

It's Not Just You: Community conversation to tackle Perimenopause and Menopause

Women across the New England are invited to a timely and important community event that aims to break the silence around perimenopause and menopause and provide practical, evidence-based support.

Proudly hosted by the CWA Guyra Evening Branch, "It's Not Just You" is a free, multidisciplinary information day to be held on Sunday, 8 March 2026, from 9.00am to 3.00pm at the Gilbert White Memorial Hall, Guyra.

Perimenopause and menopause can be confusing and isolating experiences for many women, with symptoms often misunderstood or dismissed. This event brings together a diverse panel of

experienced health professionals to offer clear information, professional insight and reassurance that women are not alone in navigating this stage of life.

Guest speakers include Dr Mandana Arshi (GP), Chris Connor (Community Nurse), Jenni Jackson (Pharmacist), Marni Hietbrink (Psychologist), Ellen Adams (Exercise Physiologist), Brianna Short (Physiotherapist) and Associate Professor Gal Winter (Registered Nutritionist). Together, they will explore the physical, emotional and lifestyle aspects of perimenopause and menopause, with a strong focus on practical strategies women can apply in their everyday lives.

The day will also feature a resource fair, offering free information and brochures, along with opportunities to ask questions and connect with local services. Morning tea and lunch will be provided, creating a relaxed and welcoming environment for conversation and connection.

This free event is open to women of all ages, as well as partners, family members and anyone wanting to better understand menopause and support those experiencing it.

Dam levels dropping as hot, dry weather continues

Armidale Region's water storages are beginning to show the impact of ongoing hot temperatures and minimal rainfall, and the community is being urged to stay alert as Level 1 Water Restrictions may soon be triggered.

Recent weather data shows prolonged dry conditions across the Northern Tablelands, with rainfall for the month so far well below the February average.

These warm, dry conditions increase evaporation rates and reduce catchment inflows, causing overall dam levels to trend downward. At the same time, increased water consumption places additional strain on already declining dam levels.

While major storages such as Malpas Dam are still relatively high following previous wet periods, they are no longer receiving the replenishment needed to maintain their levels heading into late summer. Without rainfall, continued drawdown is expected.

Under the Armidale Regional Council Water Restrictions Frame-

work, Level 1 restrictions are introduced when total storage falls below key trigger thresholds, specifically, they are imposed when overall storage levels fall to 90%. These early restrictions focus on moderate water conservation and include limited garden watering hours, restrictions on the use of sprinklers, encouragement of efficient household water use, and rules that prohibit outdoor watering during the heat of the day to reduce evaporation and unnecessary loss. These early-stage restrictions aim to reduce demand and slow the drawdown of storages so the community can avoid the need for more severe restriction levels later.

Across NSW, many regions are experiencing similar patterns. According to WaterNSW, statewide

dam storage averages are trending downward, with some valleys already reporting reduced levels due to the dry start to 2026.

Local weather observations confirm that hot days have been frequent in January and early February, with temperatures reaching 36.4°C on 26 January 2026, further influencing evaporation and water loss.

The Council continues to monitor Malpas and Guyra storages closely, and community cooperation during early restriction phases remains essential for long term supply stability.

Residents can support these efforts by reducing outdoor watering, checking for leaks around the home, using water efficient appliances, and staying up to date with Council advice as conditions change. By working together to conserve water during hot, dry periods, the community helps maintain resilience through ongoing climate variability.

As we prepare for the possibility

of water restrictions, it's a great time for residents to take advantage of Council's water conservation initiatives, like the rainwater tank rebates. Simply search 'rainwater tank rebates' on our website to learn more and start your application.

Further, Council have also instigated soil rehydration workshops, field days and bootcamps for landholders commencing 19 February 2026 and running until May. These initiatives support the community in strengthening on property water resilience, improving soil moisture retention, and reducing reliance on town water during dry conditions. By investing in rainwater capture and learning practical rehydration techniques, landholders can better prepare their properties for extended dry periods, while also contributing to broader regional water conservation efforts. 




BreastScreen NSW Mobile Unit Coming to Guyra

Local women are being encouraged to take advantage of a free, potentially life-saving health service when the BreastScreen NSW mobile screening unit visits Guyra in March.

The mobile clinic will be operating from 4th to 11th March at the Public Car Park, 131 Bradley Street, Guyra, providing free mammograms for eligible women.

Breast cancer remains one of the most common cancers affecting women in New South Wales, with one in seven women diagnosed during their lifetime. Importantly, nine out of ten women who develop breast cancer have no family history, highlighting the importance of regular screening for all women, not just those considered at higher risk.

Early detection is key. A mammogram can detect changes in breast tissue well be-



fore they can be seen or felt, greatly improving treatment options and outcomes. The screening process is quick, simple and carried out by experienced

health professionals in a supportive environment.

Appointments can be made online through BreastScreen NSW or by calling 13 20 50.

With the mobile unit only in Guyra for a limited time, local women are urged not to delay and to make breast screening a priority.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

February 3rd Yarding of approx. 6300. No market report available. Sales are being conducted weekly.

Armidale Cattle Sale

February 5th - Armidale reduced numbers from previous sale by 314 head to 1350 mixed cattle. The regular buyers attended and operated to generally subdued trends for most categories.

A stand out offering of limited early weaner steers sold to 512c/kg the heifer portion making 431c/kg. Light background yearling steers 390c to 470c/kg while a draft of steers to 330kgs were dearer selling to 476c/kg.

Medium background steers slipped 15c/kg 330c to 456c/kg. Similar feeders marginally cheaper 420c to 488c/kg. Processor steers over 480kgs made to 443c/kg.

Light yearling heifers to 280kgs down 20c/kg 350c to 420c/kg.

Medium heifers to background cheaper 376c to 416c/kg. Feeder heifers over 480kgs gained 7c/kg 360c to 404c/kg. Processor heifers over 480kgs 418c to 434c/kg.

Heavy grown steers were dearer 380c to 400c/kg similar heifers 380c to 405c/kg. Restocker cows 337c to 353c/kg. Heavy three and four score cows 338c to 378c/kg. Heavy bulls dearer 370c to 410c/kg.

Weekly Wool Market

February 6th - Another positive market this week, despite upward pressure on the Australian dollar following the Reserve Bank's 0.25% interest rate rise on Tuesday. In a clear sign that demand for wool has improved, the stronger exchange rate did little to dampen competition in the sale room. Buyers—particularly those supplying the Chinese domestic market—were keen to fill existing orders and continued to push prices higher.

All micron indicators finished

in positive territory, with the exception of the 28-micron indicator. Passed-in rates remained low again this week as growers continue to take advantage of the recent price rises.

Major buying support was spread across the large trading companies, with Techwool, Endeavour, PJ Morris and Sequoia leading the way. We are fielding a growing number of enquiries from buyers regarding likely sale quantities over the coming weeks.

The first four selling weeks of the New Year have all offered close to 40,000 bales, and with passed-in rates remaining low, the trade is keen to gain clarity on the forward flow of wool.

Next week's offering is slightly smaller than this week, before we move into a one-week recess for Chinese New Year. The Chinese trade has been pushing for some time to introduce a recess, and this year marks the first trial to assess the impact of holding it so soon after the Christmas break.

Pig Control Efforts 'Not Enough'

Shadow Minister for Agriculture and Member for Northern Tablelands Brendan Moylan has criticised the Minns Labor Government's response to the state's growing feral pig problem, calling current control efforts inadequate.

Mr Moylan said that between July 2024 and June 2025, just 83,207 feral pigs were culled across NSW, despite population estimates exceeding 100 million.

He warned feral pigs are causing widespread damage to farms and the environment, destroying native vegetation, attacking livestock such as lambs and calves, and damaging crops and soil.

Mr Moylan said existing control methods, including aerial shooting, baiting and trapping, are failing to keep pace with rapidly increasing pig numbers. He is calling for increased funding and locally targeted, ongoing control programs, arguing that a one-size-fits-all approach will not be effective.
