-accessible cabin with the option of a king or two single beds.

Guests will enjoy reverse-cycle air conditioning, ensuite bathroom facilities, tea and coffee making amenities, and access to an onsite laundry.

Designed for short stays of one to four nights, the cabins will provide much-needed accommodation for local events, celebrations, and sporting carnivals. They will also serve as an overflow option during busy regional periods, when nearby centres such as Armidale reach capacity.





Bookings have already been strong, with several weekends in December and the Christmas period already reserved.

"People are starting to realise we're here, and word is getting out," David said. "Last year during our bowls carnival, visitors struggled to find somewhere to stay but this year we're confident we can fill our greens."

The cabins are also attracting interest ahead of upcoming golf events, with bookings already secured. Prices start from \$130 per night for two people, or \$145 for three. Reservations can be made online via the club's website or directly through the club.

Cadillacs turn heads as they cruise into Guyra



A few heads turned on Friday, September 25, when a convoy of Cadillacs rolled into town as part of a five-day tour of the region.

The visit was organised by the Cadillac Club, which has branches in both Queensland and New South Wales. Each year, the club chooses a location to gather, and this year the Guyra, Armidale and Uralla area was selected.

Around 10 to 15 cars took part in the local stopover, drawing plenty of interest from onlookers. After calling into the Guyra Car Museum, the group enjoyed lunch at the Royal Hotel before continuing their journey.

Club member Robert Natoli, who travelled from Sydney, said it was his first time stopping in Guyra, although he has passed through many times.

"We like to host events that celebrate cars and history, and with the car museum here in Guyra it really fitted the bill," he said.

Mr Natoli explained that Cadillacs hold a special place in automotive history.

"There's a real connection between Cadillacs and the rock and roll era of the fifties. They were big, bold and a little ostentatious that's what makes them so iconic," he said.

"Judging by the interest, having Cadillacs in Guyra is pretty unique. They're incredibly comfortable to drive, although when we plan trips like this, we do have to map out the route petrol station to petrol station."

The visit was part of a wider tour across the New England, giving locals a rare chance to see the classic American cars up close.

Free mulch available at the Guyra Community Recycling Centre every weekend in October

Council has completed its snowstorm clean-up, with over 2,000 tonnes of green waste collected. As part of recovery and water conservation efforts, residents can collect free mulch every weekend in October (October 4–5, 11–12, 18–19, and 25–26) at the Armidale Waste Management Facility and Guyra Community Recycling Centre. The offer is limited

to one load per customer, with no deliveries and no weekday access. Council encourages residents to bring their own trailers or utes and thanks the community for its cooperation. This initiative aims to support both community recovery and water conservation. Mulch helps retain soil moisture, suppress weeds, and improve soil health - reducing the need for watering by up to 60%.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

September 23rd - Yarding: 3,086 (Lambs 2,025 / Sheep 1,061) Top Price: \$366 Sale Average: \$205

It was an overall strong sale at Guyra, with the best competition on crossbred lambs.

- Crossbred lambs (1,552 head) sold to \$366, averaging \$251, with heavy old season lambs in highest demand.
- Exotic lambs (mainly Dorpers) reached \$261, averaging \$170, with mixed quality.
- Merino lambs (384 head) topped at \$240, averaging \$173, with heavier drafts attracting support.

In the ewe yarding, crossbreds sold strongly to \$280 (avg \$202), while exotic types reached \$250 but plainer lines pulled averages back. Merinos were limited, topping at \$200.

Hoggets sold well across the board, with Black Suffolk and Dorper lines attracting competitive bidding.

Wethers met firm demand, with Merinos topping at \$185

(\$161 avg).

Ram lambs sold to \$280, while the small yarding of rams topped at \$180 for crossbreds. Merino rams were limited, easing to a softer market at \$120.

Armidale Cattle Sale

September 25th: Yarding: 2,057 (Cows 320 / Heifers 497 / Steers 737 / Bulls 67 / Cows & Calves 218)

A mixed yarding of 2,057 cattle was penned at Armidale, with firm to dearer trends in lighter cattle, while some heavier bulls met a softer market.

- Cows: Heavy cows over 600kg held firm, selling to 415c/kg (\$3,166/head). Middle weights were softer, while lighter cows up to 400kg remained steady.
- Heifers: Lighter heifers were dearer, selling to 530c/kg (\$992/head). Heavier heifers over 500kg remained firm, topping at 462c/kg (\$2,637/head).
- Steers: Competition was strongest on lighter weights.
 Steers under 200kg reached

630c/kg, while 300–400kg lines sold to 586c/kg (\$2,141/head). Heavier steers over 500kg were firm to \$3,015/head.

- Bulls: Light bulls (under 350kg) sold dearer to 510c/kg. However, heavier bulls were softer, with 500–750kg types to 394c/kg (\$2,703/head). Heavy bulls over 750kg were firm to \$3,822/head.
- Cows & Calves: Sold from \$1,300 to \$2,660, averaging \$2,464.

Weekly Wool Market

September 26th - The 10th consecutive weekly rise occurred this sale, but this one broke the trend of slow but steady increases. Tuesday's sale in the Northern region witnessed a huge daily gain in the overall market of 77 cents as buyer appetite became large.

Instead of pausing for breath as the market often does after a large daily movement it surged again on Wednesday by another 40 cents. After coming under renewed interest last week, the finer types continued to gain the most ground as did the broader Crossbred types with some of those recording an extraordinary 20% increase in the space of a fortnight.

Reports of a positive Nanjing wool market conference in China at the back end of last week proved correct with a strong message sold by the Australia contingent that supply will be well down.

As always when we see increases like this it may take time for processors to adjust to the new price levels but is does appear that the whole wool pipeline remains short of stock.

This week's closing level has tested the double top seen since post covid in June 21 and again in June 22. 29,248 bales were sold nationally with an almost non-existent passed in rate of 1.8%. A little bit more quantity has been enticed onto the market next week, but in reality, it's just over 35,000 bales.

Don't miss a beat: defibrillator grants now open

Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan is encouraging sporting clubs, and recreation facilities from across the region to apply for the Local Sport Defibrillator Grant Program.

The program is aimed at providing a grant of up to \$3000 for clubs and facilities across NSW to purchase Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs).

Mr Moylan said it is important sporting organisations are equipped to respond to life-threatening emergencies on and off-thefield

"Whether you're playing footy at the park or cheering on the sidelines, cardiac arrest can affect anyone at any given time," Mr Moylan said.

"Having a defibrillator on-hand following cardiac arrest can be the difference between life and death.

"A person's chance of survival can double, or even triple, if a de-

fibrillator is used in conjunction with CPR.

"I encourage clubs and organisations to apply for this funding because you never know when you made need a defibrillator."

The Local Sport Defibrillator Program 2025-26 is open to applicants within the bottom five socioeconomic indexes for areas determined by the Australian Bureau of Statistics.

Eligible postcodes in the Northern Tablelands include the 2365 postcode. Unfortunately Armidale is not on the list of eligible postcodes.
