Art show continues to grow

The CWA Evening Branch Art Show, held alongside this year's Guyra Lamb and Potato Festival, has attracted keen interest and a record number of entries.

A total of 109 artworks were entered in the exhibition which is the largest number ever received. Entries came from Glen Innes, Emmaville, Armidale, Guyra and Ben Lomond, showcasing the depth of local and regional talent.

The event also continues to attract new artists with eleven first time exhibitors, which has added to the diversity of works on display.

The official opening on Friday night was well attended, with 21 artworks sold. Throughout the weekend a steady stream of visitors called in to view the works on display.

Art show coordinator Lynda Kagan said planning for the event begins months in advance. Organisation starts in October and ramps up in the lead-up to the festival as entries come in. Volunteers then spend a full day preparing the display ready for opening night.

Ms Kagan praised Kylie Woods, who arranged the artworks to en-



sure the exhibition was eye-catching and inviting for visitors. She also acknowledged the dedicated CWA team working behind the scenes to ensure the show's success.

While the CWA does make a small profit from the exhibition, Ms Kagan said the main aim is to bring people into Bradley Street and support the festival atmosphere. She

also acknowledged GALA for allowing the use of their venue, noting the event would not be possible without their support.

The CWA Evening Branch Art Show remains open daily from 10am to 4pm until Sunday, January 25th, and organisers hope the strong attendance continues through to the final day.

Visitors are encouraged to take

part in the People's Choice Award, with voting open throughout the exhibition. A raffle is also running, offering the chance to win either a crocheted knee rug or a patchwork knee rug.

"Come along and have a look," Ms Kagan said. "There is something for everyone."






Mulloon Institute Rehydrating Your Farm Landscape program

Landholders are invited to take part in a fully funded landscape rehydration program running from February to June 2026, delivered by Southern New England Landcare in partnership with the Mulloon Institute.

The program forms part of the Armidale Regional and Uralla Shire Councils' Regional Drought Resilience Plan and focuses on practical, on-farm approaches to improving water cycles, managing erosion, and building long-term landscape resilience.

"This program is very much about learning by doing," said Elizabeth Rosser, Local Landcare Coordinator for Southern New England Landcare.

"Participants will learn how to read their landscape, understand water movement, identify priority areas for action, and then see those ideas applied on the ground."

Valued at more than \$5,000 per participant, the program combines learning and hands-on activities.

It begins with a Field Day on 19th February, followed by a two-day Boot Camp on 18th and 19th March.

From March to June, four landholders will be selected from Boot Camp participants partake in one-on-one mentoring to develop a property-specific Landscape Rehydration Plan.

The program concludes with a Boots on Ground Day on 14th May, where participants will see on-farm works, such as leaky weirs, demonstrated in practice.

Elizabeth said the program is designed to support landholders with practical skills and confidence to plan and implement landscape rehydration works on their own properties, strengthening resilience to drought and dry conditions.

"The program is designed to deliver benefits beyond individual farms," she said.

"Improved water quality flowing into town water catchments benefits the wider community, while drought-resilient farms support stronger rural communities overall."

In the overall club results, Guyra finished as the second highest scoring club for riders under 17 years and was named the highest scoring club overall for Associate riders, highlighting the depth of talent and consistency across the club.

Team performances were a standout feature of the Jamboree. Guyra's Junior Team of Fours claimed first place, while also being awarded the Highest Aggregate Junior Team Pointscore. This achievement marked a significant milestone for the club, as it is a trophy that has never previously been won by a Guyra team since its inception in 1959.

Adding to the strong team results, the Sub Junior Team of Fours secured second place, further demonstrating the strength of Guyra's younger riders.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

January 13th - Yarding approx. 7,000. No market report available

Armidale Cattle Sale

January 15th - The number of cattle penned at Armidale remained relatively high at 2,116 head. Overall quality was good to useful.

There was a large yarding of over 100 bulls and a mixed quality line up of cows. The bull market generally remained firm and cows continued to meet strong competition.

Young cattle suited to feed and restockers were keenly sought after. A full gallery of buyers was present and active in the market.

Light weight yearling steers under 200kg made to 548c to average 525c/kg. Yearling

steers in the 200 to 280kg range to restockers averaged 517c and made to 554c/kg. Medium weight yearling steers to feed made to 518c to average 506c/kg. Heavy weight yearling steers to feed made to 506c to average 477c/kg.

Well bred very light heifers sold to restockers at a top of 570c with most of the light weight heifers around 461c/kg. Medium weight yearling heifers to feed averaged 439c and sold to 464c/kg. Heavy weight yearling heifers averaged from 445c to 446c with sales to 460c/kg.

Bullocks made to 456c to average 448c/kg. Medium weight 3 score cows averaged 375c/kg. Heavy weight 3 score cows averaged 382c and the best of the cows made to 397c to average 392c/kg. Heavy weight bulls made to 404c/kg.

This market was captured re-

mately with data supplied by the Armidale saleyards.

Weekly Wool Market

January 16th - Auctions returned after a three week recess setting a blistering pace. History tells us that we rarely see a selling week stronger than this.

Prices were dearer upon Tuesdays opening with the Northern region indicator gaining 74 cents for the day. Not to be content with the initial surge the market gained a further 43 cents on the final day. The market closed the week at its highest level since January 2020.

All types and categories were well supported with the largest rises occurring between the 18.5 to 19.5 micron types. 36,585 bales were sold nation-

ally for the week with an almost non-existent passed in rate of just 1.3%.

Major buyers included Tech-wool, PJ Morris and Sequoia with widespread support from the trade. This week's surge has led to an increase in next week's national offering with over 43,000 bales expected. To put that in context is important because the same sale last season was a 50,000 bale offering!

AWTA test data for the first half of the season is showing an 8.4% reduction in the weight of wool tested nationally. The Australian Wool Production Forecasting Committee released an update to its 2025/26 estimate during the recess with a 12.6% decline in production expected. Concerns about upcoming supply availability would be at the forefront of the mind for most in the trade.
