National Servicemen’s Association Day Commemoration Service

The Armidale & District National Servicemen’s Association (NSA) Sub-Branch Inc will hold its annual NSA Day Commemoration Service on Sunday, 15 February 2026, at the National Servicemen’s Memorial, Central Park, Armidale, commencing at 11.00am.

A church service will be held prior at St Paul’s Presbyterian Church at 9.30am.

The service honours National Servicemen (conscripts) killed in action during World War II and the Vietnam War, those who died during service or since completing their obligations, and all who have served Australia since 1911.

More than 1.2 million men and boys served under national service schemes between 1911

and 1972.

This year, special recognition will be given to local Vietnam War casualties Billy Brett, Ross McMillan and Trevor Attwood, three of the 200 National Servicemen killed in Vietnam.

The service will also acknowledge the contribution of 2,263 Citizen Forces members undertaking compulsory military training who enlisted in the First AIF Division following the declaration of war in August 1914, representing 15.4 per cent of the division’s strength.


The guest speaker will be former RAAF Wing Commander Ken Dickens.

More than 15 schools from Armidale,

Uralla, Guyra and Walcha have been invited to attend, with students participating by laying wreaths and reciting the National Servicemen’s Ode and the Ode of Remembrance. Families, friends and members of the public are also invited to lay wreaths or floral tributes.

Invited guests include representatives from Federal, State and Local Government, Legacy, Armidale and Uralla RSL Sub-Branches, and the Glen Innes National Servicemen’s Sub-Branch.

OPINION: The real threat to local democracy is misinformation

Claims that the NSW Model Code of Meeting Practice has "silenced" ratepayers are not just exaggerated — they are false.

The current Code does not remove public participation, nor does it ban public speaking at council meetings. It expressly provides for public forums as the mechanism for members of the public to address Council, and it regulates how those forums operate, including requiring they be livestreamed where they are held. Nothing in the Code prevents councils from hearing directly from their communities.

Yet some commentators would have the community believe that ratepayers have been barred from council meetings or shut out of decision-making. That is simply wrong. Council meetings

remain open, livestreamed, and accessible. Members of the public may attend, observe proceedings, and address Council through the public forum — as they always have.

What the Code does not allow — and never has — is for members of the public to interrupt debate, engage councillors mid-deliberation, or turn council meetings into open-floor arguments. That is not "silencing democracy"; it is basic governance.

At Armidale Regional Council, nothing has changed. Public forums were already held separately from debate, and that practice continues unchanged. No new restriction has been imposed. No right has been taken away.

The real danger to local democracy is not structured meetings or clear rules. It is misinformation. When meeting laws are deliberately or carelessly misrepresented as censorship, public trust is undermined and cynicism flourishes.

Reasonable people can disagree about how councils should engage with their communities. That debate is welcome. But it must be honest. Pretending that the Code has "silenced" ratepayers is not advocacy — it is distortion.

Local democracy depends on participation, but it also depends on truth. Without it, outrage replaces understanding, and trust collapses.

Guyra 2025 water improvement highlights

Armidale Regional Council (ARC) continues to invest strongly in improving Guyra's water infrastructure, addressing long standing issues with the ageing Guyra Water Treatment Plant (WTP). ARC appreciates the patience and understanding of the Guyra community as this work continues.

ARC is now modernising the plant to improve reliability and water quality. Recent works include new automation and inline analysers, a desludge rake control panel, upgraded chlorine (Hypo) and alum dosing units,

recommissioned fluoride dosing, and new laboratory testing equipment. Council has also progressed source water improvements, including designing a bubble flume aeration system for Guyra Dam and installing a new air compressor. Water mains were replaced in Ryanda, Youman and O'Donnell streets, with more upgrades underway. In total, ARC has invested \$1,102,556 in Guyra's water system.

ARC also has more improvement projects planned for 2026 to continue strengthening Guyra's water security and treatment performance.



Bitumen patching works: Bradley Street carpark

Armidale Regional Council will be carrying out essential maintenance works at the Bradley Street carpark in Guyra on Friday, 6 February. The bitumen patching will begin at 6:30 am and continue until approximately 12:00 pm, weather permitting. The carpark will be fully closed for the duration of the works to ensure the repairs can be completed safely and efficiently.

The project involves bitumen patching to restore the surface following recent trenching required for the installation of a new watering

system for the surrounding gardens. These repairs will ensure the carpark remains safe, functional, and in good condition for community use. Council appreciates the community's patience and cooperation while these important repairs are completed. Motorists and residents are asked to avoid the area where possible and to follow any signage or directions from onsite workers. These works are part of Council's ongoing commitment to maintaining local infrastructure and enhancing public spaces for the Guyra community.

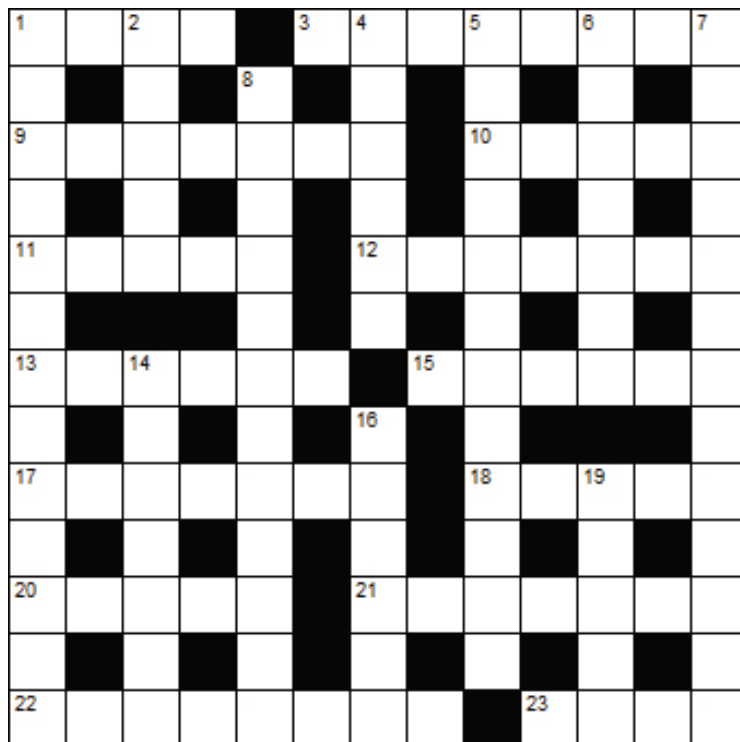

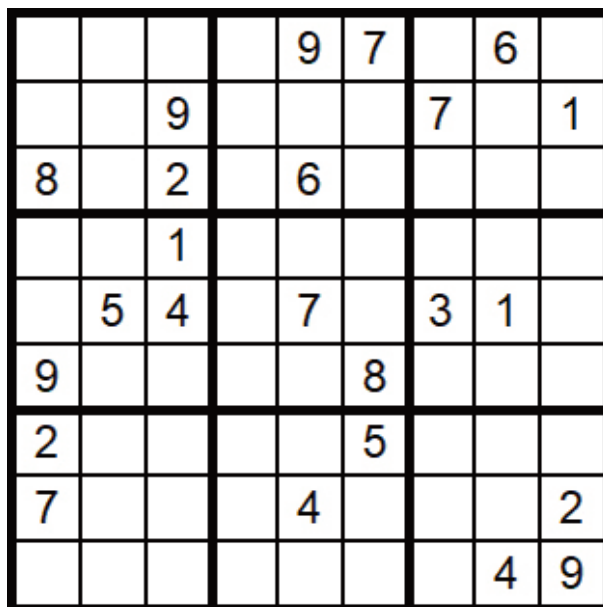

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

January 27th Yarding totalled 6,413 head, comprising 3,353 lambs and 3,060 sheep.

- Heavy XB lambs topped at \$284, averaging \$208
- Merino lambs sold to \$190, with an average of \$160
- Australian White lambs reached \$170, averaging \$157
- XB suckers topped at \$272, averaging a strong \$263

- Heavy XB sheep sold to \$220, averaging \$173
- Merino wethers reached \$200, with an average of \$176

Armidale Cattle Sale

January 29th - Armidale penned

1664 mixed cattle, 274 extra than previous sale. It was a plainer quality offering with the exception of a good selection of prime heavy cows. Cheaper trends resulted for most categories. The regular buyers attended but a major cow buyer absent with a negative result for that category.

Light weaner steers under 200kgs to background much cheaper 374c to 498c/kg similar heifers 314c to 400c/kg. Light yearling steers to feed were cheaper 348c to 480c/kg conversely the background drafts were cheaper 358c to 526c/kg.

Medium background steers were dearer 405c to 450c/kg the feeder drafts significantly cheaper 400c to 498c/kg. Heavy processing steers marginally dearer 410c to 438c/kg. Yearling heifers to background slightly cheaper 280c to 424c/kg with a quality correction the main factor.

Medium feeders slipped 18c/kg while the background heifers

gained 22c/kg selling to 426c/kg. Heavy feeder heifers 368c to 415c/kg.

Grown heifers to process were dearer 388c to 448c/kg. Cows to the paddock 340c to 355c/kg. All processor cows were cheaper categories slipping 9c to 24c/kg. Prime heavy cows down 10c/kg 370c to 381c/kg. Heavy bulls were cheaper losing 16c/kg 350c to 390c/kg and yearling feeder bulls 320c to 372c/kg.

Weekly Wool Market

January 30th - It was another 40,000 plus bale national offering this week with the extremely positive price signals seen over the previous fortnight drawing held stock onto the market.

The first day of sales opened into the head winds of a rapidly appreciating Australian dollar against the US. Climbing above 70 cents for the first time in almost 3 years on the back of Tuesday's inflation data.

This was a 4% increase in exchange rates compared to last week's closing wool sales.

Prices retreated upon the market opening for most types with the Eastern market indicator falling 1.5% for the day. The positive news is that demand held firm and remained strong with the Eastern market indicator actually climbing 2.5% when looked at in US dollars.

A firming tone late on the first day carried over to Thursday with prices regaining some of Wednesday's losses despite the Australian dollar strengthening further. The weekly result was a 24 cent downward movement in the Eastern market indicator and a 40 cent gain when looked at in US dollars.

40,987 bales were sold nationally for the week with the passed in rate climbing to 6%. Major buyers included Techwool, PJ Morris and Tianyu. Another 40,000 bale national offering is expected next week.
