New bus service connecting Northern Tablelands towns

A proposed new bus service is hoping to fill transport needs for local residents, with the Northern Express officially opening bookings for a Glen Innes to Armidale return bus service, which includes a scheduled stop in Guyra.

Anthony Wright from Glen Innes is behind the new service, which he is hoping will prove viable. While he had hoped to begin services this week, the lack of bookings meant the service could not run. He hopes that once word gets and bookings start to come in that the service will be able to operate on a regular basis.

His vision was born out of a growing community need for reliable and accessible transport services to surrounding towns in the Northern Tablelands.

"We recognised the importance of enabling residents to enjoy improved shopping opportunities, seamless connections to airports and interstate bus companies, and convenient access to specialist services," he said.

"At Northern express we are committed to delivering safe, comfortable, and dependable



travel experiences. We take great pride in knowing that our services not only meet a vital community need but also strengthen social and economic connections across the region."

The Glen Innes to Armidale service is scheduled to operate on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. Timetables, fares and online bookings are now available through the Northern Express website.

Southbound services are scheduled to leave Guyra at 8.24 am and 1.12pm, with stops at the

Armidale visitors Centre and Armidale Airport. North bound services are proposed to depart Armidale at 9.50am and 2.25pm.

Additional services are already in the pipeline, including a proposed cross-border connection linking into the Crisps Coaches timetable from Stanthorpe to Brisbane return, which is currently awaiting Queensland Government approval.

Man charged over domestic violence offence after police operation - Black Mountain

A man has been charged over multiple domestic violence offences in the state's west today.

In April 2025, officers attached to Western Region High Risk Domestic Violence Team commenced an investigation following reports of a domestic violence incident in the Armidale area.

Police were told between September 2023 and January 2026, two women – aged 36 and 34 – were assaulted multiple times by a man known to them.

Police established multiple crime scenes and commenced an investigation into the incidents.

Following extensive inquiries, on Thursday 22 January 2026, officers from Western Region High Risk Domestic Violence Team, with the assistance from New England Police District, Western

Region Operations Group, Police Transport Command, arrested a 35-year-old man at a home on Black Mountain Road, Black Mountain.

He was taken to Armidale Police Station where he was charged with seven outstanding warrants on contravene prohibition/restriction in AVO (Domestic), breach of bail, aggravated break and enter

commit serious indictable offence, attempt stalk/intimidate intend fear of harm (domestic), intentionally choke etc person without consent (DV), assault occasioning actual bodily harm (DV), larceny value less than or equal to \$2000, two counts of common assault (DV), destroy or damage property (DV), and possess or use a prohibited weapon without permit.

Westpac Helicopter called to Llangothlin accident

Around 11.30am, on Wednesday 21 January, a Westpac Rescue Helicopter was tasked by NSW Ambulance to a motorcycle accident on a property at Llangothlin, north of Guyra.

A man in his 20s was treated by NSW Ambulance paramedics and the helicopter's critical care medical team for multiple injuries before being transported to Lismore Base Hospital.

Organic clothing business puts down local roots

A passion for sustainability, quality craftsmanship and a slower pace of life has brought Italian-born designers Stefano and Sandro Palotta to Guyra, where they are now proudly producing organic, made-to-order clothing right in the heart of town.

Owners of The Organic T Shirt, the couple originally operated their business in Sydney before deciding city life was no longer what they wanted. With Sydney becoming increasingly busy and crowded, they began searching for a place that offered a better lifestyle.

That search took an unexpected turn when they came across a house for sale in Guyra.

"We had never heard of Guyra before," they said. "But we came to have a look and instantly fell in love - not just with the house, but with the town itself."

After relocating, Stefano and Sandro were keen to continue their existing clothing business. While they were unable to find suitable premises in Guyra initially, they set up in nearby Glen Innes, operating a factory-based business for three and a half years.

They have now converted what was once a butcher shop at 145 Bradley Street into a retail and production space in Guyra, something they had always dreamed of.

The Organic T Shirt produces a wide range of clothing, not just T-shirts. They use organic Good Earth cotton and natural merino wool. All garments are made on site, measured precisely to minimise waste, with leftover materials reused wherever possible.

Sustainability is central to every-

thing they do. Clothing is made to order, avoiding excess stock and landfill, with turnaround times as quick as a few hours. Customers can order made-to-measure garments, customise designs, recreate favourite styles, or even have items repaired, with services such as hemming and alterations also available.

The business also offers in-store personalised printing, supported by newly installed equipment and they are transitioning to making their own labels in store. Instead of simply "Made in Australia" they will proudly display "Made in Guyra, NSW 2365", a move they say is important in promoting the town they've grown to love.

"Our fabric is produced in Mel-

bourne, and all labour happens right here in Guyra," they said. "That's something we're really proud of."

Sandro brings extensive industry experience, having worked for major companies in Sydney. From the beginning, the couple's ethos has been to create high-quality garments that last, countering the fast-fashion model of mass-produced clothing made overseas, often with poor fabric quality and exploited labour.

The Organic T Shirt operates an online store servicing customers across Australia and New Zealand, with plans to expand into Europe in the future. Interest has already come from the UK, Italy and Sweden, and they believe there is strong potential, particularly in Italy, where Australian

merino wool is highly regarded.

While the shop has only been open for a few weeks, response from locals and visitors has been very positive. Some confusion remains due to old butcher signage still visible, but word is spreading quickly, with residents and tourists alike popping in to take a look.

With reliable internet allowing them to operate from anywhere, Stefano and Sandro say Guyra offers exactly what they were searching for. A slower pace of life, strong community and the freedom to create meaningful, sustainable work.

"It's slower," they said, "but in a good way and we are loving being here."






Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

January 20th - A total of 2,684 lambs were yarded, with competition strong throughout the sale.

Heavy XB lambs sold to a top of \$300, averaging \$190, while Dorper lambs reached a top of \$320 and averaging \$240.

Merino lambs topped at \$200 with an average of \$132, and XB sucklers reached \$210, averaging \$210.

The sheep offering totalled 1,908 head. Heavy XB sheep sold to a top of \$243, averaging \$198, while Merino ewes reached \$195, averaging \$172.

Merino wethers topped at \$200 with an average of \$179, and XB hoggets sold to \$240, averaging \$161.

Sales are being held weekly.

Armidale Cattle Sale

January 22nd - Armidale penned 1390 mixed quality cattle 726 less than last sale. A major cow buyer not operating other regular buyers attended and competed to varied trends but not as strong as last week.

Weaner steers and heifers under 200kgs to the paddock 490c/kg and 521c/kg respectively. Light yearling steers to background 370c to 455c/kg similar feeders 396c to 480c/kg. Medium feeders 422c to 520c/kg and feeders to 480kgs 464c to 480c/kg. Similar weight processors selling to 412c/kg.

Yearling heifers to 280kgs 385c to 416c/kg. Medium feeder heifers 400c to 422c/kg and similar backgrounders 375c to 418c/kg. Processors in that bracket sold 392c to 410c/kg. The heifers over 480kgs to process 410c to 440 c/kg. Heavy grown steers to process 499c to 436c/kg. Heavy heifers in that

category 375c to 426c/kg.

Prime heavy cows cheaper 380c to 399c/kg. Two and three score cows 354c to 373c/kg and light cows to the paddock 200c to 373c/kg. Heavy bulls 330c to 401c/kg.

Weekly Wool Market

January 23 - The magnitude of last week's rise in the market created a little bit of nervousness before the commencement of this week sales. Instead of pausing or even giving up some of last week's gains the market continued to push higher.

In the Northern region the market gained 34 cents on Tuesdays opening followed up with a further 10 cents on Wednesday. Signs that the booming start to 2026 was slowing down emerged on the final day of sales with small downward movements in various micron categories recorded across the

different selling regions but not enough to offset an overall general positive day.

42,769 bales were sold nationally for the week with once again a low passed in rate of just 1.7%. Major buyers included Tech-wool, Sequoia and Endeavour.

The positive start to the year has pushed next week's national offering up to 5,000 bales higher than early figures suggested to just under an expected 44,000 bales. Looking at charts, the Eastern market indicator is travelling a similar pattern seen for now the 6th time in the past 25 years.

The average bottom to top cycle the previous 5 breakouts is a 70% increase in price. This current cycle is now at 55% after beginning at a low of 1087 back in September 2024. We have closed the week at the highest broad based indicators since July 2019.

2026 Festival the best since COVID



Early figures suggest the 2026 Guyra Lamb and Potato Festival recorded its biggest attendance since COVID, marking another successful year for the much-loved community event.

Weather conditions were mostly kind, although storms on the first weekend caused a phone outage. Guyra VRA came to the rescue installing Starlink at the gazebo to maintain connectivity, however the disruption did impact some stallholders for an extended period.

The music program was well re-

ceived, with strong crowds enjoying a range of quality performances alongside the festival's food offerings.

The Show and Shine was another major success, attracting around 160 vehicles which is believed to be the largest number of cars the festival has hosted. Proceeds of just over \$2,000 from this event were raised in support of BackTrack.

The festival has now operated for 40 years as a volunteer organised event which an outstanding achievement for a small regional festival.


