Council delivers trio of bridge upgrades

Armidale Regional Council has completed construction on three new bridges - Kaurala Bridge, TwoMile Creek Bridge, and Boundary Creek Bridge - delivering safer and more reliable infrastructure for rural communities and freight operators.

The upgrades are part of Council's broader Bridge Renewal Strategy, which aims to replace ageing timber bridges with modern concrete structures that meet current safety and load standards.

Kaurala Bridge, located approximately 15 kilometres west of Guyra on Old Armidale Road, was upgraded with over \$1.6 million in funding from the NSW Government's Fixing Country Bridges Program. The new bridge improves safety and access for all drivers along this key rural route.

Two-Mile Creek Bridge, situated 23 kilometres north of Armidale on Boorolong Road, was delivered with over \$1.3 million from the NSW Government's Fixing Country Bridges Program and \$214,295 from the Australian Government's Roads to Recovery program. The upgraded structure enhances connectivity for residents and supports the movement of goods and services in the region.

Boundary Creek Bridge, approximately 40 kilometres north-east of Armidale on Rockvale Road, also re-

ceived over \$900,000 funding from the NSW Government's Fixing Country Bridges Program, and around \$500,000 from the Australian Government. The new bridge replaces an ageing timber structure and includes a temporary sidetrack to maintain traffic flow during construc-

Mayor Sam Coupland said the completion of these bridges marks a significant milestone in Council's commitment to improving regional infrastructure.

"These projects are about more than just replacing old bridges they're about increasing load limits to ensure our communities stay connected and our local economy keeps moving," said Mayor Coupland.

"We're grateful for the support from both NSW and Australian Governments in helping us deliver these vital upgrades."

NSW Minister for Regional Transport, Jenny Aitchison said the upgrades demonstrate the importance of continued investment in regional infrastructure.

"The Minns Labor Government is building better communities across regional NSW, and that includes upgrading critical infrastructure like the Two-Mile Creek, Boundary Creek, and Kaurala bridges."

"Bridges are critical infrastructure in regional communities like Armidale, not just for everyday travel, but for school buses, freight operators and emergency services."

"These upgrades are a win-win; improving safety, cutting travel times, reducing maintenance costs and supporting regional economies. I'm proud to be working with Councils, getting on with the job of delivering the infrastructure our communities deserve."

The new bridges are designed to meet modern engineering standards and accommodate heavier vehicles, improving safety and efficiency for all road users.

In addition to the bridge upgrades, Council has also completed works on the First Culvert along Herbert Park Road under the same funding arrangement, further strengthening our region's transport infrastructure.

Rev. Campbell's passing is deeply felt across the district, and the many lives he touched will remember him with gratitude and affection.

Bank Merger given green light by members

Regional Australia Bank and Summerland Bank will proceed with a merger after members approved the move at their Annual General Meetings last week.

Summerland's members met on November 19th with more than 96 per cent of the members voting in favour of the merger, whilst the Regional Australia Bank members voted on November 20th with also more than 96 per cent approving the move.

The merger will officially take effect from July 1st, 2026. Once merged, the combined entity will manage assets of over \$5 billion and service over 130,000 members with 49 locations across a large area of regional NSW and southern Queensland.

As part of the proposed merger, both banks reaffirmed that there will be no branch closures, no staff losses and accounts, services, and support will continue as usual.

Speaking following the outcome of the vote, Regional

Australia Bank CEO, David Heine said they were thrilled that members have embraced this merger.

"Today's vote reinforces our commitment to regional Australia by growing our ability to serve more towns and communities throughout regional NSW and into Queensland," Mr Heine said.

Summerland Bank CEO, John Williams said that Summerland Bank and Regional Australia Bank share the vision and values as a community-focussed customer-owned bank.

"By approving the merger our members will enjoy more branches, greater support for local communities, a wider range of products and better services," he said.

"Resilience will be supported through shared infrastructure, broader geographic reach, and increased financial capacity, allowing us to continue delivering personalised service while adapting to changing market conditions."

Firies seeking spare change to help young burn survivors

Guyra locals are being asked to throw their support behind the 2025/26 Beat The Burn Campaign, with a dedicated donation helmet now set up at the Guyra Hotel.

It is one of around 120 decommissioned helmets which have been turned into donation vessels and distributed to fire brigades across NSW.

Local Fire and Rescue NSW (FRNSW) firefighters are urging community members to drop in their spare change and help raise vital funds for young burns survivors across NSW.

Now in its 21st year, Beat The Burn raises funds for the Burns Unit at The Children's Hospital at Westmead. It is a

year-round initiative promoting burn-prevention messages, supporting families, and raising critical funds for treatment and recovery. Over the past two decades, FRNSW firefighters have helped raise more than \$1.65 million for the Burns Unit. This year, the goal is to raise \$400,000 to continue improving functional and cosmetic outcomes for children who suffer serious burns.

Local firefighters hope the Guyra community will embrace the opportunity to contribute, helping ensure children living with life-changing burns receive the best care and support possible.

Be scam smart as you shop

As Australians prepare for Black Friday and Christmas bargains, NGM Group – the customerowned organisation behind Greater Bank and Newcastle Permanent – is urging shoppers to stay alert as the festive shopping season ramps up.

The ACCC reports more than \$259 million has already been lost to scams in 2025, with activity expected to rise as online spending increases. Last November alone, Australians spent more than \$37 billion, creating ideal conditions for scammers to take advantage of distracted or rushed shoppers.

Jason Veltruski, Fraud Operations Manager at NGM Group, said scammers deliberately mirror the hype surrounding Black Friday.

"They copy the look and language of trusted brands, send fake delivery updates, and run social media ads that appear genuine," Mr Veltruski said. "Even careful shoppers can be caught off-guard, which is why small precautions matter."

Scams to watch include:

- Fake online stores posing as major retailers.
- Delivery scams demanding small "release fees."
- Bank impersonation texts claiming suspicious activity.
- Social media bargains requiring direct transfers.
- High-pressure tactics pushing rushed decisions.

NGM Group urges shoppers to: buy from trusted sites, verify business details, keep receipts and tracking numbers, and monitor accounts closely.

If you suspect a scam or have shared payment details, report it to Scamwatch and contact your bank immediately.

"Shopping safely is simple," Mr Veltruski said. "Take your time and trust your instincts."



Local group raises concerns after asbestos-containing parts found in wind turbines

ReD4NE (Responsible Energy Development for New England) Chair Susan Newey says the organisation is deeply concerned by emerging reports that wind turbines operating in Australia may contain asbestos-affected components.

The issue has sparked alarm among communities in the New England region, where several large-scale wind projects are already operating and many more are proposed.

The concerns follow national news reports that white asbestos has been detected in lift brake pads inside wind turbine generators (WTGs) at the Cattle Hill Wind Project in Tasmania,

prompting urgent calls for safety reviews across the country's wind industry.

According to those reports, the asbestos was found in lift components supplied by 3S Industry—described by the ABC as one of only a few brake pad suppliers to the Australian wind sector. This raises the possibility that a significant proportion of turbines nationwide may be affected.

A spokesperson for Goldwind Australia, which operates the Cattle Hill project, confirmed that staff access to any turbines containing 3S lifts has now been restricted "across the entire Goldwind Australia fleet."

Ms Newey said the situation

warrants immediate clarification from wind farm operators in the New England region.

"Given the limited number of suppliers for these brake pads, it is reasonable to question whether local projects are impacted," she said.

ReD4NE has formally requested comment from companies running wind farms in the area. Ms Newey also noted that public statements issued to date fail to address potential risks to host landholders, neighbouring properties, livestock, or soil—particularly if asbestos-affected components were present during construction.

ReD4NE is urging landholders

and residents living near existing or proposed wind projects to ask operators directly whether their turbines use components sourced from 3S Industry.

The organisation is also encouraging anyone with concerns about asbestos exposure or safety standards to lodge an enquiry with SafeWork NSW.

"Submitting a report is quick," Ms Newey said, "and SafeWork NSW must investigate all enquiries."



From the Archives at the Guyra Museum

The village of Falconer

The first recorded white man to reach the New England area was John Oxley, who really discovered it by accident in 1818. But that's another story.

From 1832 settlement of the New England area really began in earnest H.C Sempill was the first, and he took his stock from the outstation 'Ellerstone' (near Scone) and formed a station in the upper Apsley Valley, which he named Walcha.

It was in 1835 that James and Alexander McDougall and Alexander Campbell set out to examine the other unexplored areas of the New England. Alexander Campbell took up Gyrah (Guyra) run as the agent for a Scotsman, Peter McIntyre, who lived in Maitland area. Leaving men and stock there as a staging post before heading north west they then took up Byron Plains (near Inverell) and Waterloo (near Inverell) also for Peter McIntyre.

John Falconer was a ticket-of leave stockman who was left in charge of the stock at the staging post at the river on the 'Gyrah' run, thus Falconer Plains.

It was from Falconer Plains that Patrick Leslie and his companion Peter Murphy marked the first line to the Darling Downs. They return from their trip satisfied that they had found a suitable route. On April 14th 1840 Patrick Leslie's cavalcade drew slowly out of Falconer Plains for the marked line to the Darling Downs. I quote from Patrick Leslie's diary:

"We went by easy stages to 'Bready Plains', 'Waterloo' to McIntyre's station at 'Byron Plains' and continues till we reached the Condamine River; good traveling all the way so numerous a company, when tracks for the teams and drays had to be cut in advance."

In the party there were 22 ticket-of-leave men assigned convicts, 3 drays, 10 saddle horses, 2 teams of bullocks, (24 in all) 5000 sheep and 100 rams, the first to enter Queensland. Their destination was 'Canning Downs' an area of 90,000 acres on the Condamine River.

Also, in 1840 Richard Craig guided, down the first party of drays and livestock, from the Falconer Plains to the Clarence along a route to the east of Armidale-Grafton road. The party had to cut away through thick scrub and wind around the huge trunks of the forest canopy, while on dangerous sidelings the drays, which frequently capsized, had to be lowered down by block and tackle. It was an epic journey

In the 1850's the government decided that

a village should be established on Falconer Plains. Allotments were surveyed on the village reserve and were put into auction. However, bidding was extremely dull. There were some small farms established but the village did not grow. (Map of the Allotments can be view at Museum)

From a "For Sale" notice in an Armidale Express dated 1858 "a store in the village of Falconer containing a fair stock of goods suitable

for the bush" was noted.

In 1865 at the Village of Falconer there were the Falconer Hotel, a store and a Blacksmith shop. Cobb & Co Coaches travel the road three times a week and Thomas Rae the Hotelkeeper operated a private mailbag service for farmers in the district.

Today it is difficult to find traces of this early village.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

November 18th - A total of 6,500 sheep and lambs were yarded at the Guyra sale, with a good-quality yarding throughout.

The offering included 2,600 lambs, with heavy lambs reaching a top of \$420. A number of pens made over \$400, marking a clear improvement on recent weeks.

New season lambs sold consistently from \$230 to \$260.

The mutton yarding totalled 3,900 head, presenting as a very good quality run. Heavy mutton topped at \$260, while Merino ewes with skin made from \$170 to \$190.

Store Merinos were also in demand, selling from \$110 to \$130.

The next Guyra sheep and lamb sale will be held on December 12th.

New England Livestock Agents

Armidale Cattle Sale

November 20th - Armidale penned 1836 cattle, 404 more than the previous market. It was a reasonable quality yarding with a good supply of cows, steers and large numbers of heifers to suit backgrounders and restockers. There was strong competition on a larger offering of bulls with processors paying up to 430c/kg.

Prime young cattle were firm to slightly dearer for the better quality lines. All of the regular buyers were in attendance and operating in a market that sold to a dearer trend on the majority of cattle. Young cattle to the trade were 20-30c/kg dearer, with the prime vealers and yearlings selling from 370 to 482c/kg.

Feeder steers were much dearer while the feeder heifers were firm to slightly cheaper. Feeder steers sold from 404c to 540c/kg while the feeder heifers made from 314c to 456c/kg.

Young cattle to the restockers finished up to 45c/kg dearer, with young steers selling from 395c to

568c/kg while the larger supply of young heifers to restockers sold from 382c to 472c/kg.

Grown steers and heifers were firm to dearer for the better lines with prime grown steers selling from 364c to 470c/kg and prime grown heifers from 370c to 442c/kg. Cows were firm with 2 and 3 scores to the processors selling from 292c to 398c/kg. Prime heavyweight 4 score cows sold from 406c to 425c/kg. Heavy bulls to process were dearer, selling to 430c/kg.

Weekly Wool Market

November 14th - The green shoots of last week continued, with the market once again finding some solid support. For whatever reason the month of October is more often than not unkind and hopefully can be put behind us.

The recovery in the mid micron Merino prices was the standout this week, and whilst 21 and 22 micron price guides were not reported in the Northern region due to lack of volume, they certainly responded positively down South. So much so that just 14 cents separates the 20-22 micron indicators. Sales reverted back to the Tuesday, Wednesday format with gains made over both days. Tuesday saw an 11 cent gain in the indicator followed up with a further 19 cent jump on Wednesday.

Crossbred and Carding prices remaining flat held the overall market indicator back from being quoted even dearer. 28,522 bales were sold nationally for the week with both the passed in rates and withdrawal rate dropping considerably. Major buyers included PJ Morris, Techwool and Sequoia. With the top 2 dominating the Merino fleece offering. A similar quantity is on offer nationally again next week and whilst it hovers between 30-35,000 bales per week the trade
