Falling dam levels signal dry times ahead

Armidale Regional Council (ARC) is calling on residents and businesses to reduce water use, with dam levels continuing to decline and climate outlooks pointing to warmer conditions, limited rainfall and increased pressure on local water supplies in the months ahead.

While water supplies remain available, Council warns that ongoing dry conditions, high evaporation rates and elevated water demand are contributing to a continued draw-down of storages and increases in restrictions.

The Bureau of Meteorology has advised that the recent La Niña weather pattern is weakening and expected to end during autumn, reducing the rainfall influence experienced in recent seasons. Seasonal outlooks show no strong signal for above average rainfall across inland and tablelands areas, including Armidale, while temperatures are likely to be warmer than average.

Climate modelling also indicates an increasing risk of El Niño devel-



oping later in winter, a pattern historically associated with hotter, drier conditions and heightened pressure on water supplies.

Council is warning that as water storage levels continue to fall rapidly, recovery can take months or even years, particularly without sustained rainfall. Acting early to reduce water use is the most effective way to slow the rate of drawdown and reduce the likelihood of tougher water restrictions being required later.

ARC Mayor Sam Coupland said that early action by the community would play a decisive role in protecting the region's water supply.

"Our dam levels are falling, dry conditions are looming, and we are edging closer to Level 2 water restrictions," Mayor Coupland said.

"The actions our community takes right now will determine whether tougher restrictions can be avoided. Saving water today is critical to protecting Armidale's supply in the months ahead."

Council continues to closely monitor dam levels, inflows, climate indicators and water consumption across the region. The actions taken by the community now will directly influence how water security is managed in the months ahead.

As part of this response, Armidale Regional Council will also deliver a community education program reflecting on the 2019 drought, using the region's shared experience as a reminder of how quickly water security can change.

The program will focus on sustainable water use now, encouraging households, businesses, schools and visitors to build waterwise habits early. By doing the hard yards today, the community can help protect long term water security and avoid the challenges associated with a "Day Zero" scenario that we all experienced in 2019.

OUR HISTORY: The Corps of Australian Rough Riders



The Corps of Australian Rough Riders primarily refers to specialized Remount Sections of the Australian Army Service Corps (AASC) during WWI, responsible for breaking and training spirited horses for mounted troops. These skilled horsemen, often bushmen, worked in danger-

ous conditions to prepare remounts, distinct from the civilian "Australian Rough Riders Association" (now APRA) formed in 1944.

The Australian Remount Units serving in the Middle East during World War have been described as 'a footnote to history' as their vital role in

supplying a steady stream of reliable and well-trained horses for the Australian Light Horse has often been overlooked.

Trooper Athol Archibald and John Weideman from Guyra were two of the hardy and daring men who served with this division.

Anzac Day is one of Australia's most important commemorations with communities across the country coming together to pay their respects to those who have served our country and to those who have made the ultimate sacrifice.

I encourage everyone in the community to attend a local service to honour those who fought for our country. Lest we forget.

Pay rise for our nurses

Nurses and midwives work incredibly hard under enormous pressure in our health system and they will now receive a well-earned pay rise after the NSW Industrial Relations Commission stepped in on the ongoing dispute and ordered the Minns Labor Government to increase their pay.

Although this is well deserved and welcomed, more could still be done around leave and working conditions.

Drought

Conditions have deteriorated rapidly since the beginning of the year and the impact of drought is being felt across the region. The current forecast looks very grim with no rain forecast until at least November.

Brisbane or Sydney, for medical services to be reimbursed a small amount of their travel and accommodation costs.

It is currently at 40 cents per kilometre but this is no longer keeping pace with the real cost of travel in 2026.

The NSW Nationals are calling on the state government to urgently review and increase the kilometre rate to more accurately reflect what it costs us to get either to Sydney or Brisbane.

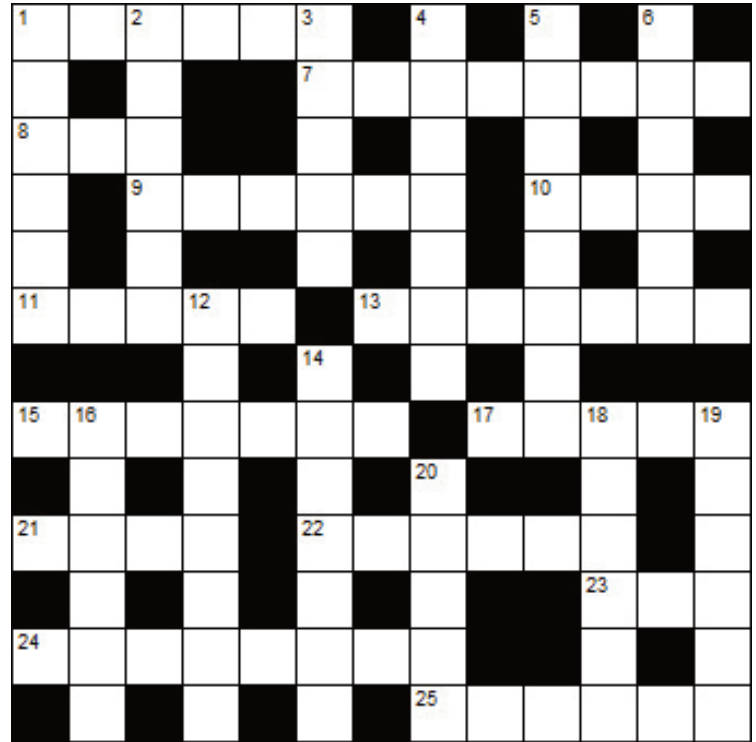

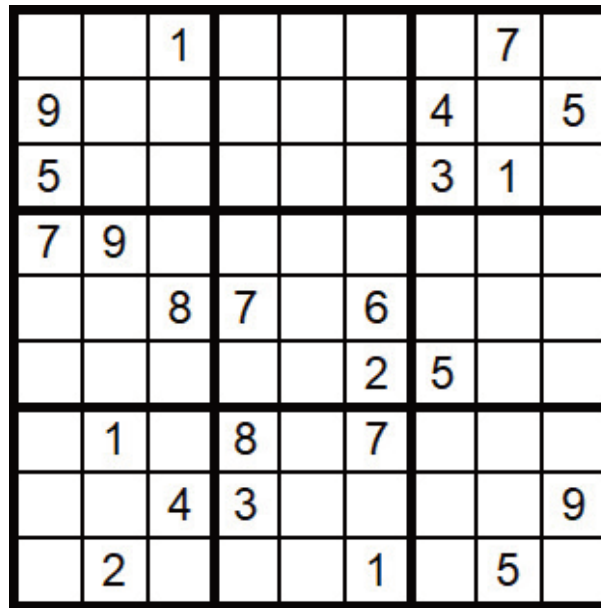

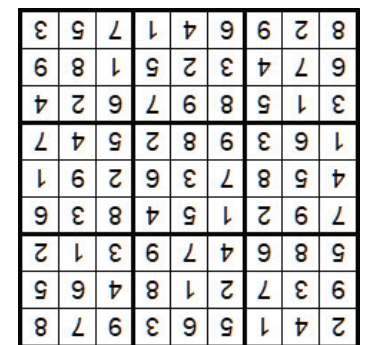

Festival of Small Halls coming to Guyra

Canadian folk/blues artist Joe H Henry and Australian guitar slinger Tullara will take to the stage in Guyra as part of the Festival of Small Halls, performing on Saturday, April 25 at the Australian Poetry Hall of Fame.

Now regarded as the benchmark for rural and regional touring, the not-for-profit music tour is presented by veteran festival producers Woodfordia Inc and is celebrating its 49th edition.

Métis singer-songwriter Joe H Henry possesses a voice described as "as powerful as a freight train" - a potent instrument delivering a rich blend of early rhythm and blues, soul and alt-country, underpinned by folk-inspired lyrical depth. Drawing on a remarkable life

journey, from a homeless train-hopping youth to a home-steading father of five, Henry's songwriting is both thoughtful and deeply authentic. His storytelling connects strongly with audiences, with each performance reflecting the depth of his lived experience.

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Bush families urged to plan ahead for emergencies

Better Internet for Rural, Regional and Remote Australia (BIRRR) and the Country Women's Association of NSW (CWA of NSW) are urging people in rural, regional and remote communities to make sure every member of the household understands how to contact emergency services, warning that misinformation about accessing emergency communications can have serious consequences.

The organisations said the message is simple, in an emergency people should call Triple Zero (000) first if they are able to do so.

The message comes with deep sympathy for families and communities who have experienced tragedy, near misses and preventable loss on farms and across regional Australia, where help can already be a long way away and response times can be affected by distance, terrain and connectivity challenges.

BIRRR Co-Founder Kristy Sparrow said knowing how to contact emergency services should be treated as a core part of farm and family safety planning.

"People in the bush are often working, travelling and living long distances from help, so un-

derstanding how to contact emergency services is not optional, it is essential," Mrs Sparrow said.

"We know too well the heart-break that follows tragedies and near misses in rural and remote Australia. When communities are already dealing with distance, patchy connectivity and delayed access to help, misinformation about emergency contact options can be incredibly dangerous.

"That is why families need to plan ahead. Talk about it around the kitchen table. Make sure adults know what to do, make sure older children know how to call 000, and make sure everyone understands what their phone can and cannot do in an emergency."

Mrs Sparrow said people should not assume there is a satellite backup available on every handset or that alternative emergency numbers provide extra protection within Australia.

"You can ring 000 but you cannot text them, the international emergency numbers have no benefit over 000 in Australia.

"If you are hearing impaired there are some options, but at this point in time you cannot connect to 000 directly through text.

"However, some newer phones

and providers have the capability to give you access to an emergency relay team via satellite text, it's a backup to direct voice calling.

"Check your phone settings, understand whether Wi-Fi Calling is enabled, know whether your device has any satellite capability, and remember that these features do not all work the same way. The best time to learn that is before something goes wrong, not during an emergency."

Ms Sparrow said the Regional Tech Hub is a free resource that can help people better understand their connectivity options and how to make the most of them.

"Our understanding is the RTH is nearing the end of its funding, but we hope to see it continued as there is obviously a need for independent technical advice."

CWA of NSW CEO Danica Leys said emergency readiness was especially important for rural families, many of whom live and work in isolated conditions.

"In country communities, people are often a long way from emergency services, and that reality makes preparation even more important," Ms Leys said.

"For families on farms and in

remote areas, teaching children and other household members how to call 000 can be just as important as teaching them what to do in a fire, accident or medical emergency."

"We want people to have these conversations before they are needed. Who has service at different points on the property? Who knows the property address or directions? Who can explain the location to an operator? These things matter when every minute counts."

Ms Leys said rural families should be supported with accurate, accessible information, not confused by misleading claims.

"Regional, rural and remote Australians already face enough barriers when it comes to distance, communications and access to services," she said.

"They deserve clear advice that helps them prepare, protect their families and act quickly when something goes wrong."

BIRRR and CWA of NSW are encouraging households, farms and rural businesses to review their emergency communication plans, check device settings, and ensure all family members know the basics of contacting help.

Police seize \$84,000 of illicit tobacco and vaping products

New England Police and NSW Health have seized \$84,000 of illicit tobacco and vaping products and have issued three short term closure notices to tobacconists following a Combined Agency Operation.

Between Wednesday 15 April 2026 and Thursday 16 April 2026,

a targeted operation was conducted by officers attached to the New England Police District and NSW Health Tobacco Regulation and Enforcement.


The operation focused on the compliance of non-licensed retail tobacconists, addressing reported complaints to both Government

agencies relating to the growing concern and prevalence of illicit tobacco and vaping products being readily available to the community.

As a result of the Combined Agency Operation, three tobacco retail premises were inspected in Armidale and Glen Innes, with all being issued closure notices under

the Public Health (Tobacco) Act 2008 for a three-month period.

During an inspection of the three locations, NSW Health Inspectors and police located and seized a total of tobacco and vaping products with an estimated value of \$84,000 as well as sums of money suspected of being the proceeds of crime.

Rural Market Reports

Guyra Sheep and Lamb Sale

April 14th - Total yarding of 8118 3433 lambs and 4789 sheep. No market report available.

Armidale Cattle Sale

April 16th - 4050 cattle were scanned in Armidale 390 more than the previous week. The yarding consisted of predominately cows again as well as a few secondary yearling and weaner cattle.

Over 50 000 cows have been sold through Tamworth, Gunnedah, Inverell and Armidale prime sales over the past 6 weeks in preparation for winter. The cows that were sold were fair quality for an overall cheaper Market. Prime Yearling cattle were limited.

The steers made to 388c while the heifers made to 370c/kg. Yearling steers to feed lacked quality and ranged from 390/kg to 440c/kg. The heifers made from 370c to 398c/kg.

Light cattle to the restocker were considerably cheaper. The Steers

topped at 464c and the heifers made to 390c/kg Prime grown heifers were 10c cheaper they made to 356c/kg.

Cows were 15c to 20c cheaper across the board. 2 and 3 score cows to the processor made from 240c to 330c/kg. Prime heavy weight cows made from 318c to 360c to average 332c/kg. Cows going back to the paddock made to 315c and bulls made to 392c/kg

Weekly Wool Market

April 17th - The current trend in the market continued. There is only a 12 month period in the past 30 years where the wool market has traded higher which was during the crossover of the 2018/19 season. This comes despite global issues supposedly conspiring against us.

The restocking by Chinese interests continues unabated and one can only wonder just how low stock on hand must have been. World demand will be no doubt tempered in the short term but the build-up for the return is being

planned.

There is limited supply left of held wool across the country according to calculations and in the past this supply coming onto the market has smoothed the fluctuations in prices. It's now all about fresh wool entering the system, so much so that Sydney has been reduced to a 1 day sale next week with just 32,000 bales expected to be offer nationally.

The one week Easter recess created a larger sale this week with almost 45,000 bales on offer. This was easily absorbed by the trade with just 2.6% passed in. In the Northern region the market jumped 26 cents on Tuesday's opening followed by a further 10 cents on Wednesday.

As an industry we are sitting on large welcome yearly changes that were desperately needed. Historically these changes will also plateau at some point in time for multiple sides of the industry, to hopefully make them sustainable for all and encourage a new price point at a productive level to be set for many years to come.
