Costa celebrates 20 years in Guyra

Costa celebrated the 20th anniversary of the opening of its first glasshouses in Guyra last week.

Costa CEO Marc Werner and Chief Operating Officer Domestic Manpreet Sidhu joined community representatives, long-serving employees and staff at a luncheon to celebrate the milestone.

Former Guyra Council Mayor Robyn Jackson and Frank Costa officially opened the first 20hectare glasshouse facility in Elm Street Guyra on December 16, 2005.

Costa has invested more than \$140 million in the construction of glasshouses including a further 10 hectares at a facility on the New England Highway, which opened in 2015, and an additional 10 hectares which opened in 2022. The New England Hwy site also includes an additional 2.5 hectare nursery.

Robyn Jackson and former Guyra Councillor David Bearup, who both worked with Costa to support the initial development at Elm Street, were among those attending the celebrations

Also present were long-serving employees Marie Reeves, Julie Driscoll, and Lenny Jones, who have been with the business since its beginnings in Guyra.


Remembrance Certificate

A scar on the heart

The tragedy at Bondi Beach has left a scar on the heart of our nation. Lives have been stolen and over sixty people injured in a place that represents, egalitarianness, freedom, mateship, volunteering and life-saving. In the quiet of Guyra and right across that nation we feel the shock of this violence, and it is only natural that our grief could turn into anger. However we are responsible for our emotions and anger will only harm ourselves.

The terrorists who attacked our peaceful nation want us in fear, and want us to hate. If we respond with blind fury, we are only finishing the work they started. We need a different kind of strength right now. We need the wisdom to stop the cycle of violence before it takes root in our own community.

The Apostle James understood how dangerous reactive emotion can be. He didn't tell us to suppress our feelings, but he warned us about where they lead:

"My dear brothers and sisters, take note of this: Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry, because human anger does not produce the righteousness that God desires." (James 1:19-20)

Anger feels powerful, but it does not heal the injured. It does not comfort the grieving. As the Buddha taught centuries ago, fire cannot be fought with fire:

"Hatred does not cease by hatred, but only by love; this is the eternal rule." (Dhammapada, Verse 5)

This is not about being passive. It is about the immense discipline required to remain human in the face of inhumanity. Jesus Christ challenged us to a standard of love that seems almost impossible in times like this, yet it is the only way forward:

"You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbour and

hate your enemy.' But I tell you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you." (Matthew 5:43-44)

He offered us a peace that doesn't depend on the world being perfect, but comes from within:

"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you... Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." (John 14:27)

Guyra and Australians, let us stand with the victims by refusing to let terror change who we are. Let us support one another and choose the harder, higher path of peace. Now is the time for a spiritual renaissance. One love.

The Bondi Massacre has left our nation heartbroken and furious. That such a brutal attack could take place in our own backyard is devastating — but that it

happened during Chanukah, when the Jewish community gathers to celebrate light over darkness, makes it even more shocking.

Families who should have been lighting candles were instead running for their lives. A festival of hope was met with violence. This is not just a tragedy — it is an assault on the basic sense of safety every Australian deserves, and a cruel blow to a community already living with rising fear.

What makes this even harder to accept is that our government has ignored the growing antisemitism that Jewish Australians have been warning about for months. And now, in the wake of this atrocity, they seem more focused on going after guns than confronting the real, urgent threat: the surge of antisemitic hatred festering in our own suburbs. When leaders refuse to name the problem, vulnerable communities pay the price.

We cannot respond with silence

or symbolic sympathy. We need a full and transparent investigation, serious protections for at-risk communities, and leadership that finally acknowledges and confronts antisemitism instead of sidestepping it.

In a moment meant to celebrate light, darkness struck. It is now our job as a nation to push back that darkness with clarity, courage, and action.

A year of community-driven wins

As the year draws to a close, Save & Grow Guyra Ratepayers Inc extends its heartfelt thanks to the people of Guyra for their steady support and generosity. Every donation, every message of encouragement, and every hand offered along the way has helped keep our not-forprofit active and effective. We exist to serve the community, and it's the community that fuels our work.

2025 has been a year defined by collaboration and practical progress. We kicked things off with a well-attended community forum featuring Brendan Moylan MP and Councillor Eli Imad—an opportunity for locals to raise concerns directly and hear candid updates on regional issues. These conversations set the tone for a year of engagement and action.

One of the most meaningful achievements came during winter, when we worked to help restore essential heating for residents at Kolora. Ensuring that some of our most vulnerable neighbours were safe and warm wasn't just a project—it was a responsibility we were proud to shoulder.

remained front and centre. Our members represented local concerns about the rehabilitation of Mother of Ducks Lagoon in discussions with Brendan Moylan MP and MLC Dr Amanda Cohn. Protecting this vital natural asset is crucial to Guyra's identity, ecology, and tourism future, and we're committed to staying at the table as planning progresses.

Education and transparency around infrastructure have been important themes this year. Members attended the Guyra Water Treatment Works tour, where Mick Purvis delivered a clear and thorough explanation of the upgrades Armidale Regional Council has implemented to improve our local water supply. It's encouraging to see the level of work happening behind the scenes to secure essential services.

Throughout the year, we continued to advocate on development and infrastructure issues across the region, making enquiries to Armidale Regional Council on matters such as future footpaths, stormwater management, subdivision planning, and long-term town upgrades. These

discussions ensure that the needs of Guyra residents remain visible in broader regional planning.

We also met with consultants and investors exploring opportunities to grow the town's future - a reminder that positive development must be guided, not left to chance. Ensuring Guyra's voice is heard in these early conversations helps shape outcomes that reflect community values.

And of course, planning is well underway for Guyra SnowFest, a highlight of the local calendar and a celebration that brings us all together in the heart of winter.

None of this work happens in isolation. It's the result of a community that shows up, speaks up, and supports the organisations that advocate on its behalf. Save & Grow Guyra Ratepayers Inc looks forward to another year of progress, partnership, and passion for our town.

NSW Seniors Festival funding

This technology can also help preserve ecologically sensitive areas, manage stock in extreme weather events, identify sick animals and prevent the spread of disease.

The good gift giver

A few years ago, one of our kids received a Christmas present, a high-pitched talking plush bear, which made me question what we had done to warrant such a punishment!? It's a question that has mysteriously gone unanswered, and in the end, it was easier to hide the "gift" in the top cupboard, hoping that the kids will forget it exists!

I wonder if you've ever had a similar experience? Nobody enjoys receiving lousy gifts, right? But more than just possibly being annoying, lousy gifts reveal a giver who doesn't really know us very well, which brings a relational clarity that we have to face quickly and unexpectedly.

Good gifts, on the other hand, can bring pure joy. They can be fun and functional, while more importantly, revealing a giver who truly knows us. This is one of the reasons we sing the carol "Joy to the World" around this time of year: at Christmas, God reveals himself as a good giver of gifts, because he really knows us and what we need. John's Gospel captures this in John 3:16: "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life."

Here, John distils Christmas to its essence. Christmas is all about God proving that he loves everyone of us. No matter what life has thrown at us, or the good, bad or indifferent gifts we have received over the years, God's love for all of us stands firm. Words come easily, but at Christmas God's actions prove a God who loves us and who wants us to come back to him, because while our tendency is always to turn away from him, he sends His son into the world on a mission to die in our place, by taking our sin upon himself.

This is what makes Christmas so wonderful. Jesus' arrival as a baby reveals that God loves us, refuses to abandon us, and steps into our suffering world. Later, on the cross, Jesus demonstrates that love again by bearing the penalty for our sins. So, this Christmas, remember what this season is all about, and take the opportunity to come humbly to the God of unwavering love. Trust in His Son and receive eternal life.


