Local wool classer recognised in National competition

Guyra was represented at the 2026 National Graduate Wool Classer Competition, with local entrant Tom Lockyer earning national recognition at the Sydney Royal Easter Show.

Trained through TAFE NSW by Pauline Smith, Tom was selected as a finalist in the prestigious competition held on April 7th.

Following in the footsteps of his father and grandfather, Tom has a strong family connection to the wool industry and is passionate about continuing that legacy. He plans to use his skills both on the family property and within the industry as a professional wool classer.

While the coveted Golden Stencil was awarded to Dubbo's Matthew Cox, Tom's efforts were recognised when he was presented with the inaugural Stuart Murphy Legacy Award, introduced by TAFE NSW to acknowledge a student demonstrating outstanding commitment to their training.

The national competition is regarded as the premier event for graduate wool classers and the only competition of its kind in the world. Finalists from across New South Wales, Victoria, South Aus-

tralia and Tasmania competed in a series of demanding tasks designed to test their skills across all aspects of wool classing.

These included multiple classing exercises using different wool types, wool valuation, a WoolClip task and an oral presentation to industry judges.

Australian Wool Exchange

(AWEX) CEO Charlie McElhone praised the high calibre of competitors and highlighted the importance of wool classers in maintaining Australia's reputation for producing some of the world's highest quality wool.

For Tom, the experience was not just about competition, but also building on his skills, gaining

industry exposure and connecting with others in the field.

His success also reflects the strength of training provided through TAFE NSW and the dedication of educators like Pauline Smith, who continue to support the next generation of wool professionals.

The Guyra Hockey Club are organising a special fundraiser to support Cody and Alyssa Patterson and their baby daughter, Frankie.

A two-person Ambrose golf day will be held on Sunday, April 26th at the Guyra Golf Course, with a shotgun start. Teams can enter in men's, women's or mixed divisions, and participants are encouraged to wear red to raise awareness for congenital heart defects.

All proceeds from the day will go directly to the Patterson family, who are currently facing an incredibly challenging time as they remain in Sydney by Frankie's side.

A GoFundMe page has also been launched, giving those unable to attend the golf day another way to show their support and help ease the financial pressure of medical, travel and living expenses.

Born on Christmas Eve, Frankie has already shown re-



markable strength in her young life. She was diagnosed with DiGeorge syndrome, a rare genetic condition caused by a small deletion on chromosome

22, which has resulted in complex congenital heart disease.

At just five weeks old, Frankie underwent open heart surgery to help stabilise her

condition, including the placement of a temporary conduit to replace her pulmonary artery. Following the operation, she required a pacemaker to regulate her heartbeat and continues to receive breathing support and ongoing treatment.

Frankie has been in the PICU at Westmead Children's Hospital since she was just two weeks old and is expected to remain there for several more months. She will also require further major surgery at around six months of age.

During this time, Alyssa and Cody have been staying in Sydney, unable to work as they focus on being with their daughter through her treatment and recovery.

The upcoming fundraiser is not only a chance to enjoy a round of golf, but also an opportunity for the community to come together and show its support.

Council prepares for potential fuel supply constraints

Armidale Regional Council is undertaking proactive planning to prepare for the possibility of future fuel supply constraints, with some non-essential services potentially impacted if the situation continues.

General Manager James Roncon said there is no immediate fuel issue affecting Council operations, but early preparation is essential to protect service delivery.

"There is no cause for concern at this stage, but sensible planning ensures we're ready if circumstances change," said James Roncon

"Our focus is on maintaining essential services while being honest with the community about what adjustments may be required if fuel shortages persist."

Council is developing a business continuity plan to guide operational decisions, including prioritising critical services and identifying areas where temporary reductions may be necessary.

"If fuel supply issues continue, residents may notice some service levels reduce or projects slow," James Roncon said.

"These changes would be temporary and carefully managed to minimise community impact."

Council is also exploring fuel-saving measures such as optional work-from-home arrangements, reduced travel between sites, and greater use of its electric vehicle fleet.

"These steps help us remain efficient and prepared while continuing to support our staff and community," James Roncon said.

Council will continue to monitor the situation closely and keep the community informed.

Warmest April spell for Guyra in 40 years

Unseasonably warm conditions swept across the region from April 7th to 11th, marking the warmest April spell Guyra has experienced in 40 years.

The five-day stretch was driven by very warm north-westerly winds from the centre of the continent, funnelling heat into New South Wales ahead of a dry cold front that moved

through late on April 11th.

Unofficial maximum temperatures remained well above average throughout the period, reaching 25.3°C on the 7th, 26.6°C on the 8th, peaking at 27.3°C on the 9th, followed by 26.8°C on the 10th and 25.9°C on the 11th.

The temperature of 27.3°C recorded on April 9th exceeds

the previous April record of 27.0°C set on April 4, 1986. However, the new figure remains unofficial, as measurements were taken using a non-standard instrument due to the regular maximum thermometer being out of order.

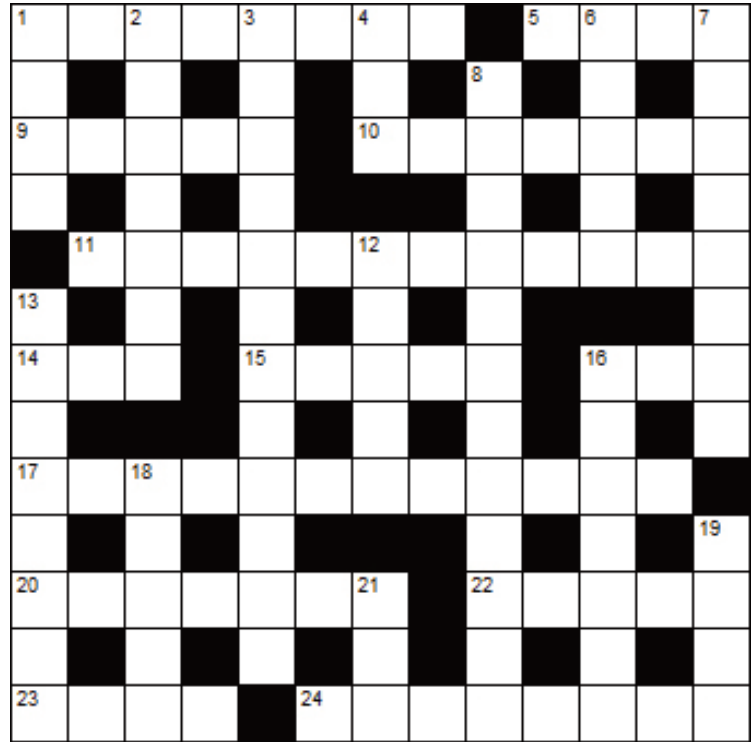

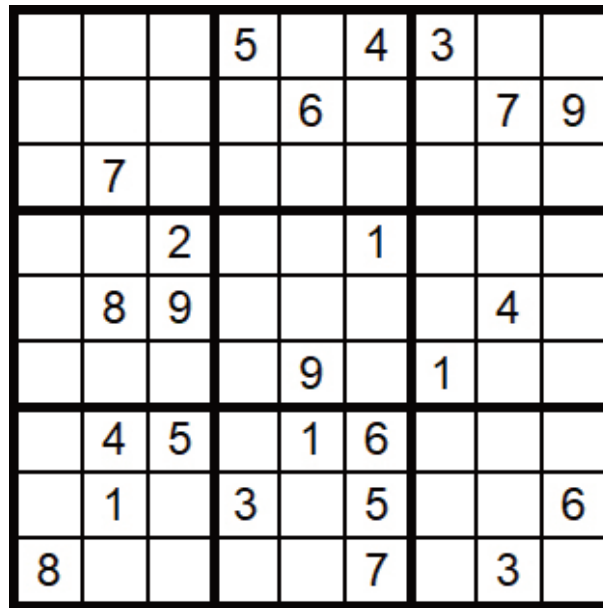

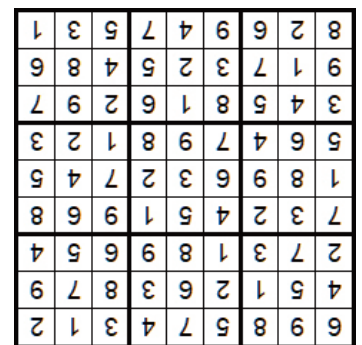

Pet rabbit owners encouraged to vaccinate against Rabbit Haemorrhagic Disease Virus

Northern Tablelands Local Land Services is encouraging local owners of pet rabbits in the Armidale, Guyra, Glen Innes, Deepwater and Tenterfield areas to vaccinate their pets against Rabbit Haemorrhagic Disease Virus (RHDV) this month ahead of a planned release of the RHDV biological control in mid-May as part of a coordinated program to manage wild rabbit populations.

Wild rabbits in the Northern Tablelands have bred rapidly over the past 12 months due to favourable seasonal conditions, and the use of biological controls like RHDV is one method that can assist local landholders to manage rabbits in the local environment. However, to ensure owners of pet rabbits are not adversely affected, Northern Tablelands Local Land Services are encouraging pet rabbit owners to speak to their private veterinarian



about vaccination.

RHDV affects only rabbits (*Oryctolagus cuniculus*) and is not harmful to native animals or domestic pets other than rabbits. RHDV is spread by direct contact between rabbits, by insects (such as fleas and flies) and by predator faeces (cat, dog, and fox).

Anthony Elliott, Senior Biose-

curity Officer at Northern Tablelands Local Land Services said that managing wild rabbit populations in the Northern Tablelands is essential to protect local ecosystems, farmland, and native wildlife.

“Wild rabbits are an invasive species in Australia and damage local environments through creat-

ing significant grazing pressure, competing with native animals for food and causing erosion and soil loss,” he said. “Landholders are responsible for controlling rabbits on their property as part of their General Biosecurity Duty in NSW.”

“As a precautionary measure, we are encouraging pet rabbit owners in the community to contact their private veterinarian about vaccination to avoid the chance of their rabbit becoming affected”, said Mr Elliott.

For more information about controlling wild rabbits, landholders can access the Local Land Services website and Northern Tablelands Regional Strategic Pest Animal Management Plan 2024-2028. Landholders can contact their local biosecurity officer on 1300 795 299 for advice on how to manage wild rabbits on their property.

Guyra Show Society's 2025 Young Woman, Colleen Pearson, has wrapped up a rewarding and transformative 12 months, describing the experience in three words - challenging, eye-opening and growth.

Colleen represented Guyra at Zone level twice during her year, first travelling to Barraba with just three weeks to prepare, before returning this year at Warialda with a full 12 months of preparation under her belt.

"The second time around was so much better," she said. "Having that time to prepare really made a difference."

The Young Woman program focuses on developing participants to benefit not only themselves, but also their local show societies and communities. Along the way, entrants build skills in public speaking, interviews and networking - areas Colleen admits once pushed her well outside her comfort zone.

"I entered the program to grow, and it's definitely brought me out of my shell," she said. "Speaking in front of people is something I

couldn't do 12 months ago."

Colleen said the experience also gave her a deeper appreciation for the work behind the scenes at the local Show. Her parents have always heavily involved and she continues that connection as head steward of the Lego section.

Throughout her time in the role, Colleen represented the Show Society at a range of community events, including laying a wreath on Anzac Day and attending Australia Day celebrations.

At the Zone finals in Warialda, she was one of 14 competitors and valued the opportunity to meet and connect with other young women.

"You get to know everyone really well. The interviews can be daunting, talking about yourself, but I'm proud of how far I've come," she said.

Despite not progressing further in the competition, Colleen said the experience was incredibly worthwhile, even with a memorable hiccup on the night when her table collapsed.

"It was still such a good experience," she said. "What you put into it is what you get out."

Now 23, Colleen attended Bald Blair Public School and Guyra Central School, and works as a team leader at the Elm Street tomato farm. She credits the program with helping build her confidence not only socially, but also in the workplace, and says it has even inspired plans to travel more.

Colleen has now passed the baton to 2026 Young Woman Reeghan Woods, while Junior Young Woman Charlie Ward is also gaining valuable experience.

She also believes programs like this are vital to the future of local shows.

"Just have a go and put your hand up," she said. "There's only a handful in my age group who are involved and it would be great to see more."

"It's really important to get new blood and new ideas into the show to keep it going for generations," she said. "New generations bring fresh energy."
